CIVIL MARRIAGE.
The civil marriage question seems to us to lie in a nutshell. In a country where there is a diversity of religious beliefs, it is necessary to establish some uniform formality or ceremony which will give legal validity to this important act in civil life. This it is the right and duty of the State to enact, and this can only be attained by a civil ceremony. This having been satisfied and the claims of the State thus duly recognised, the contracting parties are at liberty to please their consciences by just such and as many religious ceremonies as they choose. This creates perfect uniformity and fairness to all in the legal and civil effects of marriage, without offering any violence to the conscience, and furthermore provides a decent and honourable mode of marriage to contracting parties of different religious beliefs, or without any such. This civil ceremony should be obligatory is also rendered entirely necessary by the unfounded pretensions of the Catholic priests in refusing to recognise marriage ceremonies performed by priests of other religions. If it had not been for this, the civil ceremony might have been left optional, as it now is in England.

If Deputy Carve was to gain his point and repeal civil marriage, we should soon relapse into the old state of confusion, when it was difficult to know if one was legally married and if one's children were legitimate heirs, or not. We should also find a repetition of the old shameful abuses, when unprincipled men betrayed trusting women into false marriages, and then, having gratified their passions, cast them off on pretence of some difference of religious belief and considered themselves at liberty to seek fresh victims. Old residents will easily recall many unhappy instances of this, and as much was even foreshadowed by Deputy Carve, who, in his first speech, maintained that a man could civilly marry one woman and then cast her off and religiously marry another and that his second union would be the legitimate one. In most countries this would be considered bigamy and the man who committed this crime would be treated as a felon by the law and as a scoundrel by society.

The very suggestion of such an infamous possibility is enough to cause alarm at the present ill-timed attempt to restore such a state of things. Civil marriage has to be defended as the safeguard of society and the protection of our sisters, daughters and children. It must not be rendered possible for a man to pretend to marry a woman and then to dishonour her or to dishonour their children on the mockery of some religious pretence. We repeat civil marriage is the only possible solution of this vexed question, and is a solution inoffensive to any person guided by ordinary reason, and therefore must be maintained at all costs. Hardly less necessary is it to combat the unnatural and immoral theory that civil marriage is only a species of concubinage, which Sr. Carve and other bigots are trying to disseminate.

Parliament.
In the Chamber of Senators, on Monday, the Bill conceding a special pension to the widow of the eminent citizen Dr. Andrés Lamas was definitely voted, the second reading being suppressed.
The discussion in general was then resumed on Sr. Carve's Bill for the modification of Civil Marriage. Sr. Magariños resumed his defence of Civil Marriage. He made a short but brilliant summary of the history of Civil Marriage,

showing how it has gradually developed and become a necessity in all civilised states where the inhabitants were not of uniform religious belief. For those who do not believe in Catholic dogmas—and there were many such here, for whom it was necessary to legislate.—Civil Marriage signified a recognition of liberty of conscience and also of the sovereignty of the State and of its right to intervene in the most important act of civil life. The State had every jurisdiction to dictate the Law which Sr. Carve stigmatised as unconstitutional, absurd and vexatious, and moreover, the attempt to repeal it just now was singularly inopportune and the only result would be to rouse dormant passions and exacerbate discussions.

Sr. Carve spoke again in defence of his Bill. He thought the arguments he had adduced on the first occasion were indestructible and was astonished that any one should rashly attempt to reply to them. He then repeated his former assertions that because Art. V of the Constitution declared the religion of the Republic to be Catholic, therefore civil marriage was a scandalous violation of the Constitution; and that the present law made of marriage a mere private action which the State had no right to interfere. The rest of his speech was principally a repetition of what he previously said, and he was still speaking when the hour sounded and the debate was adjourned.

These receipts show a slight falling off from those for March, which were just over \$900,000, and are considerably below those for the corresponding month in 1889 and 1890. However, they continue to show an improvement on those of last year.

The result was a win for the Chocolates by 6 goals to 3, the goals for the club being scored by Davie 2, Artega 2, Theobald 1 and Owen 1, and those for the Greens by Jeffries 2 and Davie 1. Jeffries played well for his side and led off with the second goal within the first five minutes of play. The Chocolates then settled down to work and after a sharp fight secured 3 goals before time was called. In second quarter the Club team scored 3 goals to their adversaries' one and owe their victory in a great measure to their playing a better combination game. Both quarters were fast. It is to be hoped that this will be the commencement of a series of club matches.

Mr. Edward Casey Gives His Opinion.

We had the pleasure of receiving yesterday the first number of a new issue of the *Revista Economica del Rio de la Plata*, a fortnightly journal published in Buenos Aires and edited by the well-known Argentine economical writer Don Domingo Lamas. In addition to a very interesting review of the political and financial situation in Uruguay, this number of the *Revista* contains a report of a short interview with Mr. Edward Casey in which that gentleman delivers his opinion on the situation. This, says the *Revista*, is of the highest interest—accountant of Mr. Casey's recognised competence and characteristic frankness.

Mr. Casey considers that since his last journey to Europe the situation in Montevideo has become much worse. Each day it seems to get weaker, and is in a frightful state of exhaustion. For all that it has to get worse yet before it will begin to improve. It is unfortunately situated between two countries with paper currency, Brasil and Argentina; this places it at a double disadvantage, one being the chief market for its chief product (meat) and the other its rival. As everything was in gold and there was no credit, the producer had to sacrifice his products at a vile price in order to live. At present the country had no circulation of money of any class, neither gold, paper, nor silver. It is the only civilised country which has no money, no banking system, and it will not improve until there is established a powerful Bank which will supply the circulation necessary for the commercial movement of the country. There can be no prosperity in a country if payments have to be made in bags of gold or where sacks of hard dollars have to be sent into the interior. This is only done in parts of Asia or Africa, but never in a country of the importance of Uruguay. To attend even moderately

to the necessities of all the country required at least \$15,000,000 in notes, and how to guarantee this emission is the problem to be solved. Respecting the proposed new Bank, Mr. Casey did not wish to give an opinion. He thought that the \$50,000 guarantee had not yet been deposited. (It is not required to be deposited until the signing of the definite contract of concession.)

In reply to the question whether the conduct of the Government in the arrangement of the foreign debt had been wise and foreseeing, Mr. Casey replied that he thought not. It would have been possible to have made a better arrangement for the country and one which would better satisfy its creditors. The present arrangement sacrificed the credit of the country for 20 years. For a long time it will be difficult to obtain capital in Europe to establish banks or build railways in Uruguay, and the want of these capitals will prevent Government from maintaining the service of the debt and railway guarantees. Next year Government will have to propose a new arrangement.

SUNDRIES.

Another sitting of the Senators was wasted, on Monday, in the discussion of Sr. Carve's Bill for the repeal of Civil Marriage, and in listening to a repetition of his illogical attacks on that necessary institution. Sr. Carve is evidently a humorist; he said he thought that his arguments against civil marriage were unanswerable, when no one but himself was aware that he had introduced any arguments at all.

We reproduce today from a recent number of the *Investor's Guardian* an interesting article in which the question of unlimited liability on behalf of the notes of the English Bank is argued with considerable acumen and legal knowledge. The argument, to which Mr. Welton endeavoured to reply without much success, was sustained through several numbers of the *Guardian*, it being consistently maintained that such unlimited liability could not be enforced. This was our view from the very first, though we had not the legal knowledge wherewith to support it. We still maintain that the liquidation of the English Bank is being conducted without sufficient regard to the laws of the countries in which the bulk of its assets and liabilities are situated. English law has no force on Argentine or Uruguayan territory, and it is absurd to suppose that English law can be employed to enforce, on behalf of Uruguayan creditors, a liability which is not supported by the Uruguayan law. It is a well-established rule of Private International Law, that when a liability is created in one country, and the law of that country provides for the discharge of that liability, the law of that country will apply all the world over.

That miserable production the *Diario Oficial*, which enjoyed a subvention of \$12,000 annually and yet could never be depended on to give its information accurately or in proper time, whilst it prevented other papers from doing so, is at last to be suspended. In its place is created an office called the Official Register (*Registro Oficial*) charged with the collection and publication of all laws, decrees, and other official documents, copies of which it shall supply to the press; and which shall moreover publish a weekly bulletin containing these publications, an Annual Volume of the same, and, every ten years, a volume including all the legislative enactments of the period. The annual estimates of the new office are calculated at \$9480, which includes the printing of the weekly bulletin. Sr. Miguel Gonzalez Rodriguez is named Director of the new office, with Sres. Manuel Salasoa y Lamas, R. Borda, A. Buxareo and C. Lengua as assistants. The decree to the above effect has been issued from the Ministry of Government.

The Minister of Government has taken one step which we can heartily applaud, namely, he is endeavouring to provide for the protection and reclamation of the many girls, some almost children, who have fallen into vicious ways, and for whom, at present, there are no means of rescue. It has been arranged that room for twenty of these shall be found in the Buen Pastor Asylum, at a very moderate expense, and that a wing shall be added to that building for the maintenance of 100 more. The Minister's initiative, in this respect, deserves applause, although the Asylum in question, on account of certain antecedents, is not the best place the might have chosen for such a purpose.

Professor José Arechavala has accepted the post offered him as Director of the National Museum.

The Message of the Executive for the appointment of the President of the Mortgage Bank and the Liquidating Committee of the National Bank, has been passed to the Senate and was considered in secret session yesterday. We have not learnt the result yet, but we hear that the Senators are not altogether comfortable to the names presented by Government, and which are those we mentioned a day or two ago.

Payment of the first coupons of the new Consolidated Debt, and also of the local estimates for March, commenced on Monday. This double event has caused the *Nacion* to break forth into a song of joy, for which, for once it may be somewhat excused. But, with regard to the Consolidated Debt, we would travesty a well-known French proverb and say—*Ce n'est pas le premier pas qui coûte.*

The race for the velocipede championship of the year took place at the Camino Goes on Sunday, before a large attendance. As expected the winner was Juan Orth, and Luis Pitzer was second, gaining a gold and silver medal respectively. The 5 kilometres were run in 11 minutes less a few seconds.

The Superior Tribunal of Justice intends to appeal to the Chambers on the question of conflict of power which has arisen with the Executive. The latter, it is said, will pass a Message to the Chambers defending its position. As the Chambers are pretty well under the thumb of Government, the latter will probably triumph, however bad its cause.

The opening concert of the season at the Lira on Monday night was largely attended and very successful. Both professionals and amateurs distinguished themselves in contributing to a notable programme.

A peon named Benito Truco, whilst working on the roof of Mr. Humphrey's engine shed in the Cerro, on Monday, fell off and, breaking his skull, was killed on the spot.

The police who are sustaining the heroic siege of the unfortunates in Calle Santa Teresa are not particularly humane in their methods. On Sunday they kept a poor woman who was taken suddenly ill, waiting for some six hours before they could decide to allow a doctor to visit her. This was brutal, but then authority and routine generally are brutal.

La Tribuna Popular has commenced legal proceedings against the *Montevideo Noticioso* for copying its special telegrams from Buenos Aires without the formality of obtaining permission first.

No first class passengers for this port arrived by the R. M. S. "Magdalena." The P. O. authorities made a heroic effort and actually delivered her mails yesterday morning, some 15 hours after her arrival, instead of keeping us waiting a day and a half, as they did last week.

The death took place on Monday night, after a short illness, of Mr. Asistides Beduchaud, a well-known and much respected man of business. Mr. Beduchaud was a Frenchman and had been established here some 20 years.

SUPPOSED LIABILITY OF THE ENGLISH BANK OF THE RIVER PLATE ON ITS NOTE ISSUES.

(The *Investor's Guardian*.)
In another column we print a letter received from a Shareholder in the above bank, finding fault with the view which we expressed, that the liabilities of shareholders in respect of the note issue of the bank, which amounts to the sum of £160,000, was unlimited. Clause 6 of the Companies Act of 1879, to which we called attention last week, if literally read, would certainly appear to make the shareholders fully liable to make good the whole of the note issue; notwithstanding that the liability of members is in other respects limited.

The shareholder's letter to which we refer, has made us look more closely into the question, and further inquiry tends to make us doubt the accuracy of the views we previously expressed.

Section 6 of the Companies Act of 1879 expressly repeals Section 132 of the Companies Act of 1862 which enacted as follows: "No Banking Company claiming to issue notes in the United Kingdom shall be entitled to limited liability in respect of such issue, but shall continue subject to unlimited liability in respect thereof, and, if necessary, the assets shall be marshalled for the benefit of the general creditors, and the members shall be liable for the whole amount of the issue, in addition to the sum for which they would be liable as members of a limited company."

to issue notes in the United Kingdom.

It will be noticed that the words of the section do not refer to the formation of a new company to issue notes, but simply to a Bank of Issue, the registration of which, as a limited company, takes place either before or after the date of Act.

Of course, if this view of the section is correct, the companies which would come under the operation of the section would be the old banks, other than the Bank of England, which had a note-issue prior to July 19th, 1844, as from which date the issue of bank-notes by any other banks than the Bank of England and the excepted banks was expressly forbidden by the 10th Section of the 7 and 8 Vic. c. 93. If any of these old banks availed themselves of the provisions of the Limited Liability Acts, the unlimited liability of the shareholders in respect of the note issue is expressly reserved by the 182d Section of the Act of 1862 and by the 6th Section of the Act of 1879.

The view that we have put forward of the effect of the 6th Section of the Act of 1879 appears to be shared by text-book writers, though the construction is not in terms considered by any of the writers; but Mr. Grant, in his work on banking, in dealing with this section, says, "a banking Company claiming to issue notes in the United Kingdom is not entitled to limited liability, but continues subject to unlimited liability."

Upon principle, it would also seem that this view of the section is the correct one. The right to issue bank-notes is clearly one that appertains to the particular State in which the notes are to be circulated. It is clear that, in face of the Act of 1844, no power is given to any new company to issue bank-notes in England by the Companies Act of 1879, and it is also equally clear that no Act of the English Parliament could legalize any issue of notes in the State of Uruguay. If any authority is needed as to the clear right of each State to regulate the issue of notes in its own country, the well-known case of *Kossuth*, who printed in England a paper currency for use in Hungary, which was restrained by the English Courts at the prayer of the Emperor of Austria, is clearly in point.

Mr. Grant, in dealing with this case and with the rights of *Foreign Banks of Issue*, says: "These banks are regulated in their issue by the laws of the country in which they are established; the right to regulate the coinage and issue the paper money of a State is part of its sovereign prerogative, recognised by the law of nations."

It must, therefore, be admitted to be covered by authority that it is by virtue only of some legislative enactment of the State of Uruguay, or by some permission of the Government of that country, that any bank, be it English or otherwise, can issue bank-notes within the State.

If that is so, and the liability of the bank to meet its notes arises by the law of Uruguay, the power of being released from the liability to meet the notes will also be governed by the law of Uruguay; and if the laws of Uruguay do release the shareholders of a bank issuing notes in certain events, that release will hold good in all the countries of the world if those events happen.

This proposition is well established in the cases which have been decided on points of private international law, and is perhaps as well expressed as anywhere in the judgment of Chief Justice Bovill in the well-known case of *Ellis and McHenry, L. R., 6, C. P. 234*, where the *Judge* says: "A debt or liability arising in any country may be discharged by the laws of that country, and such a discharge, if it extinguishes the debt or liability and does not merely interfere with the remedies or course of procedure to enforce it, will be an effectual answer to the claim not only in the courts of that country, but in every other country. That is the law of England, and is a principle of private international law adopted in other countries."

If, therefore, the law of the State of Uruguay is as stated by Dr. Alberto Nin, the Minister of the Republic of Uruguay viz, that in the event of bankruptcy (by which, we suppose, he means the insolvency of the Company), the shareholders would be protected from any claim beyond the amount due as calls upon their shares in the Company, it would seem that the claim of the Official Receiver of the claim of the Bank of the River Plate to render the shareholders liable to an unlimited amount in respect of the bank-note issue could not be sustained.

LONDON NOTES

FRIDAY, APRIL 1.
In the House of Lords yesterday the Smoke Nuisance (Metropolis) Bill and other measures were advanced a stage.

In the Commons, Mr. Balfour said in reply to Sir W. Harcourt that next week would be devoted to the Small Holdings Bill.

An argument was commenced before the Master of the Rolls and Lords Justices Fry and Loper, on the appeal of the Compañia Mocambique and others from an order of a Divisional Court in the action against the British South Africa Company.

The Birmingham Water Bill came yesterday for the first time before the Select Committee of the House of Commons on Shop Hours of Labour, Mr. Lakeman, Inspector of Workshops, stated that in Islington, Camden town, and Kentish town the hours are excessive, ranging from 80 to 88 per week, and that the sanitary conditions are not always satisfactory.

Mr. John Morley visited Chester yesterday and opened a new Liberal Club. In the course of a speech he pointed out the advantages of such a club as a centre of political life in the constituency.

It was decided at a meeting of Ulster Tories and Liberal Dissenters in London yesterday to hold a Convention at Whitehall to express the rooted hostility of Ulster to Home Rule, and determination to have nothing to do with a Home Rule Parliament.

Princess Louise, who was accompanied by the Marquis of Lorne, yesterday opened the third annual exhibition in connection with the Drawing Society of Great Britain, in the studio of the hon. director, Mr. Ablett, at Queen Anne's-gate.

Mr. Joseph Barnby has been elected Principal of the Guildhall School of Music in succession to the late Mr. Weist Hill.

Sir John Lubbock presided at the annual meeting of the London Chamber of Commerce yesterday, and made an address on the variety of the work undertaken by the Chamber during the year.

After the Official publication of the result of miners' vote in Durham as to the continuance of the strike, a message was forwarded from the Federation Board to the Coal Owners' Association, asking them to withdraw their notices and allow the men to return to work.

The market was a trifle busier today and prices a fraction firmer, though there is nothing yet to show that the improvement is more than a temporary fluctuation.

National Bank shares opened 8.20, closing fairly firm at the same after a short excursion to 8.30. 1850 shares sold. In Notes \$5000 major went at 67 and \$1000 minor at 61.

Other operations were \$35,000 Cedulas A. at 28.20 and 28, closing 27.90 for end of month. \$7990 Uniteds at 40.

Disclosures of an important nature have been made to the Bulgarian Government regarding the murders of M. Belcheff and Dr. Vukowitch, and also regarding a plot to assassinate Mr. Stambouloff and Prince Ferdinand. The informers are two Bulgarian emigrants, who offered the Government information on condition that they were allowed to return to Bulgaria.

Mr. Newton had before him at Marlborough-street a case of cruelty to a horse belonging to the London Omnibus Carriage Company. An omnibus driver was fined on a previous occasion for working the horse when in an unfit condition; and the managing director of the company, the secretary, and veterinary surgeon were now charged with permitting cruelty to the horse. During the last quarter, however, the increase was no less than 2,042,406l, so that the net increase for the year comes out at the figure first named.

Charles Butt had directed that Ralph Usher, one of the parties cited, should pay her costs, and this was now affirmed.

An argument was commenced before the Master of the Rolls and Lords Justices Fry and Loper, on the appeal of the Compañia Mocambique and others from an order of a Divisional Court in the action against the British South Africa Company. The point in dispute, decided in the Court below in the negative and in favour of the defendant South Africa Company, is whether the English Courts have jurisdiction to try an action for an alleged trespass on lands in South Africa.

Mr. Justice A. L. Smith had before him in the Queen's Bench Division a cross action, in which the parties were Mr. G. H. Macdermott and Mr. James Taylor, music-hall artists. The former claimed commission for obtaining engagements, and the latter counterclaimed for damages in respect to alleged negligence. The judgment was in favour of Mr. Taylor, with costs.

Sir John Bridge was occupied yesterday in further hearing the case in which Mr. Horatio Bottomley, Sir Henry Isaacs, Mr. Joseph Isaacs, and Mr. Charles Dollman are charged with having conspired to defraud the Hansard Union. Mr. George Lewis, who defends the brothers Isaacs, in opposing their committal, argued that it could not be shown that Sir Henry had in any way benefited by his connection with the directors of the Union, while as to Mr. Joseph, he was simply in the position of a man who having brought a mill cheap, sold it at a profit. For Mr. Dollman it was urged by his solicitor, Mr. St. John Wotton, that he merely acted as the bona fide nominee of his brother-in-law, Mr. Bottomley. The latter gentleman had not concluded his address to the magistrate when the Court adjourned until to-morrow.

Henry Wade, the man who with others endeavoured to force his way into the London County Council Chamber on Tuesday, was brought before Mr. Vaughan at Bow-street, yesterday, on the charge of being drunk and resisting the police. In the result, he complied with an order that he should find a surety of 10l. to keep the peace for a month.
