The readers of this paper are titled to an explanation as to to sudden change in a title which has

sudden change in a title which has served for nearly three years. For this it will be necessary to give them some insight into what may be termed the secret history of recent English journalism in Montevideo.

Notwithstanding the steady growth of British interests in the Republic, and the increasing importance of the English colony here, for many years there was no English paper until on March 1, 1888, there was published the River Plate Times. This first appleared as a weekly paper, and was sulventioned by the Government of President Tajes, Dr. Julio Herrera y President Tajes, Dr. Julio Herrera y Obes, now President, being then Minister of Government. Its avow-ed-jobject was to make known the alth and resources of the Republic to English readers, for which pur pose rose coloured tints were largely employed. Its title, which, by the had been used many years before by an extinct journal now almost forgotten, was not then inappropriate, for the paper also paid considerable attention to Argentine affairs, was written more for European than local readers, and could not be raid to bere any continuer. be said to have any particular

A week later there appeared the Express, the first daily English paper ever published in the Republic. This, likewise, was assisted by President Tajes Government, though not with great regularity. For some little time both these papers were

moderately prosperous.

Early in 1889 the River Plate
Times was published twice instead of
once a week, but very shortly after,
the subvention, which for some time had been paid very irregularly, was withdrawn altogether, and on July 12, 1889, the paper being virtually dead, the connexion and title were dead, the connexion and the webs bought up and assumed by the Montevideo Independent, a daily paper which first saw the light on June 1, 1889, and which was published in the interests of certain capital-ists, and which solicited but never obtained Government support.
The papers being amalgamated, the River Plate Times now appeared daily, being really the continuation of the newer paper under the older title. But it was soon found that this title was very inappropriate for a daily paper, being indefinite, not to say misleading, as to locality, its interests being centered in Uruguay, which is not the first suggestion made by the River Plates. Contemporaries when quoting had to use the clumsy circumlocution «The River Plate Times of Montevideo.» On March 31, 1890, the Express, which had long ceased to receive any Government assistance, disappeared from view and the River Plate Times was left in the proud position of the only English paper

in the Republic. We now come down to a very recent period. On October 1, 1890, the River Plate Times, for a second time moribund, was acquired by the present proprietor, who took it over in good faith and in the belief that was at liberty to conduct it as to him seemed best. He therefore was not slow in initiating a new, vigorous and outspoken policy, which, there is good reason to believe, was already beginning to revive the fallen fortunes of the paper and to raise it in general estimation. But, to his unleasant surprise, hardly a month had elapsed when an effort was made to checkmate or silence this policy by a counter claim being laid to the title of the paper, for the purchase of which he holds the receipt.

Although the present proprietor does not doubt in the least that his claim is morally and legally substantial, he does not think it worth while to enter into dispute or litigation to to preserve a title which is so unsuitable and which has such antecedents, Therefore, without waiving his claim, he prefers to avoid any such trouble by re-christening his paper by the new and more appropriate name of The Montevideo Times, by which name it will henceforth be

THE MONTEVIDEO TIMES, therefore, appears to-day as practically a new paper. The English Community here, and all readers interested in this Republic, have now before them for the first time, an entirely independ ent English newspaper, assisted by no subvention, subservient to no private interests, subject to no extraneous influences, and free from all obligations save those of truth and konour. Thus voluntarily free-ing itself from all doubtful or undesirable associations, the paper to-day opens a new record, and the out-spoken policy which has already had

sued without fear or favour.

Although the resident English community is not large, there are great interests at stake. Both financially and socially there is evident necessity for a genuine, straight-forward English paper, which shall be of service and interest equally to-readers here and elsewhere. But to remain independent, or rather to continue its existence at all, such a paper must be self-supporting, that is to say, it must be maintained, not by subventions or by private al-lowances, but by the income derived lowances, but by the income derived from its advertisements and subscriptions. Therefore, confiding in the candour and honesty of his intentions the proprietor takes this opportunity of earnestly appealing to all his readers, and to all persons with any interest in this country, to give

worthy of and valuable to the community. It rests with no one-so much as with the community itself, to make The Mostratico Trans in reality, what its predecessors have only been in name, a representative English paper in Uruquay, which may be read with absolute confidence by all.

(November 26th) PASSING NOTES.

Politically and financially, affairs seem to be at a standstill, even perhaps at a dead-lock. There is little movement, less outlook. invariably surrounds itself on such occasions, the opposition papers will utter their usual cry in the wilderness, there will be the usual heap of protest; against the informality, illegality or corruption of the proceedings, which will be as usual quietly shelved, the Government nominees will assume their seats with unabashed foreheads and undisturbed digestion, and the President will ed digestion, and the President will once more be blessed with a deferential and feal Legislature; duly scor-respondent to command.» Such a prospect is not enlivening, and is aggravated by the fact that there is no relief from it by any ordinary resources. In such a case one has to turn to remedies which may be thought about or spoken about but which are bestleft unwritten. And such remedies sometimes prove no better than the disease.

Financially the outlook is equally painful. The collapse of Baring Brothers has deprived us of the one rock of refuge to which we were clinging, and, considering the effect their collapse has had on European finances, there is little hope of their place being supplied for some time to come. Obedient to the impulses of the hour and to the circulation of insiduous rumours which is now the favoured weapon of Bolsa gamblers, gold and stocks have their little up sand downs within certain limits, but of genuine recovery there is neither sign nor hope. Morethere is neither sign nor hope. Moreover the market continues to be hampered with a host of speculative shares, which, although sunk to prices beyond ridicule, block the way for other more legitimete beginning. other more legitimate busines general liquidation would be the best thing that could happen, and this un-fortunately is the very thing that the tyrants of the situation are most tenaciously resisting, acting on the knowledge that it would deprive them of the last relics of position or

Whilst the political and financial ituation is thus gloomy, there is ome consolation in noting that railway enterprise in the republic, though hampered by the crisis, is slowly, unostentatiously and surely

Pushing its way.

The principal lines continue forming fresh combinations ar opening new sections of their extensions, and thus gradually building up a network or system which may be compared to the bony structure of an animal. This growth goes on almost unnoticed, except for some quiet announcement that another section has been opened to public traffic, or that the constructing ngineers have advanced to such point, but for all that it is the solid base on which the future prosperity of the republic, the fles and blood of the animal, will, eventually depend. We even hear of new concessions being asked for, not by those concession-mongers whose only business is to hawk their concessions about till they meet the highest bidder, but from genuine men who have both the capacity and means of carrying out the schemes they propose, and only seek the con-cession as the legitimate means to a tory, and it is refreshing, once in a while to find that behind the mass of political and financial corruption disease there is still something healthy, tangible and promising.

Sr. A. M. Rodriguez then proposed the following additional Article.

The President of the National Bank shall have the power to veto such resolutions of the Directorate as he may consider violative of its statutes or charter or prejudicial to public interests. Any disputes arising with this motive shall be submitted to the definite resolution of the Executive Power. When the question concerns the opening of credits or acceptance of values, bills, etc., the suspensive veto of the President may only be to refuse and never to concede the credit solicited. The article was ac-

cepted.

The remainder of the scheme was

then approved, one or two verbal alterations only being made.

The third scheme, for the creation of the National Mortgage Bank, was then approved with the modi-fications proposed by the Com-mittee and with the addition of three articles, copied from the Law of the Argentine National Mortgage Bank, concerning procedure in the

Central Uruquay Railway.

On the 23rd, inst. was opened a new part of this railway, being the first section of 66 Kilometres of the Northern Extension from the Ric Negro to Achar on the route to the Recalling frontier at Santa Ana. The works upon this line are proceeding rapidly, and when completed will give direct communication between the rich Southern provinces of Brazilland Montevideo. Of the total length and Montevideo. Of the total length of this extension which is about 293 kilometres, 240 Kilometres of the earth-works are finished and already more than 150 Kilometres of rails are laid so that it seems probable the coming year may see the entire railway finished and opened, an attainment much to be desired and one which cannot fail to have a very beneficial effect upon the fut re of the Northern portion of the Republic.

The first section of an important extension of the Central Railway from what has hitherto been Northern terminus at the Paso de Northern terminals and the control was also opened for public for the same date. The direction of the new line is almost due northwards and it has for its desti-nation, when complete, the town of Rivera opposite Santa Ana. on the Southern boundary of Brazil, where Southern boundary of Brazil, where it is highly probably communication will, before long, be established with the railways of the latter country. In the mean time the new line passing as it does through the heart of the Northern provinces of Uruguay will greatly benefit the inhabitants of that part of the country who have hitherto been practically cut off during the winter season from communication with the Capital. The new section of the Railway now opened is 66 Kilometres in length and the total distance from Paso de los Toros to Rivera is 293 Kilometres.
