THE REBELLION OF THE "COLLECTIVITY."

Five Senators, thirty-seven Deputies, twelve Generals, six Colonels and various civilians have signed and published a Protest which is in effect nothing more or less than a Declaration of Rebellion against the people and the President elect of the people, for in this document they ignore the choice already made by the people of a future President, they deny the right of the people and of the partisans of the party to which they themselves pretend to belong to express their wishes in the presidential question, and they claim that that question has already been finally decided, without reference to public opinion and directly contrary to it, by the majority of an Assembly which on account of the gross impurity of its origin, has not the right to pronounce either in the name of the country or of any of the political parties of the country. It represents nothing whatever except a dead man and a condemned policy.

We call this Protest a Declaration of Rebellion and we think the term fully justified, for it seeks to deprive the people of the sovereignty vested in them by Article 4 of the Constitution; it ignores the first principles of representative constitutional Government and it seeks to confide the destinies of the Republic to the decision of a handful of men without any claim to the positions they occupy, unrepresentative either of people or party, mistrusted by everyone, impure in origin and record, and repudiated throughout the length and breadth of the Republic by natives and for signers alike. Under the monstrous and untenable pretence that the present Chambers represent the country and the "colorado" party a pretence insulting to both—under cover of this absurd convention of legality, the Protest seeks to perpetuate electoral fraud and corruption, to maintain an impure and unconstitutional situation that vitiates the authority of all the public Powers, and to keep the Republic under the domination of a corrupt, disastrous and accursed oligarchy; in short to make it subject to a tyrannous dictatorship of the worst and most offensive kind. And yet the men who are seeking to establish this pernicious permanent dictatorship are amongst the loudest in their outcries against a temporary popular dictatorship necessary for the purpose of purging the Republic of the results of electoral fraud and restoring constitutional and representative government. Under such circumstances, what faith can be reposed in the sincerity of their professions of respect for the Constitution and of their professions of liberty and honor? None whatever.

It cannot be denied that the Protest bears some names—twelve or fifteen at the most entitled to public respect and confidence, and it is truly lamentable to see these names attached to such a document and in such unequivocally bad company. In these cases, we must imagine that the owners of the names have been led astray by the strength of partisan feeling, and have been induced to place the interests of party or of faction above those of the country and of political morality. This is nothing uncommon, especially in this part of the world,

where partisanship is based far more on tradition or prejudice than on political principles.

Discounting these few respectable names, the rest of the signatories speak for themselves, and here we see revealed in all their nakedness those members of the "collectivity" which the Republic has so much reason to dread, to hate and to mistrust. Here we find Dr. Julio Herrera, the most corrupt, false and dangerous man of the generation, a man who has brought incalculable disaster on the Republic, whose name is execrated by every honest man in it, and whose offences should long ago have placed him in permanent exile, in prison or elsewhere. The mere presence of his name on the document is pollution to the few honest men that have signed it. Here are his followers, who have supported him and aided him in every imaginable iniquity, immorality and corruption, and whose perversion—we might with truth say whose moral insanity—is so great that they openly measure his political genius by his unlimited capacity for falsehood and sophism, and speak of him as an eminent statesman when everyone else would say eminent rascal. Here are legislators owing their diplomas to the fraudulent manipulations of Herrera and Bordaberry without a single claim to political and hardy to personal respect who have neither political conscience or capacity and who judge all matters from the point of view of their exorbitant legislative salaries. Here are military men whose rank has been gained not in honorable defence of their country, but by the support of bad governments and by their oppression of the people. They are very faithful indeed in support of such governments as those of Santos or Idiarte Borda, governments that were a disaster to the country and that deserved to be overthrown, but when a popular and reactionary government arises, offering horizons of hope and progress to the Republic, then they are found on the other side. Such officers are the persecutors and oppressors not the defenders of their country.

In short, here is the "collectivity," that disastrous body which for over twenty years has abominably misgoverned the country, overburdening it with debt far which there is nothing to show, obstructing its progress by oppressive taxes levied to meet their extravagances and robberies, discrediting its name at home and abroad, defrauding the people of their electoral and political rights, making a mockery of law and Constitution, debauching every public institution in pursuit of their selfish ends, provoking national bankruptcy in 1890 and revolution in 1897. This, in a few words, in the record of the "collectivity" who form the large majority of the signatories to the Protest, and these are the men who now proclaim themselves in rebellion against the people, at the same time hypocritically appealing to the "glorious traditions" of their party.

These discredited men claim to represent the "colorado" party. It is not for us to say how far that claim is true but we do say that if such men constitute the "colorado" party, then the sooner that party is wiped out of existence and utterly exterminated, the better for the progress, welfare and credit of the Republic, for, judging from its works whilst in power since the time of Latorre, it has been nothing but an unmitigated curse to the Republic. A party with such a record cannot be called a party, it is a gang of brigands. — But we know the claim is false; we know that there are honest and respectable men in the "colorado" party such as those now surrounding Sr. Cuestas, and these, when they have sufficient energy, should rise up and publicly and indignantly repudiate and expel from their midst such men as Dr. Julio Herrera and his followers, who would disgrace and discredit any party, and not a few of whom ought to be explaining their offences in prison.

The "collectivity" as we have said, are in rebellion. They openly defy the will of the people and of the rest of the "colorado" party, and they proclaim their intention to resume exclusive control of the public destinies with which they have already played such havoc. They even threaten violence for this end, by believing they can obtain military support—which, in truth, in South America is far more easily found on the side of bad government than of the people. There should be no hesitation in accepting the challenge. The cause of the people and of Sr. Cuestas' government is equally against them, and there should be no hesitation in employing any weapons even their own against them. They have oppressed and dictated to the people long enough, they have long let them feel a little oppression in their own turn, they have too long defied law and Constitution to claim their protection

now, and least of all when they issue a rebellious proclamation. Let Sr. Cuestas for once summon up the necessary energy to save the Republic from the evils and ruin they foretell. Let him imprison them or banish them let him take a dozen of their leaders, have them tried by court-martial or by a convention of citizens and publicly shot in the plaza, let him dissolve the Chambers and call the people to new elections, even let him decimate the Chambers as was proposed by the *Vicio*, supplying the places thus occupied by the "collectivists" by men enjoying public respect and confidence, let him do any of these things, and we will regard them as justified after the open declaration made by the "collectivity" of their rebellious intentions and as greatly preferable to seeing the Republic restored to "collectivist" rule. And we think that despite his apparent reluctance, Sr. Cuestas will yet be forced to some such vigorous measures, unless, indeed, he makes an entirely disgraceful and ignominious submission. But he should lose no more time in making up his mind, for on his decision rests the fate of the Republic, perhaps for another ten years—we will not say longer, for ten years more of rule by the "collectivity" would suffice to obliterate Uruguay from the list of independent nations.

POLITICAL NOTES.

The discussion in detail of the Electoral Reform Bills should have commenced on Tuesday, but the noble Representatives once more postponed giving another example of their reluctance to comply with this principal clause of the peace compact. It is quite certain now that the reform will make no progress until after the presidential election, and if that goes unfavorably, we shall not be surprised to see it shelved entirely until the "blancos" are provoked to another revolution.

There is wonderfully little report from the political world, which at present consists of wretched cry and little wool. There are rumors of the appearance of further manifestos, which it will be sufficient to notice when they do appear. The "cuestistas" have resolved not to publish a counterblast to the "collectivist" protest, and they have also rejected a proposition of Sr. Lerra to proclaim support of the legitimacy of the Chambers the idea of the majority being to stand by Sr. Cuestas in any contingency of the struggle.

The *Siglo* comments caustically, and not without reason, on the appearance of the signature of Dr. J. M. Muñoz, President of the Bank of the Republic, to the "collectivist" Protest, whilst it is not long since he issued an order forbidding the employees of the Bank from taking any public part in politics.

Another "collectivist" paper appeared yesterday, "La Republica" edited by Sr. Enrique Kubly y Arriaga. Sr. Kubly is a clever and facile writer but as no one and least of all he himself, takes him in the least seriously, his paper is not likely to attain much influence. It is scarcely necessary to say that his position is based on the untenable theory of the sovereignty of the Chambers, conveniently overlooking their impure origin, base constitution and bad record three factors which put together would be sufficient to condemn any Chambers whatever and deprive them of the right to control public destinies.

CONSULAR REPORT.

(Continued from our last.)
Great Britain holds the prominent position in the exports than she does in the imports, for out of a total of 5,431,911 she has contributed no less than 1,543,377, or 28 per cent. of the whole.

The most formidable European rival that Great Britain has in the import trade is Germany which imports 587,1681. France comes next with 529,7411, then Italy with 485,8161. Argentina imported goods to the value of 719,7331, but it should be borne in mind that they consisted chiefly of articles in transit for Montevideo.

Great Britain holds a less prominent position in the exports than she does in the imports, for out of a total of 6,163,7101, she takes but 421,9881, principally in horns, dried hides, wool, extract of beef, and wheat. Brazil is first on the list with 1,511,7111, and takes cattle, sheep, horses, mules, "charque" (dried salted meat), grain and flour; Belgium comes next with 1,141,2231, mostly in horns, salted hides, sheepskins,

wool, wheat; Argentina comes next with 1,041,5251. I may here remark that the latter country is a buyer of the products of Uruguay for reshipment to Brazil and Europe. Germany follows with 527,6411. Great Britain coming next.

Taxation and duties must be put down as the cause of the decrease in exports but another serious one was the unsettled state of the political atmosphere which began to make itself felt early in 1896, and which eventually broke out in an attempted revolutionary rising in the month of October of the same year.

This was quelled by the Government troops without much difficulty. A more serious and formidable one broke out a few months later however, which has lasted far into 1897.

Besides the above, another serious cause may be attributed to the serious plague of locusts that has infested the greater part of the country, ravaging the crops and causing widespread damage to agricultural interests.

For the sake of comparison I have given the customs revenue of Uruguay for the last eight years, viz., for the years 1889-96. The year 1889, it must be borne in mind, was exceptionally prosperous, which was followed shortly afterwards by a reaction, and there was a steady decline in the custom-house receipts up to the year 1892. After this period things began to improve and a gradual increase is visible up to the year 1896. A fair having then assumed an unsettled state, a marked decline in the custom-house receipts was the result.

The balance of trade it appears in favour of the country according to the totals given for the last five years. This would justify the current opinion of those best able to judge, that there is no lack of capital in Uruguay ready to be employed as soon as a favourable opportunity offers.

Heavy taxation and high custom dues have, by raising the value of goods and all imported articles considerably reduced the purchasing power of money in this country, hence the reduced consumption by the inhabitants of all foreign merchandise that is introduced into the Republic. Imported articles of the first necessity, it may be noted, cost three or four times their original value in Europe before they reach the ordinary buyer's hands, and living generally is exceedingly costly in this country specially in the towns.

Much has been said of want of enterprise and the proper study of the markets wherein the British merchant has his dealings, but I can hardly think such an accusation ought to be brought with justice against those who carry on business and represent British commerce in Uruguay. The large percentage of the whole import trade of the country would be sufficient to refute such a charge on the face of it. It would be well to bear in mind that the competition which British commerce has to struggle against at present is much greater now than it was some years ago. Formerly the Italians were not so numerous as they are at present (forming, perhaps, half the population of Uruguay), nor were there any mercantile houses of importance as there are now, which supply the wants of their fellow countrymen as well as those of the native population with certain cheap articles which the British merchant probably finds a difficulty in providing. Germany closely studies the market and imitates what she thinks she can sell under the name of British made goods, although of an inferior quality and price.

The imports are divided, into eight classes. I have given the totals of the imports for the year 1895-96 for the sake of comparison. A small increase for the year under consideration is observable.

SUNDRIES

—Today being the 33th birthday of the Emperor of Germany, the German Consul will receive his compatriots from 3 to 5 p. m.

—Though we have not received the official report, it may be regarded as certain that the suffrage of Tuesday night has completed the work of destruction of the unfortunate steamer "Jupiter." There has been quite an epidemic of crimes of violence in the last few days. Yesterday morning the list was increased by a serious stabbing affray between two peones in the *barraca* of Sr. Garcia Grano Caiguá 227. The victim Canoado had his stomach ripped completely open and is not expected to survive. His assailant, named Enrique Trillo, fled and has not yet been taken by the police. There were also more than the usual number of minor cases.

—The affair of the Pantanoso still remains a mystery. The police have not been able to trace the recent movements or lodgings of the victim Negri. They have ascertained, however, that although in humble circumstances he had some \$200 or \$300 of savings, and that is sufficient to supply a motive for his murder. It is believed that his body had been brought from some distance and placed on the railway line in the hope that it would be mutilated by a passing train and the death attributed to accident, but his assassins forgot to remove the cord that throttled him.

—The R. M. S. "Thames" is expected tomorrow morning, bringing London dates to about the 8th instant, and will sail homeward bound on Feb. 5th.

—The practice of carrying loaded revolvers has led to another disgraceful crime over the water. At La Plata railway station, on Saturday while the legislators were waiting for the train, the president of the Chamber of Deputies, Sr. Saenz, in passing the ex-commissary of police, Juan F. de Elia, saluted him, but Elia did not return the salute. This led to a quarrel in which Colonel Datas and others took part, and it ended in Elia being shot twice by the commissary inspector Antonio Datas, son of the Colonel, after receiving the first shot, Elia thinking that General Manuel Campoa was about to attack dis-
