A SUSPICIOUS TRICK.

A challenge to the People.

The collectivists' majority in the Chambers, recently foiled in an attempt to subvert the present popular Government of Sr. Cuestas by illegal means are now hiding their plans against the welfare of the Republic under the pretence of proclaiming an honest and popular candidate to the presidency. For this purpose they have selected the veteran Don Tomas Gomensoro, the hero of the pacification of 1874, the popular incarnation of civic and administrative virtue, and the idol of the people. Superficially this may appear well enough, but it has to be remembered that Sr. Gomensoro, though worthy of the utmost respect, is in his eighty eighth year, and therefore, even if his life should be prolonged for the presidential term of four years from March, 1892, that is to say supposing he lives to be ninety-two, which may be regarded as highly improbable, he cannot possibly maintain the mental and physical vigor necessary to preside the destinies of the Republic during the critical, difficult and perhaps even stormy period that it has to face. If he lives it will be made the tool of schemers; and if he dies, the Republic will be subject to another interim presidency, with a repetition of the doubts and difficulties through which we are passing at this moment, and their inevitable depressive effect on its economical welfare. Either contingency, however, would give the "collectivity" just the opportunity they require to make another struggle to reconquer their lost position, and that is without the least doubt, the motive of their declaration. The "collectivity," it cannot be proclaimed too often or too plainly, are the eternal enemies of peace, progress, honest government and public opinion, they respect no law and no rights, they regard the Republic as their inherent patrimony to be plundered, oppressed and taxed for the benefit of their own narrow circle they regard the people as serfs whose will need only be expressed in order to be violated, and they know no scruples whatever in the means they employ to attain their selfish, unpatriotic and dishonest ends and to maintain a predominance of power to which they have not a single legitimate claim or right. Even now, as we see, they are making a shameful use of the name of an honorable old man, venerated by all who know him, as a cover for their iniquitous plot. How Sr. Gomensoro came to lend his name for such a purpose as it would seem he has done, is absolutely incomprehensible, so much so that we prefer not to dwell upon it.

The hypocrisy of this proclamation can easily be shown by recalling the events of the presidential election of 1894. Sr. Gomensoro was then the popular candidate—though even some of his supporters demurred on account of his advanced age—in opposition to the unveiled puppet of the "collectivity" and the "herreraista" party. But the latter, the very men who are now proclaiming him, would have none of him; he was not "one of themselves" not the man for the situation, he was too feeble, they even impugned his moral and political character, but above all he was too old. But the veteran who did not suit them

and who was too old in 1894, is going to be young enough in 1898! Sr. Gomensoro was too old when he was eighty three, but is not too old when he is eighty-seven and the probabilities are a thousand to one against his living to complete his presidential term. The hypocrisy of the proclamation needs no further proof, and it is evident to the dust that the pretended supporters of Sr. Gomensoro are counting on his senility or his death as a shield for their own base plans.

The cunning of the step, which we believe is due to the mephitic tophelian genius of Dr. Julio Herrera, is plain. Sheltered behind this simulacrum of a popular candidature, the majority of the Chambers can mature their plans, pretending to be on the side of the people and offering an apparently strong argument against their dissolution. They will have, moreover, thrown an apple of discord—though Heaven knows none was needed—into the camp of their opponents. A more cunning and dangerous artifice can hardly be imagined, and we only regret deeply that Sr. Cuestas had not anticipated it by the dissolution of the Chambers some time ago or when the opportunity offered last week. The present artifice has not lessened the necessity of that step, though it may have rendered its execution more difficult.

Though the artifice is dangerous, fortunately like most of Dr. Herrera's wonderful plans, it is also very transparent, and the most unsophisticated can hardly fail to see through it. For our part, we regard it as nothing more or less than a direct challenge to the country. The majority of the Chambers, seeing public opinion clearly crystallized in favor of the candidature of Sr. Cuestas, have thrown down the gauntlet and declared openly that they will not accept it. They will carry out their own plans, they will vote an impossible candidate, but they will not accept, at any price, the choice of the people.

This is not surprising. In acting thus, the "collectivity" are simply faithful to their theory that the sovereignty of the Republic is vested in themselves and that the people are nonentities unworthy to be consulted or considered. Sr. Cuestas, in his manifesto last week set forth the opposite and wholesome doctrine that the sovereignty of the Republic is in the people, and that it is the duty of the legislators to respect and represent them under penalty of being guilty of high treason. This latter was the doctrine which the "collectivists" Dr. Acosta made himself eminently foolish by denouncing as seditious and subversive forgetful that it was he and his party not Sr. Cuestas, who represented the absolute perversion of republican principles. If Dr. Acosta were acquainted with the Declaration of Independence of the United States, he would have found the origin of Sr. Cuestas' theories which he was so eager to denounce.

Anyhow, the attitude of the majority of the Chambers is a direct challenge to the people. This handful of men taken from the dregs of politics representing nobody except themselves put in their places by fraud and violence, employing their illegitimate authority for the basest of purposes, are arrogating to themselves a supreme and irresponsible authority and denying the people the right to be heard at one of the most critical moments of the history of the Republic.

The challenge should be accepted unhesitatingly. The "collectivity," trusting to their fraudulently obtained majority in the Chambers, desire to provoke the people to a trial of strength. Very well. Be it so. Let the struggle commence. The question has to be settled some day, and the sooner it is settled, the sooner will the future of the Republic be decided.

Let it be determined once for all whether this Republic is to be governed by its people, according to the Constitution, or whether it is to be governed by the handful of dishonest men known as the "collectivity."

This is the question that will have to be worked out—perhaps have to be fought out—before March next. The attitude of the "collectivity" being thus defined, the first duty of the people is to unite and rally round Sr. Cuestas. If his candidature was necessary before, it is immensely more so now, and the people all classes, all parties and all nationalities, must show their perception of the artifice employed by the "collectivity," assert their determination to support the candidate of their own choice, and convince the present Chambers where lies the sovereignty of the Republic. Enough for the present.

POLITICAL NOTES.

The Senators sat on Monday, and after a discussion of no great interest completed the sanction of the Annual Law of Licenses (*patentes*). The petition of the retail grocers for an extra tax upon groceries was finally rejected, as advised by the Committee, and it is to be hoped no more will be heard of so absurd a claim.

The surprise of the day has been the proclamation by the "collectivists" of the candidature of Don Tomas Gomensoro. This was issued shortly before midnight on Monday in an anonymous bulletin from an unknown printing office, so that many doubted its genuineness until they found it confirmed in yesterday morning's papers. This, it is explained, is due to a coalition between the followers of Drs. Julio and Miguel Herrera and of General Tajes and is intended by them as a check to the growing popularity of the candidature of Sr. Cuestas. The proclamation, which we criticize editorially, has had a bad effect and it is feared will seriously complicate the situation. At the same time no one imagines for a moment that it is genuine. It is stated that Sr. Gomensoro has accepted the nomination, though he came to fall into so obvious a trap is simply incomprehensible. Surprise is also felt at the adhesion of General Tajes and his party, as it was expected he would support Sr. Cuestas.

The proclamation was issued too late, and has evidently taken our contemporaries too much by surprise—though they suspected some such trick was in preparation—for them to issue a definite judgement upon it. This may appear this morning.

On Monday night Dr. A. M. Rodriguez gave a sumptuous and largely attended banquet to Dr. Mendilaharsu, to celebrate his departure to assume the Legation in Buenos Aires (we erroneously stated that he had left several days ago.) This banquet had a political intention, namely of reconciling the parliamentary opponents of Sr. Cuestas but as most of these declined the invitation it failed in the object, which, indeed, was already forestalled by their adhesion to the Gomensoro candidature. Still, there was a brilliant attendance and a great flow of champagne and after dinner eloquence.

The removal—under form of resignation—of Col. Muró from the Captaincy of the Port is confirmed, and the Decree is published appointing Col. Pedro P. Solano in his place. We are unable to say anything of his antecedents.

Preparations for the great manifestations of next Sunday are proceeding apace, and, though the Chamber of Commerce cannot join in it formally, there is little doubt that it will be powerfully supported in commercial circles probably more so than ever after the last manoeuvre of the "collectivist" majority.

Com. Bauzá has been named presidential aide-de camp, in place of Col. Pollo, named Chief of the 4th Chasseurs.

Deputy J. M. Echeverri has formally signified his adhesion to the candidature of Sr. Cuestas, bringing the number of parliamentary supporters up to 21. The candidature has also been proclaimed by *El Plata*, a paper published in Canelones.

Conversion of the Treasury Certificates for February will be announced in a day or two.

It is rumoured that some more important changes are pending among the Chiefs of Battalions.

THE VICE OF THRIFT.

GRANT ALLEN, IN THE "HUMANITARIAN."

The point on which I desire to say a few words is the squalid, sordid, unsocialistic character of the petty virtue thrift so often inculcated as a peculiar virtue upon what are called "the lower classes"—that is to say, the least privileged and propertyless strata of the population. I select this theme because it is one very typical of a kind of misapprehension in common among those who do not understand socialistic aims and ideals. I have always found, indeed, that complete lack of imagination is the chief barrier against the comprehension of socialistic schemes. Most outsiders believe that Socialists aim at reducing the community to a dull, dead level of poverty and squalor—at abolishing science, art, literature, and leisure—at reducing all citizens alike to hewers of wood and drawers of water. The mere fact that most Socialists at the present day are either poets, painters, men of science, men of letters, or else the cream and pick of the intelligent artisans, might give people pause in forming this crude judgment, were it the way of the world to reflect at all before leaping at conclusions; but it is not I can only say that all the Socialists I have ever met—and I know a good many—desire, on the contrary, to raise enormously the general level of intellectual, artistic, and spiritual feeling; aim at the increase of leisure and opportunities for culture in all classes alike including those now commonly ranked as the highest. We want to give both dukes and coalheavers a better chance of developing their natures freely in every direction. But it is to remove a misapprehension of a minor sort that I write this paper. People imagine Socialism will be sordid and squalid, that we will all be compelled to save scraps of string and tear off half-sheets of note paper. I retort that that mean candle end type of saving is, on the contrary, a direct result of the capitalist régime; accomplished Socialism will supply us in the end with everything in such abundance that we will never need to think whether we are wasting or not. We shall have all we want of all commodities in any quantity that we can reasonably desire.

Under our existing conditions there are a few men who play boldly with millions, and who rise to the top; there are thousands who pick up pins or save bits of candle end, and who remain at the bottom. Now, picking up pins and saving candle-ends is a direct result of the capitalist system and the inequality of distribution which it brings about. Whenever I see a man untie a string that binds a parcel and ravel out all the knots I say to myself, "That man will never be rich." He has the slavish habit. He gives up an excessive quantity of time for an inadequate result. Only in a world where some men have juggled everything into their own hands would it be worth any man's while to untie a string instead of pulling out his good, sharp knife—best Sheffield steel—and cutting it. And how do I know his knife would be of best Sheffield steel? Why, because no one if he can help it, will buy an inferior one. And in a world where everybody wanted the best, and demand and supply were correlative nobody would ever make any but the best of everything. Things are made bad now because they are made cheap; and

cheapness, which means in this sense practically low quality, is a direct result of unequal distribution. A free world would demand for every citizen a serviceable article.

There is a certain arithmetical rule-of-thumb school of economists which is always making dispiriting calculations of what the average income of the community would be if all were equally divided. If middlemen and the agents or employees of capitalists were all diverted to honest production (by which I do not mean necessarily material manufacture) the total of wealth would be immensely increased, especially in England, where the productive class is now so relatively small, and the various forms of leech or sub-leech so numerous and all pervading. I will take a single example, that of the advertising element. Just consider the solid phalanx of people engaged in designing, drawing, printing and colouring advertisements, which add nothing to wealth, but have merely the object of inducing you to buy So-and-so's cocoa rather than So-and-so's, to use 0 What you may call it soap rather than Thingumbob detergent. Just consider the vast cohort of people employed as commercial travellers, all bent upon selling Jones's long cloth rather than Smith's; in recommending Wilkinson's tea as against Jenkinson's or Simpkinson's. Turn all this useless body to productive work, and see how enormously you increase the real output of the country. Why, everybody might go to the play, with an orchid in his button-hole!

SUNDRIES

Our case with Cavalho is undergoing a variable Odyssey. The Fiscal of Crima of the 1st Turn Dr. Romeu Borges, declined to report upon it for reasons we have already mentioned. The Fiscal of Crima of the 2nd Turn Dr. V. Martinez has now also declined for similar reasons. It has accordingly been transferred to the Fiscal of Finance, Dr. Garzon, though how he can be qualified to give opinion in a case essentially turning upon application of the criminal law, is more than we can understand. It now remains to be seen what he will do with it.

Preparations are rapidly approaching completeness, under the care of an energetic Committee, for the St. Andrew's Banquet next Tuesday. It will be given at the Pyramides, and an admirable menu has been arranged, including the dishes most dear to the hearts of Scotchmen. After the banquet there will be an interesting programme of speeches, songs and recitations. Probably there will be some allusions to Burns. We may mention that a piper, a real live piper, has been secured, and will provide the music dear to the ears of Highlanders. We hope it will not frighten the natives. About fifty guests are already booked for the banquet, and tickets, £1 each, may still be had on application to any of the Committee.—N. B. (which does not stand for North Britain.) The banquet is going to be a great success.

Messrs. Jacobson and Co. have sent us specimens of some neat and artistic Christmas Cards, consisting of photogravured views of Montevideo, mounted on gold-edged cards and with congratulatory sentences in English, French, German or Spanish. These are very suitable for sending home, and are only 25 cents each. The same house has also a fine selection of artistic cards of a more expensive description.

In the *Weekly Times of Argentina* appears a foolish letter from "Looker-on" accusing us of having made malicious mis-statements about the affair on board the ship "El Capitan" which resulted in the drowning of three Englishmen in the bay last week. As our information was derived in the first place from the U. S. Consulate and in the second from the Capitania, it could not have been very incorrect. We did it true, make a mistake in confounding Harry the Greek with George the Greek, as the man who helped the deserters to escape from the ship but that error was fully corrected in the next number as an act of ordinary justice, and certainly not on account of any impertinent threats from the former of the two. As to our having made any insinuations against the master of the ship, they exist only in the imagination of "Looker-on." We sent a message to Captain Humphreys, the master in question, asking him to call at our office, so that he might have an opportunity of giving his own version of the affair, and as he did not call we have the right to presume that there was nothing to correct and that he was satisfied. Since "Looker-on" is so ready to charge us with "mis-statements" he might explain what they are, for the version he gives of the affair is practically the same as

our own, namely that the men were drowned in an attempt to desert. Like all papers, we are liable to errors at times, but we never hesitate to correct them when convinced that we are wrong, nor is it necessary for the parties concerned to have recourse to threats or to the columns of other papers. If a "looker-on," whoever he may be, had taken the trouble to come or write to us, in proper manner, he would have found this out.

The San Felipe Theatre, which has just been repainted, decorated and furnished, and partially installed with electric light, will shortly reopen with the Italian Comic Opera and Ballet Company of Sr. Gaetano Cavalli, which is said to offer novel and attractive entertainments. We may add that we have received a circular from L. Crodara and Co., who are now lessees of all three theatres here, to the effect that they intend to work to allow their monopoly to work to the prejudice of the public. They also state that the Solis Theatre is being redecored and improved for the coming season. It required it.

The discovery is announced from Egypt of the tomb of Menes, the founder of the first Egyptian dynasty. This is of the highest archaeological importance.

The "Victoria" which left for Spitzbergen to find traces of the Arctic balloon expedition of Dr. Andree has returned to Tromsøe unsuccessful in its search.

General Sir William Lockhart, states a telegram, has determined to change the base of his operations against the Afriids, and is undertaking a daring march, with a column of 10,000 men and 10,000 bearers, across an unknown stretch of country where he will be cut off from communication with headquarters for nearly a month. His object is to unite with the column of General Hammond.

There has been a terrible cyclone in the north west of Australia, wrecking several towns in the province of Wimmera, with great loss both of life and property.

In the Lagos Hinterland, the Sudanese soldiers forming part of Major Madonald's expedition mutinied and attacked the camp with the aid of 150 native Mahometans. After a severe fight they were driven off with over 100 killed and wounded. The English had 4 officers and 15 men killed and some thirty wounded. Among the former were Major Thurston and Lieutenant Fielding. Reinforcements have been sent to the expedition.

LONDON NOTES

TUESDAY, OCTOBER 26.

An official telegram to the India Office states that Captain Robinson has died of his wounds received in the taking of the Chagru heights. Sir W. Lockhart is waiting for the arrival of the First Division before attacking the Sampagner Pass, which is strongly defended.

Sir Henry Campbell Bannerman addressing his constituents in Sirling last night, referred to the engineering crisis, and said the time had not yet come when anyone could pronounce judgment upon the dispute. But they were right in believing that some of the more hot-headed and pugnacious of the employers had a deliberate purpose, namely of taking that or any other opportunity to smash the union of the men, and to break down their power. So far as he could see, its wickedness was only equalled by its folly. For more than a generation back it had been the constant effort of the Legislature to encourage and facilitate combination amongst workmen, yet it would be fatal to the prosperity of the general trade of the country if a workman—merely because he was a workman—was to extend too far his claim to interfere in the management of the business. As the head of the War Office in 1893, with Lord Spencer as First Lord of the Admiralty, he had found that a forty-eight hours week might with perfect safety and great advantage be introduced in the workshops and arsenals.

Speaking at a public meeting in connection with the opening of a new Conservative club at Ransbottom, near Bury, last night, Lord James of Hereford replied to Mr. Morley's recent attack on the Government in respect of foreign affairs. These attacks upon the Government should have been made in Parliament, where they could have been answered. The Concert of Europe had been supported by Mr. Gladstone and Lord Rosebery. Why, he asked, was the Government to be attacked because they had continued the policy of the Liberals? The allegation that the Government had committed a breach of faith with the tribes in the North of India was denied by Lord James.

Sir Walter Besant last night opened the East London Diamond Jubilee Exhibition of Trades and Inventions at the People's Palace. There are about 200 exhibitors, including trading firms as well as artisan inventors, and the most gratifying exhibits probably are those in which the young people, who are taking advantage of the technical and other educational institutions attached to the Palace, compete for distinction.

At a demonstration of the Federated Free Churches of St. Pancras, held last night at Park Chapel, Camden Town, the Rev. J. H. Jowett, of Birmingham, delivered a sermon, in the course of which he insisted on the necessity of all benevolent and philanthropic movements combining prayer and communion with practical work.

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N. B.—Steamers calling at La Plata to coal only with J. Mudd and Co. are free of Entry and Wharf dues.

The great heresy of the present day was to disparage doctrine and eulogise practice. At a public meeting held subsequently a number of the ministers of the free churches in the district, and some from outside (including the Rev. H. Price Hughes) delivered addresses.

We regret to announce the death of the Rev. John Stoughton, D. D., a well known Congregationalist. More than forty years have elapsed since he was elected Chairman of the Congregational Union.

Sixty survivors of the Balacava charge were present at the 43rd anniversary banquet given by the President and Committee of the Balacava Society, at the St. James's Hall Restaurant, last night. Mr. H. Herbert presided.

Yesterday, at a meeting of the Lynn Sanitary Committee, a communication was received from the Local Government Board asking for an explanation of the fact that there were about 120 cases of typhoid fever in the town. It was decided to reply that it was due to the exceptionally heavy quantity of surface water, principally from pastured lands, passing into the open stream from which the town takes its supply.

The chief football match yesterday was that at Leyton under Association rules, when London beat Sheffield by four goals to one.

After her Majesty's Judges and the leading members of the Bar had attended divine service at Westminster Abbey, the Michaelmas Sittings of the Supreme and High Courts of Justice were opened yesterday with the customary observances. The new Master of the Rolls, Lord Justice Hann Collins, and Mr Justice Bigham were loudly cheered as they passed up the Centre Hall of the Courts in the legal procession. The Lord Chief Justice was absent, presumably in consequence of the injury he recently sustained.

It was announced yesterday that Lord Ludlow (Lord Justice Lopes) had tendered his resignation as a member of the Court of Appeal; and it was rumoured that Mr. C. J. Darling, Q.C., had been offered and had accepted the vacant Queen's Bench Judgeship.

The October Sessions of the Central Criminal Court opened yesterday at the Old Bailey. An unusually heavy calendar includes two charges of murder and four of attempted murder. William C. Heron, an Uxbridge auctioneer, who pleaded guilty last Session to misappropriation of trust money amounting to over 3,300l., was sentenced to three years' penal servitude.

Evidence was given by Mr. A. R. Greenwood at the adjourned inquiry, held yesterday at Chester Assylum, into the circumstances attending the death of Mr. E. Langtry. Witness spoke of seeing deceased after he had met with an accident on board ship, but could not say how he came to fall. A verdict of accidental death was returned.
