Paysandu Notes.
(From a camp correspondent.)
The locusts are with us, causing great alarm among the inhabitants, as yet we have not heard of any great damage, but the young «saltonas» are most to be feared, so the prospects of certain crops are not very cheerful, but the wheat and barley is considered safe. Although rain has fallen this month, the camps are sadly in want of more, several crops being at a standstill.

The following Devon bulls have been purchased by Mr. James Vieira, of the Bank of Buenos Aires, to be placed in his Estancia in Chacarí, Arroyo (33) Negro (36), John Bull (37) Gladstone (38) Bismarck (39) and Baron (40). The lot as a whole is uniform in respect to short legs, level lines top and bottom, heavy hind quarters thickly fleshed, neat bone and mellow hides.

They are a lot of preeminently useful bulls, and it needs no judge to conclude from even a casual inspection that they are the product of a herd, whose owners eschew fashion and set up utility as the sole standard.

The Devon cow Carly Nora 3rd (9141) has given birth to a beautiful heifer calf named Duchess of Queensbury. She is by Major (2065) a son of General Gordon (1974) by Lord Currypool (1589) Carly Nora herself, is by Lord Currypool, this cross has been made to intensify those qualities that have made the Currypool blood so famous. We are told that the descendants of this bull have been awarded more than a hundred prizes at England's greatest Shows.

It is said here that all the steamers intend making Paysandu their ultimate destination, passengers and cargo for the North, to be carried by the Midland Uruguay Railway, and that docks and workshops will be erected in our Port. We cannot vouch for the truth of this statement, but we think the public would be greatly benefited by this arrangement and the River Company would be relieved of a traffic of doubtful utility. It is certain that we can offer great facilities for the landing of passengers and cargo at the Railway jetty and it is generally thought that the time is not far distant when Paysandu must absorb all the importing and exporting business of the North and the Brazilian frontier.

The Midland Railway is now carrying much of the passenger traffic to Montevideo. The conveniences offered are very great to business men, as they can leave here at 12.15 P. M. and arrive in Montevideo early next morning. We are feeling the financial crisis here, but as little or no speculation has taken place, it is believed that in Paysandu

the effects of the abuses of credit have not been felt so severely as in other towns.

There have been few wool sales as yet, buyers do not seem anxious to fulfil their orders, they are quietly waiting events. A new feature is noticed that must have a beneficial effect on our future, good parcels of wool are being sent to the «barraza» for the inspection of buyers, so that now wools will be sold on their merits. Messrs. Corbet have every facility for classifying and baling wool for the European market, thus saving great expense to buyers. Some Estancieros send their clips annually to Europe and one year with another, they find it more advantageous than selling locally. It is calculated that 150,000 arrobas enter the Paysandu market every season. The breeds most cultivated are merinos, such as Rambouillet, and German merinos, Negretti, a few Vermont crosses may be seen, the English breeds used are the Lincoln, Romney Marsh Downs, some few Leicester, and last year some of Aylmer's long woolled rams were introduced. The wools have a high classification and are said to give from 38 to 42 per cent of washed wool. The buyers are generally Frenchmen, for the Antwerp markets.

Royal Mail Steam Packet Company.
The following is from the report of the directors of this company submitted to the general meeting on Wednesday, the 24th Oct.—
1890, to which the present accounts refer. The company had to encounter serious difficulties arising from the anti-British feeling developed in Portugal (which caused passengers from that country and Brazil to avoid English steamers), the revolution in Brazil, and the high premium on gold at Buenos Aires, all of which materially affected «passage-money» and as the homeward passage receipts in the corresponding period of 1889 were exceptionally good both from the West Indies and South America, owing to the Paris Exhibition, the falling off under that head is the more marked.

On the other hand, the freight earnings show a large increase, so that the receipts from all sources are only £12,000 less than in the same period of 1889. The increase on the expenditure side of the revenue accounts mainly occurs in coal, freight, and charges. This is due to coal being dearer, to a greater consumption from some of the company's steamers being larger and employed at a higher speed, and to there having been about 21,000 additional miles run. Notwithstanding the above circumstances, the transfer from the «revenue» account to the «repair and renewal» account is £48,314 (being at the full rate of 6 per cent per annum on the cost of the fleet) £38,500 is provided for depreciation, and £23,850 for insurance.

The debit balance on the «repair and renewal» account is further increased, but it must be borne in mind that, in addition to the ordinary repairs of the fleet for the half-year, there is a considerable amount charged against this account for the expenditure on the Para, in altering her engines to the triple expansion system, and giving her new boilers and a general refit. The result of the alterations has been eminently satisfactory, and the directors believe that she will be found in every respect equal to her sister ship, Don. The work now having been completed till after June 30, the remainder of the outlay on her will be a charge on the current half-year. This is the last extraordinary repair necessary to place the fleet in a position to meet all requirements, and it may be expected that the usual transfer will rapidly restore the account to a satisfactory condition.

The directors dispatched Tagus on the 4th October in commencement of the new direct route to the River Plate, to be followed by Moselle and Elbe. All these are superior passenger ships, and the sailings are to be every four weeks. Beginning the voyage at Rotterdam, the vessels will come to London, and calling at Southampton for mails, passengers, and cargo, and at Peninsular ports and Las Palmas, will proceed thence to Montevideo and Buenos Aires, without touching at Brazilian ports. The directors confidently hope that the route will be profitable to the company. The new West India mail contract was executed on May 15, last, and came into operation on July 1 following.

The shareholders must be well aware of the advance of wages that has taken place in different branches of labour, and of the workmen having in many cases, assumed an attitude which has impeded the conduct of business, and caused expense. The company have felt the effects of this to some extent, even in the present accounts, and since the close of the half-year their operations were interfered with in a very serious manner at Southampton. The directors will continue to give this question their careful consideration, and take such steps as may appear judicious under the circumstances.

The quarantine regulations imposed by Brazil, since June last, in consequence of cholera in Spain,

have, the directors regret to say, rendered necessary a modification of route, which impairs the company's passenger earnings from the Peninsula. The revolution which occurred at Buenos Aires towards the end of July last also interfered with the company's traffic, but quietude now prevails, and the directors trust that the peaceful progress of the important region of the Argentine Confederation in the future.

The directors consider that the moderate balance at credit of profit and loss account should be carried forward, but from the insurance account (against which it is gratifying to notice that there is only the small charge of £31), they recommend to the shareholders the payment of a bonus of £2 a share, free of income-tax; the warrants for the distribution to be issued on the evening of Nov. 1.

The Montevideo Telephone Company, Limited.
The directors of this company, in presenting their report, with the accounts for the year ending 31st July last, which shows a gross profit of £10,301 frs. 9d. after providing for all working expenses in Montevideo and London, go on to state: Off this sum there has been written £114 1s. 8d. for preliminary expenses, and £19 10s. for depreciation of furniture, leaving a balance of £10,167 Os. 8d. To this must be added the balance from last year, £325 8s. 5d., making a total now to be dealt with of £10,492 8s. 8d. The directors recommend that of this amount the full dividend of 6 per cent on the preference shares amounting to £2,308 7s. 2d. be declared, that £1,000 be added to the depreciation fund, and that the balance, £7,184 1s. 6d. be carried forward. An interim dividend on the preference shares was paid in March last. During the year the sum of £5,600 frs. 7d. has been expended on capital account, chiefly in consequence of the completion of the fixture of the multiple switch board, cables, and lines for new subscribers. The directors regret that the results for the past year have not come up to their expectations, but bearing in mind the severe commercial depression which for a considerable portion of that year, has prevailed in Montevideo, and which has caused very many subscribers to curtail their expenses by relinquishing their subscriptions, but deem it satisfactory to have maintained the profit at above £10,000. For these reasons it has not been deemed advisable to recommend any dividend on the ordinary shares. It is gratifying, however, to report that the latest advices from the manager are to the effect that a large number of subscribers, who had left for a variety of reasons, have returned to the company.

Promotion and Reception.
The veteran General George Mauey, of Tennessee, United States Minister here, has recently been promoted to the category of Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary of the United States to the Republics of Uruguay and Paraguay. In this new capacity he will be officially received by the President of the Republic at 3 o'clock this afternoon. In our next issue we hope to give the speeches made upon the occasion. General Mauey has made himself much respected during his short residence here, and as he is an able speaker, will no doubt find something to say worth the hearing.

Athletic Sports.
Although we recently had occasion to remark that the entries for the Annual Athletic Sports which constitute such a characteristic institution of the English community, were below the mark, we are now glad to be able to announce that at the last moment they picked up considerably so much so that there are over 100 entries made against 147 last year, so there is every promise of a most interesting and successful meeting. In other respects, too, the results are equally satisfactory. All the first prizes except one have been promised, and a comfortable sum collected for the prize fund, in addition. The greater number of the officials who regulated the sports last year have again promised their assistance. The introduction of the bicycle race is likely to prove most interesting. The arrival of the U. S. vessels «Pensacola» and «Essex» gives hopes of the arrangement of an international race and a tug of war between the crews of these and of the British ships in ports. These will be remembered, proved two of the most exciting events in last year's programme. Altogether, then, this year's meeting will be fully equal to its predecessors. In a few days we hope to publish the particulars of the arrangements for the meeting, which takes place on Monday, December 8, a holiday.

The R. M. S. «Moselle» is expected from Southampton this morning, it being her first trip to these waters.

Suicide.
A painful sensation was created in the city yesterday by the news of the suicide of Sr. Vicente Camboni, one of the proprietors of the large Bazaar Independencia, at the corner of calle Sarandí and the Plaza Independencia. Sr. Camboni was a man of 64 years old, had resided in this country for some 50 years, and was in the enjoyment of a comfortable fortune, having retired from an active share in the business some time ago. He recently lost his youngest son, a boy of 14, and this loss greatly preyed upon his spirits. At an early hour yesterday morning, in his private house in calle Canelones, he committed suicide by throwing himself into the open well in the patio, full of water. He was observed by the servants, and assistance was summoned at once, but owing to the difficulties caused by the narrow opening of the well, it was a long time before the body could be extracted, and life was quite extinct. The act was thoroughly premeditated, as investigation showed that he had not been bed, but had passed the night writing farewell letters, of which no fewer than eighteen were found on his table, addressed to his family, partners, friends, and relations in Italy. The previous afternoon he had visited the Bazaar and had there taken an unusually ceremonious farewell of the principal employees. The funeral will take place at 9 this morning.

Important Capture.
The detective force have just effected an important capture in the person of one José Noboy Selano, a Spaniard, accused of robbing a Madrid Bank for one million pesetas some two years ago. For this he had been imprisoned in Madrid, but by bribing his guards escaped to Paraguay, where he established himself in Asunción as a merchant and Bolsa speculator, making much money. Finding this field too small he then went to Buenos Aires where he tried the same plan with success, attracting attention by his luxurious and ostentatious mode of living, and the display of diamonds exhibited by himself and his wife. Recently he transferred himself to this city, renting a handsome house at Paysandu 79, speculating largely on the Bolsa and generally living in the grandest style. His arrest was effected at the request of the Spanish Minister, according to instructions received from Spain and in accordance with the extradition treaty. He will be sent to Spain to be placed at the disposal of the authorities. He is a man of about 50 years old, well dressed and of cultivated manners. It is believed he has an accomplice, for whom the police are still looking.

Fires.
Our recent remark that fires rarely come alone has received further corroboration. About midnight on Wednesday a violent fire broke out in the «almacen» of B. Pascual, at the corner of calles Paysandu and Cuareim. The Fire Brigade was soon on the spot, but owing to the inflammable contents of the shop, were unable to stem the fire, and had hard work to prevent it spreading to the neighbouring buildings. The shops, which was a very busy one, was completely destroyed.

The business was insured in the «Alianza» company for \$5,000, but the damages are considerably more. The origin of the fire is unknown, and the proprietor has been arrested, pending enquiries. There was a tremendous crowd of lookers-on, whom the police had great trouble in keeping in order.

About 8.30 on Wednesday a fire broke out in the «tambó» in calle Ejido, between Paysandu and Cerro Largo, but was soon extinguished by the police and fire brigade, the damages being insignificant.

A third fire broke out yesterday afternoon in the Cordón, in a large «barraza» in calle Salsipuedas, behind the old School of Arts and Trades. The Fire Brigade was quickly on the spot, and the fire threatened to be a serious one. We have to hold over the result until our next issue.

SUNDRIES.
—The flags on the Government and public buildings were half-masted yesterday as a sign of mourning for the death of the King of Holland.
—By order of the Tribunal of appeal, Dr. Sarthogha has been suspended from his post as Commercial Judge of the 1st. turn until the settlement of the mutual process for assault and battery with Dr. Durá and Sr. Velga. This is the model functionary who has just been reprimanded for his violent language towards the Chamber of Representatives—though a good many others are privately of the same way of thinking—and who, in the assault above mentioned, produced and used a revolver in the open street.
—Sr. Gomez Riano has indignantly resigned his post as director of the Pedagogical (pretty word), Museum and Library. The world continues to revolve on its own axis once in 24 hours, all the same.
—Our composers, not being English, have an invincible repugnance to the use of the letter «v» and hence, in our notice of the

Concert, yesterday, the name of our esteemed friend Dr. Lavru appeared three times spelt with a «v» instead of a «w», although it had been carefully corrected in the proof. For this mistake, incidental to English journalism in a foreign country, we now tender our sincerest regrets.

—The Chief of Police has actually discharged a policeman of the 5th section, and placed him at the disposal of the Correctional Judge, for having used unnecessary violence (which we presume is an euphemism for the «machete» towards a man whom he arrested. This proceeding is worthy of all applause, but at the same time we would warn the Chief of Police against following it too frequently, or the end will be that the numbers of the force will be reduced almost out of sight.

—It is telegraphed that the winter session of the British Parliament was opened last Tuesday. The Queen's Speech contained no remarks of interest.

—Don Luis Garabelli, the active and eminent Secretary of the Oriental Legation in London, has arrived here on leave of absence for a few months.

—Captain W. G. Blist, of the light artillery has gone to Salto, on leave of absence for three months.

—Gold closed yesterday at 140 1/2, according to which the paper dollar is worth 71.2 cents.

—The short season of the Siblon Company at the Politeama having concluded, the theatre now vacates for a great wonder, and what is more, no company is announced in perspective. For a time the city will remain without theatrical amusements.

—The lady who wore a low-neck dress, and forgot to take the porous plaster off her back, attracted much attention.

—The Tribuna Popular asserts positively that two days ago Sr. Alcides Montero presented his resignation of the Portfolio of Finance, but that the President refused to accept it. As a rider to this (which finds no echo in the other papers) it is added that the President has no intention of making any Ministerial changes until the elections are passed.

POPULAR IGNORANCE OF SANITARY RULES

To medical practitioners the ignorance and apathy displayed by many persons in the presence of infectious disease are indeed surprising. The indiscriminate use of dwelling-rooms by the sick and healthy, and the glaring ignorance often exhibited in the use, or rather the misuse, of disinfectants are far from encouraging to believers in popular sanitation. Neglect in these particulars is unfortunately of too common occurrence, and such an incident as the employment of a carrier's cart as an incense burner for the victims of diphtheria is probably not unique. It is not indeed a very striking example of its kind, for diphtheria is a disease rather of contagious than infectious property. Certainly its influence in this latter respect, though it cannot be excluded, is not to be compared with that of the exanthemata. Experience forbids us to doubt, however, that a disorder of the latter class would have been accommodated with equal readiness by some carmen in the vicinantly devoted to the service of provision dealers. The local sanitation authority where this mismanagement occurred were therefore well advised in interfering with the too willing service of the self-appointed undertaker. There are silver aspects to many clouds, however, and we must not forget that, in spite of contrary indications like that above mentioned, signs are also met with which prove that even among the poor the sanitary meaning of cleanliness, ventilation, wholesome drainage, and water-supply are not wholly misunderstood.—Lancet.

THE AMERICAN NAVY.

The United States Secretary of the Navy has just decided upon the orders for three additional battleships and a protected cruiser for the American Navy. Four firms competed, and the Secretary has notified Messrs. W. E. Cramp & Sons, Philadelphia, of the award to them of the contract for the construction of two coast-line battleships for \$3,200,000 each, and the contract for the triple-screw protected cruiser at 2,735,000 dollars. The Union Iron Works, San Francisco, have also been informed of the award to them of the contract for the construction of one of the battleships at 3,180,000 dollars, the amount of the Cramp tender for one vessel. Their tender was 3,240,000 dollars, and the award is consequently 60,000 dollars less. Should they decline to accept this figure then the contract for the four vessels will go to the Cramps. The contract given to the Philadelphia firm is the largest ever given to a single yard in the United States, the amount aggregating 8,765,000 dollars. The vessels are to be floated by 1893. When finished the United States will possess a modern navy consisting of fifteen armoured vessels, five of which will be of the battle ship type, and thirty-

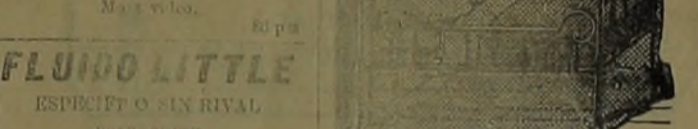
