A Decree has been issued class-ifying the calling of Dentist as a «liberal profession» for the effects of the International Convention of the South American Congress of 1889. This, which is in accordance with the report of the technical authorities consulted, means that a dentist's diploma issued in Monte-video will be recognised in the other countries subscribing to the Convention.

According to the Tribuna, the Government is contemplating the prompt suppression or reduction of several more public offices of little or no use, established by recent governments mainly for the purpose of giving a salary to some re-lative or favorite. There is also to be a further reduction of superfluous employees in the Post Office, Custom House, Municipality and other public depart-ments. This is all good work, and if this system is adhered to, not only will there be a balance achieved between revenue and expendi-ture, but there will also be room for a gradual reduction of the exorbitant taxes that at present are such an obstacle to the economical development of the country. Jabez Balfour, who is at present undergoing a term of fourteen years' penal servitude for fraud in connection with the Liberator in connection with the Liberator group of companies, was brought up for public examination in the Bankruptcy Court yesterday. The accounts filed showed gross liabil-ities 56,970*l*., of which 13,407*l*. is unsecured, and assets 44,672*l*., the surplus consisting mainly of the debtor's properly at Burcot, Gatton, and Croydon. Bankrupt stated that when he left England he was in bad health, and went away on the advice of persons who ought on the advice of persons who ought to have known better. The exam-ination was concluded.


