THE LOAN.

After au infinity of false rumours, conjectures and unfounded surmises it is at last known that the loan with Brazilian bankers is actually concluded. We have had a positive official declaration to the effect that the contract was scaled on the 2nd ins ant, and in our last issue we were enabled to give such of the details as the official papers condescended to make public, translated from the

These details, neither very complete nor intelligible, reveal the fact that the loan is for three millions dollars, with option to two million more, to be repaid within 24 months and bearing 9 per cent per annum interest. They also reveal the fact that the creoit of the State has been once more pledged, and this time ited Bank which is National only in name, and which is generally look-ed upon as a mischievons obstacle

There is also one condition which, so far as it is intelligible, reveals a possible danger anead. The loan is in gold, to be repaid in paper money of the U.S. of Brazil at the rate of the day of the Brazil at the rate of the day of the delivery of the loan. As pointed out in a very able article in Sunday's Siglo, the rate of exchange in Brazil is just now very abnormal. With exchange at par the English sovereign, (the fixed value of which may be accepted as basis for our dollar currency) is worth 8900 reis, but at the present rate of 8.900 reis, but at the present rate of exchange it is worth 13.700 reis. If on the day of repayment, two years hence, the rate of exchange should have risen, say to 14,000 reis, the National Bank will be the gainer, for it will be able to purchase Brazilian notes at a lower price than they were worth when the Bank received the loan. If, however, the rate of ex-change should have fallen towards its par value, the National Bank will be put to a loss, more or less heavy according to circumstances. The present rate of exchange, as al-ready said, is abnormal, as, in ordinary times the rate varies from 10 to 11 mil reis per sovereign. And even supposing that the crisis which is generally consider-ed impending should fall upon Brazil, within two years it will have had time to recover itself, and the probabilities are that the rate of exchange will be considerably nearer the par value than it is at present. It will thus be seen, clearly enough, that the loan has not been made upon a fixed basis, but upon a speculative one which envolves a serious and considable risk for the National Bank, and which may ultimately plunge it into a worse situation than it is at

Having got thus far, we would now ask, where was the necessity of the loan. It we are not very much mistaken it was officially declared, on the issue of the decree of re-conversion, and again in the President's Hogge, l. b. w. b. Message on the opening of the new Chambers, that the Bank could Negron, b. Poole

undertake this conversion with its own resources. If this assertion was true there could have been no necessity to embarase the Bank with a loan issued on daugerous and speculative terms, nor to pledge the credit of the State for the support of

Although the contract for the loan was signed on the 2nd instant, no of-ficial declaration was made concerning later, whilst the whole negotia-tions were conducted with the greatest secrecy. This secrecy in the most important administrative affairs, an important administrative affairs, an unfortunate legacy of Spanish traditions, and a thoroughly unrepublican proceeding, has not been favourably commented upon, and it is greatly to be regretted that Dr. Herrera, throughout his government, has shown a tendency to accentuate this blameable made of procedure instead of exchanging it for instead of exchanging it for a healthier and more enlighten-ed method. However, as the loan implies State guarantee, it is to be presumed that it will shortly be submitted to the Chambers for sanction, and in that case we may look for a clearing up of much that at present seems dubious, if not actually disadvantageous.

—On the Southern railway, be-tween Alfalfa and Tornquist the heavy rain caused a flood which carried away two kilometres of the line people here. During all yesterday and three culverts. Considerable damage was caused in the agricultural colony near Alfalfa. Two bundred men were set

A QUEER TRANSACTION.

(We reprint the following from the B. 4. Heraid of Sunday, but are quite in the dark as to the transaction to which it ef rs. Perhaps some of our readers may be bett r informed.)

Recent private advices from London report the settlement of an affair that has formed the subject of much angry comment here for several months past and it occurs to us that a brief epitome may not be uninteresting to such of our readers as are outside the pale of the inner circle of the British commercial community, so much exercised since is became an

With the virulence of the com-ments indulged in we have little concern. To us is simply remains to recount the facts as related in Club, Rail, Tram and Bolsa, whenever two

or three garrulous Britishers are gathered together.

It seems that, months ago, the head of an old-established firm took his way to Europe, leaving behind him, in charge, a partner whose nim, in charge, a partner, whose twenty-five years of hard service in the house had advanced him to this position. The continuing activity of the business was reflected in the banking account, and in course of time the balance got to the debit side, to the tune, it is said, of some-thing like \$40,000 or \$50,000 mm, but the relations of the House with the Manager or director of the Bank on the other side were of so intimate a nature that even so large an over-draft gave rise to no particular concern, nor was even an inspection

of the power of attorney solicited.

TERRESTRIAL LIFE.

(Jacques Leotarl in La Nature.)
