no novelty in the administrative removal of citizens who cause continual conspiracy and agitation. Even model governments have had recourse to it in defence of society. In 1887 Sr. Herrera himself as chief Minister of the Tajes Government, drew up and signed a Message to the Chambers in which he solicited banishment for a Senator then about to return from Europe (Santos). In this Message, Sr. Herrera said that the presence of the said Senator had become incompatible with peace and tranquility and it was therefore the duty of the public Powers to adopt all measures necessary for the defence of national interests. What Sr. Herrera said of that Senator and ex-president in 1887, may be said today of the Senator and ex-president Herrera, namely, that his presence in the country is incompatible with the tranquility and interior peace of the State. Sr. Herrera refused his vote to the Convention of Peace last September; according to him the war should continue and the blood of Uruguayans be shed without object. Repeating Sr. Herrera's own words, it may be asserted that he is a permanent centre of conspiracy and of plots against public order, as is shown by his maintenance of armed groups, keeping the police in continual agitation and frightening his neighbours from their residences. The Government has not asked for a law of exile against Srs. Herrera, Aguirre and Brian, because it is not its intention to keep them out of the country, in definitely, but the Executive deems their temporary removal convenient until public feeling has calmed down. The Executive cannot terminate this Message without giving you the assurance that it is determined to maintain order and peace, the welfare of nations, whatever the difficulties that may arise.—J. L. CUESTAS.—E. M. Eichen

POLITICAL NOTES.
The resignation of Dr. Campisteguy as Minister of Finance is confirmed, and has caused general regret, as he was regarded as one of the strong elements of the Cabinet. It was presented on Thursday afternoon. The exact reasons are not yet public, but it is attributed to his desire to see Sr. Cuestas assume a more vigorous policy. Indeed, according to one contemporary, Dr. Campisteguy only put his name to the Decree banishing Dr. Herrera etc., on condition that Sr. Cuestas would follow it up by declaring the dissolution of the Chambers and as this has not been done, he has retired.

The vacant portfolio has been offered to Dr. Martin C. Martinez, whom editor of the *Siglo* and an authoritative writer on financial questions. His name has been well received on all sides. So far however, he has not given a definite reply, and it is said that he also hesitates to enter the Cabinet unless a provisional Government is declared. We believe that the matter will be left open until Monday next.

Writing later we learn that Sr. Cuestas will send a reply to the Permanent Commission sustaining the legality of his action in deporting Drs. Herrera, Aguirre and Brian.

The Representatives were cited for Thursday but no quorumed once more. The few present passed a note of condolence for the death of their colleague Deputy Turrene.

The chaos in the political situation continues, and no one sees light. The leading papers all urge the Government in the strongest terms to adopt a definite and more energetic attitude and thus put an end to the present doubts and fears which are paralysing the economical situation. The *Siglo* says:—"Unfortunately this lesson (banishment) though it may be profitable in the future cannot have immediate results. Banishment, as a measure of government, is one of the most unfortunate. Whilst every one is clamouring for a solution, it is no solution at all, and meanwhile, like everything abnormal, it only intensifies the popular agitations. Sr. Cuestas should define his course. At present his declarations and his acts are not consistent. He constantly speaks of respecting what has come to be called a legality of convention, yet tolerates insulting manifestations against the Chambers. He professes respect for the legislators, yet banishes a senator and a deputy. Thus the firmest spirit begins to vacillate. It is impossible to form any logical conclusion from the plan he is pursuing. Thus there can be neither confidence nor tranquility, whilst no one can foresee from one day to another what new surprise is in store. Time passes and is being wasted for all except those who assemble in the plazas to make politics. Work is almost at a standstill. Even the march of the Government suffers and the springs of administration are relaxed. A solution must be given to the tremendous crisis in which we find ourselves. The fortunes of the country are at stake, and solving a game is only of advantage to its enemies. If catastrophe ensues, it will fall once more into the clutches of the 'collectivity,' if the hopes of putting an end once for all to this oligarchy which has as many lives as a cat are defeated, the responsibility will fall purely and simply on those who will not see the danger. The people have done all they can do."

Rumors, we need hardly say, continue to be prolific. Sr. Cuestas is said to have become reconciled with Sr. Duncan Stewart, Vice president of the Senate. He is also said to have made explicit declarations to some of the legislators that he will not, under any circumstances, consent to the declaration of the Chambers. Also, to have dissuaded his legislative supporters from a joint resignation of their seats. Rumors are also very current of a complete reformation of the Cabinet, and even of the resignation of Sr. Cuestas himself (his would at once replace the "herreristas" in complete power and probably be the signal for a general revolution.) Also of several individual parliamentary resignations of some importance. Both the "blanco" and the "constitucional" Committees have decided on an attitude of suspense, which is not without its significance. In fact, chaos continues.

A rumor which we are very glad to say is not true, was that of the resignation of Sr. Dominguez as the Prefect of the Capital.

Col. Casciani has been restored to his post as presidential aide de camp.

A note has been published from the Minister of Government ordering the Prefect to prohibit all street manifestations of an extempore and therefore illegal character. Some amusement

has been caused because the note says "until further notice."
The Customs Receipts for November are about \$370,000, a poor enough figure, but still above those of the same month last year. Business, which revived a little in September and October, fell back very much in November, and is now almost as bad as in the worst days of the revolution.

Railway Excursion.
We quote from the *B. A. Herald* of Thursday.—
Mr. Barrow, General Manager of the Southern Railway left last evening in a special train for the Nequeun Extension with the local committee and a small party of gentlemen on an inspection trip. The party consisted of Mr. Barrow, General Manager, and Messrs. Crane and Krabbé of the local committee; Mr. Thurburn, Manager of the London and River Plate Bank; Mr. Henderson General Manager of the Central Uruguay Railway; Mr. Fair, son and representative of the Vice President of the Railway Company, Mr. John Fair; Mr. E. T. Mullall of the *Standard*; Mr. Edge of the *River Plate Review*; Mr. Tetley, Mr. Barry and Mr. Malusen Constructing Engineer of the Nequeun Extension, and Mr. Lowe of the *Herald*. The special train was made up of three sleeping and one saloon dining-coach, all new coaches, and quite the finest in the country. The sleeping coaches were of the new model adopted by the Southern, consisting entirely of compartments large and small, with lavatories in each, elegantly but plainly finished, affording comfort and privacy to the traveller and incomparably better than those of the old style. The dining coach is from the works of the company and a most elegant coach it is, as travellers to Mar del Plata will have an opportunity of knowing. It is finished in Argentine mahogany, upholstered in morocco, and altogether a most comfortable and luxurious dining coach with all possible conveniences for kitchen and service. The party left at 6:55 p. m. and will return on Saturday morning.

the Uruguayan situation. The *Herald* and *Standard* start on the assumptions that Sr. Cuestas has declared himself dictator and dissolved the Chambers, that ex-president General Tajes is among the exiled and that there have been wholesale arrests of the "herreristas." As our readers know, none of these assumptions are true—more's the pity, we might add—so the conclusions of their articles cannot be allowed much weight. The *Times of Argentina* shows a more accurate knowledge of actual events, but, like everyone else including ourselves, is quite befogged as to the future.

The following is the *Herald's* plain spoken opinion of the "dis-tinguished" exile Dr. Herrera and his creatures in the Chambers.—
"It is impossible to have any sympathy for Herrera or his bastard Congress, which was placed there to do his bidding, and had no more right there than Cuestas has to send them about their business; but it is satisfactory to know that nothing can be worse for the country than to remain under the influence of Herrera and his gang. There is no man living or dead who has done more to ruin the country than Herrera; for it has had few men so clever as he, and not one so utterly without principle, conscience, or patriotism. All the ills which Borda brought on the country, and which his death did not cancel are due to Herrera for he has been the Mephistopheles of Uruguay and with sardonic cleverness has planned for the evil that has come, and apparently for the sake of an innate love of doing things evil. That he is out for the good of the country, and if he is so far undone as to be harmless for the future, it will be well."

The *Standard* after an unfavorable summary of the governments of Santos, Tajes, Herrera and Borda, says:—"Each administration, marked by rebellion and stained by bloodshed, may be considered as preparing the way for the dictatorship that now rises upon Uruguay, hailed by the exasperated people as a sign of redemption, as an indication that the corner will now be turned, as a necessary transition from a period of terrible blundering and national misery to one of reform and generation—as if indeed things in Uruguay had arrived at such a pitch that any change must be one for the better, and the thirsting of a people for freedom and tranquillity finds expression in the hoarse utterance "Viva la Dictadura!"

We are requested to announce that the handsome album presented by Mr. G. Schwengel on the occasion of the Diamond Jubilee Commemoration, has by the kindness of Mr. W. Adams, been placed on view in the Botica Inglesa, where it is open for the signature of all British subjects who have not yet signed it, but who, it is hoped, will now take the opportunity of doing so.

The death occurred on Thursday night, suddenly, of Col. Lopez Bolani, for many years a principal officer of the Marine Commandancy.

The "Perseo" arrived yesterday, beating the record by making the voyage from Genoa in 17 days.

Telegrams announce a renewal of the storms in the Channel. Traffic between Dover and Calais is suspended. At Margate a lifeboat upset and the crew of twelve were drowned.

It is telegraphed from Chicago that Mr. Studebaker, of New York and Boston and head of the recent American Commercial Commission to South America, died suddenly on Wednesday.

The monthly issue of the *St. Andrew's Gazette* has been delayed to make room for reports of the St. Andrew's banquets.

The Duchess of York, who remains in fairly good health, has intimated that she will, as far as she can, fulfil the part her mother, the late Duchess of Teck played in connection with benevolent and charitable enterprise.

The U. S. S. "Cincinnati," is now in Buenos Aires port.

Frank Brown's Circus Company for the new season will reach the River Plate in a few days. In due time, we presume, we shall see it here and if as good as last year's, we shall be quite satisfied.

At a meeting held in London recently under the auspices of the Humanitarian League the well-known humanitarian agitator Miss Gregg spoke of the steamers used for transporting animals from Argentina as not being properly fitted for the purpose, and favoured the prosecution of those responsible at the first opportune moment.

THE PERMANENT COMMISSION.

THE GOVERNMENT CENSURED.

The following is the substance of the Message passed by the Executive to the Permanent Commission in reference to recent political measures.—
The Executive, in compliance with constitutional precept, forwards you a copy of the Decree of Nov 30 relative to temporary removal from the country of Sres. J. Herrera, M. Aguirre and A. Brian, as decided upon in Cabinet Council, in accord with Art. 81 of the Constitution, which authorises the Executive to take prompt measures of security in serious cases of internal commotion, giving account of the same. The sanguinary events of Nov. 28, at the cry of "Viva Herrera" initiated by a group of ruffians who assaulted the column pacifically marching in Calle 18 de Julio to manifest before the President, alone justify the resolution adopted. It to these events is added the formation of armed bands maintained by Sr. Herrera in his house in considerable number principally composed of men recruited from the gambling dens and low haunts of the city and whose names are known to the Government, as proved by police reports and by references of the Sr. Herrera in his letter to the Minister of War, it is evident that the said attack may well be related to the unauthorised formation of such bands. Sr. Herrera has found himself chased and hooted by aggressive popular manifestations in the streets and has had to appeal for police protection in his house. All this is of public notoriety. The victims of the aggression of the 28th are numerous, and more families than one claim justice against the assassins. The authorities are now occupied in discovering the true origin and name of the authors of these offences.—As regards Sr. Aguirre, apart from his anarchising tendencies as an active political agitator, he has been detected in attempts to subvert the superior authorities, offering them emoluments and foreign legations to lend themselves to plots against present order. (It is said that Sr. Aguirre offered the Prefect Sr. Dominguez the Legation in England as a bribe to betray the Government.) The Government knowing this, and without prejudice to the loyalty of its subordinates, has thought it well to remove from the country a citizen whose acts thus show him dangerous to public tranquillity. Dr. Brian, President of the Municipality, vexed with the Government on account of its acts of good administration which had initiated a searching investigation into the accounts of the Board, had been actively proclaiming to the many employees of the Department, the convenience of conspiring against a Government that interferred in Municipal matters. Nor did he limit himself to a subversive propaganda, for his name is implicated with the armed group of Herrera, and it is known that he worked with elements to aggravate the situation.—There is

LONDON NOTES

FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 5.

Polling in the Middleton Division took place yesterday to fill the vacancy in the representation caused by the death of Mr. T. Fielden. The result was a remarkable victory for Alderman Duckworth, the Liberal candidate, a Tory majority of 865 being converted into a minority of 300.

Mr. Balfour, speaking at Norwich last night, said a heavy responsibility rested upon those who had urged Greece into a contest with Turkey. He rightly gauged events which had taken place upon the north-west frontier of India, they had a connection not remote or indirect with the victory of the Turk over the Greek, of the Mussulman over the Christian.

Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, the principal speaker at the Cutlers' Feast at Sheffield last night, urged the importance of maintaining, and by all means extending the Empire. Not the lust of territory, but the pure instinct of self-preservation justified the policy.

Mr. Chamberlain, addressing a meeting at St. Andrew's, Glasgow, complained that the Opposition had no policy. He complimented Lord Salisbury on a great and magnificent feat in reference to Greece, and claimed that in the Sudan and East Africa the Government had intervened to prevent outrages infinitely worse than those of Armenia.

The Bulawayo Railway was formally opened by Sir Alfred Milner, the High Commissioner, yesterday.

On behalf of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children, an afternoon party was given by the Lady Mayress at the Mansion House yesterday to children who are members of the League of Pity an organization founded to interest the children of the rich in the children of the poor.

Yesterday the Employers' Federation and the Amalgamated Society of Engineers received a new draft basis of conference from Mr. Ritchie. A meeting of the Employers' Executive has been called for to-day in Manchester to consider the proposal. In well informed circles a feeling now prevails that the conference is with in measurable distance of accomplishment.

Sir Francis Jeune, in the Divorce Division yesterday, commenced the hearing of a suit in which Mrs. Mildred Blanche Bailey sought a divorce by reason of the alleged misconduct of her husband, Dr. Robert Greenock Bailey, in practice at Stroud Green. The adultery alleged was with Mrs. Dado, wife of a solicitor, and Mrs. Hadden, another married lady, both of whom had intervened. Answers were filed denying the charge by all the accused parties.

In Lambeth County Court yesterday Mr. G. Lumsden sued Mr. H. E. Burnett, Queen's Tax collector, to recover damages for trespass and wrongful seizure and removal of goods. It was claimed on behalf of the defendant that a collector had a right to levy a distress immediately after the delivery of a demand note; that plaintiff was bound by the unauthorised signature of his daughter (aged fourteen); and that costs for a man in possession could be recovered, even though a man had not actually been in possession.
