## THE COUP D'ÉTAT.

### DECLARATION OF THE PROVISIONAL GOVERNMENT.

Yesterday it became known that Sr. Cuestas, faithfully interpreting the feeling of the large majority of the Republic, had determined to put an end to the political tension and at once dissolve the Chambers, without waiting for further reply from the "collectivist" majority, and proclaim a Provisional Government. The respective Decrees were, we believe, signed in the course of the afternoon, but had not appeared at the time of writing. No doubt they will be made public to-day, if not anticipated in last night's bulletins. According to the account generally current, Sr. Cuestas would proclaim himself Provisional Governor with Mr. MacEachern as Vice-governor (a very wise and necessary precaution Dr. Mendoza as Minister of Government, Dr. Martin C. Martinez as Minister of Finance, Dr. Varela retaining the Ministry of Foment, and either General Casimiro Garcia or Sr. Dominguez as Minister of War. An Assembly of Notables constituted of the most prominent men of all parties, will be formed to exercise legislative functions. The people will be called to general elections, under reformed electoral laws, in November, and in March, 1898, the Provisional Government will come to an end and a Constitutional President be elected by the genuine representatives of the people.

Such is believed to be the programme, and if it can be carried out without serious obstacle, it is deserving of the heartiest support. As regards the Chambers we can only say that they fall amid the contempt of every honest man in the Republic, for a more unworthy body was never brought together.

In addition to the above, it is said that the new Government will make a clean sweep of the Municipality—well deserved if only for their insolence in selecting such a President of the Board as Dr. Brian—and will notify all administrative employees that they only retain their posts provisionally, awaiting complete reorganization of the administrative offices. No doubt other sweeping changes are in prospect but we cannot speak of them yet.

In our next issue we hope to give complete and authentic details, meanwhile we relate below the chief events of yesterday as known to us up to the time of writing.

Yesterday morning, at 10 a. m., there were summoned to the President's residence the Chief Officers of the garrison regiments, the Commandants of the Civic Battalions, the Prefect of Police and the Chief of the Police Battalions. When all were assembled President Cuestas appeared and addressed them, stating that the political situation of the country had been complicated by the obstinacy of the legislative majority in turning a deaf ear to the exigencies of public opinion, to such an extent that at the present moment the presidential

question had become a vital one for the country of peace or war. The triumph of the parliamentary majority meant civil war, and this was an evil necessary to avert at any cost. Referring to the financial question, he said that it was equally indispensable to prevent the public treasury again falling into the hands of those who had left it exhausted during the recent years of government. He believed that the moment had at length arrived for rapid, radical and energetic solutions, for his conciliatory spirit had been interpreted as debility. He had therefore convoked the representatives of the army to know if he could count on them to proceed at once to a coup d'état and establish a provisional government.

At the conclusion of his speech all the officers present rose to their feet and acclaimed Sr. Cuestas as a Provisional Governor. General Casimiro Garcia Chief of the Staff spoke in the name of the others and said that Sr. Cuestas could count on the swords of all present, and that the entire army approved his political action.

Almost simultaneously various companies of the National Guards marched past Sr. Cuestas' house and acclaimed him with enthusiasm. An hour later the proclamation of the Provisional Government was made in the various barracks, and was equally well received.

The news spread throughout the city soon after midday, and though we cannot say that it was received with the same open enthusiasm that it would have been ten weeks ago, it caused an undoubted feeling of satisfaction and of relief. No doubt there will be a more decided expression of feeling when the constitution of the Provisional Government is more definitely known than is the case at the time of writing. There was great animation on the Stock Exchange and a general improvement in values. Up to the present we have not heard of the slightest hint of disorder, on the contrary, the city could not be more tranquil. Tomorrow we hope to give further details. For the present, we are unable to say anything about the attitude of the "collectivists." No doubt they will be loud and vehement in their protests, but if the army is faithful to Sr. Cuestas and the people, it is impossible to imagine that the "collectivity" can make any serious resistance. If any of them give trouble, no doubt there are vacant cells in the Penitentiary.

There is nothing worth adding to what we said yesterday about the preparatory sittings of the Chambers on Wednesday. The elections of provisional Presidents and Vices and the formation of the Permanent Committees all consisting of men enjoying a minimum of public confidence, showed the "collectivity" as impotent to the last. As the Chambers are now dissolved, it is not worth while dwelling on this.

Yesterday morning the parliamentary group supporting Sr. Cuestas issued a painfully milk-and-water manifesto stating that in view of the failure of their efforts to form a majority and attain a constitutional solution of the presidential problem they had resolved to abandon the task and—to dissolve themselves as parliamentary group. No doubt they were well intentioned but they might have found a more dignified way of falling. What has become of their declarations that they were prepared to accompany Sr. Cuestas in all contingencies?

Yesterday's *Bien* laments that the idea of a transaction candidate has not been accepted, but at the same time recognises that a provisional government is the only other way out of the difficulty, the triumph of the "collectivity" being unimaginable. It says:—"The measure has and will have its opponents, but assuredly no one will be deceived by the show of independence and civic rectitude assumed by the Chambers, in order to pose as a victim it is necessary, besides being a sufferer, to have justice on one's side; and to present one self before the country as the depository of legitimacy it is first necessary to be legitimate. The Chambers are in no such case; the senators and deputies are not the legitimate representatives of the people, neither have they acted with justice in delaying, from motives of personal interest, the desires of the country. Hence the pretended civic rectitude of the Chamber cannot be interpreted as a conscientious sacrifice on behalf of an ideal or of a great cause, but is merely the obstinate resistance of sordid self-interests." This is a strong justification coming from such an organ as the *Bien*.

The *B. A. Standard* of Wednesday publishes an article on the "Situation in Uruguay" which is so false and mischievous in its appreciations that it might almost have emanated from the pen of a

member of the "collectivity." It begins by calling Sr. Cuestas "a man of weak character, false judgement and vulgar ambition." It then says that the removal of Borda "caused an glorious revolution to achieve a hollow triumph" and says that the "Blancos" were dismayed by a Decree from Sr. Cuestas! The idea of a revolutionary party laying down their arms in obedience to a decree is novel and worthy of the *Standard*. We recommend it to future Presidents who may be troubled with a revolution. After further harping on the "ambition" revealed in the administrative acts of Sr. Cuestas though most persons here regarded them as the reverse of ambitious for they opposed the parliamentary circle to which he had to look for election—the *Standard* says that it was "an error worse than a crime" not to have dissolved the Chambers in November. Perhaps the *Standard* is not aware that though he had the people behind him, he had not the military, who as usual were on the wrong side. Finally the *Standard* says:—"To declare a dictatorship at this moment is to declare civil war. The dissolved Chambers will simply meet in Mercedes, for instance, and proclaim a counter government, supported by the armament which the Blancos cunningly preserved after the revolution." This sentence betrays the *Standard's* painful ignorance of the situation. The Chambers may find some support from the military, but they certainly will find none whatever from the "blancos," who are their deadliest enemies and warm partisans of Sr. Cuestas' Government. We recommend the *Standard* to study Uruguayan affairs a little more closely before attempting to pronounce upon them. At present its ignorance—or its want of understanding—seems so great that Montevideo might be on the other side of the globe instead of a few hours' voyage across the River Plate.

The idea of holding a popular meeting in favor of dissolution of the Chambers has been abandoned as no longer necessary. It is possible, though, that a meeting may be organized to express popular support of the new Government, and we think the occasion merits it.

## THE COMMERCIAL MISSION TO CENTRAL AND SOUTH AMERICA.

(From a Correspondent to the Manchester Guardian.—Concluded from our last.)

It is no doubt quite true that impressions widely differing from the statement of facts here presented are often conveyed by the reports of British consuls. Some of these officials complain of the fewness of the representatives of British export houses, of their want of "push," of their ignorance of the language of the countries in which they work of their unwillingness to quote prices according to the currencies of foreign countries, or of their neglect of the tastes and habits of the buyers there. The only honest way of meeting assertions of this kind is to say that they have no foundation whatever. Anyone who has a wide acquaintance with the methods and organization of the firms engaged in the export of the productions of British industry can bear testimony to the fact that their efficiency is unsurpassed. It is perfectly true that English merchants and commercial representatives abroad know little of the consular officers in the countries in which their business is carried on, and are little known by them. The reason is plain. Their self-reliant habits, and their knowledge of their own business, enable them to conduct operations even in emergencies, and usually without the need for recourse to the assistance or advice of the Queen's representatives. But the question arises, From whom are the Official Commissioners who are now about to proceed to Central and South America to obtain the information which they are about to seek? Assuredly they must apply, above all, to the very Englishmen who are now conducting our trade with these regions. But is it conceivable that they can, even after prolonged conversations, comprehend and put into useful order all the facts conveyed by their informants, filled as these must be with technical details, and evolve from them information not already known to the export houses at home? The truth is that the kind of intelligence which these gentlemen are to seek is constantly being supplied by mail and telegraph, and is daily being practically utilised by the merchants and manufacturers of this country. Samples and patterns, in huge volume altogether, are constantly passing outward and inward to and from every part

of the world, as well as quotations of prices, and intelligence as to changes of taste, new requirements, competition, and influences tending to increase or diminish our trade with foreign countries. Even, therefore, if the inquiries of the Commissioners should result in a report as thorough and accurate as diligence and ability can make it, the information supplied is likely to be incomplete and belated. It is not desired in this criticism to say one word in disparagement of useful and legitimate official assistance to commerce and industry. It is conceivable that the present Commission may be able to furnish intelligence or suggestions of a general kind which may be of some service to our trade with Central and South America. But in respect of the details of business—prices, methods, kinds, and qualities of merchandise, foreign competition, terms of credit, financial arrangements, routes, freights, and so forth it is hardly possible that its labours can bear fruit at all commensurate with the cost and effort involved. Finally, it is pertinent to inquire whether any and what useful results have ever accrued from previous similar efforts. Nor can it be affirmed that any appreciable benefit has accrued to the export trade of the United States with the South American Republics from the Mission dispatched thither some time ago, supported though this has been by the establishment of a permanent bureau at Washington for the purpose of continuing the work of the Mission. On the whole, therefore, however cordially we may desire that the newly designated British Commission to South and Central America may be able to justify its appointment, experience and reason alike should warn us against entertaining anything like confident expectations of fruitful results.

## Statistical Annual.

The Statistical Annual containing the statistics of the Republic for the year 1896 has just been issued from the Direction of General Statistics. No doubt its unusually late appearance must be excused on account of the difficulties caused by the revolution last year, but it must also be confessed that much of the information loses its value and interest after such a lapse of time, and is now ancient history. Apart from this, the volume is of the usual complete description, reflecting the highest credit on the Director Sr. Honoré Roustan. The illustrations on this occasion are very neatly printed in colours, and represent the uniforms of the Uruguayan army, officers and men, and of the police and fire brigade. In due time we will make our usual extracts from the Annual, which, despite its late appearance, is an invaluable work of reference and fount of information for all interested in the status and progress of the Republic.

## SUNDRIES

An idiotic telegram, dated from New York, was published yesterday to the effect that the British steamer "Nile" which left Southampton on Christmas night with an excursion party for South America, had disappeared between Rio Janeiro and Montevideo after touching at the former port, and nothing more had been heard of her or of those on board, who included many well-known English and North Americans.—The only "Nile" on the South American route is the Royal Mail steamer of that name. This left Southampton on Christmas Eve, arrived safely in the River Plate on January 14, sailed homeward bound on January 22, has called at the usual ports all well up to the present, and today should be leaving Vigo. The whole story, therefore is an invention and a falsehood from first to last. Moreover, it carries the evidence of its own falsity, for steamers do not take six or seven weeks to reach Rio Janeiro from Southampton, and any wreck occurring between here and Rio Janeiro would be known here long before it was known in New York. We do not know what profit or amusement there may be in publishing such inventions in New York, but in any case it is waste of labor for the telegraphic service to repeat them here, where their falsity can be detected at once.

Telegrams report the assassination of President Reina Barrios of Guatemala, his place being taken by the Vice-president Estrada Cabrera. No further particulars are given.

The Zola trial in Paris seems to be degenerating into as great a farce as the trial of the Knave of Hearts in that immortal work "Alice in Wonderland." His witnesses are cut short in their evidence, his advocates are not allowed to put pertinent questions and every possible means seems to be taken to avoid truth being known and justice being done, and all this seems to phase the Paris public. We do not know

that we have ever seen the French character exhibited in a more sorry light. As Mr. de Blowitz has written to the *Times*, France is disgracing herself in the eyes of Europe by her conduct in the Dreyfus case.

The telegrams are playing their usual bewildering tricks over the Chinese Loan affair. A week or ten days ago they told us it had been definitely settled in favor of England. Then they said England had completely failed in her negotiations. Yesterday they said it will be issued by an international commission, with the united guarantee of all the powers that have interests in China, e.g., Russia, France, Great Britain and Germany. Finally, a telegram appears to the effect that the Chinese Government has resolved not to issue any foreign loan at all! Out of such contradictions as these, nothing can be made, and, as usual, we must wait for the London papers to learn the facts. This is another example of the utter uselessness of the telegraphic service. So far as knowing the truth is concerned, we would be better without it, for it only fills our head with fictions and fables.

Mr. Kruger, "Oom Paul," has been re-elected President of the Transvaal Republic for a period of five years. We wonder now what truth there was in the reports that gave him only six or eight months of life.

The Correctional Tribunal of Paris has passed a stiff sentence on Mr. Henri Rochefort for his attacks on Mr. Reinach in the Dreyfus affair. He is condemned to five months' imprisonment, 1000 francs fine and 2000 francs damages and costs.

The Kaiser has signed a Decree suppressing part of the fortifications of the city of Metz. The Berlin press regard this as a proof of benevolence (1) on the part of the Emperor and a hope for the preservation of peace.

Professor Sanarelli has arrived at San Paulo, where he is to conduct experiments with his yellow fever toxin, and has had an enthusiastic public reception, the people turning out en masse to meet him and dragging his carriage to the hotel.

For several days past the telegrams have been making out very strained relations between Spain and the United States. As, however, they have been doing this on and off for over twelve months it is difficult to know what importance can be attached to their declarations.

The many friends of Miss Dora Marshall will be pleased to hear that she is declared convalescent from her recent attack of typhoid fever.

The little Italian Opera Company which has made such a success at the St. Jago Theatre will remove to the Cibils tomorrow, the opening programme consisting of "Pagliacci" and the 4th act of "Rigoletto." The prices are very moderate, stalls being only \$1. We may mention that the Theatre has recently been redecorated and improved in many ways.

## LONDON NOTES

THURSDAY, JANUARY 13.

Polling took place in Plymouth yesterday to fill the vacancy in the Parliamentary representation caused by the death of Mr. Charles Harrison. The result was entirely satisfactory to the Liberal party, Mr. Mendl not only retaining the seat held by his fellow candidate of the last general election, but increasing the majority from 26 to 161. For Mr. Mendl 5,966 votes were cast, as against 5,802 for Mr. Guest, the Conservative representative.

Addressing a meeting at Wymondham, Suffolk, last night, Lord Kimberley welcomed the promise of a sound measure of local government for Ireland, not only because it would strengthen the feeling for Home Rule. With regard to Chitral, he contended that the proclamation to the tribes involved an unconditional promise not to occupy any territory. The reasons put forward for the reversal of the policy of the late Government were extremely weak. He highly eulogised the valour of the troops engaged in the frontier war, whilst disagreeing with the policy. In regard to the China question, Lord Kimberley concurred in Mr. Balfour's recent utterance. In the course of his speech he said he could never be a party to the granting of women's suffrage.

Speaking at Blackpool yesterday Mr. Balfour devoted the greater part of his address to a reply to speeches by Mr. Bryce and Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman. The former he accused of attempting to crush the budding efforts of the National Liberal Federation to provide a programme for the Radical party. The Radical party, he declared, had no programme but depended on a travesty of what the present

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Government had done. He thought there was little doubt of the choice the country would make when it had to make a selection between a party which made no profession of desire for organic change, but rather professed its abhorrence of it, and a party which whispered that it would like every kind of organic change, but dared not put it forward.

A statement is telegraphed from Shanghai to the effect that notwithstanding the news recently published, no treaty for the cession of Kiao Chow to Germany has been yet signed, and that Japan is strenuously opposing the final signature.

A telegram from Suakin states that the Fourth Egyptian Battalion have reached Ariab Wells on the way to Berber, where they are expected to arrive on the 13th.

The troopship Malta left the Royal Albert Docks yesterday with reinforcements for Gibraltar and Egypt.

General de Pellieux has written to Major Esterhazy congratulating him on the result of the trial, and offering to place in his hands the opinions of the graphological experts consulted during the recent inquiry, should the officer decide to prosecute M. Mathieu Dreyfus. The "Temps," in its comments on the trial, takes the view that although the result must cause satisfaction, there may nevertheless be a forger, and that further inquiry is necessary.

Last night the Lord Mayor entertained representatives of London Government at dinner at the Mansion House Dr. Collins, replying to the toast of the London County Council, remarked that as that body seemed to possess what the Corporation lacked, there should be the closest and most intimate relations between them.

Sir Walter Besant delivered a lecture last evening at the College of Preceptors on the educational aspect of the History of London. In it he gave a number of instances to show its enterprise and pugnacity. The Bishop of London afterwards spoke of London and other capital cities in their relation to the destinies of their respective countries, remarking that if they studied old chronicles to ascertain what Englishmen were in former times they would find them to have been just the same obstinate, stolid, stupid people as their next door neighbours of to day.

A large number of persons met at breakfast at Cannon-street Hotel yesterday on the invitation of the representative board of the Anti-Opium Societies. The Rev. Dr. Moule, Principal of Ridley Hall, Cambridge, presided. A paper by Archdeacon Wolfe, of the Church Missionary Society, was read, and the Rev. Arnold Foster, of the London Missionary Society, criticised the report of the Opium Commission. Resolutions were adopted condemning the Indian opium traffic and declaring that the question must again be brought before the House of Commons.

A meeting of the London District Association of Engineering Employers yesterday passed a resolution approving of the action of the executive at the York meeting, and urging that any settlement of the dispute should ensure the return to work of the men in all districts simultaneously. It is reported from Manchester that the Federated Employers in that district have decided to post the Westminster terms of settlement, and to at once reopen their works to non-unionists only.

Before the Lord Chief Justice and a special jury the case of Joy, v. Sykes and wife came on for hearing in the Queen's Bench Division yesterday. He was a money lender carrying on business in the West End, and the defendants were Sir Tatton Sykes the owner of large estates in Yorkshire, and Lady Sykes, his wife. The action was to recover large sums of money upon promissory notes alleged to have been drawn by Sir Tatton Sykes and handed by Lady Sykes to the plaintiff. Sir Tatton Sykes denied having signed the notes. It was not disputed that the money was owing, but from the statement of counsel for the plaintiff it appeared that a portion of the defence to be set up was that the name of Sir Tatton Sykes had been forged to the instruments in question, and that for this Lady Sykes was responsible. In examination and cross-examination Lady Sykes declared that her husband was an active party to the bills, but that it was his habit to frequently disown his signature when he found he

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would have to pay money thus guaranteed. The hearing was adjourned.

Sentence of death was passed by Mr Justice Channell yesterday at the Central Criminal Court on James Harris, a platemaker, who was indicted for the wilful murder of his wife in September last. A curious feature of the case was the fact that, owing to his having cut his throat in an attempt to commit suicide, Harris had lost the use of his voice and was unable to plead or take his trial at the November Sessions. Application was made for a further postponement, but this was refused. The defence was that the man was insane when he committed the deed. The jury, while returning a verdict of wilful murder, added a strong recommendation to mercy, which the Judge said should be forwarded to the proper quarter.

Two charges of assault brought by private individuals against members of the police force came on for hearing at the Central Criminal Court yesterday. One was the case in which four constables were charged with assaulting a man named George Hillman while taking him to the police station. The facts of this case were reported at length during the investigation by the Southwark magistrate, who sent the four men for trial. The jury found the defendants not guilty, and they were discharged. The other case was that of Police-constable Lewis, who was indicted for violently assaulting a carman named Cowell. The jury found the constable guilty of unlawful wounding, and the Recorder sentenced him to 16 months' hard labour.

The Coroner's inquest on the great fire in Cripplelegate concluded yesterday. The jury, after four hours' deliberation, returned as their verdict that it was wilfully caused by some person or persons unknown. Several recommendations were added as a means of better protection against fire.

launched in the United Kingdom. The warships launched at both Government and private yards amount to 48 of 95,465 tons displacement. The total output of the United Kingdom for the year has, therefore, been 639 vessels of 1,047,951 tons. The figure is less than that of 1896 by 207,000 tons, but is about equal to that of 1895. The decrease occurs mainly in steam tonnage. The construction of sailing vessels, which has been rapidly falling off since 1892, has this year reached a lower point than any of which Lloyd's Register has previous record. In 1892, sailing tonnage formed 24 per cent. of the output; in 1897, it forms only 3 per cent. of a considerable smaller total. The warship tonnage launched in 1897 likewise shows a very considerable decrease (68,000 tons) from the figures for 1896. The tonnage launched for the British Navy is less by 61,000 tons than was the case last year.
