APROPOS OF THE CHILIAN DIFFICULTY.

The difficulty between the United States of North America and the Republic of Chile is at present one of great interest, even in the pre-occupied River Plate. The article which we reprint elsewhere from the *B. A. Herald*, states the whole case more concisely than we have hitherto seen, though it naturally omits the minor details which the telegrams have given imperfectly and confusedly, if at all.

The solution of the conflict is still a matter of doubt, but there some points concerned well worth consideration. So far as we understand, the first real difficulty arose on account of the Chilean judicial methods. When the Chileans concerned in the outrage on the mariners from the *Baltimore* were arrested, they were submitted to the jurisdiction of the Chilean courts. The method of these courts, the same that prevails throughout Spanish South America, is directly derived from Spain, and is a century behind the times. It is slow and it is secret, therefore it was naturally unsatisfactory to the Yankees, who were accustomed to swift justice and open, every step being taken in the broad light of publicity. This, we believe was the first cause of dissatisfaction and the origin of many of the following troubles. The Yankees naturally and rightly distrusted a process the steps of which they could not follow, and they even demanded that the case should be transferred to American courts. Such a demand was, perhaps, a little extravagant, and offended the national pride of the Chileans. Hence, further complications.

The dissatisfaction felt by the Yankees with the Chilean judicial processes, however, was very justifiable, and, we may say, extends to every European who has had dealings with South American courts, whether an ordinary police court or the Superior Tribunal. This Spanish method of secrecy is entirely out of date and if South American Republics wish to rise to the level of European countries, they will have to change it. This is not the first occasion on which it has given rise to serious trouble, nor will it be the last. The moral is one that should be taken into consideration in the River Plate as well.

As pointed out in a very sensible and just article in yesterday's *Stiglo*, Chile is now anxious to have recourse to arbitration, whereas, when the United States proposed, some three years ago, to establish a court of international arbitration for the two continents, the arrangement had to be abandoned because Chile would not join. Such conduct requires little comment and will not redound to the credit of Chile, who is willing to accept the arbitration she before refused, only when threatened by a superior power.

The fact is, Chile has been rather too conceited of late, and the present lesson, whether it ends in her having to eat humble pie or in her receiving a thrashing from the Yankees, will do her good. It will also be a lesson to other South American Republics, not to trespass too far on the patience of superior powers, and to learn to conform their judicial and other customs to the model of civilised countries. South American Republics have too long enjoyed impunity from intervention of higher powers, whether of Europe or the United States, and, like wayward children left without a tutor, they have acquired some very bad habits. There is not a Republic on the continent that would not be the better for a little

wholesome and timely admonishing, such as is now being administered to Chile. No one wants to see bloodshed, but it is necessary that South America should be kept within bounds, and, whilst she pretends to European culture and entertains so many European interests and residents, that she should conform somewhat to European customs and morality. The lesson may be unpleasant, as lessons generally are, but it is necessary and healthy. That which is now happening to Chile may yet have to happen to the River Plate if it cannot show a little more financial honesty.

FINANCIAL.
The news, which we were the first to publish, that the Conversion Scheme had been again rejected in Antwerp was fully confirmed yesterday by a Galveston telegram from Brussels, and by another from Buenos Aires.

The same telegram says that the conversion has been accepted by the Bank of England, but that the Bank has issued a circular recommending conversion. The latter statement is too stupendous for us to believe until we see the circular itself.

According to yesterday's *Dia* the action of the Bank of England brought five million pounds to conversion, a statement we are inclined to doubt. We expect the Bank will be severely criticised in England for its attitude. Considering the nature of the struggle its duty was to have remained neutral. According to the *Dia*, also, although no penalty is imposed on those who refuse to convert, interest will be duly paid to those accepting, but those refusing will be left without, whether in the majority or not. In other words, the prior claims will be ignored and preference given to tertiary ones. A more iniquitous and dishonest proceeding cannot be conceived.

It is certainly shameful that Government does not issue an official statement of the true state of the case, together with the telegrams it has received, whether favourable or not. Its present policy certainly seems intended only to mislead, in which it is certainly successful. It is also successful in increasing the profound distrust with which all its actions are now regarded.

We may now add the *Tribuna Popular* to the honourable list of papers which have come over to our view of the case, in which at one time we stood alone. In the course of a very sensible article in yesterday's issue it says, "In truth, if at the termination of the term fixed for conversion, a majority of creditors have not accepted, the most elementary considerations of equity and administrative prudence would oblige the Government not to accept the affair as concluded, as in fact, it would have no sanction worthy of respect,—which is as much as to say that it must not hold the income assigned to the unconverted portion of the debt as disposable for the creation of new battalions or for further batches of military promotions, such as we have lately been accustomed to, for if it does not know the form in which the money should be applied it at least knows to whom it belongs. It would then be necessary, not to oblige the dissentient creditors to conform to an arrangement which is not really such but only an unjustifiable imposition, nor to have recourse to judicial measures, certainly improper for a government with any self-esteem or care of the credit of the nation it represents. It would be necessary to listen to the explanations and representatives of the dissentients, setting before them the true state of affairs, that they themselves might assist in proposing a satisfactory solution. Why then, instead of this temperance, the extremities of imposition or of judicial action? There would be no cowardice in acting as we have indicated."

Regarding the new bank, nothing fresh transpired yesterday except doubts and rumours. The affair seems just as unsettled as ever.

SUNDRIES.
—To-day is the anniversary of one of the most important events in all English history after the signing of Magna Charta, namely the execution of Charles I at Whitehall. These two grand events form the corner stones of British liberty and have proved of world-wide influence. Magna Charta asserted the liberty of the person, the just execution of King Charles that of the subject. When the true relation of the latter event to constitutional freedom is better understood we hope to see the ridiculous service to the memory of the martyred King expunged from the prayer book and a Te Deum substituted in its place. (We believe it is omitted in more recent prayer-books.)

A telegram from Constitution states that the "John Elder" has disappeared completely and that the cargo is being thrown ashore.

The latest number of *R. P. Sport and Pastime* contains an admirable photograph of the crew of the Buenos Aires Rowing Club which won the four-oar international race in the regatta last November. The likenesses are really excellent and the picture forms a pleasant souvenir of that event, quite worth framing.

The Minister of Foment has approved the appointment of Dr. Gozalo Ramirez as Professor of Private International Right in the University, in place of the late Dr. Izcuza Barbat.

The miserable business of the persecuted Civasco has not been without its comic incident. Sr. Don Bartolo F. Sanguinetti, Captain of the Army and Judge of the Summary in the case, has returned the note in which Dr. Alberto Palomeque accepted the charge of defender, because his full titles were not used and because he did not think it sufficiently respectful. Dr. Palomeque has immediately refuted the ridiculous charge, administering sub number two to the Judge, whom he previously corrected for assuming Civasco a deserter, when that was the very question he was appointed to try. When we add that Don Bartolo F. Sanguinetti, Captain of the Army and a perfect judge (his own expression) belongs to the 2nd Infantry, the regiment already responsible for all the persecutions of Civasco, it may be imagined what kind of justice the latter is likely to receive. This is indeed delivering the lamb to the wolves for trial, with a vengeance.

Sr. Carlos Novelli (not the famous actor of that name) has applied to Judge Vila for a divorce from his wife Catalina Canela. We mention this because divorce cases are very rare here, but it must not therefore be imagined that married folks are any better or more virtuous than in other parts of the world. It is the case that is rare, not the cause.

The guarantees which were given railways were given not for the sake of the railways nor for the country, but as a means by which a ring of conspirators or favoured friends might get rich, and naturally when the operating motive has lost its force and meaning, the payment of the guarantee becomes monotonous and burdensome, and devices are sought to evade the duty. These facts are explanations, but no excuse for the hostility shown by the Government towards these railways. In the very nature of the case this hostility will not decrease unless it is boldly met and conquered and in doing this there should be no less of time. The railways must live up to their concessions, having done which they should unite for a consolidated opposition to the nagging and black-mailing persecution to which they are being subjected.—*B. A. Herald.*

The recent London papers and weeklies are full of allusions to the great preparations for the marriage of the Duke of Clarence and the Princess of Teck, which seems to have sent an unusual thrill of interest throughout the realm. It is sad reading when we remember how suddenly and unexpectedly Death put an end to the proposed match.

The particulars were published yesterday of the project relative to guaranteed railway accounts, and of the regulations for the use of factory excitements. Neither are of sufficient general interest to require translation.

Don Alberto Marquez has been promoted to the office of Secretary to the Director General of Public Works, in place of the engineer Sr. Julio Lenoble, who has been pensioned off.

An ugly rumour has been put in circulation to the effect that Government intends to extend the judicial vacations for a month, with the object of proclaiming a general moratorium, the last immoral resource of River Plate bankrupts. Naturally, the rumour had a bad effect in all quarters, adding to the distrust already felt with the situation. Fortunately the rumour has not been traced to any serious foundation and the *Nacion* has hastened to deny it, so far as its denial is worth anything.

—After a successful career of nearly twenty years, the doors of the well-known café Batucendo have been closed, victim to the crisis.

—So far as can be made out from the confused telegrams of yesterday the American Government has received the reply of Chile to its ultimatum and is still considering it, maintaining silence as to its contents. It is rumoured that Minister Blaine is satisfied, but not so President Harrison. Meanwhile, bellicose preparations continue.

BUENOS AIRES
—The death has occurred at the early age of 18, of William T. Hunter, eldest son of Mr. William E. Hunter, (Government Inspector General of Boilers and Machinery, etc.), from pulmonary consumption. The deceased was employed in the office of the Local Committee of the Great Southern Railway and he was of a peculiarly amiable disposition, he is much lamented by his office companions, who subscribed and sent a magnificent wreath of violets in memoriam. He died on the 26th inst. at his father's residence in the Avenue Montes de Oca at the corner of Industria and was buried on the 26th inst.

The Minister of Finance has appointed Sres. L. S. Boado, Carlos Hanson, M. Cuenca, A. Gomez, Alberto Hanson, D. D. Escobar and Vicente Ouvia as a committee to review the accounts of the Railways for excess of importations from 1872 to 1890.

The restaurant Lagomaggiore, situated at the corner of Cangallo and Velez Sarisfield, belonging to Pedro Otoni, was burned to the ground on the night of the 26th. The losses are estimated at \$10,000. The property was insured for \$8500. The house was built of iron and wood.

For some weeks past Joaquin J. Lebron, a Spaniard, 25 years of age, by profession a "procurador," has been living with his wife (who was a Miss Schutt, niece of Mr. Adolfo Bullrich, the auctioneer) at Mr. Bullrich's pretty *chalet*, just opposite the Tigre Hotel. They had been married for four years and were apparently living happily together; they had not any children. On Tuesday evening, about 6 o'clock, Lebron returned from the city and went at once to his wife's room, where she was probably dressing for dinner. A few minutes later the people in the house heard the noise of the discharge of a pistol proceeding from the room, and Dr. Mosquera, Mr. Bullrich's son-in-law, ran up stairs but found the door of the Lebron's room fastened; he forced it open and there were Lebron and his wife lying dead on the ground. Upon examination of the bodies it was evident that Lebron had discharged two balls from a revolver into his head. His wife had been frightfully and savagely stabbed and cut with a large Spanish knife (which was lying on the floor) in ten places—one cut had actually severed one of the poor woman's ribs and as she appears to have struggled desperately with her murderer and tried to get to the window, he must have thrown away the knife and completed his horrid work by shooting her twice in the back. That the double crime was premeditated is proved by two letters found in Lebron's pocket, one addressed to Don Domingo Ayarragaray giving instructions as to his business, and another to his brother, who resides Bahia Blanca. There are some indications that Lebron's crime was actuated by jealousy. His wife was a remarkably beautiful woman, 24 years of age.—*B. A. Herald.*

Sr. Dominico, who it will be remembered won the single sculls at the Tigre Regatta last November, started over two months ago to paddle up the river to Corrientes in a canoe, and has not since been heard of. His friends, having heard nothing of him, grew anxious, and went to search for him in a steam launch a short time ago, and traced him to an island near San Pedro, where he was seen about seven weeks ago, and it is feared that some misfortune has happened to him as they cannot hear anything further of him.—*Sport and Pastime.*

LONDON NOTES

MONDAY, DECEMBER 28.

A terrible catastrophe is reported from Gateshead. During the performance of the pantomime "Auldin" at the Royal Theatre on Saturday evening, an alarm of fire was raised, caused, it is stated, by the carelessness of two young men in the side balcony, below the gallery, who are reported to have been smoking. Those upon the stage endeavoured without success to pacify the occupants of the gallery, and in the panic which occurred ten lives were lost, the victims being principally children. Many others were

injured. One girl died of fright in the pit. After the accident a number of roughs took possession of the stage, and some of the actors' costumes were stolen.

A serious accident occurred on Saturday evening at Haugh Head Junction, on the Caledonian Railway. The 5.5 train from Glasgow to Leshmaggow left the rails, and the carriage next to the engine was thrown broadside across the line, while another was tilted on end. Nine passengers were injured, three somewhat severely.

The inquest on the three persons killed in the Lowestoft accident was formally opened on Saturday, and adjourned.

Mr. Gladstone has just addressed a letter to Major Sharpe Hume, one of the Liberal candidates for Stockport, bearing testimony to the services he has rendered to the country at large, and to the Liberal party during its long, arduous and manifestly successful struggle to put down coercion, to expose the gross breach of pledges given in 1836, and to open the way, by the settlement of the Irish question, to a course of active and effective legislation by a Parliament long fettered, but now, as Liberals trust, to have its hands set free for its proper work.

Mr. Herbert Gladstone, who was one of the presidents at the Chester Christmas Eisteddfod, on Saturday, controverted the assertion that the English are not a musical nation. We had, he contended, produced a school of composers second to none, and in the production of cathedral music, and of glees and madrigals had been pre-eminent.

Were we to announce the death of Mr. Weist Hill, principal and one of the founders of the Guildhall School of Music.

The remains of the late Duke of Devonshire, which had been removed from Holker to Chatsworth early on Christmas morning, were interred in Edeator Churchyard on Saturday. Lord Waldegrave was present as representative of the Queen.

The mild weather of Saturday caused a large number of people to visit the Parks. Skating, however, had ceased in consequence of the thaw, and in some places the ice was marked dangerous. At the Crystal Palace during the day there were 19,276 visitors; at Madame Tussaud's, 18,000; at the South Kensington Museum, 7,257; at the Natural History Museum, 3,074; and at Windsor Castle, 642—a decrease in every case but that if the South Kensington Museum on the figures of last Boxing-day.

Important skating contests were brought off on Saturday, in Lincolnshire and at Peterborough, and, considering the rise in the thermometer, under fairly favourable conditions. Many more fatalities through the recent fog were reported, no fewer than three inquests being held on men who were drowned in the Docks.

Football players had to contend on bad grounds on Saturday. A large number of contests were abandoned, yet there were many matches of interest. In the League the Bolton Wanderers were beaten, and both Preston and Sunderland are now very near them for chief honours.

According to a Leeds Correspondent a warrant has been issued for the arrest of Mrs. Osborne, the plaintiff in the recent pearl case.

A curious story of deception practised by a servant was told at the Marylebone Police court on Saturday, when Ella Bennett was brought up charged with having stolen cigars and money belonging to her master. Several things had lately been missed from the house, and they had been taken, it was supposed, by burglars. The prisoner eventually admitted that the so-called burglaries had been committed by her. She was sent to prison for a month.

Sentence of one month's imprisonment, with hard labour, was passed at the Thames Police-court, on Saturday, upon a youth named McNamara, who was charged with having assaulted two constables with a red-hot poker.

At the West London Police Court on Saturday George Fisher, described as a clerk, and George Dickenson, a bookmaker, were brought up on remand charged with being concerned in thefts from flats in the west and north-west of London. It was alleged that one prisoner called at a house when the proprietor was away, bearing a message that he was detained at his club, and asking that an expected caller, whose name was given, should be detained until his return. By this means, it was stated, the second prisoner, who represented the caller, gained access to the house. Prisoners were committed for trial, but formally remanded for the completion of the first case.

A telegram from Tangier states that troubles have broken out among the hill tribes of the Pashalik, who are dissatisfied with the rule of the Governor. Much fighting has taken place and the rebels have defeated a force sent against them under the Deputy-Governor. The Sultan, at Fez, has been applied to for reinforcements.
A New York Correspondent states that the Association of American

Timplate Manufacturers have found production impossible while the import dues upon tin-plates are at the present level.

A Paris Correspondent telegraphs that the trial of two Englishmen charged with espionage in France was concluded yesterday at St. Etienne.

A statement has been published by the Chinese Legation in Paris, according to which order has now been completely restored throughout region of the recent riots.

In view of the rumours which have been circulated lately regarding alleged strained relations between the United States and Chile, the Navy Department at Washington, a New York Correspondent says, has officially declared them to be utterly without foundation.

In the course of the trial of the man who has been selling sham decorations in France, some curious instances have come to light of combined vanity and meanness.

A French medical journal has arrived at the conclusion that the annual mortality of the entire human race amounts, roughly speaking, to thirty three millions of persons.

A pleasing story of Browning's courtesy is related by Mrs. Andrew Crosse. It appears that when he was in Rome the poet's son had hired a room in a neighbouring house in which to exhibit his pictures.

The chemists are in a distressing dilemma regarding the sale of proprietary articles, and what are popularly known as "patent" medicines. They have helped to popularize these remedies by selling them over their counters and exhibiting labels in their windows.

Let week came round the feast of San Genaro. But this time the crowd in the chapel of the Casafreda waited in vain for hours for the "miracle" to take place.

At 4.45 p.m. the blood in the crystal receptacle remained quite hard, and even at the last hour, when a cry went through the church that the miracle had been performed, the blood was not all liquid.

Boxing Day was no day of recreation for the London sandwich men, nor was there probably any desire among this miserable class that it should be. The fogs of last week temporarily destroyed their living; but with the return of brighter weather on Saturday they were out in great force.

Altogether in London and the suburbs it may be taken that something like a thousand of the poorest of the poor were enabled to earn a crust in the streets on Saturday in this way.

THE UNITED STATES AND CHILE

The meagre telegrams leave us to arrive at the facts more from induction than from direct statement, but the facts of the case—as we construe fragmentary statements received—are that the United States waited patiently, after having made due protest and demand, for the action of the courts of Chile.

It is interesting to note that the investigation of the Baltimore incident was concluded that ship was ordered to San Francisco, and the Judge Advocate General of the United States navy was sent there to personally examine witnesses and investigate the matter.

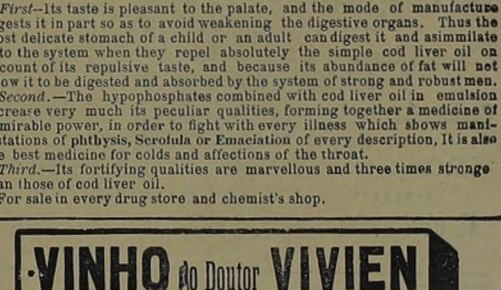
