THE CONDEMNED MURDERER DEEMING.

DEEMING.

Mr. Lyle, Deeming's solicitor, has sent a petition to the Victorian Government asking for a postponement of the arccution for one week, in order to allow time for his letters, dated April 19th, to a firm of solicitors in London, containing instructions for a petition to the Privy Council, to reach their destination.

The Governor of Victoria has de-clined to accede to the petition for the postponement of the date of Deeming's execution for a week.

Deeming's petition to the Privy Council was lodged yesterday morning, and, as is understood, will be leard to-day. It will be supported by declarations made by Mr. Edward Deeming and his wife, which have been despatched by the Australian mail. It is feared, however, that these documents will not reach Melbourne till after the date fixed for the execution, and hence it is that a respite is considered necessary. The petition sets forth the facts of the trial and sentence passed on the petitioner, and submits that the verdict of the jury was against the weight of evidence; further, that he is now, and was at the time of the said murder, insane and not responsible for his actions; and also that it consequence of the feeling shown towards him he was not granted a fairtrial norgiven sufficient time to prepare his defence. It then reviews the evidence in favour of this plea contained in the statutory declerations made by the petitioner's brother and sister-in-law, and forwarded as above stated. The statement made by the brother, Edward Deeming, declares that their father's cruelty to their mother just before Frederick's birth would tend toward the latter insanity. At a very early age Frederick displayed an incontrol lable temper, and could not be managed, despite severe thrashings by his father. When he was about fourteen he left home, and was not again seen by the family for five years. On his return he seemed childish and eccentric, was continually in the company of girls, represented himself as a member of the Bor de'l Trade, and dressed in a most incomprous fashion. He then went on other voyages, and at Calcutta was laid up in the hospital with brain fever. On his return home he was ill for three months.
