On a capital of \$33440 (about £7100) our correspondent thus estimates a net profit of \$2396 (about £510) or a trifling over 7 per cent. This, at all events, is an improvement on the estimates of our previous correspondent "Camp" who only reached 4 per cent. The prices given for the cattle in the above table are those paid by Lieb's Company, and are consequently the lowest obtainable. On the other hand the wool is estimated at \$3 the arroba which is rather high. As before, this estimate does not include the owner's personal expenses. We hope more camp readers will favour us with communications on this subject.

MILITARY ENCROACHMENTS.
Whilst on the one hand the Government is making show of repressing that militarism which has so long been the curse of the country, the military, on the other hand, are still showing the old, evil spirit, inherited from the black times of Santos, and still continue to encroach upon the privileges and tire the patience of the public. One instance that has just occurred, has justly called forth the indignation of our contemporaries and deserves special mention. The Chief of the 1st Chasseurs, not content with annoying the residents in the neighbourhood of his barracks, for many squares round, by band and bugle practice at unearthly hours of the morning, in the open streets and directly under the walls of the hospitals, has lately taken to the same kind of thing in the Plaza Independencia, that is to say in a public place, not intended for military evolutions, in the centre of the town. Also, whilst marching there from the barracks, his soldiers disturb the sleeping residents by the hideous blare of their bugles.

Such an encroachment as this, the city not being under military occupation, is entirely unwarrantable, and is simply another proof that the military think themselves masters of the situation and at complete liberty to annoy and trespass upon the civilians in any way they please. It is bad enough to have barracks inside the town at all, but being there, the soldiers should be

made to understand that they must behave themselves properly and not become a public nuisance by making abominable noises at unseasonable hours. A nice outcry there would be if the civilians were to retaliate in kind, and serenade some of the officers in similar fashion.

The Minister of War should at once put a summary stop to this encroachment and to others, amongst which we must again mention the constant practice of all the regiments of obstructing the traffic whenever they march through the streets, by marching along the tram lines and stopping the cars. If there were any justice in this country against the military, the officers who indulge in these objectionable practices should be prosecuted as public nuisances and made to pay damages.

We have already heard some very uncomplimentary murmurs about the "cursed soldiers," and one of these days when the military are thus encroaching upon the public there will be a hostile manifestation against them and they will be made to understand the hatred and disgust with which they are regarded and which they have thoroughly earned. Our verdict will be "serve them right."

The military must be taught to keep their place and to respect the civilians.

NEWS OF THE DAY

MONTEVIDEO

1st Sunday after Trinity. *Saints Gertrudis, Protasius and Julian*. Spurgeon born, 1834; 171 days past, 195 to the end of the year.

Parliament.
In the Chamber of Senators, on Friday, after some routine business had been attended to, the discussion in detail was resumed of the Bill relative to the title of *Serviente (escribano)*. After a lengthy debate, of no general interest, Articles 4, 5 and 6 were approved with certain modifications, completing the first reading of the Bill.

The Bill creating a National Department of Engineers was then brought forward for second reading, and was approved in general. In detail Articles 1 to 12 inclusive were approved without debate or modification. The hour having sounded, the sitting then concluded.

FINANCIAL.
Another week has elapsed and we are still in exactly the same indeterminate situation. The expected "definite telegrams" respecting the foundation of the new Bank have not yet arrived, and the impression is gaining ground that they never will arrive, the business having definitely collapsed. The two *papelista* organs the *Razon* and the *Dia* announce this latter very positively, even adding that the President is preparing a Message to be presented to the Chambers early in the weeks giving account of the collapse of negotiations and proposing new schemes. We think however, that this announcement is premature and not well founded. At all events, we prefer not to believe it until corroborated.

Amongst the new schemes attributed to Government is one for coining \$2,000,000 in silver, though how that would cure the crisis remains to be explained. The *papelistas* also insist that proposals will be presented for an issue of inconvertible paper, an announcement which helps to keep the market in a state of alarm, despite the effusive assertions of the *Nacion* to the contrary.

There is again considerable talk of serious reductions in the Budget, a measure which has long been clamoured for as the first and greatest necessity, but which still seems to meet with resistance in Government quarters and from those who think the State was created for no other purpose than to provide comfortable situations for themselves and their friends.

Conflicting reports are abroad as to the resignation of Dr. Ramirez, and no official announcement having been made, it is uncertain whether it has been definitely accepted or not. The Senior Official continues to take charge of the work.
Beyond this we have nothing to report. We do not care to repeat all the different rumours given by our contemporaries, knowing from experience that they are quite untrustworthy.

Football, etc.
Last Thursday a match was played at Peñarol between the Peñarol C. C. and the English school past and present, resulting in a victory for the home team by two goals to none. The School played one man short and had to fill up a few places with juniors owing to the non-appearance of some of their best players, nevertheless they made the game a lively one from start to finish. W. Ashe, Negron, Shaw and Kelly did excellent work for the School, while Jones, Dow, Davis and Davenport were prominent for Peñarol. A return match will shortly be arranged. At the conclusion of the game the visitors had an opportunity afforded them of going through the various and extensive workshops of the Central Uruguay

Railway Company, which are replete with all the modern contrivances for executing the most difficult and intricate work, and are well worth a visit by those interested in machinery.

On the old cricket ground there will be a pick-up Rigby match this afternoon, commencing at 2.30 p.m. sharp; all players being invited to turn up. There will also be a pick-up Association Match on the ground of the Albion F. C. at Punta-Carretas, commencing at 2.30 p.m.

There will be a Polo practice game at 2 p.m., on the usual ground, it is hoped that all members of the Club will turn out in force, as the ground is in good order after the late rains.

After the football match on the old ground, there will be a hockey match, England against the World. The following team will represent the World; Messrs. Ashe, J. Ashe, Owen, Harvey, Dunbar, Adam, Christie, Jones, Crocker, Negron, Dutton and another. We have not received the names of their opponents.

The "United Charities."
In consequence of the limited accommodation of the "Home" in Calle Piedras, the Society is changing its working centre to Calle Cerro, a house in every way more suited to its working requirements. During the past week 8 cases have been relieved with 69 meals and 29 beds, and donation of food made to two families in distress. 143 Merchant seamen received 359 meals and 153 beds. Mrs. Thompson was promised payment of her rent for April and May. Employment has been found for one of the inmates of the Home as fireman on a homeward bound steamer, and J. Welton was shipped as steward on the s.s. "Wordsworth." Some 20 sailors on the "Oceana" wrecked off Punta Brava last week, are being accommodated at the Home, but these will probably be sent home in a day or two. The sailors on board the "Lodore" and "Oceana" have been visited and assisted.

SUNDRIES.
We are informed that the Rt. Rev. Dr. Stirling, Lord Bishop of the Falkland Islands, will arrive here from Buenos Aires this morning and will preach in Holy Trinity Church. We are also given to understand that his Lordship will stay with the British Minister, E. Satow Esq., and will please to receive any of the residents who may desire to call, this and tomorrow afternoons from 3 to 5 p.m.

At a meeting of the Committee of the Entertainment Society held on Friday, Mr. S. Francis tendered his resignation as honorary secretary on account of want of time to attend to the duties. This was regretfully accepted with a hearty vote of thanks for his valuable services in the past, and Mr. Dart, having consented to undertake the duties, was elected secretary in his place. A large number of new members were elected.

Members of the Entertainment Society are reminded of the "Social Evening" to be held at the Lafone Memorial Hall to-morrow. This is the first experiment in a new direction, but the idea has already met with much approval. We hope to see a large muster of members and those taking part in entertainments, and that they will all come prepared to contribute according to their ability to the entertainment of those present. We remind them that the proceedings will be strictly informal and that they need fear no criticism. One or two good items have already been promised.

The Emperor William of Germany must certainly be getting a little crazy. According to recent papers we learn that he has presented with his portrait and publicly congratulated the sentry who some weeks ago shot dead a civilian, the man having interfered with him while on guard. Even the rampant militarism of the River Plate would hardly go to public approval of deliberate murder in this fashion. We believe the incident has caused quite an uproar in Germany, and no wonder.

There is a tide in the affairs of men which, if not skilfully dodged at the proper time, drowns them.
A decree has been issued from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs approving the appointment of citizen Pedro Bottaro Schenone as Oriental Vice Consul in San Juan Bautista de Cuareim, Rio Grande, Brazil.
A sensible decree has been issued from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, putting a stop, from September 1, to the ridiculous practice of flying the National flag from Government and public buildings on the national anniversaries of nations who do not reciprocate by doing the same on Uruguayan anniversaries.
The Foment Committee of the Representatives recommends that the port scheme of Sr. Lebot, of which we recently spoke, should be returned to him to be referred by him directly to the Government, that being the proper course for such schemes.
This is how they speak of Football in Liverpool.—First Politician: "My dear sir, international

arbitration is all humbug. Why, if you do your way with war, how are you going to keep down the surplus population?" Second ditto: "Surplus we've got football."

The death occurred on Friday, at an advanced age, of the Sr. Zelmira Rodriguez de Perez, widow of General Pantaleon Perez and mother of the Dr. Pantaleon Perez who was treacherously killed in the Artillery Barracks at La Union, on the occasion of the so-called "conspiracy" of last October.

The *Diario* of Buenos Aires asserts the following to be the "secret Clauses" in the organic Law of the proposed new Bank:—"Whenever the profits of the Bank exceed 6 per cent, the Government shall receive the third part of them, and when they exceed 9 o/o, the Government shall receive the half."

The seal of the Executive has been put to the Bill creating the Public Registry of Contracts and Leases, and it is now Law. We do not think it necessary to reproduce the terms, which are mostly technical.

The programme at the Politeama this evening consists of "Niña Pancho," "Cavalleria Rusticana" and some musical varieties. There will be afternoon and evening performances at the Cibils, but we have not received details.

Government has appointed Sr. N. Granada, E. Garzon and A. Bachi to delegates to represent it in the celebration of the Centenary.

According to a telegram received yesterday afternoon from Porto Alegre, another revolution has broken out in Rio Grande, the Viscount of Pelotas has been deposed and the Governorship assumed by Julio Castillo. Some arrests have been made in Yaguaron, where there are groups of armed men. It is not added if there was any fighting.

LONDON NOTES

WEDNESDAY, MAY 18.
In the House of Lords yesterday a number of Railway Rates and Charges (Provisional Orders) Bills were advanced a stage. So also were the Weights and Measures (Purchase) Bill and the Sale of Goods Bill.

In the Commons, at the morning sitting, Mr. Balfour, replying to questions by Mr. Bryce and Mr. Labouchere, said it was intended to take a vote on account about the 25th or 26th of the month, and that it would probably be for about a month or six weeks. The Small Holdings Bill passed through Committee, the Report stage being fixed for Monday. At the evening sitting Mr. O. V. Morgan moved a resolution in regard to the development and protection of sea fisheries. Before the discussion had proceeded far the House was counted out, at ten o'clock.
A Correspondent, continuing his inquiry at Middlesbrough into the condition of the ironworkers of that neighbourhood, gives details of the suffering experienced by residents of Newport, a district having a population of 28,000. Among these there are, roughly speaking, about four thousand bread-winners idle. Furniture is being sold for bread, children are lying fever-stricken for want of suitable sustenance, and most pitiable scenes are witnessed on all sides.
Lady Aberdeen, who presided at the annual council meeting of the Women's Liberal Federation yesterday, at the Memorial Hall referred to the meeting as the most important to the country, the Liberal party, and the Federation that had ever been held by them. Mrs. Gladstone, who was unable to be present wished her to bid them God-speed in their work. In an interesting discussion on the motion for the adoption of the report, Lady Carlisle vindicated the action of the Progressive party in the Federation. In urging them to work amicably together, she said Mr. Gladstone had asked her whether means could not be devised to bring unity into their ranks. In a subsequent speech she

pointed out that Mr. Gladstone had told them that if they wanted the franchise they must vote for it. She moved a resolution instructing the executive committee to promote the Parliamentary enfranchisement of women—married, single, or widowed, who possessed the legal qualifications entitling men to vote—among the other Liberal reforms now before the country, but not making it a test question at the general election. After a long discussion this resolution was declared carried, with only twelve dissentients, and the meeting adjourned until to-day.

At yesterday's sitting of the London County Council the debate was resumed on the motion of Mr. Burns that all contractors be compelled to sign a declaration that they pay the trade union rate of wages and observe the hours of labour and conditions recognised by the London trade unions; and that the hours and wages be inserted in, and form part of, the contract by way of schedule, and that penalties be enforced, for any breach of agreement. Mr. Roberts moved as an amendment:—"That a special committee be appointed to consider in what manner the Council can require its contractors to pay all employed on work for the Council the standard rate of wages." On a division the amendment was defeated by 55 votes against 53, and the debate was again adjourned.

The annual meeting of the Peace Society took place last night under the presidency of Sir J. W. Pease, M.P., in the memorial Hall.

Alderman Sir James Whitehead presided last evening at the annual dinner of the Gardeners' Orphan Fund, held at the Hotel Metropole, the subscriptions announced exceeding 1,000.

An earthquake shock was felt in West Cornwall early yesterday morning.

From Newbury comes the report that Edith Stevens, a young woman employed in a drapery establishment, has been murdered by her lover, Ellis Wainkin Wynn, who has committed suicide by shooting himself.

Three men were killed and several persons more or less severely injured by an explosion which took place last evening at the cloth works of Messrs. Higginbotham, of Glasgow. The disaster occurred through the blowing up of a bleaching boiler, but the cause of this is unknown, as the men in charge have lost their lives. It is believed that a Board of Trade inquiry will be held.

News has reached St. Petersburg of a terrible disaster which occurred on the Caspian Sea at the end of March. A steamer bound for Baku, with over 200 passengers on board, foundered with all hands. No particulars are known, but the vessel was carrying a heavy dock cargo, which is believed to have shifted and capsized the vessel.

Rain greatly interfered with cricket at Nottingham yesterday. In the intervals during which play was possible the Rest of England carried their score against Lord Sheffield's team from 43, at which it stood on the previous night, to 168 for five wickets. M. C. C. and Ground defeated Yorkshire at Lords by four wickets; Surrey had an easy victory over Essex at the Oval, having 194 runs to spare; and Lancashire won their match with Cheshire by an innings and 34 runs. In the match at Cambridge between the University and the Gentlemen of England, the latter with five wickets down in their second innings require 50 runs to win.

On the opening day of the Newmarket Second Spring Meeting, Mr. Deacon won the Match with The Fisher, Lord Zealand the Exning Plate with Santa Maria, Mr. H. Milner the Visitors' Plate with Hydres, Captain Laing the Burwell Stakes with Somersall, Lord Roslyn the Newmarket Handicap with Buccaroo, Mr. Mamford the Selling Plate with Melpomene, Mr. Foster the Somerville Stakes with Queen of Navarre, Lord Penrhyn the 3000 Plate with Theallian, and Mr. Rose the Breeders' Plate with the Agill colt.

At the London Sessions yesterday Edward Fry was sentenced to terms of hard labour amounting in all to twelve months for stealing the offertory at one Roman Catholic church at Greenwich, and attempting to steal from an offertory box at another.

During the hearing of a charge at Clerkenwell against a coachman of deserting his wife and child, it was stated that the prisoner was 20 years of age, and that both he and his wife were under seventeen when they married. The prisoner pleaded that his wife would not do any work, and was asked by the magistrate why she should, with her two children. A remand was granted that the accused might have another opportunity of obtaining work.
There were 1,597 deaths in London last week or 23 fewer than the average for the week. The death-rate per thousand per annum, 21.0, 19.3, and 18.9 in the preceding three weeks, was last week, 19.5. There were three deaths from smallpox, the average being seven; but the cases of this disease under treatment in

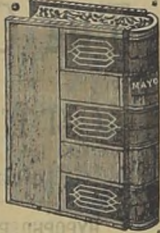
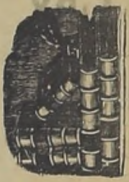
