The management of a State requires honesty and morality just as much as the management of a house of business, even more so, and there can be no real prosperity or progress without them. The man who robs in a public office is just as much a thief and a criminal as the man who robs a bank or picks a pocket, and is just as little entitled to be called an honorable man or to admittance into selfrespecting society -Even worse than the above is the report in the Diario of Buenos Aires, which refers to Dr. Herrera as having chonorable antecedents and sacrifices for institutional lib-erty.» This is simply astound-ing. We have watched Dr. Her rera's career closely for over due time, we presume, we shall see it here and if is as good as last it nothing but corruption intrigue, falsehood, fraud and everyling that is dishonorable, whilst no man living has done more to debauch and injure the institutions of his country, reducing them to anarchy.
