THE REAL QUESTION AT ISSUE,

The personal factor in the pre sidential problem still remains up permost, not only in the public mind, but even in the col-umns of our most luminous contemporaries, and this to such an extent that it is completely obs curing the far more important question of principles which, in our humble opinion, stands behind.

The question, as argued by our contemporaries and by the large majority of the people, would seem to be whether Sr Cuestas or whether Sr. Gomensoro is to be the president of the Republic on March 1st next. The Razon, practically alone, admits a varia tion by advocating a transaction candidate who will continue the administrative programme initiated by Sr. Cuestas but yet be accept able for election by the present Chambers, who are making a per-

sonal opposition to the latter. Both these presentations, in our opinion, avoid the greater question in the background and the ques-tion which is the real cause of all the present agitation and anxiety.

That question was stated by us in an article dated as far back as No vember 24, in the following words:
- «Let it be determined once for all whether this Republic is to be egoverned by its people, ac cording to the Constitution, or a whether it is to be governed by the handful of dishonest men « known as the 'collectivity'.»

This, we think, puts the matter in a nutshell Il more is wanted, we might also say that it is necessary to be determined whether any Assembly, and least of all so unrepresentative and unworthy an Assembly as the present, has the right to oppose and defy the clearly expressed will of the nation in the presidential or any other question.

Thus stripping the problem of its personalism, it will be seen at once that it is impossible to view it in any other than a radical light, and that is the reason that we have consistently advocated a radical and extreme solution, per haps going further in that respect than any paper published here ex-

cept the Dia.
From this point of view, also, it will be seen at once that any transaction, such as suggested by the Razon, is impossible, for such transaction would at once concede the point at issue, and yield an authority contrary to that of the people which we deny, not only as regards the «col-lectivity» but also as regards the Chambers.

With legitimate and constitu-tional Chambers, indeed, it is im possible to imagine such a question being raised at all, for such Chambeing raised at all, for such Cham-bers would be the expression and the mouth-piece of the national will, and could no more defy it than a man's voice could defy the workings of his brain. It might happen, certainly, that individual legislators were opposed to the ideas and wishes of their constituents, and could not conscientiously vote in accordance with them, but in that case it would be the unhesitating duty of such legislators, as honorable men and honest politicians, to resign their seats. It is inconceivable within the most elementary notions of personal honor and of political morality, that a parliamentary

self unable to perform this duty, and it is still more inconceivable that he should adopt an exactly op posite policy to that he was elected to represent. In the latter case the electors are justified in demanding and insisting upon his resignation, for he has become a mere pretender and usurper, and, if there is a salary in question, he is obtaining money under false pre-tences, which is a serious criminal offence in all civilised countries.

From this point of view, which we imagine it will be difficult to disessablish, the present Chambers collectively, and the majority of the legislators individually, have of themselves, by their attitude in the presidential question. presidential question, proved the impurity of their origin and their unfilness to control the destinies of the Republic. And since these re-calcitrant legislators have not sufficient political morality to resign individually, finding that they do not and cannot represent the will of the country, their collective dissolution is the only logical

sequence.
This brings us back to our starting point. Constitutionally this coun-try, like every other has the right to be governed by the representatives of the people. The present Cham bers do not fulfil that condition, never have fulfilled it, make no pretence of fulfilling it, and openly express their intention of opposing and thwarting the will of the people. What possible claim, then, have they to be considered as a constitutional power # So far as we can see, none whatever. On an electoral basis, the only one admitted by the constitution, there is no constitutional power at present in the government of the Republic -it is under a solid distributions. under a veiled dictatorship based on electoral fraud and supported by force. The Executive Power, how-

ever, approaches nearest to a constitutional power, because it is interpreting the desires of the people and has received the sanction of their acclamation throughout the Republic. If, then, this Executive Power proceeds to dis solve the Chambers, in con-formity with desires that have being plainly expressed by the people, so far from committing an unconstitutional act, it will be showing the highest respect for Constitution in removing a body that is unconstitutional and an obstacle to constitutional government, and it will at the same time be showing the highest respect for the national welfare -which, after all, is a more important consideration than adherence to the strict letter of an antiquated Constitution—in saving the country from a body of men who for many years past have been its worst ene

Thus it is not a question whether Cuestas or Gomensoro shall be president; it is a question which shall dominate the will of the people, or the will of the Cham equivalent to saying the will of the «collectivity.» And this is a question which no person al factor, nor even party factor, should be allowed to obscure, though it is being very much lost

This question may or may ing presidential election, but not be settled at the approach we do not hesitate to say that, if it is not settled then, it will prove a factor of serious unrest and disturbance to the Republic for a long time to come, whoever is proclaimed president

The Senators set yesterday afternoon, after a prolonged vacation, which, however, did not affect their salaries. The chief business was discussion of the resignation of Dr. C M. Ramirez, which was eventually accepted by the *collectivist* majority, consisting of Senators Garzon, Vigil, Irisarri, Lenzi, Segundo, Perez, Castro and Ellauri. This was rather a surprise, as it was generally believed it had been agreed to reject it, but it may be attributed to Dr. Ramirez recent propaganda in the Raxon which has had the misfortune of displeasing both sides His substitute is, we be-lieve, Sr. Echevarria, a rank «col-lectivist.» The affair is thus both a misfortune and a bad augury.

On Thursday morning there was an elaborate ceremony in the barracks of the 1st Chasseurs over the blessing of a new banner presented to the regiment by Cuestas, who was himself pre-sent. There were also present the chief officers of all the garrison regiments, of the police battalions, and of the National Guard Volunrepresentative, who is supposed to be elected to represent the ideas and wishes of the electorate, should retain his post when he finds him

to discuss it The Minister of Finance has resolved to reestablish the wholesome practice of publishing monthly Treasury Balances, and that for January will be given to the press in a few days Detailed statements of the previous months of the present administration, which had been prepared by his predecessor Dr. Campisteguy, will also see the light shortly. The present Government, having nothing to fear, intends to make no secret of its financial ad ministration. We congratulate it on the determination.

We can confirm the statement that conversion of the Treasury Certificates for April will commence next Thursday.

Locusts.

A London telegram states the following. -Satisfactory accounts continue to be received here from South Africa of the employment of Dr. Edington's discovery for extin-guishing the locusts. Taroughout Rhodesia myriads of the insects are daily being destroyed by the toxine. In the district round Fort Salisbury success has not been so marked, owing possibly to the difference of temperature. Dr. Edington's system is as follows: The toxine is injected into a number of locusts, which die immediately afterwards. Their bodies are then ground to powder, which is thrown into a quantity of water with which the 'saltonas' are sprinkled. The poison is rapidly spread in this manner. The well known ento-mologist Blandford has given it as his opinion that the employment of the toxine is the only rational method which will be henceforth employed to extinguish the pest, and predicts the success of the method now in question. Ho recommends its adoption by the Argentine Republic under suitable directions. It is at present engag-

trust the report of the Dia some of the North American entomologist ways remains open as a worthy at present in that city, speaks un-favourably of the Edington system of destroying locusts by the dis-tribution of the fungus which is found so fatal to them in South Africa. He says that locusts in captivity succumb at once to the disease, but in the open fields its ef fect is not so certain though in lavourable weather and conditions the locusts are sometimes killed by millions by means of the fun-gus, Therefore he recommends that a quantity of locusts that have been killed by the fungus should always be kept ready for use in the manner directed by Dr. Eding on, but he advises that the Argentine fungus, the sporotrichum, found at Carcaraña, should be used in preference to that of North America or of South Africa. It is known that the Argentine «acridium peregrinum» is, unhappily for Argentina, of a more robust constitution than its relatives in North America and Africa and therefore it should be attacked by an equally robust

Germany's Grab in China,

BERLIN, JAN. 5.-This evening the official «Reichsanzeiger» publishes the agreement concluded be tween China and Germany with regard to Kiso-Chow. The official

publication runs as follows: By this agreement the German Government is to be enabled to realise its just wish to possess, as do other Powers, a point d'appui for commerce and navigation in Chinese waters. The cession is to take the form of a lease of considerable duration. The German Government is at liberty to erect all necessary buildings and works within the ceded territory, and to take all the requisite measures for their protection. The ceded territory comprises the whole inner basin of Kao-Chow Bay up to high water mark; further, the long longues of land north and south of the entrance to the bay, up to where they are naturally bounded by ledges of rocks, and floally the islands in and oif the bay The ceded territory has a total area of some square miles, enclosed by a large zone drawn completely round the bay, within which no measures can be taken, or dispositions made by the Chinese without Germany's consent. Measures for the regulation of the water courses which may be deemed necessary by the German Government are in particular to meet with no obsta-cles. In order to avoid conflicts which might disturb the good understanding between the two Powers, the Chinese Government has transferred during the whole dura-tion of the lease all its sovereign rights in the ceded territory to the German Government The duration of the lease and the financial terms are not given in the very short telegram which reports the agreement Should for any reason Kiao Chow Bay not prove suitable for the object which the German Gov rnment has in view, the Chinese Government, after coming to an understanding with the German Government, will cede to the latter another spot on the coast better

which have been made to the Post-master-General, to the Board of Inland Revenue, and to the Con-troller of Stamps, a compromise has been arrived at on the subject of the reproduction of English postage stamp designs for the purpose of illustrations. Messrs. Stanley Gibbons have received a letter from Somerset House informing them that the Board of Inland Revenue were advised that such illustrations were an infringement of the law; but as their innocence was recognised where intended for the use of stamp collectors, neither the Postmaster General nor the Board of Inland Revenue would interfere if certain re-gulations were complied with. These regulations forbid the use of colour. Illustrations must be in black alone. The Board of Inland Revenue must be consulted before even black illustrations are made. and must be satisfied as to the proper custody of the dies, blocks, plates, &c, and their officers are to be always free to visit the premises where the dies are kept. This concession is limited to certain special classes of publications, such as stamp dealers' catalogues, books on stamps, stamp albums, articles in newspapers, periodicals, and does not apply to ordinary adver-

tisement purposes. Germany is to have full liberty to erect all necessary buildings and to take what measures she may think advisable for their protection. The mail from the Far East brings copies of the proclamation issued to the inhabitants by Admiral von Diederrichs at the occupation by the force landed by him of Kiao-Chow. After laying down the boundaries of the area occupied, he exhorts all to continue their business peaceably, assuring them that Germany is the friend of China, and that they will receive full protection during the period of occupation.

An offer has been made by a number of Maltese gentlemen to raise a force of 1,000 Maltese for service under the Crown in the Soudan campaign. Further letters have been receiv-

ed from members of the French Missien to the Upper Nile under Capt Marchand One of them dated from M' Bima, August 1st, men-tions, as illustrating the difficulty of the task before the mission, that the parts of two steamers destined for the Nile have to be carried 600 miles on men's backs. Two hundred and fifty miles of the journey had already been accomplished. It is stated that one of these steamers has been set affort on one of the tributaries of the Nile in the Bharel Ghazal province. The «Temps» deprecates the publication of such letters on the ground that they sup ply information to the enemies of France, to be used against her.

Replying to a letter from the Brixton Branch of the Social Democratic [Federation, the Prince of Wales has expressed the greatest sympathy for the large number of underfed and half starved children letters and states that living in London, and states that he has sent a donation to the Lon-don Schools Dinner Association which, he understands, is doing good work in providing food for those in public schools. Yesterday the National Federa-

tion of Head Teachers' Associa-tions commenced its first annual conference in London. 



leaned in a poetic attitude (against an aged oak, and waited to bear what coarse remark he would make




