### A NECESSARY DISCLAIMER.

We reproduce elsewhere a speech of Sir John Lubbock, Chairman of the Council of Foreign Bondholders, relative to the Conversion or Confiscation Scheme which has lately been enforced. Leaving for another occasion any reply to Sir John Lubbock's statements as to the merits of the scheme and of the means employed to thrust it on the bondholders, we think it necessary to refute his charge, evidently made in no kindly spirit, that the *MONTVIDEO TIMES* is the "organ" of the bondholders.

We may say at once, that the charge is gratuitous and unfounded. Nay, more, it is even ridiculous. Sir John's Council, as its name signifies, pretends to represent the bondholders; how, then, could those bondholders have an "organ" which so decidedly opposed and so strongly criticised the action of the Council? If we were the "organ" of the bondholders and represented their opinion, the only rational conclusion is that the Council did not represent them and therefore failed in its object and duty. Sir John's assertion, then, only recoils on the head of the Council of which he is Chairman.

If by being the "organ" of the bondholders, Sir John intends to say that we did our humble best to protect their interests, and to expose the viciousness of the Conversion scheme and the irregular practices pursued to carry it out, the charge is only a compliment, and we have the satisfaction of knowing—according to Sir John's own acknowledgment—that we shared our position with every London paper except the *Times* and every financial journal of the least importance or influence.

If, however, Sir John desires to insinuate—and we think he does—that we were paid for our advocacy, we at once reject the insinuation. We acknowledge, with regret, that the unfortunate antecedents of English journalism in this city, make the insinuation plausible, but we had hoped that our unimpeachable independence, since the paper has been in the present hands and under the present name, would have sufficed to save us such an accusation.

Fortunately the solicited and immediate reply of Mr. S. Kennedy, Secretary of the Uruguay Bondholders' Committee in London, (which we print below Sir John's speech) sufficiently proves that the charge is groundless. Mr. Kennedy speaks of us as an independent English journal of high character. If any further disproof is necessary, we may state at once that we have never received, nor expect to receive, directly or indirectly, one single cent of payment for our advocacy of the bondholders' cause and our opposition to the Conversion scheme. We are not even aware of its having added a single subscriber to our list. Our advocacy was merely undertaken—as we presume was the advocacy of all our English contemporaries—on an examination of the merits of the case as it appeared to us, and with no further instigation than our habitual policy of doing our best to represent and protect English interests in Uruguay. This is our plain statement, on which we are content to stake our reputation, and we defy anyone to produce the least proof to the contrary. The only reward we look for is in the increased confidence accorded our paper if gain had been our object no doubt it have been pecuniarily more profitable to take the side of the Council and the high financial powers who rule the destinies of Uruguay for the moment. But we preferred the side of independence and truth, and whether our judgment was right or wrong, we are content to abide by the consequences.

On this head we shall say no more. Some other day we may answer Sir John's other remarks.

## NEWS OF THE DAY

**Parliament.**  
In the Chamber of Representatives, on Tuesday, a Message was received from the Executive containing particulars of the credits forming the deficit from 1886 to 1890. Referred to the Committee of Finance. Various minor matters were referred to Committee, and some reports distributed.

Deputies Pacheco, Barros and Lamarca presented a Bill relative to public tenders for administrative works, etc. Referred to the Committee of Legislation.

Private Bills for the creation of one urban and six rural schools in the Department of San José, and for a grant of \$10,000 for repairs and furniture in the public offices of the same Department, to be deducted from the \$50,000 due to it from the State according to the law of Jul 23, 1887, were referred to the Budget Committee.

The modifications introduced by the Senate in the Bill relating to vine-culture were approved.

The petition of Boccia and Co. for concession and monopoly for a fishery's mole, was rejected, as advised by Committee.

After some further business of secondary importance, the sitting closed.

### Definite Liquidation of the National Bank.

The present Directorate of the National Bank has passed a note to the Minister of Finance, officially advising him of the acceptance by the shareholders of the administrative form of liquidation offered by the Law of March 24. The Directorate considers that it has accordingly ceased in its functions and only awaits the nomination of the Liquidating Committee created in Art. 3 of the said Law in order to hand over the administration of the Bank.

At the same time, the Committee of Auditors and Mortgage Certificate Holders has officially informed the Minister of Finance of the acceptance of the same Law, in so far as it affects them, by their constituents, a majority of some three-fourths having directly expressed their conformity, and none having expressed the reverse. This Committee, likewise, now considers that its functions have ceased.

In conformity with these declarations, the Minister of Finance has instructed the President of the National Bank to fulfil Art. 5 of the Law by proceeding at once to the payment of the drawn bonds and coupons due to Dec. 31 inclusive, of the Cédulas and Mortgage Certificates. These payments were accordingly commenced yesterday, in notes of the National Bank at their nominal value.

### Pension Office.

The long-threatened decree creating a General Paying Office for the Pension Lists has been published from the Ministry of War and Marine.

After a preamble stating that the present system of paying the pension lists gives rise to many abuses, both of the State and the pensioners, the Decree proceeds to concentrate all the present offices in one central office to be called the General Paying Office of the Pension Lists. (*Habilitación General de las Clases Pasivas*). The office is divided into two sections, each under the charge of a Superior Chief or Paymaster, personally responsible for all the acts of their offices, and giving guarantee to Government for \$20,000 each. Each of these takes charge of the payment of certain assigned pension lists, receiving the money direct from the Treasury, and rendering monthly account of the same. The Office is allowed to collect a commission of 1 1/2% on payments in camp, and 1 1/4% on payments in town. The two Paymasters receive this commission as remuneration, paying all expenses of the office out of the same. The Paymasters and Chiefs of Sections are to be appointed by Government.

This decree, the preliminary announcement of which caused considerable criticism, has been very ill received, and is already denounced as a shameless piece of jobbery merely conceived to provide two fat appointments for Government nominees. It is also contended that Government has no constitutional right to appoint the Paymasters, in whose selection the pensioners should have some voice.

The Council of Foreign Bondholders and Uruguay  
*Sir John Lubbock reviews the Situation and explains the Confiscation Scheme.*  
The annual general meeting of the Corporation of Foreign Bondholders was held on Friday, March 25, at the offices in Moorgate-street, Sir John Lubbock, Bart., M.P. (the chairman), presiding.  
In the course of a lengthy speech, reviewing the year's work of the Council, Sir John Lubbock made the following remarks relative to Uruguay.—

The only other subject as regards loans that I need say anything about is the subject of much acrimonious discussion in the new-papers, and we have been attacked in somewhat strong language, mainly, I might almost say entirely, by anonymous writers. Fictitious meetings have been reported at which imaginary resolutions are said to have been passed, and the misstatements have been really so audacious that I do not at all wonder that the English Press was somewhat misled by them. It has been stated that the *Times* and the *Financial Times* are the only papers that supported the Council in this matter. That is, I think, an exaggeration, but I merely allude to this matter to say that if any of the Press require information, and they will come to the council-house they will find us anxious and ready to give them information on any subject. Now, the council, I think everyone must see, really cannot afford to answer anonymous attacks, and, moreover, in many cases it would be most dangerous to do so. For instance, at the very time that we were being attacked here, because it was said that we had made an arrangement which was very unfavourable to Uruguayan bondholders—we see now from their organ, the *MONTVIDEO TIMES*, and from the report of the President of Uruguay; that at that very time they were urging the Uruguayan Government to upset the arrangement, on the ground that they would be ready to carry one through more favourable to the Uruguayan Government. Therefore, any step we had taken in answer to those letters would have been used on the other side of the water as a general argument why the Government should repudiate the arrangement in the hopes of obtaining better terms for themselves and worse terms for the bondholders. Now, the facts of the case are very simple. We received in the month of August a very influential requisition, requesting this council to appoint a committee, five members of which were directors of trust companies, and therefore, presumably, represented large interests, and four of them were represented by Uruguayan railways and I think every who looks at the names will say that it was an excellent and representative committee. The committee negotiated with the representatives of the Uruguayan Government, and eventually they brought it before the council, and it is substantially the arrangement which has been now confirmed. They did their best to induce the Uruguayan Government to agree to the proposal which, while containing the reduction of interest for the time, would have contained provisions under which the interest would have been gradually increased until it arrived at its old amount; but the Uruguayan Government positively declined to come to any such arrangement. When they submitted it to the council, the council then felt, as many would have felt that it would be much better, not only for the creditors, but for Uruguay, that the reduction should be temporary, and as the finances improved the rate should be increased; and the council did everything they could to secure such an arrangement, but the representatives of Uruguay positively declined to agree to it, and, under those circumstances, it was submitted to a general meeting on August 31, and was adopted by that meeting. I may say that at that time I was out of England, and therefore I had no part in those negotiations; but when I came back I looked into what had been done, and found a considerable discussion going on, and the principal objections were, first of all, it was said that the council had received a commission of £500,000 sterling. The commission which the council has not yet received, but I hope, will be £2,000 and a small sum as trustee. Well, then, it was said that the meeting was of an irregular character. Now, the meeting was of the character of all our meetings. Everybody who attended the meeting had to sign a paper giving his name and stating the amount of Uruguay stock in which he was interested, and, as far as I am able to say, there is not the shadow of a foundation for the assertion that it was otherwise than a perfectly fair meeting. At any rate, if there had been any people who doubted it, it would have been open to them to invite us to call another meeting. Then it was said that the rights of the five per cent. holders had not been recognised. That again is a misapprehension, because while the five per cent. bondholders receive 70 per cent. of the interest to which they were originally entitled, the six per cent. bondholders will only receive 80 per cent. and, therefore, there was a recognition of the rights of the five per cent. bondholders.

Of course, the subject might have been dealt with in either of two ways. We might, as in the case of Turkey, have made two stocks, and given a certain priority of redemption to the five per cent. bondholders; but, on the whole, it was

thought better to make one stock, which I hope is for the interest of the bondholders, and to recognise the priority to a larger amount of interest than to the six per cent. bondholders. It was also said that, instead of a permanent sacrifice, it should have been a temporary diminution of interest, rising by degrees subsequently. Well, that was what we did our very best to secure for the bondholders. We thought—and we think now—that it would have been better for the interest of Uruguay if she had consented to that course, but we had no means of compelling her to do so, and we had only to consider whether, on the whole, it was desirable to accept what was offered or not. Again, it was said that the arrangement was made in the interest of the Baring guarantors, and that the Baring guarantors should have been omitted. I believe it would have been a very great mistake if, in any settlement of the Uruguayan debt, the Baring loans had been left out of consideration. It was very much better for everybody's interest that the whole of the debt should be settled at once in some way or other. (Hear, hear.) Then the question remains whether, on the whole, it was as much as Uruguay could pay for the present. I observe, in the last number of the *Financial News*, that Mr. Kennedy, the secretary of the committee who mostly opposed the loan—now comes forward and says that the amount is more than Uruguay can possibly pay. That, of course, entirely cuts the ground away from his previous arguments. (Hear, hear.) But a much higher authority, the *Economist*, of last week, says that even as it is £20,500,000 at 3 1/2 per cent. is a great burden for so small a country as Uruguay. That we feel is the case. We feel it is as much as perhaps Uruguay could undertake with safety to pay at the present time. Well, then, when I came back and found this discussion going on, I certainly thought there must be some bondholders who objected to it, and that we should be invited to call another meeting, or that they would call a meeting of their own; but nothing of the kind was done, and November came. The law was passed through the Chambers in Uruguay and sent over here. It was considered and discussed, but no meeting was called by any opposition, and it was not until November 27 that we ratified the agreement. After we had done so, Mr. Kennedy's committee called a meeting of the bondholders. If they had done so sooner, no doubt those in favour of the arrangement would have attended, and given their reasons for supporting it, and, as experience showed, they would have carried it by a large majority, but the arrangement having been ratified those in favour of it naturally felt it useless to attend the meeting, and they did not do so. (Hear, hear.) Well, in spite of all said in the new-papers, an overwhelming majority of the bondholders, while they regretted the diminution of interest, considered it better to accept the arrangement proposed, and which has been accepted by some.

The following reply to Sir John Lubbock's assertions appeared in the *Financial News* of March 28.—

*To the Editor.*  
Sir—I have just read in the *Financial News* of to-day Sir John Lubbock's speech at the meeting of the Corporation of Foreign Bondholders, held yesterday. I find that he made me the subject of a personal attack on account of a letter of mine which you kindly published in your issue of the 24th instant. He further adversely criticised the action of those bondholders who protested against the spoliation of their rights by the Uruguayan Government for the benefit of others.

With your permission, I will briefly allude to a few of these points. Sir John Lubbock insinuates that the attacks on his incorporation in the public press have been anonymous. This is strange, as the action of my committee in the interests of the five per cent. bondholders has been by no means anonymous. Not a single line has appeared in the press emanating from anyone connected with my committee which has not had the signature of the writer attached. The meeting at the Cannon-street Hotel on December 17, at which a resolution condemning the confiscation scheme was carried almost unanimously, was not called anonymously, and at that meeting every precautionary measure was taken to ensure that each person present was a bona-fide bondholder.

The press of the country, London and provincial, with one or two exceptions, has condemned over and over again the principle of violation of hypothecated rights, which has been consummated by means unnecessary for me here to characterise.

So much for Sir John Lubbock's charge of occult opposition. Sir John Lubbock makes a distinct allegation against my committee in connection with a journal named the *MONTVIDEO TIMES*, which he describes as their organ. This journal in Montevideo, in conjunction with the English press, has had the courage to expose the disastrous re-

sults of this spoliation scheme, not only to the bondholders, but to Uruguay, and hence it appears to have excited the animosity of the Council of Foreign Bondholders. I wish to state clearly that the *MONTVIDEO TIMES*, as far as we know, is an independent English journal of high character. It is no more the organ of my committee than is the *Financial News* or any other respectable paper in England which may have attempted to educate the public against Uruguayan confiscation.

On one point Sir John Lubbock is perfectly accurate, namely, that my committee was urging the Government of Uruguay to upset the arrangement of August 26, 1891, which was a scheme simply to deprive the holders of the five per cent. bonds of their hypothecated rights in favour of the Baring guarantors, of recipients of commissions, and, what is worse still, the alleged claims of persons interested in the Western Railway, who, by agreement with President Herrera, and with the assistance of the Council of Foreign Bondholders, have mainly brought about this state of affairs.

From the moment that arrangement was known my committee has persistently endeavoured to obtain from the Uruguayan Government a reconsideration of this matter at the hands of the bondholders. Communications to that effect were addressed to Dr. Ellauri and to President Herrera in Uruguay, both by telegraph and letter. To not one of these communications was a reply deigned to be given.

Sir John Lubbock now publicly states that the corporation only receives £2,000 out of the £500,000 of bonds set aside for expenses, commissions, and press propaganda. Perhaps Sir John will equally publicly state in what manner the balance has been expended, and who are or will be its recipients.

Sir John Lubbock's next statement is that they did their best to induce the Uruguayan Government to agree to the proposal, which, while containing the reduction of interest for the time, would have contained provisions under which the interest would have been gradually increased until it arrived at its old amount. . . . and the Council did everything they could to secure such an arrangement; but the representatives of Uruguay positively declined to agree to it.

But let me ask Sir John how he reconciles this statement with that made in his letter to the Antwerp Committee on November 25, 1891, which is as follows:—"The alternative proposal put forward by the opponents of the present scheme of settlement, that a graduated scale of interest should be demanded, reasonable and equitable though it may be in theory, would, in the opinion of those here whose knowledge and experience of South American affairs he safely relied on, prove altogether illusory in practice."

What President Herrera says in his message to Congress with regard to this matter is the following:—"The Committee of Bondholders and Creditors for Railway Guarantees, which was formed in London, . . . took under its charge the realisation of the arrangement proposed to our financial agent in London and accepted by the Government."

I leave this discrepancy to be settled, therefore, between Sir John Lubbock and President Herrera. Sir John next makes a categorical complaint against me, viz.—I observe, in the last number of the *Financial News*, that Mr. Kennedy (the secretary of the committee who mostly opposed the loan) now comes forward, and says that the amount is more than Uruguay can possibly pay. That, of course, entirely cuts the ground away from his previous arguments. I explained in my letter to your journal that Sir Edward Thoroton, who was wholly responsible for the statement of figures put forward at the meeting on August 26 last, and which statement has been relied on to induce bondholders to accept this scheme, declared that with \$8,000,000 the Government of Uruguay could carry on the internal administration of the country; but that President Herrera, in his message to Congress, recently admitted that at least \$12,000,000 was required for that purpose. Hence my statement is correct; and, in view of what Uruguay has done in the past, the President not only proves my argument, but justifies the position my committee has assumed in this matter, viz. that before bondholders accepted any arrangement with that country it was highly necessary to obtain from them a fair and honest statement of account, not based on calculations by interested persons, but one which would enable the creditors of the country to enter into a fair and honest understanding with their debtor, so that the rights and interests of the creditors might be maintained, and the honour and reputation of the debtor not be sacrificed.—I am, sir, yours, &c.,

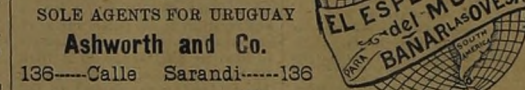
