THE MANIFESTO OF SR. CUESTAS,

cepting his nomination as candidate to the Presidency of the Republic on March 1, was published in bul-letin form on Wednesday evening, as we were going to press. We condense the principal ideas of the document below.

Sr. Cuestas commences by ex-pressing the belief that it is his duty to address some words to his fellow citizens, in presence of the proclamation of his candidature by an important fracdidature by an important frac-tion of the Assembly. Although his faculties may not be at the height of such a situation, the energies of his will and activity of his spirit are and always will be devoted to the one desire of concord, peace, liberty, order and administrative probity. Nature has endowed the Republic with superior productive forces, which will enable it speedi ly to replace the ravages caused by the civil war, though we will still have to lament the blood generously shed on both sides. Fortunately peace came in time to save the country trom the shows at its feet, and that from the abyss at its feet, and that peace it is necessary to preserve at all costs. The Chambers were the first factor in this great benefit, for they indicated its fundamental principles and in due time voted it by acclamation, in spite of some frenzied voices that still proclaim-

The daily papers have thought that the Chambers should complete the work of peace by proclaiming at once the candidate for the Presidency next March, and have even seen in the attitude of the Chambers an obstacle to the crystallisation of public pinion as regards the political and administrative future of the country, and the pertinent and opportune propaganda of the press has been succeeded by the agitated and violent comment of those who tried to show that the first Magistrate was party to and stimulating such pro paganda. This is not the case, for, says Sr. Cuestas, «I am foreign to any manœuvre outside the law.»

public promise in issuing the con-ciliatory manifesto of August 4, but at the same time the unexpected event of August 25 (meaning the death of Sr. Borda,) shook all minds. It may be said that this threw the Chambers off their balance and since then they have been try-ing to orient themselves, studying ing to orient themselves, studying the question before pronouncing, and always had confidence in the correctness of their decisions, because events invariably determine the proceedures of the majority in questions of public interest. The men who compose the Chambers, whose commission it is to guard the general interests of the Nation, cannot sacrifice these to private interests or sympathies without

due, to law, and to institutions, and I do not believe there is any people at present happy without the enjoyment of the guarantees and benefits of institutions. I do not deny that there are exceptional circumstances in which it is necessary to take prompt measures of security for the salvation of a litution, but these extremes should only be taken when public order and security are endaggered. It is impossible to conceive an anarchical Chamber, or a governor who does not adjust his acts to legality and justice. In both cases the sovereign people is called upon to judge. The public powers should always be inspired by public opinion, to govern with the lic opinion, to govern with the people and for the people, to frater-nise with them, and when they lose public confidence, they should at once modify their procedures or retire. (We regard these phrases as very significant. Sr. Cuestas excuses the attitude of the Chambers so far, but at the same time plainly warns them that they should be guided by public opinion, and that he would not be adverse to extreme measures if necessary to protect public order and interests. This is open to a broad interpretation and we regard it as more reassuring to the public than to the Cham-bers, to whom, indeed, it is a veiled threat. We are glad o see Sr. Cuestas take this attitude, and wish he had spoken even plainer.)

After a declaration of his fidelity to the «colorado» party, Sr. Cues-tas makes the following remarks about foreign interests in the Republic, which we translate in full as of special interest to our readers, - «It must not be lorgotten that a fourth part of the population of the Republic is composed of foreigners, according to official calculations. This foreign population represents one hundred and thirty seren million dollars. seven million dollars declared in property, taxable or other sise, a figure nearly equal to that represented by the natives of the country. Furthermore, their capitals imported for railways, factories and works of progress, represent in their greater part our Public debt, over 100 millions, which absorbs 45 % of the Customs Receipts for its services. The capital, Montavideo, as appreciated by travellers and statisticians, is superior to any other cians, is superior to any other city in relation to the population of the country, and all is due to the credit represented by foreign of the Chambers, then it is loans The annual consumption by the Republic of goods imported fluctuates about twenty without further waste of time. five m llion dollars, which is compensated by our national riches, which give an excess of some millions in favor of the cosome millions in favor of the co-untry. For these reasons these Amer-ican countries should pay special attention to foreign capital, which, although it comes in search of an interest it cannot get in Europe, is the most important factor of progress in these regions, still lacking population, of fertile and generous soil, tutored by liberty, and only waiting for the colonist to turn up unknown riches with the plough All should therefore recognise that the fountain of national wealth is the attraction of foreign capital, for without the first the second will not come, and it must be re-membered that to foment this wealth there is necessary the assistance of commerce the develop

After some phrases of thanks to the legislators who have initiated his proclamation, Sr. Cuestas con-cludes his Manifesto as follows:—

·The spontaneity and nobility of my colleagues compels my grati tude, because on climbing the mountain I desire to present myself without other personal compromise than that of comply

deeds to the most alluring of promises. Electoral liberty, political liberty guaranteeing the people at present happy without the enjoyment of the guarantees and benefits of institutions. I do not deny that there are exceptional circumstances in which it is necessary to take prompt measures of security for the salvation of a threatened society. Reiss) hav ing read the notice convening the meeting, and the report and state ment of accounts being taken as The Chairman said: Gentlemen.

has not suffered as much as might have been expected; in fact we are able to show a substantial improve-ment on last year's figures. The number of subscribers at the end of July shows an increase of 46, as compared with the previous year, giving an increase of some £300 on the total amount of subscriptions while the working expen-ses at Montevideo show a decrease of £1,040 on the amount under that head for last year, when it, will be remembered, exceptional expend-iture had been rendered necessary for repairing the damage done by a cyclone of unusual severity, and for the installation of a new micro phone. Our normal expenditure for working expenses had previously been brought down to the lowest point compatible with giving effi-cient service, and I do not think we can look for any material decrease on the present figure, when the importance of keeping up our efficiency is remembered. The other items on the debit side of our profit and loss account with the exception of the last item, which I will touch I may mention, a sum in addition to deductions made by the manager for the gross subscriptions for the current year for differences and other amounts considered irre-coverable. The last item, viz., amount written off value of stock of materials. really explains itself. This stock includes a number of old instruments which have become obsolete and other old material, the value of which naturally grows less each year An amount of £2,345 was written off this item in 1894, and the board considered it very desirable to somewhat further reduce the amount figuring as an asset in our balance-sheet, so that it should more nearly approach a realisable value. Looking again at the credit side of the profit and loss account, it will be noted that the interest earned on our securities is a little more than last year. which is a satisfactory feature, and a still more satisfactory feature is that the value of those securities at yesterday's middle prices shows an appreciation of some £700 above their actual cost price at which they stand in the balance-sheet. After the ample amounts written off, as explained to you, and adding £500 to our reserve fund, we are able to distribute a dividend of 4 per cent, to our preference share-holders, being the same as last year, and to carry forward £976 is. 6d., a substantial figure. I am sure you will agree, and making altogether a satisfactory showing for the 12 months working When once the country of Uruguay settles down again, and is blessed, through judicious government, with more prosperous times, I am convinced that our telephone business will expand and give an increased revenue. 
