RE THE ENGLISH BANK.

The remarks which we print elsewhere concerning the English Bank throw a little more light on the vexed question of the unlimited liability of the shareholders in regard to the note issue in Montevideo.

It seems that according to a banking Act of 1879 it is distinctly laid down that a bank of issue, registered as a limited company, is not entitled to limited liability in respect of its notes; but that, so far as these are concerned, the shareholders occupy the same position as if the undertaking were unlimited.

Whether just or unjust, this appears clear and final, so far as English law is concerned. But there still remains the point that the Montevideo branch is not being liquidated under English law, but under that of the Uruguay Republic, and accordingly to the latter the notes are most distinctly not made an extraordinary or unlimited liability.

In fact, the branch here is being liquidated not merely under the ordinary law of the country, but under a special law created for its behalf, that of August 1, 1891. The mode of liquidation ordained by that law was approved by the creditors, as was necessary in conformity with Art. 1770 of the Commercial Code, at a meeting held on August 11. This law, in effect, ordains the liquidation of the local branch, on its own basis, that is to say, as if it were practically an independent bank. The assets of the Bank being considered good enough to satisfy all liabilities in due time, no mention is made of claim on the shareholders either here or at home, no claim is made on the London or other offices, and those offices can neither interfere with the liquidation in any way (except that the London office appoints its representative in the liquidation) nor can they enforce any claim whatever on the assets of this branch until all its creditors are satisfied in full. The notes are made a preferential but in no sense an extraordinary liability, and there is no reference whatever, either in this or any other local law, to unlimited liability of the shareholders on their behalf. We repeat that the liquidation is practically that of an independent concern, with which the English law has nothing to do. We still think then, that there is no reason to alter the conclusions arrived at in our article of last Saturday on this subject, and that the shareholders have strong grounds for resisting any attempt to saddle them with unlimited liability on account of the notes.

The question is one which also closely concerns the shareholders in the London and River Plate Bank, which has a floating note issue of over two million dollars. It is to be hoped then that the points will receive some more satisfactory solution.

Respecting the position of local shareholders with regard to the call for the unpaid capital, we have already expressed our opinion, which we have had no reason to change. The news we give them to-day should prove of some comfort to them, as also to the general creditors. We think there can no longer be any doubt of the ultimate reconstruction of the Bank, in which case the shareholders may hope to recover a great part, if not all of their capital; and we congratulate ourselves on having been the first journal in the River Plate to make the announcement of the proposed reconstruction, which we did many weeks ago.

English Bank of the River Plate. We find the following notice in Sunday's *Siglo*, though no copy of it has yet reached us officially.—
English Bank of the River Plate, in liquidation.—The creditors of this Bank are notified that, in consequence of a resolution of the competent Court in England, a meeting of creditors will be held at Cannon Street Hotel, London, on Wednesday 13th April proximo, to consider a scheme for the sale of the assets to a new company, and the arrangement of the creditors' claims; the details of the said scheme will be given at the meeting in question. This is made public at request of the head office of the Bank, and for the corresponding objects.—Montevideo, March 5, 1892.

Mr. Wilton presided on Monday Feb. 8, at a special meeting of the shareholders of this bank, in his capacity as liquidator under an order of the Court of Chancery. He said the meeting was convened to sanction calls amounting to \$12 5s. There was a project on foot for the reconstruction of the concern, in which considerable concessions would be made in favour of the shareholders, and, if that desirable end were to be attained, it was absolutely necessary that the calls

should be made. The section of the Act of Parliament bearing on the question was perfectly plain. As to the issue of notes, they were not *ultra vires*. They were issued in Montevideo, and the obligation to pay in full was created by the law of both countries.

A Shareholder: There is a question whether the directors are not personally responsible for the issue of the notes.

The Chairman: Nothing you may say can override the statute of 1879. If the note issue were really *ultra vires*, the action of those who made it can be challenged; but it is quite new to me that anyone can be made personally responsible.

A Shareholder: In any reconstruction scheme I hope no notes will be issued without the consent of the shareholders.

The Chairman: No doubt that will be provided for. As the notes were issued in Montevideo, the bank must have derived a profit, and nobody has doubted that the issue was lawfully made. The scheme in progress is that the new company shall issue shares on which you will have to pay £10; but there shall also be to each shareholder a preference share of £5, on which £2 10s. only will be paid. Any shareholder, therefore, who comes into the scheme will get his capital back twofold out of the surplus which he hopes to work out in the long run.

Mr. Peebles: I think there is every prospect, if the scheme is carried out, that the bank will pull through.

The Chairman: I have every hope of that, as we are to have the services of gentlemen of great influence in the River Plate. It was then agreed unanimously to sanction the calls.

The Liability on English Bank Shares. (*Financial News*, Feb. 9.)

In our recent article on the position of bank shares there was one part of the subject with which it was impossible to deal within the limits then at our disposal, and which we, therefore, reserved for separate treatment. We refer to the liability which attaches to securities of this class. This, of course, is an important factor in determining their value, although it is not always easy to trace its influence in individual cases. There is always a class of investors, inspired by a degree of prudence which others might describe as over-caution, who shrink from putting their money into any undertaking which is liable, some day or other, to the contingency of a more or less heavy call. The contingency may be remote, as it, no doubt, is in the case of the leading English banks; but with the class of investors referred to it acts as an effective deterrent. The Companies Act of 1879, as our readers are aware, permitted banks previously unlimited to register as limited, and gave them power to either increase their nominal capital in order to create a reserve liability available in the event of failure, or to set apart for the same purpose a portion of the existing liability on their shares. Most of the leading banks availed themselves of the Act, but they pursued very diverse methods in dealing with the question of liability. In the majority of cases it was made very onerous. The responsibilities of bank shareholders do not, however, end here; for, as the recent instance of the English Bank of the River Plate has shown, they are also liable for any issue of notes, over and above all obligations.

In some quarters the power to make a call for the express purpose of taking up an outstanding note issue has been doubted; but by the Act of 1879 it is distinctly laid down that a bank of issue, registered as a limited company, is not entitled to limited liability in respect of its notes; but that, so far as these are concerned, the shareholders occupy the same position as if the undertaking were unlimited. There is no reason why any great importance should be given to this special liability; for, as a matter of fact, the note issues of the English banks are so small that investors have little or nothing to fear on this score. The case is different with colonial and foreign institutions, many of which have large note issues.

The remainder of the article deals with the issue of purely English Banks, and would be of little interest to our readers.)

The «Burial» of Carnival. This was celebrated on Sunday amid general dullness and profound disgust. If the city had been really in mourning, the streets could hardly have presented a more melancholy and deserted aspect. For this we have to thank the offensive practice of water-throwing, which, as was anticipated, was carried to an inexpressibly brutal excess, exceeding anything known in the most uncivilised periods of the city. The supply of india-rubber balloons or bombs had been exhausted on the previous days, and as much as six and eight cents were asked for the few remaining, their real value being about half a cent. However, their place was taken by paper bags, large syringes, dippers, jugs and buckets, whilst eggs, tomatoes, onions and other offensive missiles were also used. Needless to say, once this beastly play began no respectable

person was seen in the streets or balconies. The conduct of the police was most reprehensible, for they did not make the least effort to enforce their authority or restrain the brutalities of the play. The scene in the centre of the town was indescribably disgraceful and disgusting, and if we say no more about it, it is because we cannot find words severe enough to condemn it.

One or two incidents are worth recording. About six o'clock the «comparsa» of *Charras Civilizados*, a band of about thirty men and youths very well got up in imitation of Charras Indians, armed with bows and arrows and knob-sticks, and carrying some handsome insignia, was coming down the calle 25 de Mayo. Arriving at the corner of calle Solís, opposite the house of Sr. Julio Aramburo, some ignorant ruffian in the balcony threw a bucket of water over them. Their protest against this tasteless trick was only met by more water, whereupon, like brave Indians, they determined to show fight. A shower of arrows and darts soon drove the cowardly occupants of the balcony indoors. The Charras then stormed the house. With marvellous agility, worthy of the Indians they represented, some half-dozen of them actually swarmed up the front of the house, clambered over the projecting balcony, fully twenty feet from the ground, broke open the persiennes, smashed the windows and even entered the rooms and began to destroy the furniture. Their assailants had, of course, taken to flight. A large crowd had collected, and loudly cheered the Charras, as the house in question was one which had distinguished itself throughout for sheer brutality in water-throwing. The police now interfered, and the Charras at once yielded to their authority, formed into line, and marched in good order to the station, amidst triumphant cheers.

Later on they were taken to the Cabildo where they were detained until Monday morning, thereby being prevented from taking part in the competition at the Cordon, where they had gained the prize for two years previous. Their behaviour was violent, unquestionably, but seeing the disgraceful inaction of the police they can hardly be blamed for taking the law into their own hands and avenging their insults. The gross injustice of the case was that the blackguards who provoked them were neither arrested, imprisoned nor fined. For that, we regret that the police interfered before they received the bodily chastisement in store for them and which they well deserved. Nearly every one has applauded the conduct of the Charras. It is only fair to add that in the Cabildo the Charras were treated with consideration and kindness, though their detention all night, under the circumstances, was severe if not unjust. This was not the only «comparsa» treated in the same disgraceful manner, though the others were not so spirited in self-defence.

A new «comparsa», composed of some 30 young men, mostly students, and cleverly got up in imitation of the President, Ministers and lately formed Presidential Escort, made its appearance amid general applause, but also came to grief. Passing in front of a military office, they were detained by Commandant Lucas Rodriguez of the real Escort, who ordered them to dissolve and retire, an impertinent act for which he had not the least authority. As they very rightly refused to obey, the police of the section, acting under orders which he had not the least right to give, arrested them and conveyed them to the station, where they were treated to insults and threats, until they were bound to dissolve in self protection. Against this arbitrary and illegal treatment they have issued a just and dignified protest, and, as some of them belong to influential families, more will probably be heard of the matter. We hope there will, for it is very necessary to teach the military their place with regard to civilians and to check their continual impertinence and usurpations of authority.

A young man named Alfredo Rodriguez, son of Col. Osvaldo Rodriguez, at calle Florida 118, was stabbed in the arm by a man over whom he threw some water. The man escaped, but his companion, who had done nothing, was arrested.

Sr. Luengo, living at calle Corro 86, was fired at with a revolver, by a man over whom he threw a bucket of water from the balcony. The shot missed and the man escaped.

There were many minor incidents, in some of which the police interfered, and in some of which they were conspicuously absent. Considering the unrestrained brutality of the whole business it is surprising there are no more serious consequences to record.

Fatal Accidents. About 830 on Sunday evening one of the wires of the electric light in calle Ituzaingó between Buenos Aires and Reconquista, broke, one end falling to the ground. A young man named Carmelo Laborido, who was passing, took hold of it, and received a violent shock of electricity which killed him on the spot. His right hand, which clutched the wire, was quite burnt. The police took

the body to his parent's house for burial. Laborido was an Italian, aged 17, and a shoemaker by calling. Although the electric light is in general use throughout the city and the first very much exposed, this is the first serious accident we remember in connection with it.

On Saturday afternoon, on board the English bark «Stillwater», a sailor named Edward Walsh, English, aged 26, fell from the deck into the hold, fracturing his skull and dying shortly after.

SUNDRIES.
—The discussion in the Senate of the Banking Bills did not commence yesterday, but, it is said, will do so to-morrow. The terms of the report have not yet been published. It would seem as if the «burry» with which these Bills were to be treated has evaporated. Perhaps the capital for the new Bank is not so ready as was at first pretended.

Dr. Zorrilla de San Martin, distinguished *literateur*, and Oriental Minister in Spain, will represent the Republic in the Historico-American Exposition to be held at Madrid next October.

«Scorching» revelations are made by the Doctors of Law employed to examine the records of Judge Sarachaga's conduct in the 1st Commercial Judgeship, and they assert that he has been guilty of gross derelictions of duty and abuse of his office.

Chief of Police Col. Abella, began office very well indeed and his energetic measures met with general applause, but he has lost all the ground gained by his inexorable and inexplicable negligence of duty during Carnival, permitting the city to be converted into a ruffianly bawdy garden, and allowing his own edict and authority to be entirely set at naught. It will take him a long time to recover the good opinion and respect he has thus forfeited.

Carnival was «buried» on Sunday, and we hope it may never be revived again sooner than see the city disgraced itself as it did.

No fresh alarm from Flores Island; it seems that one of the «suspected» cases was small-pox, and the other nothing very serious. The remaining quarantiners are reported as all well.

It is telegraphed from London that the Commons have rejected Baron Denman's bill for local government in Scotland.

«On Friday a well-dressed stranger stepped into Cassel's and asked for permission to wash his hands. He had his trouble for his pains; for, although he obtained the permission solicited and availed himself thereof, he did not quit the es ablushment with clean hands after all. Instead of doing so, he picked up a clock when no one was looking, and left for parts unknown. When a man does a thing like that, we regard him as an arrant hypocrite. It seems evident that the alleged longing for clean hands was a mere pretext and that the man's real object was to «gain time.»—*Rio News*.

The Uruguayan Government has been invited to take part in the International Railway Congress to be held at St. Petersburg shortly. It is thought probable that the engineer Sr. Guillermo Rigoni will be appointed to represent the country on this occasion.

The savage spirit, though repressed in the Argentina is by no means extinct. Last Tuesday a bull-fight was held at the Argentine Brighton, Mar del Plata, and it is said that about 5000 persons, including some ladies (? females) were present.

The *B. A. Standard* is busy printing a new, revised and enlarged edition of Mulhall's «Handbook of the River Plate.» Considering the great changes that have come over the River Plate since the last edition of 1885, and the exceptional interest developed in it since then, this «Handbook» is destined to a large circulation and will prove more of a «Standard» work than ever.

The first class passengers for this port arrived by the «Thames» on Sunday were Miss Ada Hugo, Mi s L. Miles and Sr. M. Barreira. These unfortunates are in 10 days quarantine at Flores Island.

The «Thames» has brought back to the River Plate Mr. Maurice M. Herve, who acted as *Times*' correspondent for a short time during the civil war in Chili and made himself conspicuous by his extraordinary partisanship for B. Maqueda.

The «Wordsworth» with Mr. E. Casey on board, is expected to-day. He is said to be accompanied by Mr. James Oliver, already known in financial circles out here. According to some accounts the latter comes, not to propose the reorganisation of the National Bank, as was at first reported, but on behalf of the bondholders protesting against the enforcement of the Conversion scheme. In the latter case we fear he will have his journey for his pains, for the Government shows no symptom of listening to reason or right in the business.

Mr. Jones, of the firm of Messrs. Kelsey and Co. has returned from a trip to Curumalao. Mr. Jones reports land and live stock in splendid condition in the far South. Large quantities of locusts are in the Curumalao, Pigué and Casaca estates. They have done much damage to the quintas, but otherwise the injury is nothing to note. Directly the frost sets in they will all die and their eggs will be destroyed. Mr. Sewal, the popular Manager of the estate, has purchased a large estancia beyond the Curumalao mountains, which is very good land. Mr. Sewal will stock his estancia with fine animals and expects to have a good establishment of his own soon.

Don Pedro Cirione has taken proceedings against the Anglo-Argentine tram company to recover \$20,000 for the loss of his right leg, which, according to him, was caused by carelessness on the part of the driver of one of the Flores cars, who refused to stop the car for him to descend, when in Calle Rivadavia, between Saavedra and Misiones, thus occasioning the accident alluded to. The representative of the Company alleges that Cirione had only himself to blame.

A decree has been issued ordering the Public Works Department to complete and present to the Minister of the Interior on April 1st, a statement of accounts with Messrs. Lucas Gonzalez and Co. for the construction of the extensions of the Central Northern Railway and its branches.

The new Railway Board is composed of Dr. Araoz, president; Dr. Nogueira, vice president; Drs. J. A. Terranova, A. Castano and Sr. A. Villanova, S. Alcorta and C. Stegman.

The Rio Negro Salt Company now supplies the market with more than 50 tons of salt a day. It is brought to the company's stores at the Boca, where, immediately on being landed, it is dried in large kilns. Afterwards, it is passed to machines, which remove all impurities from it and separate it into different classes, viz: fine table salt, refined salt in barrels, common salt, and salt specially prepared for the saladeros, for which purpose it is considered quite equal to the foreign salt and is much cheaper.—B. A. Herald.

From the European Mail of January 28th we take the following:

Since our last a company has been registered under the title of Messrs. James Nelson and Sons, with a capital of 500,000, divided into 45,000 10l. shares and 50,000 1l. shares. The object is to acquire the undertakings of Nelson's (New) River Plate Meat Company (Limited) and of J. Nelson and Sons and Hugh Nelson and Co., and with a view thereto to carry into effect two agreements, each bearing date December 21, 1891, the first made between Philip Holmes, on behalf of the old company, of the first part, and W. H. Adams, on behalf of this company, on the second part; the second made between the members of the firms of James Nelson and Sons and H. Nelson and Co. of the one part, and W. H. Adams, on behalf of this company, of the other part; generally to carry on business as importers of and dealers in meat, cattle, and sheep; to acquire ranches and sheep farms, and to carry on the same; to establish and maintain abattoirs, freezing houses etc. There are to be not less than three nor more than seven directors; and the first are to be nominated by the signatories to the memorandum of association. The qualification is 500l., and the remuneration 1000l., with an additional 500l. per annum after payment of 7 per cent. dividend on the ordinary shares.

Extraordinary Defusion. Benigna Mendoza, a Spanish girl, who is a servant in the house Calle Santa Fé 1379, declares that the Virgin Mary has appeared to her repeatedly in the room in which she sleeps, near the roof. She says that the figure was apparently formed of ashes and was hanging from a nail on the wall. One night, a girl, of vague and ethereal shape, clothed in white, appeared in the room and said "I am the Virgin who appeared to you on the wall, and my name is 'Our Lady of Beautiful Love.' I wish to be carried in procession to the poorest church in the neighbourhood." Then the figure disappeared.

This was the statement made by the girl to Sr. de la Casa, who lives in the opposite house and who related the matter to Benigna's mistress. They went to the girl's room and there found a small image of the Virgin, made of terra cotta, hanging from a nail in the wall.

They went to the Archbishop's house to inform him of the miracle that had occurred, but his secretary said his Grace was too busy to receive them and that they had better see the curate of the Merced Church, Sr. Rassore, who is Benigna's confessor. Sr. Rassore went to the house to inspect the image, and Benigna and Sr. La Casa say that when he pulled it away from the wall a stream of water burst forth which filled several bottles and pitchers. Benigna supposed that Sr. Rassore would at once organise a procession to take the image to Piedad church, which is certainly one of the poorest, as it is in an unwholesome state, but this duty was neglected and the result was that on morning the image disappeared mysteriously. Benigna and Sr. La Casa, guessing that the image had taken matters into its own hands, went to the

Piedad Church to look for it, and there, sure enough, it was, on one of the altars.

The Curate was sent for and he was told of what had occurred, but he did not properly appreciate the honor that had been conferred on his Church and told the women to take their image elsewhere, as he had no fancy for celestial music nor for such impudencies. So the image was taken to Sr. La Casa's house where some notable phenomena have been observed.

The first was that a tin of olive oil was found close to the image, without any one (so far as is known) having placed it there, and this was understood as a request by the image for a lamp to be lighted. This was done, and it is kept constantly burning though the supply of the miraculous oil has not been maintained and common oil had to be bought.

Nevertheless, the common oil, as well as the miraculous, has had a wonderful effect in curing numbers of persons of various diseases. The *Prensa* gives the names and addresses of about 40 persons who declare that they have been thus cured (mostly of diseases of the eyes, but one of dumbness, others of heart disease, lameness, sores, &c.). Yesterday afternoon the streets near the house were blocked with pilgrims, actuated either by curiosity or by a desire to benefit by the medicinal properties of this lamp-oil.—B. A. Herald.

LONDON NOTES

WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 3.

Lord Salisbury addressed a meeting of about ten thousand persons at Exeter last evening, in a building which had been specially constructed for the occasion. Alluding to the new Khedive, he said that the Government had every ground for hoping that Abbas Pacha would carry out his father's wise traditions. He next spoke at some length on the hardships of labouring people, ridiculing village councils, but remarking that if he had the opportunity he would create district councils himself. He was in favour of Mr. Chamberlain's old age pension scheme, and expressed himself as anxious to multiply small holdings in this country; but he was strongly against compulsion. Ireland still remained the burning question of the hour. He did not attach very much importance to recent bye-elections, and repeated his threat that the next general election would only be the first stage in a long and protracted struggle.

Lord Ripon was the principal speaker at a Liberal demonstration at Hyde last evening. Referring to recent bye-elections, he took a hopeful view of the prospects of the Liberal party, and in the course of his speech pointed to some of the reforms which the party advocated. As to local government for Ireland, he held that if free popular local bodies were created with an honest franchise, there would be such a demand for Home Rule as would make the passing of a Home Rule Bill absolutely irresistible.

At a meeting of Livermen at Guildhall yesterday, Mr. Alderman Cotton was elected, on a show of hands, to the office of City Chamberlain. A poll was, however, demanded on behalf of the other candidates, Mr. Pannell and Mr. Payne, and it will be held on Friday.

Details of the arrangements for Mr. Spurgeon's funeral were announced at the Metropolitan Tabernacle yesterday. On Tuesday next the coffin will be conveyed to the Tabernacle, and the church thrown open to the public from ten till six. On Wednesday there will be a series of memorial services. On Thursday the interment takes place at Norwood Cemetery at half-past two, after a service at the Tabernacle, to which seatholders and delegates only will be admitted. Mrs. Spurgeon has received a telegram of condolence from the Prince and Princess of Wales.

A Correspondent in the Isle of Wight gives a graphic description of the gallant rescue of the officers and men composing the crew of the Eider, the operations being carried out in stormy weather, with an exceptionally dangerous sea. According to him the work of rescue was completed at seven o'clock, when the whole of the 166 officers and men were brought to land, the captain being the last to leave the ship. The three lifeboat crews at the back of the island have, he says, gained a noble record, having in trying weather and treacherous seas saved 391 persons without accident to a limb.

In the Belgian Chamber of Deputies yesterday the debate upon the proposed revision of the Constitution resulted in a definite statement by M. Beernaert of the proposals of the Government. The Premier named ten articles of the Constitution which, he said, needed revision, among them being those dealing with laws on elections, the representation of minorities, and the payment of members of Parliament.
