PASSING NOTES.

«No Quorum»

On Saturday, as on the preceding convocation, no business could be transacted in the Chamber of Representatives, because the Honorable Deputies, not satisfied with the holiday they voted themselves in Holy Week, did not attend in sufficient number to form a quorum. This «no quorum» complaint, which occurs regularly every session, and at times delays most important business, is eminently scandalous, and requires putting a stop to it, if only one could find the way. Even if the Legislators were volunteers, it would be a reprehensible breach of faith. But they are not volunteers, they are paid servants of the country and consequently the country has the right to demand from them a proper attendance to their duties and to reprimand or even punish them if they fail. Moreover, they are servants with the extraordinary privilege of fixing their own remuneration, which they have carefully done at a sum higher than that paid for similar services in any other part of the world and quite out of proportion to the value of those services as judged by an impartial eye. Even the acute crisis from which the country is suffering, causing her to default in her foreign obligations and to confiscate the claims of her creditors, has not induced them to withdraw their salaries into reasonable limits. Under these circumstances, their inattention to business is still more inexcusable. If their payment was made proportional to their attendance, and they were fined two days salary for every day's absence without reasonable excuse, no doubt the tale would be a different one. And we do not see why it should not be so; they should be placed on the same footing as salaried servants in any other branch of life. Unfortunately, no one has the power to enact or enforce the legislation necessary to secure this except themselves, and the legislators which have so little sense of patriotism as to be unable to reduce their own exaggerated salaries in time of acute crisis, and who, moreover, enact that they shall be paid before any one else is attended to, can hardly be expected to make enactments which would out short their present privilege of drawing the national money without attempt to earn it.

More Military Injustice.

Of the barbarous injustices of military procedure there is apparently no end. A few days ago we recorded the fact that a farmer named Olivera, of Minas, had telegraphed to the Minister of War asking protection for his brother Romero, whom the military and police were persecuting for having left the infantry regiment into which he had been illegally pressed to serve against his will. The Minister replies «When the soldier Romero has returned to the regiment from which he has deserted the affair may be taken into consideration.» That is to say, the Minister, contrary to all established rules of justice, begins by assuming the very matter which has to be tried. Until it is proved that Romero was not pressed against his will, the Minister has no right to call him a soldier, nor to say that he has deserted, for it is not and never can be desertion for a man to regain the liberty of which he has been wrongfully deprived. Similarly, until the said fact is proved, the military authorities have no power over or claim on Romero, and it should be the duty of the police, not to aid the military in persecuting him, but to protect him against their aggressions. If Romero were to surrender himself as the Minister suggests, it would be a tacit acknowledgment that he were in truth a deserter and that the military authorities really had power over

him. It would indeed be a case of the lamb surrendering to the wolves. The proper and just course for the Minister to have followed would have been to protect Romero from further aggression until it could be proved whether or not he had been pressed, and then either to punish him for deserting or else to punish the officers and soldiers who have abused and persecuted him. The present procedure, similar to that employed in the case of the unfortunate Ciavasco, is brutal as well as unjust, and only serves to render military methods hateful. Resistance to such processes is both necessary and justifiable if the country is not to degenerate into military slavery. When General Perez was elevated to the Ministry of War, we had some hopes that we would see some modification in these barbarous methods; we regret to find we were mistaken. In military matters the country is as uncivilised as ever.

The National Bank.

The meeting of shareholders to decide on the administrative or judicial liquidation of the Bank, as ordained by the Law of March 24, was held in the San Felipe Theatre on Saturday afternoon. The attendance was not large, being under 200 shareholders. The chair was taken by the President of the Bank, Dr. J. M. Muñoz, supported by the Directors Stes. Vidiella, Capurro, Castilla and Isea.

Dr. Muñoz set before those present the object for which the meeting was called. He added that the Directorate had done all in their power to guard the interests of the Bank and to obtain for the shareholders the greatest advantages possible, either in the case of reorganisation or of liquidation. The Directorate did not think it possible to obtain greater advantages than those conceded by the present law, for even if the Executive Power had been willing, they would not have been granted by Legislature. In the Meeting of Aug. 24 last, the situation of the Bank had been clearly set forth. Since then the monthly balance published had shown that the Bank had had to struggle with an aggravated crisis, rendering the collection of debts and the realisation of properties or mortgages, most difficult if not impossible. The present situation, then, as regards the greater part of the assets, was practically the same. Referring to the «Special Account», Dr. Muñoz said that on the 12th instant the legal adviser of the Bank had issued his definite report, after a careful examination of all the antecedents, establishing the conclusions that all the Directors of the Bank who authorised the scandalous operations of that account are collectively responsible for the enormous losses thereby caused to the Bank, and that the ex-director Sr. Domingo Ayarragaray, besides his share in the collective responsibilities of the Directorate, is individually responsible for the losses ensuing to the Bank by the investment in the operation; he effected, of \$450,000 in excess of the funds proceeding from the \$20,000,000 loan. The Directorate has approved and accepted these conclusions, and, constituting the collective and personal responsibilities which they establish, values, if not of eventual realisation, of great importance in favor of the assets of the Bank, the Directorate has considered it its duty, before retiring, to give full authority to the general solicitor of the Bank to initiate the cases corresponding to make effective the said responsibilities.

SUNDRIES.

—Once more, on Saturday, the Representatives could summon up no quorum, thereby making their Easter holiday extend for a week beyond the appointed time. Some minor matters were passed to Committee, and a handful of Committee report on petitions for pensions were distributed.

—We have now the official declaration of Dr. Muñoz that the previous directorate of the National Bank is considered collectively responsible for the losses of the scandalous «Special Account» and that Sr. Domingo Ayarragaray is further individually responsible for the losses from the investment of \$450,000 in excess of the balance of the 20 million loan. So far, good. To know this is to have attained something. It now remains to be seen how far the persons responsible—parties of high position—will be proceeded against towards making them restore the amount lost to the shareholders through their iniquities.

—General José María Reina Barrios, has been elected President of the Republic of Guatemala.

—Our weekly contemporary, following out its policy of representing things as they are not, calmly states that Government is beginning to pay the monthly estimates for April. Seeing these are not due until the month has expired, the statement smacks of audacity, even for our contemporary. The truth is that Government is concluding payment of the estimates for February, and hopes to commence on those for March in the course of a few days, so that it is barely a month in arrears.

—We learn that the Committee of the United Charities have accepted the resignation presented by Mr. D. A. Williams as Superintendent of the Saviors' Home and Harbour Mission, and are now on the look-out for a suitable person to take his place, combining with it the superintendence of the Night Shelter, which it is proposed to start under the same roof.

—«Cavalleria Rusticana» at the Solís, on Saturday, was hardly a success. The prima donna Sra. Paydro, was good and secured the sympathy of the audience, but the rest of the singers, and even the church bell, were «out of tune and harsh». The tenor Annovazzi, from whom so much was expected, had a sudden attack of cold, and could not do justice to himself or his part. The orchestra was fairly good. «Ernani» will be given this evening, not having been given on Sunday as announced. «Cavalleria Rusticana» will be repeated on Thursday, when it is hoped the singers will have found their voices. Audiences have been limited.

—The Company at the Politeama continues to give complete satisfaction and is attracting large audiences. As we expected «Un Milanes in Mar» was very successful and immensely amusing. Tonight will be given «The Fishers of Naples», full of bright music and with amusing scenes of Neapolitan life. In the last act there will be two dances.

—The Superior Military Tribunal has named the following as Judges of the Permanent Council of War:—Col. Ignacio Madriaga, Col. Juan Quinoces, Col. E. Pereda, Col. G. Monegal and Col. E. Chaves.

—Sr. B. Fernandez y Medina, of the staff of *El Bien*, has favoured us with a little volume called «Chararmusas», containing some admirable sketches of street and social life in Uruguay, cleverly described. The work has a short preface by the Minister of Government Sr. Bauxá.

—The Finance Committee of the Senate has reported on the Bill for the arrangement of the Municipal Debt, recommending its adoption with the addition of a clause providing for the draft outstanding against the English Bank in liquidation.

—Col. Quinoces having been morally obliged to leave his post as Director of the Penitentiary on account of the charges of abuse brought against him is now rewarded for his services by being made a Judge on the Permanent Council of War.—«For he is a judge, and a good judge too.»

—According to *La Razon* Government has telegraphed to the syndicate in London of the new Bank to know how matters are proceeding, not having had any communication from them since the passing of the Law on March 24. This looks suspicious.

—The trial Athletic Sports of the Central Railway C.C. were held at Peñarol on Sunday, before a large gathering of residents and visitors and with every success. Marks were given for the various events, and the gainers of the highest marks, receiving first, second and third prize respectively, were Davies, Gowlan and Woosay. The Club will shortly hold a meeting on a more ambitious scale.

—The Canelones Crims is taking a new and even more repulsive aspect. The Commissary of the district, Cosme Melo, and the three policemen appointed to guard the rancho where there Traversi family were assassinated, are now under arrest under strong suspicion of being accomplices or at all events accessories after the fact; and Colman, a man in charge of the rancho is also in custody, it having been found that he had tried to efface the tracks of the criminals. This has come to light since the Montevideo police authorities took up the case, being disgusted with the apparent ineptitude of the Canelones police, which has now received this appalling explanation.

—Our readers are reminded of the meeting at the Lafone Hall this evening, to constitute a choir for the practice of choral music, under the direction of Mr. Henry Marshall, Musical Director of the Entertainment Society. Those who cannot attend this evening but who are willing to join, should send their names in to Mr. Marshall.

—The Executive has forwarded to the Chambers a Message relative to the consolidation of the deficit of the Budgets, of 1890-91, amounting to some \$600,000, and other floating credits against the State for appropriations, etc., amounting alto-

gether to about \$3,000,000. The form of solving this deficit is left to the determination of the Chambers.

BUENOS AIRES

—The Board of Public Works have advised Government to instruct the Engineer's Department to make out the surveys and plans of seven kilometers of line required to make Messrs. Bamberg and Co's railway concession independent of the Argentine Gt. Western. Messrs. Bamberg's concession is for a line from Mendoza to San Rafael. The Board state that Messrs. Bamberg must pay \$32,147 due for surveys and plans already made out by the Engineer's Department.

—The volunteers in full marching order started from Palermo on Friday morning and encamped at the Arroyo Medrano outside of Belgrano. They form the vanguard of the Maldonado division which starts on Sunday for the Pajar de Pacheco. The troops which will undergo about a fortnight's manoeuvring at this place will number about 3000, under Generals Palacios and Gardemina.

—Mr. Francisco Lix Klett, for many years «barraguan» in this city, and one of the numerous victims of the crisis, has committed suicide by shooting himself with a revolver, leaving a young wife and two little children to mourn his untimely loss. It appears that up to the time of his demise Mr. Lix Klett was visiting the different agricultural centres in the South camps with a complete battery of threshing machines, the business not turning out a lucrative one.

—Under the name of «Constructing Company of Huergo Bros. and Co.», a new company has been formed, who will undertake the location of domiciliary sewers, piping, etc. The gentlemen who represent this new firm are Messrs. Luis and Edward Huergo, who will act under the direction of their father, Mr. Luis A. Huergo, the well known civil engineer.

—The following interesting data appear in the last Statistical Police Bulletin for March: «The offences for every 100,000 inhabitants in that month reach to 86.38 as against 61.38 in the former year. The persons arrested for offences represent a 66.02 % of the total of probable offenders; the 33.97 % who form the rest, have evaded arrest. The offences committed are classified as follows:—offences 463, minor do 3210, suicides 15, fires 9, 66 accidents. Value stolen, amounts to 133584, 15 as follows:—\$23,912.30 robbed, \$67,686.85 stolen, \$25,033 defrauded, \$36,832 by fires, \$440, accidents. Of 15 attempted suicides, 9 were committed within a north wind was blowing and 6 with a south wind. These offenders were all Roman Catholics.»

—Celestino Fà, José Abeiro and Juan Luis Ozan, who were arrested on suspicion of being the murderers of George Hiron in Mendoza have confessed their guilt. It appears that Hiron's wife, to whom he had been married for two or three months only, formerly lived with Fà, who wished to have her back again, and therefore determined to «suppress» the husband. Abeiro and Ozan assisted Fà in committing the crime with as little compunction as if he had asked them to join him in killing a sheep. It is asserted that Hiron's wife was cognizant of the intention to kill her husband. Fà is the son of an influential *caudillo*, and will doubtless escape punishment.—*B. A. Herald.*

—Judge Constanzo has declared the investigation of the \$600,000 robbery in the London and River Plate Bank at an end; but the police have orders to bear the matter in mind, and keep all their eyes open, in case anything should turn up to enable the case to be reopened. We greatly fear that it is a case of gone for ever with the big lump of cash.

—The Burton murder case which has given rise to considerable comment, took place in October last, and before the date of Jan. 29th no formal complaint was made by Mr. Burton to H. M. Minister. However, he at once on receipt of this complaint took steps to have the matter investigated, and the result is that the assassin, a soldier of the guard at the Riachuelo has been condemned to the maximum penalty prescribed by the Code, namely 12 1/2 years imprisonment. There are circumstances connected with this case to which it is impossible to give publicity. Suffices it to say that Mrs. Fryer, in whose house this deed was committed, has at length got some small share of her deserts, by having been fired at and wounded by D. M. Greenslade, as recently reported, because she had induced his wife to come to her home for immoral purposes, in the same way that it is believed, that she had enticed Mrs. Burton there. Moreover, she and Mrs. Burton were in the habit of lending small sums on pledges, which caused the dispute which led to her death. In view of the excellent character borne by Greenslade, at Mr. Herbert's request Mr. Walker, the contractor of the Port Works, has agreed to pay a share of the expenses necessary to find his defence in the case.—*B. A. Standard.*

—Demand for the Bijou «Crab Apple Blossoms» has been so brisk that stock has run out for the moment;

meanwhile the larger bottles are on sale and can be found as usual at the Botica Inglesa, etc.

THE RAINHILL HORRORS. Liverpool, April 2. Frederick Deeming, who is charged with the murders in Melbourne and Rainhill, was removed from Perth, Western Australia, on Saturday, and began his journey to Melbourne, where he arrived yesterday morning. At York he would have been lynched by the people if they could have got at him.

The telegrams from Australia convey reports of further charges against the man Deeming. It is now held, apparently with reason, that he murdered a companion named Keays in the African goldfields. He has also been identified as a man «wanted» for a triple murder at Johannesburg in 1883. At Adelaide the prisoner was interviewed on board the steamer by a correspondent. It appears that Deeming has been informed of the ghastly discovery at Rainhill, and he is said to have given expression to a feeling of almost brutal indifference as to his own fate.

The inquest on the bodies of Mrs. Deeming and her four children, the victims of the Rainhill tragedies, was resumed and concluded on Monday before Mr. Brighouse and a jury. The evidence given, although elaborate, threw little additional light on the events leading up to and following the tragedy. It appeared from the evidence of Mrs. Martha Deeming, sister to the murdered woman, who is married to a brother of the alleged assassin, that hardly any secret was made of the taking of Dinham Villa, where it was represented that the family intended to stay only for a short period before again going abroad. From the evidence of Mrs. Morley, Guelph-street, Hall-lane, Liverpool, it appeared that the murdered woman was aware of her husband having committed bigamy at Hull. The jury returned a verdict of willful murder against Frederick Bayley Deeming.

A Hull correspondent states that a number of letters written by Deeming, alias Lawson, while under arrest at Montevideo, after his flight from Hull, have come to light. They are badly spelled, and are addressed to the British Consul. In the first, dated April 4th, 1880, he says, «The treatment I am receiving is not fit for a dog, and it is doing considerable injury to my health.» He adds that he shall take action against the Government if it cost him a thousand pounds; and, as a British subject, he demands protection, also alleging that there was a man at large who had «eloped» with \$3,000 of his money. His request for removal to a cleaner goal was acceded to, and in another letter, written after it had been decided to send him home, he asks that he may be allowed to telegraph to his «poor, dear wife» who, he says, «must be suffering even more than me.» He also expresses the hope that «you will let me go as private as possible, for the sake of my family name.» In another epistle he says, «I never see any one to speak to, not even a spiritual adviser. I have not any Prayer-book nor my Bible, and my Sunday has passed almost without my knowing.» At that time the British Minister received an anonymous letter, in a disguised hand, but evidently from Lawson, threatening «if my cousin, Harry Lawson, is not released by the 30th May, as he is guilty of no charge, and his debt is paid, as soon after that date as possible you are a dead man.»

SCIENCE IN A RESTAURANT. NEW YORK MAIL.

In a downtown restaurant, not far from Broadway, a gentleman of scientific turn of mind and possessed of a sharp, penetrating voice, raised a commotion the other day, which came near resulting in a riot. The scientific man was seated at a table with a spectacled epicurean, who had wine and many tempting dishes before him and was doing justice to them all. Only a cold glass of ice-water and a huge slice of meringue pie decorated the plate in front of the ascetic disciple of science. He took a robust mouthful of pie, washed it down with ice-water and spoke as follows to his companion: «Yes, sir, science has pronounced against the average consumer of alcoholic liquids. Your system becomes saturated with the alcohol, and no medicine can have its full effect upon your system. Your moderate drinker is more in danger than the man who goes on occasional big sprints, for the latter, when he sobers up, throws off the alcoholic effects and his system resumes its normal condition. Now that claret wine you are drinking will shorten your life. You are now forty years old, you say. Without alcohol you would live until you reach the ripe old age of seventy. As it is, you will probably die before you are sixty.»

The decree pronounced against the longevity of the epicurean was delivered in a penetrating voice and distinctly heard by a dozen others eating in the restaurant. They all kept their ears open to hear the pronouncement of the stern man of science, who continued: «It is the least harmful of the beverages, because it does not quicken the heart's action to any appreciable degree. It may not shorten a life more than a week. Now that man over there drinking black coffee so copiously is cutting off seven years of his life. He looks healthy and does not suspect the insidious action of coffee.» The man who was drinking black coffee ceased to drink and listened. «California wine is no better, no safer than imported wines, because it has alcohol in it,» continued the sage. «That stout man drinking white California wine, under ordinary circumstances, might attain

the age of fifty-nine or sixty, but if he lives to be fifty-one years old I would be willing to give him all I possess. And as for beer—four beer drinkers about to quaff the Gambrian liquid heard and paused—«why, it is the enemy of long life and shortens a healthy man's existence by twelve years. I say twelve years, because beer drinkers are heavy drinkers.»

The remarks were all distinctly heard, and the clatter of knives and forks ceased. Each man was meditating upon the number of years he was cutting off, and his appetite had shrunk to small proportions. «Now, my brother Tom believes in the saying, eat, drink, and be merry, for to-morrow you may die. He is healthy, athletic, and strong, and should live to be ninety, but he will probably experience dissolution at seventy-two, losing eighteen useful years. I've remonstrated with him in vain. His philosophy is all wrong.»

The man who had been drinking the black coffee yelled out: «Say, how long do you expect to live. Mr. Philosopher? A dozen voices then chimed in chorus, «Yes, tell us.»

«Why, until I am very old, perhaps ninety, and I shall go out quietly like a candle that has burned to the socket,» triumphantly replied the scientific philosopher.

«You never will reach fifty,» said a guest, «for any man who drinks ice water every day and eats nothing but pastry for lunch, is simply inviting disease to enter and begin its mortuary work. Ze ice water and ze pie—» with one hand he knocked a pitcher of ice water to the floor and with the other he threw a plate of pies out of the window. The action showed he was against the scientific man, and the latter, lighting a long thin cigar, strolled leisurely out, remarking at the door: «That Frenchman, by his excitement, will cut short his life thirty years at the least. Excitement as a steady diet is worse than alcohol.»
