NEWS OF THE DAY

Parliament.

In the Chamber of Representatives, on Saturday, several matters of minor importance were referred to Committee, as also several petitions from various persons asking for despatch of business.

The affair of the Colonia elections was then brought forward. Sr. Zorrilla said that if these elections were not legal, the remainder were still less so, there was not one election more correct than that of Colonia.

Sr. Johnson said there had been serious disorders. The president of one of the voting tables had been assaulted and killed and no one knew who had taken charge of the urns.

Sr. Ellauri said that according to the report of Col. Pedragoso the election was peaceable, the assault took place afterwards, and the question was to know who were the aggressors. In strict justice the Chamber should declare the elections legal.

Sr. Gil said it was impossible for the Committee to report without being in full possession of the details, which was not at present the case. The data now to hand were contradictory. The protestants were the leading members of the "colorado" party.

After some further discussion it was resolved to ask the Executive to supply further particulars to the Committee.

Sres. Pallares, Sanchez and Olivera were then elected to the Committee of Accounts. Authority was given to increase the estimates of the Chamber by hiring another porter. The sitting then concluded.

Politeama Theatre.

This popular theatre, converted into a comfortable circus, was reopened on Saturday night by the Podesta-Scotti company, of River Plate renown. There was a crowded and rather demonstrative audience, representative of all classes and including a large proportion of familiar English faces.

The first part of the entertainment consisted of the usual circus feats, fairly well performed, though hardly up to the standard of Frank Brown's or Carlo's circuses, so well known here. The clown Pepino 88 is a great favourite with the gallery lads, and his japes in the vernacular found much acceptance.

The second part, which was evidently the attraction that filled the theatre, was the native or *criollo* drama "Juan Moreira," which has just achieved the phenomenal run of 66 nights in Buenos Aires. Though beneath criticism from a dramatic or artistic point of view, this is not without interest as a morbid social study. The performance (for drama it cannot be called) has been accused of having an immoral tendency. At

present the accusation is not without grounds, but for all that it seems to us that the author, Sr. E. Gutierrez, either through inexperience or false modesty, has narrowly missed teaching a great moral lesson, and by some slight alterations the piece might yet be made to serve a good purpose. Sr. Gutierrez resembles Zola in the unrelenting hand with which he paints vice and the worst side of human nature, but he allows no relief to the picture, and lacks the genius to make his scenes and characters sufficiently repulsive. The central figure, the historic Juan Moreira, is a *gaucha* of a fortunately nearly extinct type, one-third civilised, two-thirds blood-thirsty murderer savage. Like Alejandro Tezzone and other monstrous criminals, Moreira evidently suffers from acute attacks of homicidal mania, though the author neglects to make this clear. The incidents of the piece give some idea of the old semi-barbarous *gaucha* camp life of the River Plate some 50 or 70 years ago. We see portrayed the cruel abuse of authority on the part of the powers, and the reckless disregard of human life and not altogether unjustified contempt for the law on the part of the people which were characteristic of the period. We have also brought before us with considerable realism the mingled squalor and tawdriness of old camp life in its worst aspect, its discomforts, its vulgarities, its slatternly, frowsy women, its poor resource of amusement, its utter barrenness of artistic taste or intellectual interest, and its lack of even the redeeming feature of picturesque quality. Unfortunately neither author nor performers dare portray all this with the accuracy desirable in treating of historical or social studies, for the simple reason that absolute realism in either language or manners could not be presented before a respectable audience. Both author and actor fall into the error of trying to invest Juan Moreira with a fictitious heroic interest, so that when the unmitigated ruffian meets his richly deserved death, and is shot down like a mad dog, not a few of the audience are found to sympathise with him, instead of execrating him as a brutal assassin. Perhaps, however, this arises from the fact that as the other characters are hardly less vile, it would have been necessary to slaughter them all and there would have been no one left to let down the curtain. Had the author only had the courage to present this multiple assassin in his proper light, and had he had sufficient dramatic instinct to introduce a proper contrast between the monotonous brutalities of the present play and some more civilised and picturesque scenes, the piece might have filled a moral and educational purpose—though it might not have proved so lucrative. As it is, unfortunately only serves as a glorification and apotheosis of barbarous manners and customs which, as there is no redeeming feature, it would be far better to allow to pass into oblivion. It would also be preferable that, whilst ladies visit the theatre, the many bloody murders with which the piece abounds should be performed behind the scenes, out of sight, and only their description presented to the audience.

The artists of the company had evidently made a careful study of their parts, which they performed with considerable talent, and even too much discretion, trying to soften down and make presentable their native asperities and repulsiveness. The domineering manner of the commissary in the first scene was especially well given, and we quite regretted that when he had Juan Moreira in his power, he did not make an end of him there and then, and so bring the drama to a far more appropriate conclusion. The performance was enlivened by some "national" music, including the abominable "pericos" which is so popular in the streets of late. As the orchestra was fortunately placed almost out of hearing, our ears were spared this culminating offence. A "national" dance was introduced in the 2nd act, not altogether unpleasant in idea, and the realistic effect of protracting it to an almost interminable length was conscientiously carried out.

The performance was received with yells of delight by the crowded audience, and one could feel the rapturous thrill that passed through the house as each fresh murder was culminated. It only required some blood and entrails flung about to make the effect as delightful as a bull-fight. No doubt it will attract large houses for several nights, but at the same time we cannot congratulate Messrs. Codrara and Carbone on having elevated the standard of their theatre.

Saturday's Catastrophe.

With regard to the terrible fatal fire of Saturday it seems most probable that the victims suffered a painless death, being suffocated by the smoke, had it been otherwise they might have escaped by a staircase at the back of the building leading to the iron-foundry next door. It has been suggested that one of the inmates, named Casiano Carballo, rushed out in his shirt and trousers when the alarm was first given, and was afterwards seen in an *almacen* drink-

ing heavily. He then disappeared, and after considerable search, was arrested by the police on Sunday. Great importance is attached to his evidence, being the only survivor, but his wits have been so affected by the fright that it has not yet been possible to obtain from him any coherent account. It also appears that considerable delay took place in summoning the fire brigade, partly through the error of the policeman on duty who whistled the wrong signal, and also through difficulty in obtaining telephonic communication. Both these affairs are being made the subject of enquiry.

The following is a corrected list of the victims.—Juan Garcia, Spaniard, aged 28, owner of the *almacen*, Maria Carballo de Garcia, his wife, 25. Manuel Garcia, 7, and Maria, 5, their children. Serafin Carballo, 16, cousin of the Sr. Garcia, employed as servant. Miguel Lopez Riveiro, Portuguese, a lodger, cigar maker. Luis Crovotto, another lodger, employed in the foundry next door. And an unborn child. The business was insured in the Italo-Uruguayo for \$3000. The losses and damages are estimated at nearly \$10,000.

Sunday's Races.

Death.

The death took place on Sunday night, of Dr. Pedro Bustamante, after a long and painful illness. Dr. Bustamante was Senator for Canelones, and had also occupied many important public posts, having been Minister of Finance, Deputy Senator, Member of the Tribunal of Justice, and having figured as President of the National Bank until the crash of last July. He had also won distinction as a journalist, orator and controversialist.

SUNDRIES.

A half-cracked lad fires a pistol at a highly unpopular Minister in Buenos Aires, and straightway the capital is declared in a state of siege. Of course this was not the only reason, but it was the culminating one and its introduction at the end of the Presidential declaration has a strong smack of bathos. Our neighbours are in a bad way, for which the powers and the people are equally to blame. The truth is that the Argentines, like all Spanish colonists and their descendants, are incapable of governing and if they would only consult their own interests they would send to Europe,—England, Germany or France,—for some half dozen capable statesmen and financiers and put the government of the country in their hands. They could afford to pay them royal salaries, and the country would reach a state of prosperity at present hardly a dream of. The same proceeding might be applied to other South American Republics with enormous advantage.

Gold closed yesterday at 120, according to which the paper dollar is worth 333 cents.

The new Representatives find themselves in a dilemma. If they declare the elections for Colonia illegal, they will thereby stultify their own elections, for all were conducted on the same plan. Yet in face of the evidence presented they hardly dare declare them illegal. Probably they will find some convenient excuse for shelving the question and leaving matters in *state quo*.

To those in search of some good English furniture, we call attention to the auction to be held next Thursday by J. B. Comensoro at Misiones 84.

The idea of making a homicidal maniac like Juan Moreira the hero of a drama is both audacious and original, and we recommend it to our English dramatists, who, however are likely to treat it in a very different spirit. It has evidently proved brilliantly successful.

The death is announced of Mr. David Leighton, owner of the Saint Kilda estancia in the department of Paysandu, and one of the earliest settlers there. Mr. Leighton was a Scotchman by birth.

The Criminal Judge Dr. Ballesteros has absolved the Public Prosecutor Dr. Julian Herrera y Obes from all blame in the homicide of which he was unfortunately the agent in the person of Victor Lameiz, on the 5th instant.

The above case has been tried and settled in some 16 days, and the accused party was only under arrest some 24 hours, thereby showing that Justice can be prompt in her actions when she chooses. Yet we have known cases in which persons have been kept in prison here 20 or 30 months on similar charges, and finally acquitted. But then they were not important public functionaries nor relations of the President. Justice is not so blind as she is painted.

A prisoner named José Gutierrez, remitted from Cerro Largo on a charge of murder, committed suicide in a most determined manner in his cell in the Penitentiary on Sunday afternoon. He had no weapon, but lacked a large wound in his throat with a blunt piece of metal taken out of his necktie.

The ministerial question, to which the President carefully avoided all reference in his recent message, remains as before. Whether the President does not want a Ministry, or whether suitable men cannot be found, or whether if when found they refuse to serve, is more than we can say. Meanwhile public business suffers and discontent increases.

Three fires have taken place since Saturday evening, the most important being in the *almacen* of Pedro Musimeli, in front of the Central Market, early yesterday morning, through throwing a lighted match on some spilt kerosene. Damages about \$200. The other two were insignificant.

The rowdy classes kept the police busy on Saturday and Sunday, and there were several fights, including three rather serious stabbing cases. The details are of the usual description and not worth repeating.

La Razon is greatly amused by the discovery that Sr. Chucarro, the National Inspector of Schools, cannot spell Spanish properly, in proof whereof it quotes several grossly misspelt documents from his hands. Now there is some excuse for not spelling English well, but in so entirely phonetic a language as Spanish, it is inconceivable that a person of even ordinary education should not spell correctly.

The tremendously successful *criollo* drama "Juan Moreira," will be repeated at the Politeama nightly until further notice, preceded each evening by a circus performance.

Several cases of small-pox have appeared in the old city, between calles Perez Castellanos, Maciel, 25 de Mayo and Corrito. The 2nd commissary of the section is one of the sufferers.

The substitute for Dr. Bustamante in the Chamber of Senators is Sr. Alejandro Chucarro.

The marriage was celebrated yesterday evening, in the church of St. Francis, of Sr. Gerardo Villegas Zuñiga and Miss Sara Dallazoppo, both belonging to well-known families of Montevideo society.

Colonel Escayola has resigned his post as Jefe Politico of the department of Tacuarembó.

The camps in Cerro Largo, Salto, Artigas and Treinta y Tres are now reported in excellent condition thanks to the recent rains, and the live stock fattening rapidly, giving the estancieros renewed hopes.

After March 11 the tickets of the Caridad Lottery will be sold, and the prizes paid in gold, instead of National Bank notes as hitherto, due authority to that effect having been obtained. During the last quarter the Lottery Committee has lost \$96,000 through difference in exchange.

Sunday proved a glorious day, with a most delightful temperature. The bathing places were thronged till dusk, and in the exceptionally beautiful moonlight evening which followed the streets and public places were filled till a late hour. Certainly there can be few parts of the world where the evenings are more delightful than here, during some seven months of the year.

A contemporary recently brought some serious charges against Colonel Usher, Commandant of the 4th Infantry of having inflicted barbarous corporal punishments on some of his men. We are glad to say that, in this instance, the charges have not been substantiated, and Colonel Usher himself has come forward in the most honorable way and given an entirely satisfactory answer. In this he has served as an example to many of his brother officers.

Yesterday's *Tribuna* repeats a report that the President and the Minister of War entertain the idea of making extensive economies and changes in the army, passing a large portion of men to the reserve, and at the same time strengthening and improving the police and fire services. We sincerely hope it is true, for we

know of no reform that is more urgently called for, or that would produce a better impression.

BUENOS AIRES.

The *Diario* states, from information obtained at the Ministry of Finance, that if the London bankers do not carry out the proposed arrangement for a loan, the payment of interest on the foreign debt will be suspended.

The *Argentino* announces that Sr. Pedro Palacios, one of its editors, has accepted the challenge of Sr. Pero A. Costa, that he has named Sres. José M. Niño and Francisco Uzal and that these gentlemen have proposed that the duel shall be fought with pistols at ten paces, the combatants advancing and continuing to fire till one is killed.

Government has approved of the contract between the office of lands and colonies and Mr. Popper whereby it is agreed to give him 80,000 hectares of land in Tierra del Fuego for establishing a colony of Indians.

At a General Meeting of the National Hippodrome Club, at which 2064 shares were represented, it was resolved unanimously that notice should be given to General Bosch to repay to the Treasury of the Club the sum of \$150,000 which he improperly retains in his possession, and that, in default, judicial proceedings will be instituted against him.

The Finance committee of the Chamber of Deputies has under consideration the bill relating to oddals. It has been arranged that the Committee shall have a conference with the Committee of Oddals holders in Buenos Aires. The bill will be discussed by the Chamber early next month.

On Saturday the police seized the copies of *El Argentino* which were being offered for sale in the street and its future publication has been forbidden. The *Defensa del Pueblo* commanded a high premium. The publication of *Don Quijote* has been suspended.

The following decree was issued by the Government on Friday evening proclaiming the city of Buenos Aires under a state of siege.—

Buenos Aires, 20 Feb. 1891.

Whereas the Capital of the Republic is now passing through a period of excitement and of alarm which injuriously affects both social interests and the National Credit;

Whereas this condition of things has already led to various manifestations and tends to be aggravated unless the measures authorised by the Constitution for preventing and repressing acts likely to cause profound disturbances in the community are adopted;

Whereas it is still more necessary to proceed in this manner because the Nation has to surmount financial difficulties which cannot be overcome unless public order and the action of the public authorities are put upon a firm basis;

Whereas this dangerous state of things constitutes precisely the case of internal commotion referred to by Art. 23 of the National Constitution in as much as the exercise of the constitution and of the authorities thereby created may be considered in danger;

Whereas the Executive is bound to watch over the public peace and to repress all excesses to which the excitement of evil passions may give rise;

For the foregoing reasons and having regard to the dastardly attack made yesterday evening upon the Minister of the Interior.

The President of the Republic resolves and decrees:—

Art. 1. In accordance with the provisions of Art. 23 of the National Constitution, the Capital of the Republic is declared to be in a state of siege.

Art. 2. Let this decree be duly reported to the National Congress.

Art. 3. Let this be communicated, etc.

Art. 53 of the Constitution declares: In case of internal commotion or of foreign attack which may endanger the exercise of this Constitution or of the authorities created by it, the province or territory wherein the commotion exists shall be declared in a state of siege, all Constitutional guarantees being suspended there; but during this suspension the President of the Republic shall not condemn or inflict punishment on his own responsibility. His power in such a case shall be limited as regards persons to arresting them or sending them from one part of the country to another, unless they should prefer to leave Argentine territory.

yesterday there were heavy snowfalls in Naples, where the streets are deserted. Several towns have been completely snowed in. Algeria even is suffering severely. Sicily, in Oran, has been snowed up for several days past, and much anxiety is felt for the inhabitants, as their supplies must be nearly exhausted. The recent earthquake there is now reported to have destroyed two villages with a loss of forty lives.

Two doctors of Nantes on Saturday read before the Paris Academy of Medicine the results of their experiments for the cure of consumption. Acting upon the well-known fact that the goats are liable to the disease, they have transfused the blood of the animal into several hospital patients, as they state, with beneficial results.

The death of Mr. George Bancroft the American historian, was announced in Washington on Saturday evening. The deceased was in his 91st year.

Mr. Christopher Furness, Liberal, and Sir William Gray, Dissident, were nominated for the Harlepool on Saturday. The polling takes place next Wednesday.

Further attempts have been made by committees to effect a settlement of the Scotch railway strike, with the result that the North British directors have announced that they stand by their Dundee memorandum—that the men must return to work before the question of grievances can be considered. According to a Correspondent, the men's Executive enter upon the fifth week of the struggle with a balance of 5,000l., which they hope will enable them this week to double the grant to the men on strike, to give 1l. instead of 10s.

The discontent which has been smouldering for some time past among men employed at the Victoria and Albert Docks broke out on Saturday, when a fight took place between Unionists and non-Unionists. A serious element in the situation is that the stevedores are showing a disinclination to load vessels on which non-Unionists are working.

The ashes of the late Duke of Bedford, whose body was cremated on Friday, were deposited in the family mausoleum at Cheneys on Saturday, after a funeral service in the adjoining church. The novel features of the ceremony greatly aroused the wonderment of the tenants.

A number of representatives of trade union and kindred societies met in the Memorial Hall on Saturday evening under the presidency of the Bishop of Bedford, and, after much discussion, adopted a resolution in favor of holding a World's Labour Exhibition during the present year. It was said that sixteen acres of land had been secured at Shepherd's-bush for the purpose of the exhibition.

Prince Bismarck, speaking of the Russian Emperor at a recent interview, said: "The Czar is certainly a man of peace. But whether he himself believes that he will always remain so, is questionable. The Russian army, which for the greater part is uncomfortably garrisoned, desires occupation from time to time. The last war against the Turks was partly due to considerations in connection with the increasing dissatisfaction in the Russian army. Hereupon the Prince related an anecdote from the life of the Emperor Nicholas to show the sense of insecurity felt by a Russian Emperor. Nicholas was ordered by his physicians to have his back rubbed, but found nobody to whom he could trust himself in this position. At his wife's end, he at last begged King Frederick William IV. to send him some Prussian sergeants of the Guards, who, after the treatment was over, returned to Berlin handsomely rewarded. "As long as I can look into the face of my Russians it is all right," said Nicholas; "but to let them manipulate upon my back, that I won't risk!"
