form as the line regiments. The Chief of these battalions shall open a register for the citizens thus volunteering, publishing invitations to that effect in the press, and when the required number is received shall give account to the General Staff, which shall then take steps for organization, drill, etc.

The above Decree is signed by President Cuestas and the five Ministers, General G. Castro, Mr. E. MacEachon, Dr. Salterain, Dr. J. R. Mendoza and Dr. J. A. Varela.

Another Decree appoints the citizens Mario R. Perez, José Batlle y Ordoñez, Dr. J. Campisteguy and Pedro Carve as Chiefs of the 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th battalions in their respective order, these Chiefs to propose to the General Staff their subordinate officers.

It is expected that the 2nd Chiefs and military instructors of the battalions will be Capt. Schweitzer and Majors Luis Fabregat, Buzon and Juan T. Iribar respectively, whilst a number of well-known names are already mentioned for the subordinate posts.

It has been decided that the National Guard shall wear a simple and inexpensive uniform of grey duck with blue facings and kepis. The contract for making these has already been placed—we cannot say with what firms, but we presume not Portera and Co.—there being no time to call for tenders.

Fernandez has been named Adjutant to the new Minister of War.

Issue of the Treasury Certificates corresponding to the local obligations for December commenced yesterday. Conversion of the Certificates for March is proceeding.

**SUNDRIES**  
—In our yearly retrospect for 1897, published in our issue of January 1, 1897, written before the present legislators had taken their seats, we said:—"The destinies of the Republic will be entirely unsafe in the hands of such a Chamber, apart from its unrepresentative character, and so much so is this recognised on all sides that it is publicly proclaimed that the annulment of the elections, even if the Republic is thereby placed in an unconstitutional situation for a period, is an absolute necessity in public interests." These words are worth recalling as showing how plainly the trouble with the present Chambers was foreseen even before they became a "constituted power."

—Our transatlantic contemporary the Southern Cross has now commenced its 24th year, and celebrates the occasion by appearing in new type and an extended form, covering in fact 20 pages. Apart from its special ground as organ of the Irish Catholics in the Plate, the Southern Cross has more pretensions to be considered a literary and family journal than any other paper published in the Plate, it always contains a large quantity of well-selected general reading matter, whilst the spirited and witty contributions of Mr. W. Bulfin («Che Buono») who is now proprietor as well as editor, are alone sufficient to secure it sale and circulation. We give our contemporary our heartiest congratulations and «many happy returns of the day».

—Argentine justice has thought six years' imprisonment sufficient for the assassin Queiroga, who shot dead his doctor for being late in making his call. As is general in the case in the River Plate, murder is no crime, or only a trivial one.

—WANTED, urgently, «one strong man in a blatant land.» Apply Republic of Uruguay.

—Pneumatic tyre fire engines are now being adopted in the States, and one of the first trials of the same was a complete success. Most of the principal American towns are interlined with railway tracks, causing severe jolting to ordinary wheeled vehicles; but in this instance the firemen, instead of experiencing the usual terrific jolting, found that the wagon glided quite easily over the tracks. The tyres fitted were ordinary Dunlop carriage tyres.

—The Argentine Government is said to be hankering after a new battleship. More probably some Argentine official is hankering after a new commission.

—Sir Vincent Barrington, who will be remembered in the River Plate, amongst other things, by having founded the St. John's Ambulance Society, is coming out again as a principal member of the British Commercial Commission, at least so we imagine from an absurd telegram which mixes things up completely and attributes his appointment to Washington!

—Mr. Ronald Bridget the veteran and very popular British Consul in Buenos Aires, is off for a six months' holiday.

—We read in a London exchange:—A German is advertising for a prescription for the manufacture of genuine Worcestershire sauce, price to be stated for the recipe. «Genuine Worcestershire sauce» bearing the made-in-Germany label, is a little too funny!

—Norwegian seamen, it appears, are now entitled to vote before leaving their country if the polling day is within three months of their departure; or they can vote at a foreign port within the same time by having their votes registered and sent home through a notary, if they are not on board a Norwegian ship. If on board a Norwegian ship where there are not less than four of the crew entitled to vote, then the captain and two of them are to administer the polling. It is not absolutely necessary to vote for named persons. Votes may be given for Liberal or Conservative candidates. Seamen who would vote must provide themselves with a proxy form, to be obtained from a Registrar of Voters in Norway.

—Sir Norman Lockyer's eclipse party has sailed for Colombo, to observe the total solar eclipse of January 21, 1898, and event which is exciting no inconsiderable amount of interest in the astronomical world. The Rev. J. M. Bacon one of the members of the British Astronomical Association, who is also going out to India to observe the eclipse, takes with him a powerful cinematograph camera, which will produce five or six photographs a second. His instrument if only it works satisfactorily, will give the most complete series of simulacra ever produced of the corona surrounding the sun, which should help to settle whether changes take place in the appearance of the corona during the brief moments of eclipse.

—During the voyage of the river steamer «Comercio» from Buenos Aires, an Englishman named J. P. (or B.) Pearson, aged 34, tried to commit suicide. About 3 a. m. on Sunday morning he asked the Captain for a revolver «in order to kill himself.» a request which was naturally refused. He then made an equally ineffectual attempt to obtain poison, and finally tried to throw himself overboard, having to be held back by several men. On his arrival here he was handed under arrest to the Port authorities, by whom he is still detained. From the account of his proceedings it is to be doubted if he is in his right wits. We believe that at one time he was employed in the British (or the English) Bank in Buenos Aires but left on inheriting a fortune, since when he has been without fixed occupation.

—A horrible accident, for which however no one can be blamed, occurred yesterday morning on the Central Railway line at Kilometer 6, between Sayago and Paso Molino. A man named Pedro Martinez, living at Minas 82, had been to visit a relative in the neighbourhood, and was walking alongside the line, which is level with the road, when the Pando train approached. He had his four children with him, two girls and two boys, and on the approach of the train called them to his side, taking the hand of the youngest, a boy of five. However, the children got frightened, and in the confusion the little lad broke away from his father's hand and ran right in front of the train. The poor little fellow was caught and hurled aside by the cow catcher, which broke his skull and otherwise injured him horribly. The train was stopped at once, and Dr. Edey, who was on board gave what assistance he could, but the lad was fearfully injured, and in a few minutes died in his father's arms, many of the passengers being witnesses of the painful scene.

—General Weyer kindly prophesied that a grave conflict is imminent between Spain and the United States. Probably the wish is father to the thought for the General and his friends seem to be doing their best to provoke it.

—Mrs. Maud Booth, wife of Commander Ballington Booth, of the Salvation Army, has just been ordained in America. The ceremony was conducted by ministers of different denominations as follows: Rev. Dr. MacArthur, of the Baptist denomination; Rev. Dr. Amory H. Bradford, of the Congregationalists; Rev. Dr. Gregg of the Presbyterians; and Rev. Dr. Josiah Strong, of the Evangelical Alliance. Mrs. Booth is «minister of the Church of God in general» and has the «power of performing ministerial functions» including the administration of the sacraments and the marriage ceremony. There are over 200 women in N. America who have been regularly ordained as ministers, besides nearly three times as many evangelists and lay preachers, the Church of the Disciples having no fewer than 46 of its regular

ministers women, the Universalist Church 40 the Free Will Baptists 38, the Unitarians 24, the Congregationalists 23, the United Brethren of Christ 21, and the Protestant Methodist Church 8, while Mrs. Solomons has recently officiated as Rabbat at the Sinai Temple, Chicago, so well known in connection with the liberal Jewish movement. If England were America we should be looking forward in the near future to hearing a woman from the pulpit of St. Paul's.

—We need hardly say that the promised sports of the C.U.R.C.C. at Peñarol on Sunday had to be suspended on account of the violent storm which broke about noon and continued for some three hours. They will be held next Sunday instead.

—It is telegraphed as almost certain that General Vannowski will quit his post as Russian Minister of War and be succeeded by General Chroucheff.

—The China question seems simmuring down, at all events the telegrams have very little to say about it for the last two or three days.

—Despite the stormy weather, the Spanish Fêtes were brought to an animated close on Sunday evening, and, for once, without incident of importance. We must, however, take objection to the group of infatuated Spaniards who paraded the streets of the city between 4 and 5 a. m. yesterday morning, playing the bagpipes and tambourines with all their might, and waking up everyone in the neighbourhood. Why the police did not stop them, we cannot understand, but lately it would seem that anyone can make any amount of noise in the streets at any hour of the night or morning without the police taking any notice, and consequently no one can even call the hours of slumber their own. In more civilised cities these barbaric noises at unearthly hours are prohibited, and we wish they were here.

—The Cavalli Company will give one more farewell performance at the Cibi's Theatre this evening, the programme consisting of «El Matrimonio del Sr. Pistagfa» and «El Medico del Signor».

—News has been received from Tacuarembó of the suicide of Sr. Manuel Menendez, a well-known resident of that Department.

During the recent civil war the National Guard of the Departments of the interior were mobilised and took more or less active part in the campaign thus receiving sufficient military instruction for the present. The Government has reason to believe that many citizens are anxious to receive military instruction, and although the enrolment of the Guard was ordained by the previous administration, the operation was not carried out in proper form owing to the state of war and the absence of many citizens from the country. The form in which drill practice of the National Guard is carried out will be of no prejudice to the citizens in their occupations or interests, as it will only be on Sundays and holidays, for three months.

The Articles of the Decree are substantially the same as those issued by the late Government, and may be summarised as follows:—

The register for enrolment of the National Guard of the Capital shall be opened, the inscription to be made before the police commissaries of the respective sections, within a term of 20 days, each citizen inscribed receiving an enrolment ticket, and the list of inscriptions being forwarded to the corresponding authorities. A special meeting of the Hospital Saturday Fund was held on Saturday evening, when it was resolved to discontinue the street collections on Hospital Saturday.

Results of the engineers' ballot already to hand show a majority in the proportion of 138 to 1 against accepting the employers' proposals. This morning the terms of a speech recently addressed by Col. Dyer to the Manchester employers are published.

The cricket match at Sydney, between England and Australia, was again postponed on Saturday owing to rain. It is stated that Prince Ranjitsinhji is now determined to play.

In the Football League Championship on Saturday the Sheffield United Club met with their first defeat in the competition of the season, Stoke a comparatively outside team—beating them by two goals to one.
