The Duke of York has telegraphed to the Lord Mayor of Dublin asking him to convey to the citizens the sincere and grateful thanks of the Duchess and himself for kind expressions of sympathy with them in their great sorrow. Further votes of condolence were passed by public bodies meeting vesterday. Last night the Chancellor of the

Exchequer took a leading part in the annual meeting of the Bristol Working Men's Conservative Association. In replying to Radical criticisms and charges against the Government, Sir Michael first de-fended the Foreign policy of Lord Salisbury which had materially helped to preserve peace, and also to secure easier terms for Greece and autonomy for Crete. Next he vindicated the course of the Gov ernment with regard to the Agri-cultural Rating Act, and the aid given to Voluntary schools and to necessitous School Boards in poor districts. Dealing with recent phases of the currency question, he expressed his entire concurrence with the Indian Government for rejecting the proposal to reopen the Indian mints to the coinage of silver. 
