FACTORS OF THE CRISIS.

Having no political bias, we cannot share the opinion freely express-ed by several party organs of influence that the present crisis is primarily and mainly due to the present Go-vernment. However serious may be the sins of omission and commission committed by the Government, we will do it the justice to absolve it from

that charge.

A crisis such as that from which we are now suffering is a disease of a complicated nature, not due to one cause alone, but to several which act

crisis seems to us to be divisable into two two branches, economic, as applied to the Government, financial, applied to commerce and business in general, and each of these branches embraces several factors. This definition may not seem very clear, but it is as near the mark as the shortcomings of our vocabu-lary will permit us to arrive. Let us

The origin of the crisis dates far beyond the access to power of the present. Government. To keensighted persons it might have been visible plainly enough in the year 1889, when the so-called shooms was at its height. At all events the finan-cial side of it should have been then apparent. The astention of European apparent. The attention of European capitalists had been directed in an unusual degree to the River Plate Republics, then in a period of rapid growth and apparently lasting prospericy and peace. The consequence was money came in treely, and was lavished on schemes good and bad. Hence arose a speculative fever, fostered by unscrupulous local capitalists who made and lost fortunes with equal facility. It was a period of general inflation and gambling. Business of all kinds was pushed beyond its natural limits and consequently outgrewits strength. Conquently outgrewits strength. Con-cessions were applied for and granted wholesale for all sorts of ent-prpises, wholesale for all sorts of enterprises, with or without guarantee, and fre-quently enough solely for the purpose of selling them to some luckless in-vestors. Intrinsic value was entirely disregarded and prices were sent racing up and down as the «bulls» or «bears» and down as the souls or sears gained the upper hand, or to suit the convenience of those capitalists whose superior audacity enabled them to rigs the market. Behind all this relative dishonesty there was not a little absolute dishonesty in not a little absolute dishonesty in the administration of companies and speculative banks. Directors played fast and loose with the funds entrusted to them by confiding shareholders, imposing upon them with fallsfield balance-sheets and carrying their points by the aid of packed meetings. In short it was a repetition in a minor degree of the South Sea Craze and the many speculative fevers which have from time to time attacked various centres and have invariably brought disaster in their train. It is from the perfectly natural and logical conse-quences of all this that we are now suffering. The productive and indus-trial energies of the country were stimulated, it is true, but not to the degree represented, nor in a wholesome manner. On the contrary, they were mis-directed and over-strained. Consequently, like an ill-used race horse, they have been injured and crippled, and their last state is worse

than their first, Whilst this was going on in the financial and commercial world, the Government, that of General Tajes first, and that of Dr. Herrera afterwards, was contributing its quota to the causes that have produced present events, Behind the scenes, Government officials, from the highest down to the very porters

The country has been over-taxed, and the revenue has been misapplied. This a subect to which we have frequently referred of late, and therefore will not enlarge upon now. Dr. Herrera's Government, to our thinking, is chiefly to blame in that, when it saw the crisis at hand, it did not immediately introduce those administrative economies only now on the tapis, and relieve some of the over-taxation from which the country suffers. And, although we do not think that there exists here that wholesale and tremendous corruption wholesale and tremendous corruption and dishonesty which was the prominent feature of the Celman regime in Argentina, there is no doubt that a a good deal of public money might be saved by a little cleansing influence exerted in various administrative departments. Despite the high estimates and continually increasing taxes the Government is geneing taxes, the Government is generally in arrears with its payments, and each economic year ends with a serious deficit, to meet which there is required a fresh loan, entailing a fresh burden on the country. Naturally this cannot last for ever, and the resultisacrisis, such as we are now suf-fering from. The Governmental crisis has in this instance been accelerated by the diminution of the national revenue arising from the check to commerce brought about by the financial side of the crisis. The two

Argentine capitalists we would ght day have been much better off to-fact, it was from them that we cauIn the speculative fever.

Summing up, then, we think that the factors of the crisis may be described as,—too much credit, too much speculation, too many banks and companies, too much attention to inflationists, too little attention togenuine business, Governmental waste, of public funds, inattention to developmens of the country's resources, and over axation. With such a view of the disease as this, it ought not to be difficult to know where to apply the

In the Chamber of Representa-tievs, on Thursday, the Message of the Executive concerning Ministerial reforms was referred to the Committee of Legislation. Consent was given to the petition of Otto Bem-berg and Co. for the withdrawal of their proposal for a *Banco Fanda-

The bill presented by the Budget Committee, making reductions in the estimates, was then placed in general

Sr. Luis Carve said that the pre-sence of the Minister of Finance, and indeed of the other Ministers, was very necessary in a discussion so closely related to their departments. It was accordingly resolved that the Ministers should be invited to attend the discussion in detail.

Sr. Pedro Carve said that, owing to Sr. Petro Carve said that, owing to the exaggorated announcements made in the press, great hopes had been raised that serious economies would be proposed. These hopes had suffered disappointment. In his opinion the legitimate aspirations of the people had been once more deceived. In his opinion the report of the Budget Committee was full of of the Budget Committee was full of discrepancies and irregulaties, and showed evidence that the subject had at the Government House, were fostering the speculative fever and joining in the Bolsa gambling. They,

teen very superficially studied.

To begin with the report spoke as if the reductions were valid for a whole year, whereas the Budget had less than six months left to run. This really reduced the proposed econo-mies to some \$700,000. At the end of six months there would be another Budget and a new Assembly, for which we cannot legislate.

Sr. Lenzi pointed out that this defect might be remedied in the

Sr. P. We should not follow the foolish example of Argentina in raising th price of foreign merchandise and driving out foreign enterprise and capital. He concluded by proposing that the Bill should be returned to the Committee for further study.

The Queen now dines at nine, so that in half a century there has been an advance of two hours, whereas the rate of progress previous to that had been about one hour in fif-y years. It is a curious thing that though dinner is so late there is always a rush for support at those evening functions where this meal is served. Even the guests at the recent ball at Sandringham were not guiltless in this matter. The not guiltless in this matter. The crowding round the door of the supper room is described by eyewitnesses as vigorously competitive.
At parties, both public and private, the buffet is often stormed by an apparently hungry army whose dinner, if consumed at the hour of eight or nine must be seen to an apparent or nine must be seen to a second an apparent beautiful and the second arms. eight or nine, must have been hopelessly inadequate to their needs. Should the dinner hour be put back, the supper-eaters will be formidable indeed, naving had two extra hours wherein to develop a raging hunger and a thirst to match. It will be purest pinlanthropy on the part of any reformer to do away with the late hours that obtain at present. Dances that begin at eleven p.m. and end at two or three in the morning tire out even the young, who enjoy them. What of the poor chaperon, who has man, who escorts a dance-loving daughter? The next morning finds the elders in a limp condition, and if votes were taken on the subject, it would be found that even the young ones are in favour of earlier hours. The Cinderella dance has been a protest and, so far as it goes, a suc-cessful one, against turning night into day, as we do. A very strenuous army of voters against unnecessary lateness will be found in the coach-men, tootmen, and (could they vote) the horses that wait in long lines for an hour or two in the chilly small hours outside the scene of festivity. The cone dance mores that means a quarter of an hours of whirling pleasure to the girl involves an admens of those for whom they wait. Why not begin the dances at nine and finish them by one o'clock, or earlier? It would be merciful to many. But the dinner hour is the pivot on which the later engagements turn. Till it is altered, there can be little change in them.— Daily Newc.

JOTTINGS.

Fifteen years ago, in America, there were nineteen branches of industry in which no women were employed; five years ago there were only seven; and now, it may be assured, there are not more than two or three. In Massachusetts nearly thirty per cent. of the local female population is engaged in what are described as "gainful occupations." Ten year ago the proportion was only about twenty-one per cent. Yet, strange to say, the proportion of women in domestic service has, for years, steadily decreased; and to-day tamala sarrants, such as cooks maids. female servants, such as cooks, maids and nurses, are most difficult to obtain. On the other hand, female lawyers; doctors, clerks, preachers, agriculturists, fishers, and factory hands are much more numerous than they used to be. This suggests the question, is not the American woman in danger of missing her vocation? A woman is surely better fitted, by nature, to be a domestic servant than to be a tiller of the soil, or to be a governess than to be a preacher. When, as is the case in Massachusetts, women become railway conductors, bargees, undertakers, wheelwrights, and blacksmiths, one cannot resist the conclusion that the

The Mashonaland Expedition bids fair to introduce us to some very interesting remains of a lost civilisation. One is circular in shape, and composed of wrought stones, the walls being in places as much as ten feet thick. Have we here vestiges of the works of King Solomon's explorers? If so, we may easily be upon the brink of some most important archæological finds. The natives do not pretend to any knowledge of the history of the ruins, save that the buildings were there when the forefathers of the there when the forefathers of the present inhabitants arrived in the present inhabitants arrived in the country. At the same time, it is well to recollect that ancient structures often seem upon casual examination to be very much more ancient than they really are. The ruined cities of Central America used at one time to be assigned to a period lying almost before the beginning of European his-tory; but fuller study of them has convinced the best and most impartial ob-servers that many of the ruins, it not all were inhabited and were probably of quite recent building when the Spaniards first overran the peninsula in the sixteenth century.

No The art of good talking lies as much in dressing up comparatively commonplace material in attractive guise, as in anything else; and the lecturer's recognition of this fact was largely responsible for the great success of Dr. Abbott's charming address on «Illusions» at Toynbee Hall the other day. For example, Dr. Abbott well brought out the almost immeasurable distance of the stars from the earth when he reminded his hearers that the pole-star is not where we think we see it now, but that we see it where it was twelve years ago. There are stars, he went on to say, still farther off. It may be that the inhabitants of some star are now looking at the Battle of Hastings, and wishing success to one side or another.» This kind of illustrationisindeed the only effective one to enable ordinary people to form any idea of such huge distances ashave to be deal with in the science of Astronomy. Light and sight travel at a speed of over 186,000 miles a second; yet we have reason to believe that there are stars whose twinkle takes eight hundred years, and more, to reach us even at tat of rathe travelling.

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
