Cricket.

For the second time this season we are able to congratulate our cricketers upon a victory over their old opponents from Buenos Aires; the return match, played at the Blanqueada on Thursday and Friday, having been gained by the home team after a well contested and interesting game, on the two innings by 221 runs to 195. The scores were, M.V.C.C. first innings 86, second 135; B.A.C.C. first innings 71, second 124.

For the home team Jeffries batted well and carefully, making 27 and 26. Chater also did well, making 21 and 23. The top score was that of Stanham who made 32 in the second innings. Slater bowled splendidly on both days, and much of the credit of the victory is due to the fine way in which he "spotted" off the Buenos Aires crack batsmen. On the first day he took 8 wickets for 19 runs, or an average of 2.37, and his average for the two days was 4.77. Hunt and Poole were not so happy in their bowling as usual.

The visitors showed the best batting on the second day, when Dillon, Boyd and Gifford made a gallant stand at the opening of the innings, making 42, 24 and 23 respectively. At this time, the aspect for Montevideo was threatening, but when these three were disposed off, the rest showed little stand and the wickets came down quickly for small numbers. Anderson and Walshe gave some good bowling.

There was a considerable number of visitors both days, the match evincing considerable interest, especially towards the close. At conclusion both victors and vanquished were warmly cheered. This brought the cricket season to a triumphant close.

The annual dinner, at which the Buenos Aires team were guests, took place on Thursday evening. E. Satow Esq. presiding. The proceedings passed off with the happiest of occasions, and the usual friendly and complimentary toasts were exchanged.

The Conversion Scheme.

We are officially informed that the North-Eastern of Uruguay, the Central Uruguay Northern Extension and the Central Uruguay Eastern Extension Railway Companies having accepted the arrangement for the conversion and consolidation of the External Debt of the Oriental Republic of Uruguay of August 26 last, the necessary contracts for giving effect to the provisions of such arrangement have been concluded in Montevideo, and the respective companies have now received bonds of the New Three-and-a-Half per Cent. Consolidated Debt of Uruguay in full settlement of their claim for arrears of guarantee to December 31, 1891, in accordance with the terms of the arrangement.

Montevideo United Charities.

At the Committee meeting held last Friday, 6 cases of local distress reported by the sub-committee, were considered, it being found that only 2 required further assistance. One was granted \$5 a month and the other left for further enquiries. Since the beginning of April 3 cases of distress have been relieved at the Home. One was dismissed as undeserving, one obtained work on the U.S.S. "Chicago" and the other left for B. Aires. From April 10 to 14, one Merchant and 105 Navy seamen paid for their board and lodging at the Sailor's Home. The decision to try and make the Home self-supporting was confirmed and the sub-committee exhorted to keep a watchful eye on the daily expenses. The establishment of an English school for children of poor parents was mooted, but left for future consideration.

The Holy Days.

So far as outward manifestation is concerned, Holy Thursday and Friday met with unusual observance this year. Never have we seen the streets and churches more crowded, mostly with the gentler sex dressed in the regulation black and making the customary tour. The less said about the reverence observed inside the churches, the better. More than one of our contemporaries remark that the singing and preaching were unusually poor. The compulsory attendance of the garrison corps, in companies, was not conducive to devotion, and some of the officers and men seemed to be unaware of the difference between a church and the barrack canteen.

In some parts of the city there was a revival of the open air processions, but they did not meet with much attention. We think these are a mistake in the midst of a mixed population, and it chiefly excited only to see old men and children marching and standing bare-headed in the biting cold wind that was blowing; they should either have been allowed to cover themselves, or else have kept under shelter. There is no necessity for piety to interfere with ordinary precautions of health and safety.

On Friday evening there was a scandalous scene outside the Cathedral. This church being crowded to excess, the police refused to allow any more to enter, which they did very roughly. Their abusive language and rough conduct aroused considerable opposition, and quite a riot ensued in which several policemen were roughly handled by young

men, and several of the latter were arrested. Minor disorders from similar causes also occurred outside other churches, in which both police and people were to blame.

SUNDRIES.

The London journals received by yesterday's mail reproduce President Herrera's Message at the opening of the Chambers on February 15. As we expected, his allusions to the financial position and the conversion scheme have made a very bad impression there. We quote elsewhere the opinion of the *S. A. Journal*. The *Financial News*, amongst other remarks, says as follows:—When Dr. Herrera proceeds to refer to the sacrifices and privations in "which all now join," it is difficult to see whether he alludes to the Government or its unfortunate creditors, but probably the latter. The capital for a new bank, he thinks, could hardly be raised at present outside the country; and we agree with him on that point. But when he declares that "Uruguay has not lost the confidence of foreign capital," and that the arrangement of the "public debts," so far from having "damaged the country financially," "has confirmed its credit on the basis of the sincerity and honour of its Government," he talks sheer nonsense.

It does not improve the reputation or usefulness of a paper to resort to abuse of the personnel of a contemporary, even if differing in politics.—*B. A. Herald*. We reproduce this remark for the benefit of a contemporary which frequently indulges in this offence, due to bad taste and ignorance of the first rules of respectable journalism.

The new committee of the B. Aires Choral Union consists of Messrs Boyd, Begg, Mayne, Colquhoun, Grassick, Mackern and Pjilner; with Mr. Nicholson as President and Mr. R. Moore as Vice-president.

Sr. Frenedoso, commissary of the 7th section of Salto has been dismissed from his post for brutal and violent ill-treatment of a man whom he had to arrest, and who died shortly after, his death being accelerated if not directly caused by his injuries. The commissary, one of "good old school," denied the acts to the last, though testified to by several witnesses. The affair was too strong for the authorities to blink at, and the commissary has accordingly being dismissed, serving as an example to many other camp commissaries of the old school, who are addicted to these practices. We would suggest, however, that dismissal is not sufficient, and that the ruffian who abuse their authority in this manner ought to receive some punishment as well, or else the offence, too frequent a one in this country, will never be stamped out.

The debut of the Italian Opera Company at the Solís Theatre, originally announced for last night, is postponed until further notice.

The Ministry of Foreign Affairs has appointed the following committee to represent the Republic in the Italo-American Exhibition at Genoa.—President, Dr. José Campaña, Oriental Consul in that city. Members, Sres. C. A. Polle, P. Casaravilla, F. D. Costa, Dr. J. Pagnalini, J. Charlene and F. Polleri.

The decree has been issued from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs recognising Sr. Antonio de Portugal de Faria as Portuguese Consul in this capital.

The Minister of Government has appointed the surveyor J. J. Castro, in conjunction with the Chief of Telegraphs, Sr. Maximo Clavell, for the inspection and reception of the National telegraph lines. The inspection is not to last more than five months, during which period Sr. Castro is to receive a monthly salary of \$250, paid by this Post-Office and Telegraphs Department.

Subscribers to the "Night Shelter" are reminded of the meeting to be held at the British Consulate on Monday afternoon to decide on the knotty question whether or not the funds are to be handed over to the "United Charities," a question on which there seems to be some diversity of opinion.

The position between these two Charities is a peculiar one. The new one says "Give us your money and we will see what we can do with it." The old one says "Let us know what you are going to do with the money, and then we may give it you." Unless one side or the other makes a concession, matters may thus reach a dead lock. For our part, we think it would certainly be rash on the part of the Night Shelter subscribers to hand over their funds, a considerable sum due to the economical administration of last year, to a new body, without first receiving assurance that it will be properly administered. We might suggest, as an acceptable compromise, that a portion of the funds, say \$100, be given to the United Charities, and then, if at the end of four or six weeks it is found to work satisfactorily, let the balance be handed over. If on the other hand, the new concern does not work well, the balance will have been well saved for application to its original purposes by the original committee.

It is customary in most parts of

the world, for Charitable Associations to publish a definite programme before applying for subscriptions, and not to apply for subscriptions with the intention of forming the programme afterwards.

When the idea of extension of political rights to foreigners was first mooted, the *Nacion* applauded it. Now that the Presidential clique has decided against it, the *Nacion* calls their unpatriotic and interested opposition "well founded." The *Nacion* does not shine in consistency.

That most tranquil and amusing of operettas "Dona Juana" will be given at the Poli eama this evening, with an excellent cast, including the prima dona Cesira Gori, who is admirable in this piece. Conti, the comedian, is also very good as the Alcalde. Altogether we anticipate an unusually good performance.

The Clerk of the Weather gave us of his best and worst on the holidays. Thursday was "glorious summer" and Friday the "winter of our discontent" (under advertisement) and great coats and fur wraps were hastily summoned from their retirement. The difference between the two days could hardly have been more striking.

We cannot congratulate the city on its observance of the two holy days just past. There was much church-going than religion about it.

The arbitrary siege by the police of certain houses in calle Santa Teresa, continues, and numbers of curious spectators visit the scene, which is not without its ridiculous aspect. The 1st. Fiscal of Crims has decided that the criminal Judge Dr. Ballesteros has no jurisdiction in the case, the orders having proceeded from a superior authority; and it has accordingly been passed, for the second time, to the Superior Tribunal of Justice. Further protests and claims have been lodged. The proprietors of the besieged houses have resolved not to charge their tenants for rent during the siege, and to supply them with food, which the police will not let them go out of their houses to seek for themselves. All this arises from the obstinacy of the Minister of Government in refusing to acknowledge that he had blundered in the first instance.

It is telegraphed from Buenos Aires that doubts as to the candidature of Dr. Saenz Pena are already arising, and that the candidature of General Roca (who is recovered from his recent indisposition) is again being spoken of. We expected as much. The old "fox" means to be next president—but we do not think the people will accept the imposition quietly.

On Thursday, the stupid practice of carrying a loaded revolver caused a serious accident to a young man named Montevideo, on the passengers' mole. His foot slipping, the weapon he had in the back pocket of his trousers went off, inflicting a severe wound in the leg. It is fortunate that he was the only sufferer from his folly, and not some innocent bystander.

Holy Thursday and Good Friday give the observer an opportunity of noticing how admirably black becomes the majority of the beauties for which Montevideo is justly famous. And they seem to know it, too.

The police were unusually busy in the holidays, making a great number of arrests, chiefly for disorderly conduct. There were no serious cases, however.

A smart shock of earthquake was felt in Tacuamen on Wednesday evening.

An unusual number of visitors came over from Buenos Aires on Thursday and Friday, many of them with the object of visiting the political exiles, who are staying in the Hotel de Paris, where they excite much attention.

On Monday evening a concert will be given in the Lira saloon by Miss Minna Brückner, assisted by Sres. Saques, Sambucetti and Aguller. An attractive programme has been arranged.

The Captain of the Albion Football Club requests us to announce that there will be a pick-up match this afternoon on their ground at Punta Carretas. Kick off at 2.50 p.m. sharp, sides to be elected on the field. All members are particularly requested to attend.

BUENOS AIRES
—From January 1st to the 10th instant 20,135 immigrants arrived in this country and 17,396 left it.

The Government has ordered the payment to the Central Córdoba Railway of the sum of \$91,277, in bonds of the Morgan loan, being the amount due for interest at 5%, on the capital expended in the purchase of the Railway.

The Government has resolved to establish a deposit of provisions on Staten island sufficient for a shipwrecked crew for six months.

Some of the members of the Argentine Yacht Club have arranged for a cruise next week by a "squadron" of yachts, viz. the "Veloz" Messrs. D. and E. Mackinlay and A. N. Williams; the "Gaviotas," Messrs. R. Newton and E. Zimmermann; the "Gladys" Messrs R. Kinoh and A. Leighton; the "Emma," Messrs. E. Wilding, G. Kimball and H. Coffin. The squadron will visit some of the ports of the Uruguay and will practise manœuvres; the vice-president of the Club will be the commodore of the squadron. The yachts are to keep within 100 metres of each other.

Machinery for making Artesian wells will henceforth be free from Customs duties.

Sr. Grieba has been appointed director of the School of Agriculture in Terra Colony.

A decree has been issued requiring the Railway Companies to notify the Minister of Finance during this month whether they will obey the prescriptions of paragraph 2, sect. 4, Art. 3, of the decree of 30th December, 1891, relative to the free introduction of materials for the use of the Railways. If not, they will be subject to the following regulations:—the materials not made free by the general law are to remain in the Custom house stores and to be despatched in lots sufficient for a fortnight's consumption; the Railway Company giving a guarantee bill for the duties; these prescriptions apply to the articles in the Company's warehouses at the end of this month.—*B. A. Herald*.

«THE UNITED CHARITIES.»

To the Editor.

Sir,
I am desirous as a subscriber to both the Sailors' Home and the Night Shelter to call attention to the position of the last named institution, which I trust will not transfer its funds to the "United Charities," till this undertaking can show that it has been successful in obtaining the required revenue to meet its current expenses. At present, the Night Shelter has \$340 in the bank, owes nothing, is incurring no expense, but as soon as it is found desirable, it can open its doors to the distressed.

There is considerable doubt as to the United Charities obtaining any increase in the grants from the British and Foreign Sailors' Society and the American Seaman's Friend Society, and I even fear that, owing to the misappropriation of the funds by giving free meals and beds, the grants may be altogether retired.

The Entertainment Society's success in the coming season is problematical, and they they are no more bound than is the Night Shelter, to transfer their surplus funds to the "United Charities."

The latter must therefore depend on the regular monthly subscriptions, if these are ample they will not be wanting the dollars of the Night Shelter for some time. If not ample the retention of the \$340 by the Night Shelter, till it is required for the purpose for which it was subscribed, appears to be the most prudent and correct course.

PRESIDENT'S HERRERA'S MESSAGE.

(*S. A. Journal* March 19.)
The mail last to hand from Uruguay brought to us President Herrera's Message to Congress at the opening of its ordinary sessions on 15th February. It is a very lengthy document, and we have made no attempt to reproduce it in *extenso* in our columns. The portion of it, however, which we have deemed of special interest to our readers will be found elsewhere inserted. Naturally, his Excellency makes special reference to the conversion of the Foreign Debts, the successful realisation of which is notified in terms of considerable elation. Indeed, President Herrera so represents matters that one might almost imagine that it was quite a meritorious and patriotic achievement to have broken faith with the external creditors of the Republic, and to have secured from them an arrangement severe mitigation of their just claims upon the exchequer of the State. There is, in fact, a jubilant ring in his utterances, and his Excellency poses just as if he had deserved well of the nation for the astuteness with which he has got the better of his *acreedores ingleses*. But he adds insult to injury when he characterises the conversion on this side as a voluntary concession, observing, in proof of this, that it was the bondholders here who approached the Government with these proposals of composition, and not the Government that approached them. We are not ignorant of the genesis of this spoliation. We do not deny that the conversion originated with parties in England who had axes of their own to grind. But it is only too notorious that the bondholders were practically compelled to consent to an arrangement which they regarded as flagrantly inequitable. A very large section of them protested, and only came into it when they

had really no other recourse. As might be expected, President Herrera speaks in strong terms of the opponents to the negotiation or this transaction. They are described as a limited financial group, and their action is attributed wholly to speculative and interested motives.

President Herrera has not, however, been allowed to chuckle without admonition from the press on the spot. The MONTVIDEO TIMES brings him face to face with the unpalatable truth, when it states, editorially: "Not a word of proper regret do we find for the maladministration, the dishonest borrowing which have brought the country to a second default, . . . none of the humility becoming a debtor only able to pay 50 or 60 cents in the dollar, . . . on the contrary, there is an absolute tone of triumph at the success with which the creditors have been cajoled or frightened into the involuntary acceptance of an unfavourable and venal arrangement."

Alas, for the past! What of the future? Will Uruguay honestly pay the covenanted interest of 3 1/2 per cent. on the debt as it now stands? The President uses the word *puede*, which will pass for *may* or *can*. Time, in its fullness, will provide us with the true interpretation.

The Government were again defeated in the House of Commons yesterday. On the order for the second reading of the Places of Worship Enfranchisement Bill, an attempt was made from the Conservative side to postpone it, on the ground that the Bill had only just been circulated. This being successfully resisted, the debate went forward. Towards the end of the sitting, Mr. A. J. Balfour proposed that the Bill should be referred to a Select Committee with other Bills dealing with the same subject; but the Opposition objected, holding that that would kill the Bill for the year. They therefore elected to go to a division, when the second reading was carried amid loud cheers by 238 votes to 119, a majority of 119, or exactly two to one.

The polling at East Belfast to fill the vacancy caused by the expulsion of Mr. De Cobain, passed off quietly yesterday. Both candidates were Conservative—Mr. G. W. Wolf, who received 4,748 votes, and Sir William Charles, who secured 2,607. Mr. Wolf's majority is thus 2,141.

Mr. Arthur Arnold presided at the annual meeting of the Free Land League, held at the Westminster Palace Hotel last night, and in moving the adoption of the report, which referred to the increasing prosperity of the League, declared that the progress on the land question which had been made since 1885 was due to the enfranchisement of the rural population. The late Mr. Bright had told him that he regretted his association with the Tories, because free land would never be obtained from a Tory Administration. Reform of the land laws would be given by a Liberal Government. The intelligence of the agricultural labourer was aroused, and would not again slumber until the land and the people were more closely united by just and beneficent laws. The report was adopted, and Mr. Arnold re-elected president.

Progressive members of the London County Council met at the Westminster Palace Hotel yesterday, and resolved to ask Lord Rosebery to accept the chairmanship. Mr. John Hutton was selected for the post of vice-chairman, and Mr. Dickinson for that of deputy-chairman. Aldermen were also chosen.

The thirty-second annual meeting of the Association of Chambers of Commerce of the United Kingdom was resumed yesterday at the Hotel Metropole, under the presidency of Colonel Hill, M.P. Sir Michael Hicks-Beach spoke on a resolution which drew attention to the desirability of telegraphic communication with lighthouses and lightships. He was also present at night at the annual dinner of the Association, and delivered an address on the trade of this country, with special reference to its commercial treaties with France, Spain, the United States, and other nations.

Complete defeat has fallen upon the supporters of Mr. Mercier as the result of the Quebec elections. Of the seventy-three members elected to the Legislative Assembly, only seventeen of the partisans of the ex-Premier have been returned. The Liberals interpret this result not as a defeat of their party, but as a condemnation on the part of the electors of Mr. Mercier's methods, as shown by the recent scandals. The Attorney-General, it is stated, has decided to issue warrants for the arrest of Mr. Mercier and other members of the late Cabinet.

Important correspondence with regard to the Behring Sea difficulty was transmitted to the United States Senate by the President yesterday. Mr. Blaine is informed in a despatch of the 29th ult. that Lord Salisbury would not object to a zone, closed to sealing, of not more than thirty miles round the Pribyloff Islands on condition that the catch on the islands be limited to 30,000 seals. In a later communication Sir Julian Pauncefote presents the argument in support of Lord Salisbury's refusal to conclude another

modus vivendi. In reply, the United States Government calls attention to the fact that the tribunal of arbitration cannot deliver its judgment early enough to permit of sealing during the present season being controlled thereby, and insists on the modus vivendi.

The semi-final tie for the English Football Association Cup was at the third attempt brought to a definite issue at Derby yesterday. West Bromwich severely beating Notts Forest by six goals to two. West Bromwich and Aston Villa play the final tie at the Oval on March 19.

At the Central Criminal Court, yesterday, before Mr. Justice A. L. Smith, Mrs. Florence Ethel Osborne pleaded guilty to two indictments charging her, in the first place, with the larceny of certain jewels belonging to her cousin, Mrs. Hargreave, and in the second with having committed perjury in an action for slander against Mrs. Hargreave. Sir Charles Russell, who appeared on her behalf, argued in mitigation of sentence her frail state of health, and the facts that the jewels had been restored, that Messrs. Spink, to whom the jewels were sold, had been repaid, and that all the parties to the action had been reimbursed their costs. The learned Judge, in passing sentence, said he took all those points into consideration, but remarked that if the prisoner's action against her relative, Mrs. Hargreave, and Major Hargreave had been successful, they would have left the court with an indelible stain of infamy. For the offence of perjury, a sentence of seven years' penal servitude might be passed; but having regard to the circumstances, he would only pass a sentence of nine months' imprisonment, with such hard labour as the prisoner's state of health would permit her to undergo.

FRIDAY, MARCH 11. In the House of Lords yesterday, the Clergy Discipline (Immorality) Bill, the Gaming Act, 1845, Amendment Bill, and the Colonial Probates Bill were each advanced a stage. In the Commons, the Bill to repeal the clause in the Eastbourne Improvement Act under which Salvationists have been proceeded against, led to an animated debate, on Mr. H. H. Fowler moving that it be read a second time. The great preponderance of feeling was in favour of the Bill, as shown in the division, when the second reading was carried by 269 votes to 122, a majority of 147. Mr. Balfour, in reply to a question, announced that it was intended, in the event of the draft charter of the proposed Gresham University being referred back to the Privy Council, to bring it before a new and stronger Royal Commission. Mr. MacNeill moved the adjournment of the House in order to call attention to the famine in India, more particularly in Madras. Mr. Curzon, Under-Secretary for India, and other members having spoken, the motion, was withdrawn. Mr. Balfour's resolution, permitting report of Supply to be taken after midnight, even if opposed, was carried after amendments had been negatived. The report of Supply was agreed to.

A correspondent at Newcastle telegraphs that the ballot returns in the Durham districts, so far as they were known last night, point to an overwhelming majority in favour of a general strike of miners throughout the country. This resolution will affect something like 120,000 workers. The men are determined strenuously to resist any attempt to reduce their wages, and the colliery owners, on the other hand, are preparing for a long struggle. Today horses and ponies will be brought to bank. Work in the North generally will be affected, and already throughout the Cleveland district blast-furnaces are being damped down. Our correspondent points to the possibility of a water famine in mining villages, where the supply is derived almost entirely from the pits.

Among the resolutions adopted by the Associated Chambers of Commerce yesterday was one in favour of shortening the period over which general elections are allowed to extend, in order to minimise the hindrance of trade. Mr. Littler, Q.C., was yesterday re-elected chairman of the Middlesex County Council, Mr. Montagu Sharpe being again chosen as vice-chairman. The Liberals have obtained a majority of more than two to one at the County Council elections in the counties of South Wales. Much damage has been caused in every sheeprearing district of the country by the recent snowstorms and frost, the mortality amongst lambs having been immense. A large vessel with thirty hands went ashore yesterday off Buda. The ship is expected to become a total wreck, but the whole of the crew have been saved through the exertions of the local rocket brigade. A remarkable letter has been addressed by Mr. Mercier, the ex-Premier of Quebec, to his supporters in the Province. He complains that calumny has got the better of the Constitution, and laments that for all the good he has done ingratitude is his sole reward. It is reported that Mr. Mercier's adherents in the Legislature will resign as a mark of sympathy with him.

News has been received, via Chicago, of a disastrous blizzard which has been raging throughout the whole region, extending from Lake Michigan to Montana. Owing to the damage done to the telegraph wires, information is so far scant, but reports received all speak of loss of life and destruction to property. The temperature has fallen alarmingly, and already a number of persons are known to have been frozen to death. Railway carriages have been blown off the lines, and houses unroofed, and agricultural work has

everywhere been brought to a standstill.

—The «Olympo» brought on Thursday from Asuncion \$400 to Galli, \$750 to Rein, \$550 to Martinez Rademacher, from B. Aires \$10,000 to London Bank, \$2,000 to B. Tejada, \$20,000 to L. Superville. Total \$33,700.—The «Montevideo» brought from Concordia \$276 to T. Bernini, from F. Bentos \$186 to J. Silva, from Mercedes \$400 to M. Gonzalez, \$901 to E. Julia. Total \$1,763.

—From April 1 to 9 inclusive, Liebig's factory at Fray Bentos slaughtered 8793 head of cattle, making a total to date of 108,682 head. The daily average of slaughterings has fallen to 737. The Swed. lugger Veritas sailed on the 10th, taking from Liebig's for England 10,500 salted ox hides, 300 cases meat extract, 120 casks tallow and 21,691 horns.

—From Zurich news is telegraphed of the death of Mr. Charles Fehr, founder and partner of the firm of Wedekind, Fehr and Co., of this market and B. Aires.

—Yesterday being a holiday in B. Aires, no business telegrams arrived thence.
