CUSTOMS RECEIPTS.

The following were the Customs Receipts for the month of January, 1898.—

These receipts, though much below those of January 1896, show a considerable improvement on those of January last year, and are, in fact, superior to those of any of the months since April 1896, with the exception of Sept. 1896 and Oct. 1897. During the month exportation was very brisk, thanks to the good results of the wheat and wool harvests, and importation was better than might have been expected considering the general complaints of commercial dullness. It may also be noted that importation has been favorably affected by the abolition of the 2 1/2 % extra duty or patente (which did not figure in the official returns) which took place on the 13th of the month. These receipts show business on a sound basis, which would speedily improve on a favorable settlement of the political problem at present distracting the energies of the Republic.

POLITICAL NOTES.

As briefly mentioned in our last, on Friday the majority of the Senate accepted the resignation of Dr. Carlos Maria Ramirez as Senator for Tacuarembó. The result, though a surprise to the public, must have been anticipated, for his substitute, Sr. Liborio Echeverria, was in waiting and at once took the oath and his seat. The matter has given rise to a good deal of comment of diverse character. In Dr. Ramirez the Senate loses one of the very few elements of intelligence and worth that were remaining to it, and it cannot be said that the new-comer is any acquisition to the Chamber. Politically it means that a vote is lost to Sr. Cuestas and the popular cause and one gained to the «collectivity», who now muster 12 out of the 19 members namely Julio Herrera, Duncan Stewart, C. Castro, Montero, Eliauri, Irisarri, Vigil, Garzon, Capurro, Lenzi, Segundo, and Echeverria. Many persons regard the vote of the majority in this matter as an indication of their anti-cuestista intentions on Feb. 14. If from this point of view, it precipitates the dissolution of the Chambers, so much the better. In fact, the Senate with its present «collectivist» majority of entirely unworthy men, is even a greater public danger than the other Chamber, for who ever is elected President of the Republic, it will always keep a prominent member of the «collectivity», perhaps Dr. Julio Herrera himself, ready to step into his place and produce a full «collectivist» restoration at the first opportunity. This is a real and always present danger, and it is one which should be averted, and that can only be done by dissolving the

Chamber, which, in any case, is quite as unworthy composed and as unrepresentative as the other Chamber. In fact, at no previous period of the Republic's history, has the Senate been composed of such unworthy and untrustworthy elements as at the present moment. Whatever may have happened to the Representatives, the Senate has generally been allowed to preserve some elements of dignity, respect, intelligence and public representation, but between them Herrera and Borda have carefully eliminated these qualities, and with the exception of three or four (at the most) senior members whose term will soon expire the Chamber is entirely unworthy and its removal would be an unmixed public benefit.

The other matter treated in the Senate on Friday was the prolongation of the term for liquidation of the National Bank. The Executive forwarded the statement of the liquidators, and recommended a prolongation for another twelve months (from the 10th instant). After a short discussion of no great interest, it was resolved to make the term six months and a Bill to that effect was sanctioned and is now ready for the other Chamber. It had been said that new liquidators would be appointed, but that does not appear to be the case, which is perhaps a matter for some disappointment.

The last week having passed off without anything exciting occurring, political prophecies are now loudly predicting stirring events for the week now commencing. The *Tribuna*, which is the most outspoken, openly proclaims the dissolution of the Chambers for Monday or Tuesday, and the prediction is repeated in telegrams published in Buenos Aires. The *modus operandi* is said to be that Sr. Cuestas, instead of issuing the usual Decree convoking the Chambers to ordinary sessions, will issue a Decree declaring the Chambers dissolved, as not representing the national will, appealing to the judgement of the country, which at the same time will be convoked to new elections. He will also declare a provisional government and convolve an Assembly of Notables, divided into two Chambers, to act as Legislative Power. On the other hand, the «collectivists» it is said, as soon as the Dissolution is announced, will hold a meeting of the Chambers wherever they can (we beg to suggest that in the Penitentiary, and once they are gathered together, kept there) declare Sr. Cuestas deposed and appeal to the army to support their cause. An other tale is that all the generals and colonels who signed the recent Protest will go to the Chambers in person and in full uniform (what a display of gold lace and epaulettes there will be!) in order to protect them from any outrage and to allow them to deliberate undisturbed. The spectacle of the *«fine fleur»* of the Uruguayan army thus protecting and abetting the sworn enemies of the people would be very edifying and patriotic. Other reports contradictory to the above, point to a compromise which at all events, will postpone the critical struggle until March 1st by allowing Sr. Cuestas to retain the Presidency of the Senate. How many of all these, and other reports which we do not stop to mention, will be fulfilled, we will not pretend to say, but time should soon show. The solution cannot be delayed much longer.

The mysterious Document is once more in town, but it is said that it still lacks the full complement of signatures, some of the Departmental Prefects having declined to sign it. This will mean more changes. Referring to this Document the *«Republica»* («collectivist» organ) advises the military men who have signed it to break their word, saying that they cannot be bound by a promise «to carry out an offence which the Military Code punishes with death, and honest and sensible public opinion with contempt.» We think the contempt is far more likely to fall on those officers who support the «collectivity» than on those who help to purge it out of the country.

Yesterday's *Siglo* once more argues against the idea of a candidate of transaction, coming to the same conclusion as ourselves, namely that, by the very nature of their cause, the «collectivists» can only accept a transaction which is a victory for themselves and therefore a loss to the people. It further points out that the idea is a dangerous one to the popular cause. The candidature of Sr. Cuestas may have its defects and drawbacks, but it is the one rallying point of the people against the «collectivity», and if it is withdrawn it will simply leave the field open to the people's adversaries, who will then be tempted to go to their worst lengths, even perhaps to placing Dr. Julio Herrera in the presidency, for it has been shown by painful experience that the «collectivity» take a delight in de-

fining public opinion to the utmost, and they would not hesitate to do so now, if the one obstacle to their plans, the candidature of Sr. Cuestas, were withdrawn.

It is stated that no fewer than nine of the subordinate officers of the 4th Chasseurs were dismissed on Friday night. Their names have not yet been made public. The reasons are probably political.

The prolonged term for inscription in the National Guard expired yesterday, and it is now announced that all citizens inscribed and who have no exemption to claim must present themselves to one of the four Volunteer Battalions before Wednesday next in order to commence drill. The meaning of this is not very clear at present, but no doubt explanations will appear. It is believed that only those between 17 and 25 will be chosen in a sufficient number to complete the vacancies in the Volunteer Battalions which will thus lose some of their voluntary character. Notice is also given that those of the Volunteers failing to attend drill on Sunday mornings will be liable to two days' arrest.

We hear that the Government has forbidden the circulation in barracks of the *«Republica»*, the *«Uruguay Militar»* and other «collectivist» organs engaged in the seditious propaganda of urging the military to rebel against the people and their President elect. We do not, as a rule, approve of these restrictions, but in the present case we think the Government has done right, and it would do better still if it prosecuted the editors of such papers for treason.

THE REGULATION OF SEX.

ALLEGED IMPORTANT DISCOVERY.

Vienna, Jan. 6.

Although most people here declare that they have absolutely no faith in Professor Schenk's alleged discovery of a means by which the incidence of sex may be controlled, the announcement has created very great interest. The Professor, however, is recalcitrant. He claims that he has made an important discovery, but asks us to wait for further information until he has submitted it to the Academy of Science in a volume which he hopes to begin soon and to finish before the end of the summer. Professor Schenk is not unknown. Besides being President of the Embryological Institute here, he is the author of works on Embryology, and former discoveries by him in this branch of medical science have been noticed. These facts explain why some importance is attached to his announcement even by the Government itself. The Professor has so far only stated that for many years his experiments were limited to the lower animals, and that by a system of nourishing the female, he produces a disposition to bring into the world male young only. A somewhat discouraging admission, however, is that once this disposition is established it cannot be changed, and the offspring of the same parents are henceforth all males.

Yesterday a Vienna paper inter-viewed several men of science whose opinion on the matter should be of weight. One and all expressed serious doubts, but admitted that the thing was not impossible. One remarked, that the bees must long ago have made a discovery of the kind, since they had a system of bringing up and feeding their queens and male bees.

Berlin, Jan. 6.

Dr. Schenk's alleged discovery has, of course, not failed to cause a great sensation here. The Professor is not a nobody. His name is well known in the scientific world, and his claims therefore deserve attention, however sceptical one must be. Similar investigations have been made long time heretofore with animals, but these have always had but negative results, and the history of Professor Koch's tuberculine warns one against resting too much faith in the success claimed for the present series. This view finds expression in the opinions of some of the Berlin men of science, amongst them Professor Virchow, who says:

«Professor Schenk has met with many opponents on his scientific way, and such opponents will not now be waiting. As the male is stronger and larger than the female, one might suppose that strong and well-nourished women would be more capable of giving birth to boys than delicate and poorly nourished women. But this is only a supposition, the confirmation of which is wanting. In order to be able to judge of the value of Professor Schenk's statements, one ought first and foremost to know when he begins to apply his method. The one thing appears to me certain—that the germ cell has in itself a quite defined sexual disposition. How, therefore can one influence a female germ-cell? I do not see any way unless the influence to be brought to bear is begun at

the time of the formation of the female ovum, and unless it is even extended to both parents. And how is it with twins? What influence of nourishment is in this case predominant? I should not like to dispute the possibility that such influence can be exercised, but I do not think it will be so easy to solve this problem, and I am therefore very sceptical about Professor Schenk's statements.»

Professor Hartwig, Director of the Anatomical Biological Institute at the Berlin University, declared also that one must receive all such statements with the greatest caution. He pointed out however, that success had been obtained in the efforts to influence sex in the lower animals. Professor Gussow, Director of the Gynecological Institute, is also sceptical, but does not dispute the possibility of the discovery. Professor Munk, Director of the Physiological Institute, says that while all experiments in this direction have hitherto failed, the reputation of Professor Schenk is such that one must look forward to further statements from him with the greatest interest. Professor Ohlshausen, the well-known gynecologist, thinks the whole thing impossible. Like Professor Virchow, he says that the germ cell is originally male or female, and not, as Professor Schenk asserts, bisexual, and therefore the influence claimed is impossible.

SUNDRIES

—We quote the following from the *Review of the River Plate*.—«A good many patriotic English people are exercised from time to time regarding the Argentine fashion of rendering English Christian names into their Spanish equivalent, a practice in which the Argentine official indulges whenever he has a chance. Against the practice itself in general a good deal might be said. There are many practical inconveniences which an Englishman might experience if after coming to this country he submitted to any alteration being made in his Christian name, and particularly in his signature. It may be allowable to translate a man's name in the body of a document, and we rather think it has been the custom of all Latin nations, ever since the middle ages, when the most outlandish Celtic and Teutonic names were latinized; but no one can be required to alter his signature, and if he is fool enough to do so, there is every chance that it may be challenged if it ever comes into an English court of law. In the same way, where British subjects are concerned, it is very absurd to translate their names into Spanish. We should be very much surprised to learn that the name of the captain of the Annie M. Law, whose case was referred to in last week's summary, was really Diego Bain; yet the Argentine press assures us that it was so. The English custom seems a great deal more sensible. If an Italian captain were charged in an English court he would be charged as Giovanni Cavagnari for example, not as John Cavagnari, which is simply not his name.»

The above complaint seems to us a very just one. A point the *Review* overlooks is that in some cases not only are the names changed, but even the initials, so that it may be said there is a complete loss of identity. For instance, William Henry Smith («W. H. S.») would become in Spanish Guillermo Enrique Smith («G. E. S.») James Stephen Brown («J. S. B.») becomes Diego Estévan Brown («D. E. B.») and Philip Walter Jasper Jones («P. W. J. J.») is transformed into Felipe Gualterio Gaspar Jones («F. G. G. J.») When we come to female names the confusion is no less, for we see Ethel and Helen equally changed into Elena; Maud into Matilde; Hester into Estér; Elisabeth into Isabel; Jane, Joan and Jenny into Juana; Josephine into Josefá; and Bridget is barely recognisable as Brigida, nor Catherine as Catalina.

—The custom is an absurd and unreasonable one. There is no law that can compel man or woman to sacrifice their identity by changing their names, and anyone who has official or other transactions is quite justified in insisting that his

original name shall appear in its original form and with the original initials and in no case should they sign it otherwise.

—Since native functionaries thus take upon themselves to translate and transform Christian names, there is no reason that the system should not be extended, where possible, to surnames. Doing this, we might find Mr. Smith figuring as Sr. Herrero, Mr. Brown as Sr. Moreno, Mr. White as Sr. Blanco, Mr. Brooks as Sr. Arroyos, Mr. Towers as Sr. Torres, Mr. Bell as Sr. Campana, Mr. Wingate as Sr. Ganapuerta, Mr. Mudd as Sr. Lodo, Mr. Laneas as Sr. Callejuela, Mr. Hill as Sr. Monte, Mr. Cooper as Sr. Tonelero, Mr. Scott as Sr. Escoses, Mr. Hogge as Sr. Chancho, Mr. Fisher as Sr. Pescador and Mr. Denstone as Sr. Piedra de la Cueva (the last is, indeed, the name of a well-known native family.) The process might be less happy if reversed. The famous combination Sra. Dolores Fuentes de la Barriga would not look pretty in English as Mrs. Fearful Pains in the Stomach.

—A Cannes telegram states that Mr. Gladstone is slowly but steadily improving and is regarded as quite out of danger for the present.

—Mr. James Farrell returned yesterday by the «Oravia» and received a warm welcome from his many friends.

—There will be masked balls at the Solis and San Felipe theatres this evening.

—We have not received notice of any athletic fixtures for today.

—Professor Sanarelli left yesterday for Brazil, where he will carry out further experiments with his yellow fever toxins. A quantity of the toxins has also been sent to the United States for experiment.

—The hull of the unfortunate steamer «Jupiter» was put up to auction on Friday, and fetched the grand sum of \$100 say £21. The purchasers were Lussich and Co., who with their powerful salvage agents will no doubt get a great deal more than that out of her. All the machinery and fittings still remain in the hull.

—The native Demodar Chapo- kar, who murdered Lieut Ayers and Mr. Rand at Poonah, during the Jubilee fests last year, has just been condemned to death.

—According to a Paris telegram, great reserve is maintained with regard to the sentence passed by the military court on Colonel Picquart. It is stated that in order to avoid more complications in the Zola case the decision will be kept secret at present. This is going from bad to worse. After this, what justice is likely to be done to Mr. Zola.

—Mr. R. S. Neville, a tobacco expert from America arrived at Sydney the other day, on his way to fulfil an engagement with the Queensland Government. Asked by an interviewer as to the effects of smoking, Mr. Neville made answer: «Over indulgence does have a harmful effect with some people, but so does excess in anything for that matter. I know men living active lives who smoke all day, and who claim to feel no ill effects from it. At all events, there is very little to fear in moderate smoking. Look at literary men (he goes on); you will find that the majority will tell you that moderate smoking makes the brain active inspires them, helps them to concentrate their thoughts. You go to a man, by the way, and ask him a question that takes some thinking; he will almost invariably scratch his head, and then turn to his tobacco pouch and light his pipe before he answers you.» He added, referring to his own countrymen, that «chewing, though perhaps a dirty habit, is far more healthy than smoking.» This will be news to many.

—A Calcutta telegram confirms the victory of General Mayne in Turhak valley last Monday. The rebels were 15,000 strong, and were defeated after an action of two hours. They had over 100 killed, including the Khans Mehrab and Baluck. The British losses were only one artilleryman killed and another wounded, and three native soldiers killed and eight wounded.

—About 10 p. m. on Friday a smart shock of earthquake was felt in Catamarca, Cordoba, Tucuman, Rioja and Rio Cuarto. No damages are reported, but there was great alarm.

—It is telegraphed from Calcutta that Lieut. Gen. Sir George White has broken his leg, through a fall from his horse, and is in a critical condition.

—On Friday morning there was a railway collision near Troon station (Scotland) between a passenger and a cargo train. Nine passengers were killed and many injured.

LONDON NOTES

FRIDAY, JANUARY 7.

The statement that the Powers are negotiating in view of an amicable arrangement for the division of China into spheres of interest has been received favourably at Berlin.

A Cairo Correspondent states that great activity is being displayed there in pushing forward supplies for the British troops. Major Gordon has left for Assouan to supervise the transport arrangements and the putting together of the new gunboats.

Speaking before a meeting of his constituents at East London on Wednesday, Sir John Gordon Sprigg, the Cape Premier, said that while in England he had discussed the scheme to lay a deep-sea cable between the Mother Country and the Colony.

Mr. Walter Long, M.P., Minister of Agriculture, last night addressed a meeting of Unionists at South Bristol, and alluding to agriculture denied that the report of the Royal Commission was unduly pessimistic.

At the Conference of the Miners' Federation, yesterday, Mr. Pickard, M.P., presiding, a resolution was adopted, giving a general support to the Workmen's Compensation for Accidents Act.
