Some important changes and appointments are announced since our last. First of these is the Decree naming Dr. Saturnino A. Camps as Postmaster General This was anticipated some days ago, and the nomination has given very general satisfaction. Dr. Carlos E. Lenzi, General Florencio Pacheco and Don Ramon Tavares are named members of the Council of State, in place of Sr. F. Bauza and Generals N. Cas-tro and P. Callorda, resigned. Sr. Manuel Pagola is named interim Prelect of Canelones in place of Sr. C. E. Lenzi, who has joined the Council of State. Sr. Alejandro Wiedmann is named Secretary of the Police Inspection and Revenue Office of the South of the Rio Negro, in place of Sr. M. Pagola. Amongst further appointments anticipated is that of Dr. Luis Melian Lafinur to the vacant Ministry in London, though some say the post will be given to Dr. Campisteguy. The report that Sr. P. E. Carve, who is now one of the Council of State, will resign the post of Inspector of Banks, is denied by the Siglo, which asserts that the resignation will only affect the sal-ary of the latter post. So much the more credit to him. On Saturday afternoon the mem-bers of the new Municipality were formally received by the President Cuestas. According to the Razon— though we do not find the state-ment corroborated elsewhere —in addressing them Sr. Cuestas made the categoric statement that he would not stand as candidate for the approaching Presidency, part-ly on account of his health, which he did not feel equal to office for a prolonged term, and partly to prove that in recent events he had not been inspired by personal ambition. -Recent telegrams from Bombay give depressing accounts of the spread of the bubonic plague there and in other cities throughout India. The epidemic has attained greater proportions than it did last year, and the panic that has seized upon the poorer classes, who are those principally attacked, is very great.

-The commander in chief of the United States North Atlantic Squad-United States North Atlantic Squad-ron has appointed as the com-mittee for investigating the origin of the explosion on board the «Maine;» Capt. Sampson, com-mander of the ironclad lowa, pre-sident; Capt, Chadwick, command-er of the New York; Lieut. Schroe-dar of the New York; Lieut. Schroeder of the Masschusetts and Lieut. Marx Sampson of the Vermont.

--News comes from Pernambu-co to the effect that the Protestant clergyman of the English Church there has been murdered. The as-

sassin has been arrested. --Mr. Willis E. Baker, the po-pular United States Consul at Rosario, will shortly vacate that post, President McKinley having ap-pointed Dr. James M. Ayers, to succeed him. Dr. Ayers, who is a medical man, was Consul at Para, Brazil, during the Harrison admi-nistration. He is expected to arrive about the end of March.

-A telegram from London states that in the House of Commons on Friday night Mr. Chamberlain, in reply to Sir Charles Dilke as to news of serious char-acter received from West Africa. said that he would merely read the despatches that he had received and would leave the House to appreciate iheir gravity. One of the telegrams was from the Governor of Lagos and stated that 30 Senegalese at Borrea, in the Hinterland, which is occupied by an English detachment, had demanded that the English flag should be hauled down. The English officer refused to do this and the Senegalese retired and encamp-ed at a distance of three miles. Another telegram from Major Northcote reported that the French had established a military post at Wac, and that a French officer had arrived at Vassa with 64 men. Major Northcote sent an officer to prohibit the passing of the French force through the territory, but no notice was taken of the protest. When Mr. Chamberlain had read the despatches the Irish Home rule Member, Dr. Tanner, gave a

Such a thing is merely an intolerable nuisance and senseless licence which ought to be repressed, Carnival or no Carnival. The Chief of Police who has the energy to issue an edict repressing these and similar ex-crescences, and limiting Carnival play to certain forms, hours and restrictions, may earn some temporary unpopularity with the lowest classes, but he will gain the thanks of all decent citizens and enable the large majority who wish to enjoy themselves in a comparatively rational manner to do so without offensive or unpleasant associations. So far from making Carnival duller, this would redeem it and make it a festival for all classes, and not, as it is now, for almost the lower classes exclusively. Above all, it is necessary to subdue the street ur-chins, whose conduct for some time past has gradually been be-coming more impudent and outrageous, until at times they seem the veritable masters of the city and the streets are hardly safe for the ordinary citizen, still less for ladies. This is a remark that applies to other occasions besides Carnival. On Sunday the Clerk of the weather effectually spoilt all diversion. The heavy penetrating drizzle that fell all the afternoon kept every one indoors. The even-ing was damp and raw, not many ventured out, and there was very little animation, even in the central streets, and no «corso» worthy the name. On Monday the weather was ine, but with a suiff gale blowing that impeded play with «serpentinas» and «confetti». The «battle of flowers» in the evening was a poor affair. There was a fair assemblage of carriages and peo-ple in the Calle 18 de Julio, but not much animation, and the other streets, even the illuminated ones, werealmostempty. -A frightful murder was brought to light on Monday morning about five o'clock on the premises of Messrs John and Joseph Drysdale in the Calle Perù, Buenos Aires. The victim was the night watchman, Estefano Amiaro, an Italian, 45 years of age, and for many years in the employ of the wellknown firm mentioned. When some labourers of the firm were returning after their Carnival dan-ces, they found Amiaro lying inside the passage way with his throat cut from ear to ear, and his skull smashed. The police were immedi-ately called in and found a razor with which the crime had been committed, as also a leather-cover-ed steel walking stick. The deceas-ed must have been first stunned by the robbers and then murdered there is no doubt that the murderers were robbers for they carried off a number of nickel watches besides somes articles of small value. The police have arrested all persons who slept on the premises on Sunday night:

Mr. William Fa-gan was founded dead at the gate ot his corral, with his threat cut, and with 16 or 17 ferocious knife wounds, most of them mortal, on his person Mr. Fagan, who lived all alone, rented the run of a flock of sheep on the camp of Mr. Edward O'Brien. He was 60 years of age, was for many years a resid-ent in Argentina, and was a native of Miltown parish, county West-meath, Ireland. He had sold his wool a few days previously, and it is surmised that the object of the murder was robbery.

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
