## NEWS OF THE DAY

**Our Lady of Guada up. Saint A ex-ander.** Tom Moore died, 1852 Victor Hugo born, 1802 Treaty of Versailles, 1871. 57 days past, 908 to the end of the year.

**The Budget, 1891-2.**  
According to custom, the Minister of Finance has issued a circular to the other Ministries, calling their attention to the fact that according to law the General Budget for 1891-2, which should come into force on July 1, 1891, should be forwarded to the Legislative Chambers for sanction on or before April 1, and therefore the Ministries are requested to prepare and forward their respective estimates as soon as possible. In the drawing up of these estimates they are asked to observe the strictest and severest economy possible, compatible with the present financial situation and with good service in public administration.

Appropos of this circular a difficulty has arisen respecting the Minister of Foment, to whom a copy was addressed in due course. The Ministry was created some weeks ago, but up to the present there are neither Minister, officials nor offices, matters remaining exactly as they were before the decree was issued. Consequently the porter entrusted with the delivery of the circular is at a loss to know what to do with it. *Cosí va el mundo.*

## FOREIGNERS AND POLITICS.

(We condense the following moderate and sensible article from a recent number of the *B. A. Hera* d. Much of it is equally applicable in this city.)

We observe a very moderate and candid article in a recent number of the *Standard* advising foreigners to abstain from a too active participation in the approaching presidential campaign, unless prepared to acquire that rigour by becoming naturalized citizens. We are quite in accord with the general tone of that advice, so far as it relates to practical politics which urge the claims and work for the interests of some particular candidate or party. Inasmuch as the alien is not to vote for or against any candidate, he would be following the spirit of that disabling provision if he abstained from from speech, scheme and influence as well as vote, and for the same reason. We repeat that the disabling law which prevents an alien from voting for a candidate should prevent his participation in said election in any other form, even though no statute law could reach the act. To this extent we are quite in agreement with our esteemed colleague, but beyond this there is a wide world of politics in which the alien has as much right, interest and even duty in participating as any native could have. The Constitution clothes the alien with all the rights of the citizen except that of the voting franchise and the right to hold office, which is its concomitant. Personal or party politics and the selection of party or candidate, belong exclusively to those who are to vote for them, but what kind of candidates any party should adopt, what principles it should espouse, what theory of government is soundest, are, according to Constitutional prescriptions, questions that concern the inhabitants and not merely the citizens of this Republic, and this same Constitution also declares that the "inhabitants" (not citizens) shall be guaranteed the right to hold and advocate their opinions. It follows, therefore, that the foreigner has every right to present and urge his views on all or any public questions, including politics, which, after all, constitute only one phase of political economy. The alien, then, may urge the nomination and election of men of honest character, leaving the voter to exercise his own judgment in the selection of such candidate and officer. The alien may urge the adoption of any course or policy of government which he thinks would prove of benefit or value to the country; in fact, he may participate fully and freely in all discussions which do not support or detract from the chances of a candidate for votes. Foreexample, the foreigner has a right to think and to teach that officials should be honourable and efficient in office, that they should not betray a trust, that economy should be practised in all public expenditure, that public interests should not give way to personal enmity, friendship, that soundness and prudence should characterize the management of public finances, and so on with the

—Wash a baby up clean and dress him up real pretty, and he will resist all advances with a most superlative crossness; but let him eat molasses, gingerbread, and fool around the coalstove for half an hour, and he will nestle his dear little dirty face close up to your clean shirt bosom and be just the loveliest, cunningest little rascal in all the world.

—Sr. Saens de Zumarán, Oriental Consul in Barcelona, arrived here on Tuesday, on a short leave of absence.

—The Duke of Liegnano, Italian Minister to this Republic, returned here yesterday after a year's absence. He was met and welcomed by a large gathering of friends and compatriots.

—Dr. Julian Herrera having been duly acquitted of the charge of manslaughter in the person of Victor Lamez, has resumed his post as 1st Public Prosecutor.

—A new paper to be called *Los Debates* is announced for next May. It will be edited by ex-deputy Pedro Carve, whose eloquence in the Chambers and whose outspokenness against abuses we have frequently extolled.

—The Board of Health are having a wary eye to the alphas or closed wells in the houses of the city, and have already ordered over 100 to be emptied and cleaned, as not being in a healthy state.

—One native contemporary, and only one, has had the courage to speak in frank condemnation of "Juan Moreira" as an immoral play, full of bad example and utterly contemptible from an artistic point of view. That paper is *El Bien*.

—Is it possible that our old familiar summer friend the *caso sospechoso* has succumbed to the crisis? The summer is nearly through and he has not yet made his appearance. Or is it that we are too much occupied with our financial troubles to recognise him, and that he is stalking about in our midst, unheeded and unknown?

—Dr. Saturnino A. Camp, Jefe Politico de Soriano, is on a visit to Montevideo. As this camp magnate is of saturnine humour he has asked his friends to refrain from perpetrating weak and obvious puns upon his name.

—Mr. R. Broad, accountant of the London and Brazilian Bank, leaves to-day in the "Moselle" for a six month's holiday. His many friends wish him a pleasant time and a safe return.

—Juan Moreira continues his career of blood at the Politama, drawing crowded audiences nightly. It is worth seeing—as a curiosity.

—Gold closed yesterday at 117 1/2, according to which the paper dollar is worth 85 cents.

—The recent denunciations concerning abuses in the 4th Infantry have brought to light some very serious, horrible and unmentionable offences committed by an officer and several privates of that regiment, for which the culprits have already been submitted to a severe but well-merited punishment. So far, however, from any blame being at-tacked to the commander, Colonel Usher, his conduct throughout has been entirely correct and praiseworthy. The Minister of War is in possession of all the particulars.

—A fire broke out on Tuesday afternoon in the *baraca* of Sr. C. Dabal, Queguay 73, which might have been serious but for the prompt assistance of the brigade. There was also a fire in the stables of Sr. Martinez, Camino Cibils. Yesterday morning there was also a fire in the coach house of Sr. Martins, also in the Camino Cibils. In neither case were the damages of great importance. This makes seven or eight fires in four days.

—The passengers by the "Iberia" were released from prison—we mean quarantine—yesterday.

—The "Moselle" will take to-day an ingot of gold weighing *two arrobas*, from the San Gregorio mines at Cañapiru, being the 21st monthly remittance made on account of the Gold Fields of Uruguay, Limited.

—The old, old story. Nothing new whatever about either the Ministry or the loan. All the combinations formed, all the conjectures made and all the hopes aroused remain as fruitless as ever.

—The "Nord America" which sails to-day, takes 900 emigrants, mostly Italians, from Buenos Aires, and 150 from this port.

—Some excitement was caused in the President's private house, on Tuesday afternoon, by a well-dressed young man, who called himself Colonel Velasco and aide-de-camp to the President, thereby obtaining an interview with Dr. Herrera, whom he asked to give him a post. As Dr. Herrera declined, the young man became very excited and began violently abusing the President in strong terms and a loud voice. This, of course led to his immediate arrest, and as it was found on examination by Dr. Felippone that this prepotent individual's wits are disordered, he has been sent to the Asylum. His name is Gabriel Velasco, he is 25 years old and a son of the late General Velasco.

—Telegrams have been received in Buenos Aires stating that the loan has at last been definitely settled, and the Sanitary Works affair is left for a separate arrangement. Perhaps this will relieve the tension from which our neighbors are suffering.

—Brigade General Antolin Castro, a veteran in the field and in politics, has just died in his estancia in Salto, whither he had retired from public life for many years.

—The commissary of the Gardon is making determined war on the vagabond and unruly boys that infect his section, in common with all other parts of this city. In two days he has had captured some 50 of them, all under 16 years of age, and many of them previously in the hands of the police for thefts and other offences. The difficulty is to know what to do with them when caught, as whipping is not allowed, and there is no suitable House of Correction for them.

—A distressed widow with seven small children was arrested yesterday and taken to the Cabildo, because she could not pay her direct taxes. We think that in such a case a more humane and considerate method might be adopted, especially in these bad times.

—Two Napolitans of bad character and odour were captured by the police yesterday just as they had broken into and were about to rob a barber's shop in the Aguada. A companion had informed the police of their little plan, so they were laid in wait for and nearly caught in the act.

**DATEST.**  
A telegram from Rio Janeiro yesterday afternoon announces that Marshal Deodoro da Fonseca has been elected first President of the United States of Brazil, and Citizen Prudentino Moraes as Vice president. Sovereigns 12 550.

## LONDON NOTES

London, January 23.

Parliament reassembled yesterday, after the Christmas recess. In the House of Lords the Bishop of Peterborough's Children's Life Insurance Bill was read a second time, and referred to a Select Committee.

In the Commons notice was given by Mr. Stansfeld of a resolution on the subject of the Parliamentary franchise, and by Mr. Parrell of another respecting the administration of the Crimes Act in Ireland. Questions were also asked with regard to the death of the late Duke of Bedford and the hours of railway servants. The Private Bill Procedure (Scotland) Bill was discussed, read a second time, and referred to a Select Committee.

Mr. Furness, the new member for the Hartlepool, was yesterday the recipient of telegrams of congratulation on his victory from all parts of the country. Mr. Gladstone has expressed the opinion that the election is by far the most important since 1886, and that the figures of the poll reduce to dust and ashes the declarations of Lord Salisbury and others on recent events.

The Court of Common Council yesterday decided to present the freedom of the City to Mr. Liddellale Governor of the Bank of England, in recognition of his prompt and able action during the recent financial crisis.

No change of consequence has taken place in relation to the Scotch railway strike. Both sides are shouting victory, and last night pickets were told off by the strikers to wait personally upon the men remaining at work. It is feared that before the strike is over the companies will not only have sacrificed about a quarter of a million of their own money, but have inflicted an equal loss upon the public.

According to news received in Paris, the Portuguese Government has granted to the Mozambique Company a charter conferring upon it rights of exploitation in all territories claimed by Portugal between the Zambezi and the Sabi. The Manica territory is included in this boundary, and it is feared that the granting of the charter, assuming, as it does, the assent of the British Government to the boundary laid down in the unratified Convention of the 20th August, may seriously complicate the negotiations between the

two Powers.

Sr. John Pope Hennessy took his seat in the House of Commons yesterday, after an absence of nearly twenty-five years, during which he has held various offices under the Crown. He succeeded in securing the very seat below the gangway he was accustomed to fill in the House Lord Palmerston led.

Is there not a book about "Bravo Little Boy"? If so, a new chapter should be added in favour of little William Hayward, of Harpinger, near Folkestone, who so narrowly escaped from the terrible accident which destroyed in an instant his father and mother, together with their infant child. The cottage of the Hayward family was built under a broken hill, that rose almost perpendicularly close behind it to a height of nearly 160 feet. Habitations in similarly perilous situations may often be seen close to cliffs by the sea-shore, and in old quarries and marl-pits; and it is curious how little their inhabitants appear to take heed of their treacherous character till some catastrophe befalls them. The Hayward family, being altogether six in number, retired to rest on Tuesday night as usual, suspecting nothing; yet already their doom was sealed. High over head in an arable field behind the summit of the clay cliff a deep indentation had formed wherein water had accumulated. The frost had been at work widening and deepening the breach, and that night there was a thaw and a heavy fall of rain which rushed down into the gully. Suddenly, at about an hour after midnight, there was a tremendous crash. The great landslip descended like an avalanche, burying and sweeping the cottage across a roadway and down a further depth of thirty feet into a field. Silent for evermore were the poor man, his wife, and their infant child, but in another room little Willie, a boy of eight, was miraculously preserved. He succeeded in forcing his way through the thatch of the roof of the shattered cottage. The sky was pitch dark, the rain falling in torrents, the wind blowing hard, but the boy, though stunned and bruised, was mindful of his two little sisters—one aged ten, and the other only one year and eight months old—who, like himself, had sustained only slight injuries. The courageous little fellow having extricated these two, snatched up the younger sister and carried her to the nearest house, a quarter of a mile distant, where he procured assistance. Such is the simple story of the stout heart and the thoughtful care exhibited under these appalling conditions by a boy eight years old.

January 24.

Speaking at Shoreditch last night, Sir Charles Russell, referring to Ireland's demand for Home Rule, said there could be no doubt that in the broad line of its own destinies and fortunes, a nation had never committed a permanent error.

General Booth has addressed a letter to the Lord Mayor in reply to the denial that on a recent night 184 outcasts were counted on one of the Thames bridges. He explains that the phrase "on the bridges" was used in his first letter instead of "the immediate approach to the bridge," and maintains that the distress was not over-stated by him.

The Earl of Aberdeen visited Glasgow yesterday as mediator between the men and the railway companies, and the result of his interview with Mr. Thompson, of the Caledonian line will probably be made known to-day. Mr. Thompson expressed his readiness to confer with any two of the men if they were accompanied by Lord Aberdeen, but declined to recognise the official position of Mr. Tait or Mr. Harfield. At their mass meetings both in Edinburgh and Glasgow the men reaffirmed the policy of no surrender.

Lord Derby has written a letter in which he says that he is opposed to the proposal for giving power to the Board of Trade to determine disputes between employers and workmen by compelling the parties to accept its arbitration. Such powers would mean regulation of the rates of wages by a Government department, and would destroy the freedom of employers and employed to make their own terms.

The empire of the penny is rapidly extending. Regarding Penny Banks we have lately given some cheering news. The penny violin classes of the Midland Institute are stated to be a great success; a later development still is the Penny Gymnasium, started by the Birmingham Athletic Club, who for the nominal fee of a penny a week generously undertake to provide instruction and secure a thorough physical training for youths who could not otherwise command such advantages. The Birmingham lads appear to have hastened to avail themselves of this opportunity. Upwards of one hundred attended the classes on Thursday evening. They are described as mostly well-built fellows. Some came in football jerseys, others in cricketing suits, and not a few in shirt-sleeves, or stripped to a flannel vest. Mr. Clarke, the all-round champion gymnast of England, is the instructor, assisted by a number of the leaders of the club, of which

Dr. Stamford, however, chose to shut his eyes to the truth, and requested his wife to include the Oswalds in the invitations to her next dinner-party.

The answer which followed in neat but somewhat out-of-date, Italian handwriting, displeased Mrs. Stamford not a little. She characterised its wording as so wanting in courtesy as to verge upon positive rudeness.

"Mr. and Mrs. Oswald beg to thank Dr. and Mrs. Stamford for their invitation, which they will not be able to accept."
