### NEWS OF THE DAY

**MONTEVIDEO**  
WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 17, 1892  
Saints Donatus and Sylvanus. Duchess of Albany born, 1831. 48 days past, 318 to the end of the year.

**Parliament.**  
General Assembly.—Opening of the Ordinary Sessions.

The Chambers met in General Assembly on Monday under the Presidency of Sr. Gonsensoro, there being present 17 Senators and 47 Deputies. Sres. Borda, Vila, Perez, Lacueva and Freire were appointed as special Committee to receive the President of the Republic, Dr. Julio Herrera y Obes, who presently entered, accompanied by the five Ministers of State.

The President then read the Message which we translate elsewhere, and concluded by declaring open the ordinary sessions of the 2nd period of the 17th Legislature.

Sr. Gonsensoro replied in a few formal words of courtesy and those present then adjourned, according to custom, to the ante-rooms, where refreshments were prepared. Here toasts were proposed by the President and Vice-President for the prosperity of the country and the welfare of the present Government.

The President was then accompanied to his house by those present, accompanied by many military officers and other dignitaries.

**Permanent Commission.**  
The Permanent Commission held a short-sitting on Monday when permission was granted to Sr. Clodomiro Artega to wear the decoration of a Knight of the Royal Order of Isabel the Catholic, accorded him by the Queen of Spain. The Constitutional functions of the Commission were then declared closed, in view of the opening of the Chambers for ordinary sessions.

**THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE.**  
(The Message read by President Herrera at the opening of the Chambers on Monday was very lengthy. The first part, relating to financial affairs which are of most interest to our readers, we translate in full, the remainder will be condensed.)

To the Hon. General Assembly.  
On opening your ordinary sessions on Feb. 15, 1891, the E. P. in giving account of the profound and violent economic and financial crisis which weighed upon the country since July, 1890, took occasion to analyze that perturbation of our national organism in its generating causes and its inevitable effects; pointing out with that motive the final objects towards which Government would direct all its forces, and expressing the hopes entertained that we would arrive at a prompt and satisfactory solution of the crisis by virtue of our vigorous economic forces, stimulated and accelerated in their development by the common spirit of patriotism.

There was a moment in which it was possible to believe, and all did believe, that the crisis was nearing its end, saving intact the base of our foreign credit, namely the religious payment of the service of our Public Debts; and the pivot of our economic and commercial mechanism, namely, the metallic base of the circulating medium.

reappear in all minds, causing local capital to issue from its cowardly and pessimistic retirement, so much so that the national revenue began to ascend. But this reparative movement was paralyzed in a blow, last July, by the unexpected failure in London of the English Bank of the River Plate. As in July, 1890, the aggravating if not the determining cause of our economic evils came from without, as an obligatory consequence of the solidarity of interests created by the relationships of commerce.

The National Bank, suffering the repercussions of the distrust produced by the failure of the English Bank, had to ask from the Banco Popular of Rio Janeiro the extension of the loan of \$3,000,000, with which it might have saved the situation for the moment, but the Banco Popular was suffering in its turn from the monetary crisis in Brazil, and could not comply with the demand. The National Bank again had to suspend the conversion of its notes; an obstinate drought and the fall in the price of produce has prevented agriculture and the live-stock industry from obtaining the expected results, business is once more paralysed, capital has retired, commercial credit is restricted to the utmost limits, and the Customs revenues have suffered a heavy decrease in consequence of the diminution of all consumption.

From that moment the situation has been one of the severest trial for governors and governed, on account of the sacrifices of all kinds imposed, and which, to the honor of the country, have been and still are supported by all with manly fortitude. The crisis, re-aggravated by the events of last July, now follows its logical course, reducing to an extreme the social and economical penalties, in order to arrive at a liquidation, inevitable, but yet most difficult on account of the want of credit and of the circulating capital which is necessary to aid and hasten it, for it is not possible to liquidate without selling or mortgaging, and it is difficult either to sell or mortgage when there are neither buyers nor lenders in the country.

The E.P., powerfully aided in its administrative tasks by the decided and patriotic assistance which you have lent it in the legislative order, has managed to extenuate the evils of this straightened situation by means of partial solutions adequate to the difficulties of the moment, either by proposing economies and creating revenues, when attending to financial necessities, or by suppressing and reducing taxes when attempting to satisfy the legitimate necessities of industry and commerce.

Thus, whilst on the one hand the E.P. asked for the creation of the additional importation duty, the reestablishment of export duties, taxes on beer, alcohol and matches manufactured in the country, imposes the joint product of which has partly helped to fill the void caused in the public revenues by the decrease of all consumption; on the other hand it also asked you for the reduction of the lighthouse dues and the suppression of the packet licenses, granting to the maritime commerce of the Republic liberties and freedoms the efficacy and opportuneness of which have been consecrated by the public manifestations of jubilee with which these measures were saluted.

Our live stock trade with the Province of Rio Grande del Sur was threatened with a serious danger. Exaggerated valuations arbitrarily elevated our export duty on cattle, and the Brazilian Government unexpectedly revived an ancient tariff, according to which our cattle had to pay heavy duties on passing the frontier. Great was the alarm in our frontier departments on account of the serious contrarieties which weighed upon this important part of our rural industries.

The E.P., invoking considerations of the reciprocal interests affected, opened a friendly negotiation with the Brazilian Government, through the Legation in Rio Janeiro, the result being that Government, proceeding with elevated spirit and responding to well-understood interests of its country, has suspended the execution of the tariff, at the same time that the E.P., acting within its administrative faculties, has reduced to its proper proportions the price of exported cattle, thus considerably diminishing the export duty previously paid.

The E.P. does not forget that these momentary solutions have no further effect than to assist in the definite solution of the crisis which is the final goal of all the efforts of the Public Powers.

Neither has the E.P. ever neglected the fulfilment of this duty in the part concerning it, and in its efforts has not departed one instant from the course laid out at the first outbreak of the crisis; namely, to save the foreign public credit and to preserve the metallic base of our monetary circulation.

The first seemed inevitable, for it was notoriously impossible to attend to the full and exact payment of service exacted by the foreign debts and obligations of the Nation.

The explanation of this fact is easy and well-known, still the E. P. considers it its duty to record it officially in this document.

During the period 1890-91 the Public Debt service was kept intact absorbing \$6,019,386, and there were also paid for seven months all the State pensions and salaries without any discount at all, all of which brought about the difficulties of that same period and which also weigh upon the present period.

The Customs revenue, which in the period 1889-90 had produced \$11,000,000, fell in 1890-91 to \$5,900,000, of which there had to be separated and banded over to the Fiscal Committee of Emission \$431,997, corresponding to the 5% additional import duty assigned by special Act to the redemption of the National Bank notes.

To partly fill this void of \$2,582,000, Government could not even dispose of the \$1,500,000 of its current account with the National Bank, which had formed a most important resource in the previous Administration.

These three facts, related with the general fall in the other revenues, due to the crisis, suffice to give a complete idea of the principal causes of our bad financial situation. This was of such a nature that last July there were owing nearly four monthly payments of the Public Administration, it being notorious that it would have been impossible to pay any more if we applied the national revenues to the service of the Public Debts. This service, then, had to be suspended by the hard law of necessity.

But, was it possible, at the same time, to save the public credit, avoiding national bankruptcy? Government did not believe it; that which dishonours Nations as well as men, is not the omission to pay its debts when it has not the means, for that is an unfortunate contingency of the accidents of commercial life, but the dishonour is not to pay when one can, and all that one can. Understanding this, and foreseeing a suspension of the service of the Foreign Debt to be unavoidable, Government initiated in London the financial arrangements with its creditors, the transaction and termination of which were later on confided to Dr. José E. Ellauri.

A complete and faithful exposition of our economical and financial situation, showing the absolute impossibility of meeting the entire payment of our foreign obligations, has sufficed to carry to our principal creditors in Europe the conviction of the truth of the facts and of the good faith and seriousness of our proceedings.

The Committee of Bondholders and creditors for railway guarantees, which was formed in London, composed of men of the greatest honour and influence in English business circles, took under its charge the realization of the arrangement proposed to our financial agent in London and accepted by the Government with your previous authorisation.

By this arrangement, as is known, all our 5% and 6% Debt is reduced to one single Debt of 3 1/2%, interest and 1/2% amortisation, in the bonds of which will be paid the services in arrears and falling due of the Debts to be consolidated, and also the services falling due of the railway guarantees, these latter, formerly 7%, being permanently reduced to a maximum of 3 1/2%.

In this way we have saved as far as was possible the national credit, avoiding the ignominy of bankruptcy. The quotation of our foreign debts is continued on the London Stock Exchange, as an express recognition of our honour, saved intact from the disaster of our public fortune.

Our foreign creditors, proceeding with practical judgement, resigned a part of what was owing them on condition of being assured the exact payment of that which was offered them; and a Nation of 800,000 inhabitants may be able to pay interest of 3 1/2%, on a debt of 100 millions, where it cannot pay interests of 5% or 6% on the same sum. It is not a question of will but of impossibility. Here then is that which has justified us in the eyes of our foreign creditors, obtaining for us their good will and even their assistance.

As could hardly be otherwise with a negotiation in which there were opposed interests opening the way for lucrative speculations, the proposed arrangement had from the first moment the resolute opposition of a limited financial group, which, without being creditors of our country, managed to unite in London, Antwerp, Holland, Madrid and Portugal, a certain number of United bondholders, tempted to this course by assurances that they would obtain by means of another combination an arrangement more favourable to their interests.

The E. P. says «to procure the failure of the Ellauri arrangement,» because in reality the opposition of the Antwerp Committee was reduced to this alone. The offer to present in substitution of this arrangement another more advantageous for the State never went beyond vague and unauthorised promises, notwithstanding the repeated requests made to the protestants to formulate their propositions categorically and seriously in order that their convenience and justice might be appreciated.

The prevailing note in this opposition has been the sordid and insensate interest of those United bondholders, who, shutting their eyes to the truth of facts, blindly claimed their rights, ignoring the impossibility of our country to make them effective.

These opponents, however, have been definitely vanquished by the adhesion to the Ellauri arrangement of the absolute majority of our foreign creditors; but their resistance has served to prove the powerful influences which patronised the arrangement and consecrated it with their moral authority as equitable and convenient for all.

Without administrative pressure and only by the persuasive force of facts and of private interest, the absolute majority of the bondholders in Europe attended for the exchange of their bonds within the first term fixed for this operation (January 31) and which was prolonged to February 13 at the request of numerous holders who could not attend in time.

The conversion has closed with the following figures:—  
In London £ 12,038,000  
In Montevideo " 2,031,000  
Total £ 14,067,000

To which sum there is to be added the amount converted on the Continent (Antwerp, Paris and Amsterdam) not yet known to Government.

When it is taken into account that the total amount of the foreign Debt is £16,780,000, it follows that the bonds not offered for conversion represent a really insignificant sum.

With regard to the local holders of Unifides, it is notable and significant that only one, representing the nominal sum of £200, has protested against the arrangement.

By this means the creditors of the country, giving a proof of good sense and patriotism, offer the foreign creditors the example of their acceptance as express recognition of the necessity and relative convenience of the operation. They, those here, who intimately know the country and its present state, and therefore those who can best judge of the propositions guiding the Public Powers, hastened to accept the arrangement, and with it give the most irrefutable denial to the calumnies and declamations of its opponents.

The Ellauri arrangement consummated, its effects are a considerable and permanent quittance in the service of our foreign obligations, a quietude which, even if it is only a lessening of the pressing charges of the present, is, with relation to the future, a positive benefit assured to the coming generations, who will thus gather the fruit of the sacrifices and privations in which we all now join, each in his sphere, to the future prosperity and glorification of the country.

**THE CONVERSION SCHEME.**  
(S. A. Journal, Jan. 16.)  
The controversy with regard to the conversion of the Uruguay Debt still continues actively, and some important communications with regard to it will be found elsewhere in this issue. Each party professes to be confident of victory, but, until the agent of the Uruguayan Government announces the amount of bonds which have been actually sent in for conversion, it will be a matter of speculation as to the ultimate result. So far as we can learn only a comparatively small amount of bonds (about £600,000) had been deposited with Messrs. Glyn, Mills, Currie & Co. before Christmas. With a view to ascertaining how far the conversion had proceeded up to date, we this week addressed Messrs. Glyn, Mills, Currie & Co., suggesting that it might remove some misapprehension and be a guide to the bondholders if they allowed us to publish the actual amount of bonds deposited with them. To this communication we yesterday received the following reply:—  
To the Editor of the "SOUTH AMERICAN JOURNAL."  
Sir, We beg to acknowledge the receipt of your letter to-day, and to say, in reply, that we do not feel at liberty to communicate the desired information to anyone but the accredited representative of the Uruguayan Government.—We remain, sir, your obedient servants (for Glyn, Mills, Currie & Co.).

allow the bondholders to freely elect a committee to go thoroughly into the whole matter. It is clear that the Council were not fully informed of all the circumstances when they recommended the scheme as it stands. If the assertions made in the clever letters published in the Financial News over the signature of «Antwerp» be true, it is evident that the Uruguayan Government have also been misled. It seems to have been the intention of the Government not to insist upon any conversion which did not meet with the approval of a majority of the bondholders, and in spite of their being advised by Dr. Ellauri, upon what authority does not appear, that such approval was obtained, the ratification of the agreement was only carried in the Uruguayan Senate by two votes.

It is also alleged that the Bank of England and the Baring guarantors only accepted the conversion scheme on condition that they should be freed from the obligation of taking £1,200,000 in six per cent. bonds at 85 for the construction of the first section of the Western Railway, but this condition was rejected by the Uruguayan Deputies, and, consequently, this scheme has been modified to a serious extent, and ought to have been reconsidered by the bondholders. It is becoming clear also, that there is very little chance of the shareholders in the guaranteed railways reaping any advantage from the conversion, and that, therefore, they can have no interest in helping to carry it through. The rejection of the scheme by the Trust Companies is also very significant. Altogether, if the Council Foreign Bondholders wish to retain the prestige and influence which they have acquired in this market, they ought at once to call another meeting of bondholders and allow the freest discussion.

**A Comparison.**  
Referring to the foreign commerce of Uruguay for 1891, the B. A. Standard makes the following comparison.  
If we compare the trade and population of Uruguay with those of Argentina we cannot fail to be struck by the fact that the former has a much greater commerce per inhabitant than the latter. We may premise that Argentina is estimated to have a population of 3,600,000, and Uruguay 730,000, according to latest statements.

We find here an average as follows:—

Thus the total trade in Argentina is just £9 per head, whereas in Uruguay it is nearly £13. The above figures, of course, are the Government valuation, which is notoriously exaggerated in Argentina and probably likewise in Uruguay.

Whilst suspending fuller criticism we may say at present that the Message has not made a good impression here, and, we think, will make a still worse one in England, if only on account of the decidedly improper terms used towards the foreign creditors defending their rights. It is bad enough to confiscate their claims, without abusing them as well.

—Colonel Muró, yielding to Presidential persuasions, has decided to accept the Captaincy of the Port. Why could not the President let well alone, and accept the resignation presented at first. Col. Muró did not so greatly distinguish himself as Chief of Police, that he need be persuaded into accepting another post for which he has still fewer qualifications.

—We do not know if the B. A. Standard has any particular offence against us that it should be reluctant to mention our name, but we do wish that it would not attribute extracts from our columns to the M. Y. News, a purely imaginary title. We would rather not be quoted at

now call another meeting to

all than be misquoted in that fashion. We mention this because it is by no means the first time that the mistake, which can hardly be accidental, has occurred.

—We are requested to announce that the regular meeting of The Woman's Christian Temperance Society will be held at the American Schoolroom, calle Rio Negro 170, at 4 p. m. this afternoon. All ladies are invited to attend, whether members or not.

—Owing to Major Barritt not being able to come over from Buenos Aires, the Special Meeting of the Salvation Army announced for tomorrow evening is unavoidably postponed for a few days. The new date will be announced in due time.

—The following startling item of news is due to the powerful imagination or inventive powers of a Buenos Aires contemporary.—On Thursday night, in Montevideo, the police service of the city was rendered by a number of private citizens, as the regular force were all kept under arms in the Comisarias. This shows that our neighbours on the other side of the river are expecting something in the patriotic gunpowder line.

—The Presidential Escoorte made its debut, as promised, on Monday, but was not received with any demonstration of popular joy.

—The less the people see of the military just now, the better they are pleased.

—The scandal about the alleged theft in the Argentine Consulate grows nastier. The Consul's son now writes to the papers to say that Sr. Raymond was caught by detectives in the act of picking the lock of the official drawer of the Consul, and that in their presence he fell on his knees and cried and begged of them not to expose him. Seeing the affair is sub judice the publication of these letters is most improper, and we wonder the Judges do not stop it. Sr. Raymond is nephew to a prominent Senator, whose name was mentioned a few days ago in even a nastier affair than this.

—The three daughters of General Roca, the prominent Argentine statesman, are on a visit to this capital.

—The Water Pantomime will be repeated at the Politeama this evening. We note that the price of stalls is reduced to \$1.50, but even that is 50 cents too much. Some novelties, including boat and swimming races, are announced for Friday.

—A telegram received yesterday from Artigas says that a revolution is about to break out in the State of Rio Janeiro, owing to disagreements between the people and the military.

—On Monday night, a man named Prados, keeper of a low coffee house, was severely stabbed in four places by a drunken and disorderly soldier whom he had called the police to eject.

**BUENOS AIRES**  
—The National Party is divided in opinion about the candidature of Dr. Luis Saenz Peña; some are in favour of it, others prefer his son, and some will only be satisfied with General Roca. The executive Committee of the National Civic Union held a session on Friday evening, when it was resolved that a meeting should be convoked for Sunday afternoon of the members of the Convention now in Buenos Aires, and of the Executive Committee and of the Committee of the Capital and the Province. The meeting will be attended by General Mitre. The general opinion of the party seems to be in favour of maintaining General Mitre's candidature. A meeting of the Committee of the Capital of the National Civic Union was also held, and it was resolved to send a deputation to General Mitre to ask him not to insist on the withdrawal of his candidature. General Mansilla has expressed himself in favour of Dr. Luis Saenz Peña's candidature.

—General Francisco Reynolds informs the Government that he holds 1075 certificates for 100 hectares each, representing 43 square leagues, and he asks that they may be allotted to him. It would be interesting to know how much the General gave for the certificates.

—The return of the Cleary Company to the scene of their triumph was welcomed with enthusiasm by a full house last Saturday night, the lively opera "Mikado" was rendered with the usual spirit, the artists being apparently nothing the worse for their visit to the depths of the Pacific Ocean, and the scenery and costumes being, if anything, improved by the application of salt water.

—Sr. Justo has instituted criminal proceedings against Sr. Pizarro, Sacon, Coronado and Gonzalez, who formed the first voting table in the parish of San Cristobal for receiving false votes (in one case arresting the real voter after accepting the false vote) for allowing personation of voters, for expelling the complainant from the *tribuna*, although he was properly acting as substitute for an absent member of the tables Sr. Mendrago, and lastly as regards Sr. Pizarro, for voting in two parishes.

The Minister of the Interior has issued a resolution that the Chief of Police should be informed that the President of the Republic has seen with satisfaction the praiseworthy conduct of the police in fulfilling their duties, which were limited to guaranteeing order and the freedom of the suffrage. Pending an application to Congress for a pension for the widow and children of Corporal Sommer, the Police department is to pay to the widow monthly the amount of the salary received by the deceased.

—Mr. Court Stiller, formerly of the firm of Stiller and Laas, and afterwards a director of the South American Bank Note Company, and Mr. Lionel Mallock, late the re-

presentative of that Company in this city, have entered into partnership in the business of stationers and book-sellers, printers, lithographers book-binders and manufacturers of account books. Their place of business is in Calle San Martin 162, where, we have no doubt, from their experience in the business and their well-known perseverance they will attain all the success that can be hoped for in these bad times.—B. A. Herald.

**LONDON NOTES**

WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 15.

It is with profound regret that we announce the death of His Royal Highness the Duke of Clarence and Avondale. We have been officially informed that after the issue of the evening report on Wednesday there was a decided improvement in his condition, which continued up to 2 a.m. A reassuring message was sent to the Queen at midnight. Two hours later a serious collapse came on, which threatened to be immediately fatal, and members of the Royal Family were summoned to the bed side. His Royal Highness rallied from this attack, and regained some degree of consciousness, but after a time it became evident that there was only a temporary character. The Rev. F. A. J. Hervey domestic chaplain to the Prince of Wales, read the prayers for the dying in the presence of the assembled family. His Royal Highness gradually sank, and expired just after nine yesterday morning.

There were present the Prince and Princess of Wales and other members of their family, the Duke of Fife, the Duke and Duchess of Teck and Princess May, together with the three physicians who had been in attendance, and the three nurses. A Correspondent at Sandringham describes the sorrow evinced in the neighbourhood when the sad news became known. The Princess of Wales, he adds, bore up with great fortitude until all was over, and then completely broke down. The Princess May, for whom the deepest sympathy was expressed, was prostrate with grief. Messages of condolence arrived during the day from all parts of the world.

In London the expression of public sympathy was universal. In the course of the morning a number of telegrams were transmitted from Sandringham to the Lord Mayor. One signed «Albert Edward» contained these words: «Our beloved son passed away 9 a.m. Crowds gathered round the Mansion House to read the messages, which were, as usual, posted outside, and within the building representative Welshmen, whose original object had been to promote a marriage gift fund from the Municipality, separated after discharging the duty of passing a resolution of sympathy with the Royal Family. At Marlborough House more than a thousand persons inscribed their names in the visitors' book during the day, and the number of those who assembled at the gates was so great that a special force of police had to be sent for to control the traffic. Many of the callers were moved to tears.

The telegrams which reach us from the Continent and all parts of the world show what a deep and painful impression has been caused by the news of the Duke of Clarence's death. Sympathy with the Prince and Princess of Wales, Princess May, and the Royal Family is universally expressed. Among those who will probably attend the funeral are the Empress Frederick, Prince Henry of Prussia representing the Emperor, the King of the Belgians, and one of the sons of the Archduke Charles Louis of Austria.

We regret to announce the death of Cardinal Manning, which took place at his residence in Westminster at eight yesterday morning. He was in his eighty-fourth year. The Cardinal had few surviving relatives, the nearest being a sister who has attained the great age of 93, and who, on this account, has not been able to be present during the last moments of her brother.

Cardinal Simeoni, Prefect-General of the Propaganda, died yesterday in Rome of influenza at the age 76. Cardinal Simeoni began a brilliant career in the service of the Holy See as Secretary of the Cabinet for Foreign Affairs. He afterwards filled a number of high offices, and in 1868 became Secretary to the Sacred Congregation. He received the Cardinal's hat from Pope Pius in 1876. He was subsequently appointed Cardinal Secretary of State, and in 1878 Prefect of the Propaganda, which office he held till his death.

News of a serious reverse to the forces under Mr. H. H. Johnston in Nyassaland has reached Mozambique from the representatives of the Lakes Company. It would appear that the Arab slave hunters made a combined attack upon Kamnjira, a settlement within the British Protectorate. Captain Maguire who came from India with the Sikh force, Dr. Boyle, of the British South Africa Company, and Mr. McEwan, engineer of the Lakes Company's steamer, were among the killed.

When, at the Marlborough-street Police-court yesterday, Joseph T. Deakin was placed in the dock, charged on remand with being in possession of a cigar box, containing a bottle of white fluid, of which he did not give a satisfactory account, the police stated that they did not propose to offer any further evidence, and the prisoner was discharged. The justices of Walsall having issued a warrant on a charge of having in

his possession an explosive substance, he was immediately re-arrested, and afterwards conveyed to that town.

A Paris Correspondent telegraphs that M. Chirac, director of the Théâtre-Realiste, appeared yesterday before the Correctional Tribunal charged with having permitted the performance of pieces of a scandalous character. He was condemned, together with the principal actress, to 15 months' imprisonment. Two other persons who took part in the performance were sent to prison for two months and a month respectively.
