A youth of sixteen, who was said by his father to have been demoralised by reading cheap novels, was committed for trial from the Bow-street Police-court on a charge of stealing a box containing 3l. 9s. and some valuable papers belonging to his former employer. The prisoner, it appeared, absconded on being pressed as to the theft, and wrote a remarkable letter to his father, representing that he was detained by brigands in a cave and must have 25l. in gold...

—2500 arr. wool were sold in feria yesterday at 22 to 27 reales fleeces. 70 bales sheepskins were sold in barraca at 65 to 100 reales the lb. according to quality.

—Sr. Freijeiro has sold from his saladero in Mercedes 2 to 3000 salted steer hides, guaranteed 67 lbs., under sail all March, at 47 1/2 reales the pesada, p.o.b. in the saladero.

—The wool market is in a state of panic. Prices for good, middling and inferior qualities have fallen to such a degree that extra superior wools can hardly aspire to 95 quotation, wools that fetched in November 138. But where the decline is most, severely felt is in so called «borrega» wools; sales of «borregas» from the North with «carretilla» are reported at \$4 in spite of this low quotation, there is only one buyer of this kind of wool in the markets. Limits of purchase are 3.50 francs for good Southern wools, kilo washed; 3.25 for middling qualities. Consignees will naturally not submit to these low prices, and business in consequence is paralyzed. It is calculated that we must yet export 225,000 bales of wool.

—The wheat market is a reflex of the wool market. The leading wheat men are already beginning to store their grain; meantime, prices in Europe continue falling and the gold premium here is on the decline; these hopeful farmers are looking forward like their colleagues in wool to a heavy rise in gold. Wool, wheat, maize, hides, skins, all are falling steadily—the degingrolade is complete. The losses of estancieros, consignees, «acopiadores», and farmers in general will be enormous if this absurd policy of sterling their products continue. Our friend Don Carlos Lix Lett has been preaching the march of events for the last four months. Those hearkened to his advice have done well, and many are sorry that they did not heed same.—B. A. Standard.
