—We have omitted to state in our 'Political Notes' that conversion of the Treasury Certificates for February commenced yesterday. Also that Sr. Gomensoro has issued a manifesto accepting his candidature. It is admirably phrased, but poor old man—who can expect him to live to carry out his plans, and still less, who can expect the 'honesties' to support him in an honest policy?

LONDON NOTES

FRIDAY, OCTOBER 29.
It has been decided that the body of the late Duchess of Teck shall be buried in St. George's Chapel, Windsor, on Wednesday next. The unusually long interval between death and burial is said to indicate the probability that the Queen herself will travel to Windsor to be present.

Last night the Chancellor of the Exchequer took a leading part in the annual meeting of the Bristol Working Men's Conservative Association, in replying to radical criticisms and charges against the Government. Sir Michael first defended the Foreign policy of Lord Salisbury which had materially helped to preserve peace, and also to secure easier terms for Greece and autonomy for Crete. Next he vindicated the course of the Government with regard to the Agricultural Rating Act, and the aid given to Voluntary schools and to necessitous School Boards in poor districts. Dealing with recent phases of the currency question, he expressed his entire concurrence with the Indian Government for rejecting the proposal to reopen the Indian mints to the coinage of silver. The Government had felt bound to return a negative answer to the United States and France with regard to that proposal. Bimetallism was a difficult and important subject, on which he believed that no living man could speak with absolute confidence as to the future of any course of action taken, but the Government was pledged to maintain our gold standard.

Yesterday Sir Wm. Lockhart occupied some heights near the Sampagna Pass, and a reconnaissance was made to the foot of the Pass, Colonel Plade being severely wounded.

A busy day was spent by the National Union of Women Workers, who resumed their Conference at Croydon yesterday. It was decided to change the name of the body to the National Council of Women of Great Britain and Ireland Mrs. A. Booth, of Liverpool, was chosen President for the ensuing year.

This morning appears the text of the master's and men's reply to the Board of Trade's invitation to a conference on the Engineering dispute. From this it will be seen that both parties agree to a conference subject to certain important conditions. In the course of their letter the Federated Employers pointed out that they are obliged to insist upon the demand for the reduction of hours being unconditionally withdrawn, but that they are willing to meet the Joint Committee to discuss the best means of removing the restrictions that have hitherto hampered the Engineering trade, and of extending to all works the fair and equitable arrangements existing in many shops before the commencement of the dispute. The most important condition stipulated by the men is the appointment of a neutral chairman.

Mr. Stoddart's team opened the first match of their tour at Adelaide yesterday morning. Play began well for the Englishmen, Darling returning the ball to Richardson. When Hill joined Lyons, however, the Colonials put on runs freely, and at the close of play the score stood at 86 for five wickets, Hill having made a double century not out.

tising in London against a former client, for slander. Plaintiff after he had acted for the defendant some time, felt he had reason to complain of her behaviour, and he accordingly denied her access to his office. After he had taken steps to enforce that order, she forced her way into his room, and then and afterwards uttered words concerning him which he urged, reflected on his professional character. The jury gave a verdict for the plaintiff, and assessed the damages at 350l.

Yesterday, at the Central Criminal Court, Thomas George Senior, a member of the religious sect known as 'The Peculiar People,' living in Church street, Plaistow, surrendered to answer an indictment charging him with the manslaughter of his son, a child of five years of age, who had died from congestion of the lungs. Prisoner had neglected to call in medical assistance when his child was ill; the only aid invoked being the laying on of hands by one of the elders. George Vince, another member of the sect, was similarly indicted. They both were found guilty, and each refused to give a pledge to revert from the course hitherto pursued. Sentence was postponed until this morning.

In a moment, fifty wild possibilities flashed across the curate's mind. She meant to offer him money—to send him abroad—to demonstrate to

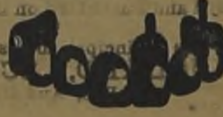
