THE MANIFESTO OF SR.

CUESTAS. The Manifesto of Sr. Cuestas, accepting his nomination as candidate to the presidency of the Re-public in March next, is a docu-ment that has impressed us very favorably. It has not the literary flourish, nor the verbosity, of the public utterances of his predeces sors, but we certainly consider that no loss. On the other hand, there is about it a quiet and unassuming tone of good intentions, good faith and sincerity that we find very satisfactory. Sr. Cuestas says that he does not believe in making fine promises. He is right. After the experiences of Herrera After the experiences of Herrera and Borda the country is justified in discounting and disbelieving presidential professions. The country wants deeds, not words, and Sr. Cuestas is in the happy position of being able to appeal to his own governmental acts as the most convincing promise for his course in the future, should he be confirmed in the post he now occupies ed in the post he now occupies temporarily. We do not think any better guarantee than this can be demanded. As the Rason has pointed out, Sr. Cuestas' administrative acts since he exercised the Executive Power, though entirely factory to the people, have by no means been of a nature to please the legislative body in whose hands, most unfortunately, his election rests. He has been too strict and too upright to concilate Chambers of such base material as the present, and this is, in our opinion, a strong and this is, in our opinion, a strong proof of his sincerity and also a proof that public confidence in him is not misplaced. He himself concludes his manifesto with the honorable declaration that in acceding to power, she desires to present himself without further personal compromise than that of complying with his duty in good of the interests of the country.» When we remember the shameful epersonal compromises» and in-trigues by which certain previous presidents have reached the chair, presidents have reached the chair,
this frank declaration, which is
fully supported by Sr. Cuestas'
acts and attitude, comes like a reviving breath of pure air after the
corrupt vapours of a dungeon
We do not intend, nor have we
space, to analise the manifesto in

detail, but there are two passages

that claim special attention.

The first is that relating to the important share of foreign capital and of foreign residents in the fortunes of the Republic. We do not repeat Sr. Cuestas' words, as we translated them in full yesterday, but they are terms. in full yesterday, but they are cer-tainly notable on account of their frank admission of the importance of foreign interests, not merely in the economical, but also in the political, life of the Re-public. No such admission has ever been made before, within our memory or knowledge, by any President or aspirant to presidential honors in the River Plate. We will not say that the foreign interest has been ignored, but it certainly has been consistently overlooked as a political factor. Whether here or in Argentina, a large proportion of the population, fully half the public wealth, seventenths of the commerce, enterprise and public works and nine-tenths

disregarded in politics; it was not consulted in political questions, it had neither voice nor representation in the councils and administration of the nation, its interests were neglected or even made a deliberate object of persecu-tion. «Foreigners» were very well in their way to bor-row money from when occa-sion required, and there was an end; for the rest, they were nought in the life of the nation and the Go vernment had no interest in their welfare. Certain presidents, such as Dr. Julio Herrera and the late Sr. Idiarte Borda, mades no attempt to disguise their direct hostility to foreigners and foreign interests, they presented

nterests; they persecuted and oppressed commerce because it was mainly foreign, and therefore, in heir eyes, had no rights to consideration. Similar sentiments have found open expression in the legislative bodies formed by these rulers. It is not long since the official organ of Sr. Borda sneered at a public demonstration because it was largely composed because it was largely composed of foreigners, and the same journal frequently challenged the right of foreign papers to criticise public affairs—though it was ready enough to quote them when they spoke favorably, and though Sr. Borda's government did not hesitate to subvention (bribe would be a plainer word) certain be a plainer word) certain foreign journals German, French, and even, we are sorry to say, English, to pervert the truth about

its character.

To the honor of Sr. Cuestas, be it said that he has boldly proclaimed a different policy. Although he knows that foreigners have no vote or parliamentary representation, and have little or no influence in the circles to which he looks for his election, where indeed they are rather regarded with disfavor than otherwise, he has not hesitated to devote a considerable portion of his manifesto to an act of justice, we might almost say of reparation, to the foreign interests so poorly treated by his predecessors. He goes further, for in one of the final sentences he says that in his opinion at it is not sufficient that the election of the President of the Republic
should be effected by the exclusive sanction of a given party, · but it is absolutely necessary that the general interests of the coun try, represented by natives and
 foreigners, should proclaim the
 candidate, etc. He thus directly recognises the right and title of the
 foreign residents to express their foreign residents to express their opinion and employ their influence, so far as is in their power in the election of the President who is to preside over destinies and interests which they share with the natives of the country. He recognises that the President of the Republic has to govern in the interests not of a circle nor even of a party, but the these of the active Republic that the two factors is practically one

and the same, each prospering and each suffering with the other. This is not only the absolute truth, but it is a broad and states manlike view which does Sr. Cues-tas great credit and for which we give him high honor. The admission is all the more welcome because it is rare, and because it is in direct contrast with the narrow policy of his predecessors, a policy which no one can say has been conducive to the national advancement.

Sr Cuestas, by his administrat ive acts, has already conquered the sympathies of the foreign commun-ity—at all events we think we may speak for those of the Englishspeaking community, which, if not the greatest in numbers, is certainly not the least important in the interests and wealth it represents. This frank declaraconfirm that sympathy, and, given form and the circumstances under which it was made, the foreign residents, notwithstanding their general reticence in poltical matters, need not hesitate in actively cooperating, to the best of their power, in the success of his candidature. He himself has dis-tinctly invited them to do so, and the profession he has made of his intention to protect their interests should give them additional sti-

A New Type of Vessel. It is stated that the Admiralty

It is stated that the Admiralty have ordered the dockyard author tites at Devonport to prepare the designs for an entirely new type of vessel. It seems rather strange that the Devonport Dockyard authorities should be asked to prepare designs, a business which is supposed as a rule to devolve upon the constructive department. upon the constructive department of the Admiralty. 


