OUR PROSECUTION.

Our readers may remember that, a few days ago, we informed them that the Correctional Judge Dr. Rovira had referred our case to the Fiscal of Crime (Public Prosecutor) to pronounce upon our criticisms on national justice.

The case was accordingly laid before Dr. Romeo Burges, temporarily acting as Fiscal of Crime of the 1st Turn. Dr. Burges, however, has already returned the case to the Judge, informing him that he must refer it elsewhere. Dr. Burges, without entering into the merits of the case as regards ourselves, reminds the Judge that it was his Office (that is to say as Public Prosecutor) that conducted the prosecution against Carvalho and that appealed against the first sentence of acquittal. The sentence of the Tribunal is final as regards judicial effects, but still it must be remembered that even the Courts are liable to human error, and in the case of Carvalho it is noteworthy that he was condemned by the First Court of Appeal and that not one of the Judges that have intervened in his case have concurred with the verdicts of acquittal. As regards his Office, says Dr. Burges, whilst respecting, as it is bound to do, the sentence of the Tribunal, it still preserves, as it also has the right to do, the opinions that led it to conduct the prosecution (meaning thereby that it still regards Carvalho as culpable.) For these reasons, concludes Dr. Burges, his Office is "not the most appropriate to silence the clamor of the press that is excited by a possible lamentable judicial error."

Those of our readers who followed our arguments in the case will not fail to perceive that the above remarks are strongly favorable to our point of view, which throughout was to the effect that in the acquittal of Carvalho there had been judicial error, or as we preferred to call it a "miscarriage of justice" the expression commonly used in English to describe such errors.

The case accordingly now passes to the Fiscal of Crime of the 2nd Turn, Dr. Victoriano Martinez and we have little doubt but that he will take the same common-sense view of it as his colleague Dr. Burges.

We cannot help remarking—and our lawyer has done the same—on the strange proceeding of the Correctional Judge in referring for an opinion to the legal authority previously concerned in the prosecution of the very man against whose acquittal our articles were written in protest. As the question at issue is not one of fact but of right, such authority could not possibly condemn our views without also condemning the prosecution that it had itself conducted.

POLITICAL NOTES.

The Representatives sat on Monday, but no business was done beyond passing a vote of condolence for the death of the Deputy Don Teófilo Diaz. That report on the question of electoral reform still fails to make its appearance.

The death of Sr. T. Diaz has left vacant the post of Inspector of Banks. The candidates at present mentioned for the post are Sr. Pedro Carve and Sr. Mauricio Llamas.

The Decree has been issued from the Ministry of Foment appointing Dr. Juan Paulier and Sr. A. V. Rodriguez as a special Commission to investigate the affairs and accounts of the Direction General of National Education. It is said an investigation has been ordered into the accounts of the Direction General of Direct Taxes, but we have not yet seen the Decree to that effect. Anyhow, its turn is sure to come.

The Decree has been issued from the Ministry of Finance rejecting all the tenders presented for renting the Nafoal Electric Light Company. Among the reasons set forth are irregularities in the form of call for tenders (this was issued by the late Government nearly a year ago) the inability of the proponents to give the guarantee required by the Government and also their refusal to sign an advertisement contract, the fact that since the call was issued the financial situation of the Company has materially altered by the paying off of some of its debts, and lastly the fact that under the present conditions it is practically impossible to secure a genuine competition in the tenders. It is expected that the Government will refer the matter to the Chambers for resolution or amendment of the present Law. This affair of the Electric Light was one of the most criticised clauses of the Law of Liquidation of the National Bank and there is little doubt that the Government has succeeded in averting a scandalous job.

A Decree has been issued from the Ministry of Government naming Drs. P. de Maria, J. M. Montero, C. M. de Pena and Luis Varela to integrate the Commission presided over by Dr. Joaquin Raquena and continue the labour of drafting an Administrative Code. The object of this Code is to simplify and harmonise the various permanent administrative Laws and Executive Decrees and Resolutions. The Commission was originally named in March, 1885, over twelve years ago, but so far as we know it made very little progress with its labour and for a long time past has practically been dissolved. Perhaps the stimulating example of Sr. Cuestas' Government may now cause it to produce some practical results.

Some of our contemporaries still insist that the grand public demonstration in favor of Sr. Cuestas' candidature is to take place next Sunday, but we see no convocations published, nor any signs of life on part of the promoters. We must confess that we do not understand. Although there is little doubt that Sr. Cuestas' candidature is eminently popular, that alone will not make the meeting a success, without steps for its proper organization, and any failure in this respect would be highly dangerous, as giving the opposition occasion to blaspheme and also giving the recalcitrant legislators another excuse for rejecting the candidature or at all events for delaying the declaration of their intentions.

There seems to be some hitch about the parliamentary manifesto, it being said yesterday that the number of signatures was much less than at first stated—the *Siglo* reduces them to 18, a very small proportion out of 89—and also that the manifesto, after all, is not a frank declaration in favor of Sr. Cuestas, but merely a conditional acceptance of his candidature which leaves the signatories a loop hole for rejecting it later on. The *Siglo* comments bitterly on this, saying once more that the legislators are merely playing with the people and the problem in order to give a disastrous solution next March. The *Siglo* also points out the danger ahead with regard to the election of a President of the Senate on February 14. As out of the 19 present senators only some three or four are not "herreristas" or "collectivistas" of the most pronounced type, and men entirely inaccessible to public opinion or interests, we do not see what can possibly be expected from a Chamber so constituted. The whole thing comes back to the starting point which we have maintained from the first, that the present Chambers can not be trusted with the presidential election, and therefore there is no third course what over between their dissolution or submission to their dictatorship and to an election which would mean disaster and renewed civil

war. In our opinion our contemporaries are merely wasting time and energy to try to produce any popular solution from the Chambers, and are deceiving the people in leading them to expect or hope for it. The Chambers represent "collectivism" and "collectivism" and the people are two essentially antagonistic forces between which there is no more chance of reconciliation than there is between fire and water. The one may extinguish the other, but there can be no compromise and it is absurd to try to bring it about.

Although for the moment the Cuestas candidature does not look in a very hopeful condition, we understand that the parliamentary manifesto in its favor will be published in a day or two, perhaps this morning, without further waiting for signatories, and will be immediately followed by Sr. Cuestas' reply accepting his nomination and setting forth his programme of government. The appearance of the latter is explained by the fact that Sr. Cuestas has been furnished in advance with a copy of the manifesto.

Judge Ballesteros has issued an order decreeing the absolute liberty of Carmelo Cabrera and the other persons accused in connection with the alleged bomb conspiracy of Marzu last. This is in conformity with the report of the Public Prosecutor Dr. V. Martinez that their case was covered by the indemnity in the compact of peace. We may remark that nobody ever took this conspiracy very seriously after the first day or two, the general opinion being that it was more or less a got up affair of the late government the same as a somewhat similar conspiracy, in which Cabrera also figured during the Herrera administration. The truth is not likely to be known, and the affair may be allowed to sink into oblivion.

It has been decided not to issue any Decree concerning the military commandancies in the interior, they having ceased in fact with the cessation of hostilities. One or two officers who attempted still to give themselves local authority on the strength of having occupied the commandancies during the campaign, have promptly been called to order.

Reports from the interior show that the candidature of Sr. Cuestas is making headway there far more actively than in the capital, and practically all the more important papers of the interior, both "colorado" and "blanco," have now proclaimed it. Unfortunately this will have little or no effect in the capital, where reside the legislators, the majority of whom have practically no relations whatever with the constituencies they are assumed to represent.

Three Englishmen Drowned in the Bay.

A strange affair, resulting in the death of three men, occurred in the bay on Sunday evening, but only came to light yesterday. "El Capitán" is the name of a U.S. wooden ship which put into this port in distress some ten or twelve weeks ago, on her way to Cape Colony. She was repaired and went to sea again, having shipped several mariners, mostly English, in this port. Last week she returned, again in distress, having met a violent storm which had practically swept her decks. We believe one or two men were drowned in this storm, but of this we are not certain. Anyhow, though the hull was still sound, it was judged advisable not to send her to sea again, and she lay here awaiting the formal condemnation of the surveyors, the crew remaining on board awaiting their discharge. Meanwhile the notorious crimp known as "Harry the Greek" had been busy among the crew and induced a number of them to desert. On Sunday evening "Harry the Greek" and another man came alongside the vessel with a shore boat and eight of the crew got into her, with their kits. But the weather was squally, and the boat had hardly proceeded a few lengths from the vessel when she capsized. This was immediately noticed from the vessel—though the escape of the men seems to have passed unobserved—and the Captain, Humphreys, launched a boat to the rescue which succeeded in picking up seven of the ten men and taking them on board. The other three were drowned, these being Robert Williams, English, John O'Keefe and William Sweeney, Irish, all three having shipped at this port on August 27th. Up to the time of writing their bodies had not been recovered. We believe that the four deserters saved and "Harry the Greek" and his companion have since been given into custody.

Such is the best account we can give of the affair, which is rather mysterious, as it is not intelligible why the men should desert when they knew the vessel was not

going to sea again and that they would soon be discharged nor is it clear how they could escape from the vessel with their kits, and yet be seen only two or three minutes later when their boat had capsized.

Salicylic Acid in Food.

It is well-known to-day that salicylic acid is a powerful antiseptic. As such it retards the action of organised ferments like the yeast plant and putrefactive bacteria. It hinders and prevents fermentation, the souring of milk, and the putrefaction of milk. Its action upon unorganised ferments is even more powerful. It completely arrests the conversion of starch into grape sugar by disease and pancreatic extracts. This action is directly opposed to the process of digestion, and were there no other reason the use of salicylic acid should be universally condemned. These facts in connection with salicylic acid have been recognised very thoroughly in legislation. The use of the acid has been condemned by most of the European countries having pure food laws. In France it is forbidden by law in Austria, Italy, and Spain it cannot be used without the danger of incurring a heavy penalty, and all South American States having pure food laws have absolutely forbidden its sale. The laws of many of the States forbid its use. By a decision of Mr. Wells the dairy and food commissioner, the use of salicylic acid in food is prohibited in Pennsylvania. I wish to call attention here to another fact in connection with the use of salicylic acid which is of extreme importance viz, the sale of preservatives, preservatives, &c., under various high sounding names intended for use in private families. A number of these, claim to be perfectly harmless, are on the market, but actually contain salicylic acid as the main ingredient. The conscientious and careful housekeeper should put an absolute veto upon the use of any such compound. There is rarely any need for them, since, when pure fruits and vegetables are used and the proper directions for sterilising by heat, &c., are carried out, canned or preserved goods of all descriptions can be prepared that will remain in good condition for years without the aid of any preservative.—*Sanitarian.*

The Nagging Devil.

A French lad has been, fortunately without success, attempting to kill himself in consequence of the maddening reproaches of his disappointed father. The poor boy, a student in Paris, at the Collège Rollin, had failed to win a prize at the annual examinations and was sharply reprimanded by his father on his return to his home. He was terribly depressed, and told his mother that if the reproaches were renewed he would kill himself. At dinner his father returned to the subject, whereupon the lad seized a knife and stabbed himself somewhere in the region of the heart. A doctor who was summoned, declared that in the absence of complications the wound would not prove fatal. Last year an English girl was goaded into a lunatic asylum by the constant pressure put on her by her father to study incessantly in preparation for an examination. The tendency to worry young people into desperate efforts to distinguish themselves is one of the results of the spirit of competition which is making modern life increasingly difficult. But reproaches poured on failure are inflicting more misery than is generally known. Sometimes failure is a real road to ultimate success while quick success is not seldom preliminary to a life of failure. Many a young man or girl, compelled through a breakdown in the career first chosen to elect some other, lives to rejoice in the experience which was so disappointing at first.—*Christian Commonwealth.*

SUNDRIES

—The only first class passenger for this port by the P. S. N. Co's "Orellana" yesterday was the well-known commission agent Mr. Ernest Stunz, from Liverpool. The mails were delivered about midday and we will now do our best to make up for the arrears in our "London Notes," the cause of which we have already explained.

—The social event of this evening will be the Concert and Dance given by The Entertainment Society, in the French Saloon in Calle Arapey. The combination, though ordinary enough elsewhere, is a new one for this Society, but we have no doubt it will prove successful. We are asked to state clearly that tickets cannot be had at the doors, but although the period for application has closed, those members who have not yet provided themselves, will probably have no difficulty in obtaining them to day on application to the Hon. Treasurer Mr. P. C. Towers or the Hon. Secretary Mr. Hogge. Although the season is somewhat advanced, a

good attendance may be expected. The Ladies of the Cinderellas Committee have kindly consented to act as a Committee of Reception and a Sub Committee has been energetic in attending to the important items of music and decorations and the most important item of refreshments.

—Says the S. A. Journal of Oct. 23 just received;—The Pacific Steam Navigation Company's Royal Mail twin screw steamer Oropesa, Captain H. W. Hayes, has just completed the round voyage to Valparaiso and back in 11 weeks. This is a splendid performance, considering the number of ports called at—13 on the outward and 8 on the homeward voyage, besides a fortnight's detention at Valparaiso. The homeward voyage from Valparaiso, including the usual calls, occupied just 30 1/2 days—the shortest time on record.

Only 23 men in every thousand serving in the British army are 6 feet and upwards in height; 33 in every thousand are 5 feet 11 inches; and 58 in every thousand 5 feet 10 inches. There are 785 in every thousand army men under 5 feet 9 inches. As some new regulations are being made respecting the height and weight of candidates for Woolwich and Sandhurst and for commissions in the army, it may be interesting to note that at present there are in the army 112 men of 5 feet 4 inches and under in every thousand. It is said that the new regulations as to weight and height would have excluded Lord Wolseley and Lord Roberts when in their youthful days they entered the army.

—The Lawn Tennis Tournament was advanced another stage on Sunday when three more matches were played, Davie beating Bankier after a long and hard fought game, and Ashe beating both Fuller and Harvey. Although the day was oppressively hot, there was a considerable number of spectators. Tea was kindly provided by Mrs. Crocker. There are now only ten more matches to be played off, and it is therefore likely that the Tournament will be concluded by the end of the month.—In our last notice we stated that Wright beat the Rev. S. F. Handcock; it should have been the other way about.

—Mr. George Meredith's view of decadent literature, according to "The British Weekly," was recently given in reply to a question in the following witty terms: "The leaves are falling especially the figleaves."

—There is recorded in Tennyson's Life, a good instance of Sir William Harcourt's ready wit. The poet was talking about smoking, and said that the pipe he enjoyed most was his early morning one. "Ah," said Sir William who happened to be first one of the company, "the earliest pipe of half awakened birds." The great man, it seems, did not resent this clever abuse of one of his verses in the "Press."

—The Police office (Comisaria) of the 1st section has been removed from its former quarters in Calle 25 de Mayo to more commodious premises in Calle Perez, Castellanos 105, between 25 de Mayo and Washington.

—The weather is upside down again. On Monday we were broiling and suffocating with the heat, yesterday we were shivering with cold. What it will be to-day we will not venture to predict. A violent gale blew the greater part of Monday night, and rain was threatening all day yesterday.

—A New York telegram states that Mr. Hatcher, Professor of Natural History in the Princeton University, is about to leave for Patagonia, via Buenos Aires, with the object of exploring the former territory and collecting specimens of the flora and fauna.

—We omitted to express our sincere condolences with the Brazilians on Monday, which was the anniversary of the declaration of the Republic and the commencement of so many of its troubles. From a fairly happy and well-governed monarchy it has changed into a disorderly not very reputable and ill-governed Republic. Yet we believe some of the Brazilians actually make the anniversary a day of rejoicing.

—A Paris telegram announces the death of the dentist Mr. Evans who in 1871 assisted the Empress Eugenie to escape from the Tuilleries.

—The Great European Impotencies are still squabbling over the appointment of a Governor to little Crete. Six great nations, representing we know not how many millions, cannot agree over the destinies of a little island with barely 300,000 inhabitants. Well may we call them the Great Impotencies.

—Under the state of siege, the Brazilian Government is proceeding vigorously against the eternal enemies of peace and progress, the "collectivistas" or Jacobins, and amongst the ringleaders arrested are senators, deputies, and military and naval officers. The affair has given the people opportunity to array

themselves vigorously on the side of the Government, just as the people here have arrayed themselves on the side of Sr. Cuestas since the death of Borda. We should not be in the least sorry to see some of the "collectivistas" here treated with equal rigor; they richly deserve it.

LONDON NOTES

THURSDAY, OCTOBER 14. A telegram from Tobi reports that a party of tribesmen have attacked a small British force slightly wounding an officer and several men. The enemy in the neighbourhood of the Samana are reported to be disinclined to fight.

It is stated that a force of 3,000 Abyssinians has been defeated by Somalis, and that Ras Makonnen was among the slain. The news is brought by Mr. Bennet Stanford, who has just returned from Somaliland.

Mr. Brodick, M.P., speaking at Guildford last night, discussed the conditions of our national defences, and the suggested increase in the military forces of the country. Whilst he advocated economy of administration in every detail, he submitted that a peace strength which was sufficient for the army twenty-five years ago was inadequate to our great increase of territory and to a trade expanded by over one-third. National annexation necessitated increased national insurance, and neither the devotion of soldiers nor the talent of statesmen could enable three men to do the work of four.

A very busy day was yesterday spent by the delegates attending the Congregational Union at Birmingham. In many respects the chief incident was the unveiling of the memorial of the late Dr. Dale, a ceremony which was largely attended. A cordially phrased answer was returned by the Conference to the Bishop of Worcester's message of welcome received on Tuesday, and a resolution expressing commiseration with the people of Maidstone in their present unfortunate plight was adopted.

At the London Sessions (South Side), yesterday, John Harris and George Gabbitts, ticket of leave men, pleaded guilty to a charge of housebreaking at Nunhead. This was the case in which prosecutor's wife was decoyed from home by a bogus telegram summoning her to Charing Cross Hospital as her husband had met with an accident. During her absence the premises were broken into. Harris was sentenced to seven years' penal servitude, Gabbitts to five years.

FRIDAY, OCTOBER 15. The Victorian elections were held yesterday, and a telegram from Melbourne states that, although the returns are not complete, the Government has obtained a substantial majority.

Speaking at a large meeting of the Church of England Temperance Society at Northampton, last night, the Archbishop of Canterbury urged the importance of the movement from a social standpoint. The cause of temperance was, he said, the cause of humanity, and as an indubitable fact of the Gospel of Christ about which there could be no argument at all temperance must always stand.

Through the Lord Mayor, Mr. D. P. Sellar, of Brentwood has offered to present the City with a collection of pictures by old Dutch, Italian, and English masters. A letter to this effect, read at yesterday's meeting of the Corporation, was received with enthusiasm. The Lord Mayor and the President of the Royal Academy have arranged to see the pictures early in November.

Congregationalists brought their Conference to a close at Birmingham yesterday. A strong appeal was made in favour of Church extension in London and large towns. The delegates approved of a resolution condemning the educational policy of the Government, and declaring that there could be no settlement of the difficult until the schools supported by public funds were placed under the control of bodies elected by popular suffrage. A motion in favour of arbitration in trade disputes was also carried. Halifax was chosen as the place for the next autumn meeting.

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Charges of manslaughter against George Senior and George Vince, members of the sect known as the Peculiar People, were investigated at the West Ham Police-court yesterday on a Treasury prosecution. Prisoners had, it was alleged, in accordance with their professed principles, neglected to call in medical aid when their children were stricken with illness, and had depended upon the laying on of hands by their Elders to effect a cure. In each case evidence was given that the sufferer would probably have lived had he been attended by a doctor. The accused were committed for trial at the Central Criminal Court, but were admitted to bail.
