NEWS OF THE DAY

Holidays.
Monday and Tuesday being kept as Carnival holidays, THE MONTVIDEO TIMES will not appear again until Thursday morning next.

CARNIVAL.
To-day, to-morrow, Tuesday and Sunday next will be devoted to the traditional fêtes and follies of Carnival, and there seems little doubt that on this occasion they will be gayer and more animated than has been the case for a long time past, nor will they be any the worse because the organization has been somewhat hurried and impromptu.

For the first time for several years, we might almost say since 1890, the people will be able to devote themselves to amusement unrestrained by political perplexities, problems and agitations, or by financial or economical crisis or depression, at peace and concord with each other, thoroughly content with their government, and full of hopes for the future. When we remember the conditions of recently past Carnivals, and especially of that of last year which took place amid the first sounds of civil war, we cannot fail to recognise the enormous difference, and we can quite understand how the people, without distinction of class, are ready and eager to express their good spirits by fêtes and festivities which, as a native contemporary has put it, will be quite as much in honor of the new Government as of Carnival itself. The Carnival holidays have given them just the excuse they wanted for a thorough outbreak, and they could not have fallen more opportunely. The following will be more or less the programme.—

Today and Tuesday, general corso commencing at 5 p. m. This will start from Calle 18 de Julio, between Minas and Yaro, go down that street, Sarandí, Colon, 25 de Mayo, and dissolve in Calle Uruguay Entrance free. Vehicles of all descriptions will be allowed to circulate freely during the Carnival days, without payment of tax.

Monday and Sunday the 27th, battle of flowers in Calle 18 de Julio from Ejido to Sarandí, concluding on the Sunday with a torch march. Carriages will only be admitted to this by ticket, and the use of disguise or masks (we think this is not meant to exclude fancy dresses) is forbidden.

On Tuesday afternoon, from 3 to 5, there will be a competition of «comparsas» in the patio of the Cabildo. This is an item that has been omitted for many years past, owing to the want of good feeling between the people and the police, but this year it promises to be one of the most popular. Unfortunately, as so many feared that we would have practically no Carnival at all, it is to be doubted if there has been time for the organization of any really good «comparsas».

The culminating «high life» note of the Carnival will be the masked ball in the Club Uruguay on Tuesday night, which promises to re-

vive old time glories. In addition to this the Spanish, French, Italian and numerous native and other Clubs and societies all give masked balls on one or other of the evenings. For the general public and lower classes there are masked balls nightly in the Solís and San Felipe Theatres to which admission can be had by payment. The use of masks and disguise during Carnival is free. Serpentine and cut paper may be thrown, but the use of water and «pomitos» is forbidden, a restriction which we hope will be strictly enforced. We hear that considerable additions and improvements have been made in the illumination of the central streets.

It will be rash to prophesy as to the weather, but it is to be hoped that the rain which fell yesterday and Friday will leave it fine and as cool as can be expected at this sultry season.

POLITICAL NOTES.

The Council of State held a short sitting on Friday, mainly for the transaction of formalities and routine business of no general interest. The Committees are considering the questions of electoral reform and of new elections, which also afford material for discussion to our principal native contemporaries. Some of the latter, especially the *Siglo*, seem anxious to hurry forward the elections as soon as possible, without even waiting for the completion of electoral reform, but we think this would be an error. The country, and especially commerce, wants a truce from political agitations.

As regards other matters, the political world is very quiet, a great contrast to the unrest and agitation of recent weeks, and there is very little to record. No little amusement has been caused by the statement started by the *Diario* of Buenos Aires, the organ of Dr. Herrera, that the Senate has reincorporated itself, elected Dr. C. Castro as its President, and that the deposed Chambers will shortly meet, elect a President of the Republic, make public their resolutions, establish a Government, and appeal to force to claim their rights. This may be all put down as Carnival news. Meanwhile Dr. Castro remains a refugee on board the «Garibaldi», and not all the assurances that his person will be respected can tempt him ashore. He says he wants to go to Buenos Aires, and so far from preventing, the Government has sarcastically offered him the use of the official galley to embark for the purpose, but he fails to see the joke. Like many natives, he is quite devoid of a sense of humor, and even takes himself seriously. The only thing he need fear here is the laughter caused by his foolish escapade. Another joke going the rounds is that ex-president Julio Herrera, following the example of ex-President Pellegrini, proposes to set up in Buenos Aires as an auctioneer. If a faculty for representing black as white is of any service to him, he ought quickly to reach the head of the profession. It is added that several of his followers propose to establish themselves in Buenos Aires as lawyers having disregarded the law so long, they now propose to practise it. We expect the truth is that the «collectivistas» no longer able to draw upon the public treasury, are at their wits' end how to live, being unused to earning their livelihood by honest work, and moreover finding themselves entirely discredited here and uncomfortably pressed by their numerous creditors, the only persons who have the least regret for their fall. Perhaps we ought to feel Christian pity for their predicament—but we don't, not in the least.

The vacant post of National Inspector of Public Instruction has been offered to Dr. C. M. de Pena, who would fill it admirably, but in spite of all entreaty, he declines, and the post remains unfilled. Dr. Martinez Vigil, an excellent choice, has been appointed to a vacancy in the Direction General of Public Instruction (Board of Education).

The Executive has promulgated the Law referring to the administrative liquidation of the National Bank and has appointed the following liquidators, as President, Sr. J. H. Arredondo, Treasurer of the Nation; as Treasurer, Sr. M. V. Martinez, Chief of the Office of Public Credit; and as Secretary, Sr. J. A. Marquez of the State Accountancy office. It will be remembered that they are to carry out the task without additional salary.

The Administrative Committee of the Electric Light Company, composed of Dr. Campisteguy, Sr. P. Echegaray and Sr. B. Quinones, was installed on Friday.

The garrison troops, which have been confined to barracks since the *coup d'état*, will be given free gate after the Carnival holidays.

Dr. Mendilaharsu, Minister, in Buenos Aires, has arrived here, and will remain over the holidays.

None of our contemporaries have articles from which we consider it necessary to quote.

The Commercial Commission.

We quote the following notes from the *S. A. Journal* of January 22 and 29.

—We are informed that the Board of Trade has decided that the visit of their Commissioners on the South American Commercial Mission is to be limited to Southern Brazil, the River Plate and Chili.

—Mr. Thomas Worthington, the Board of Trade Commissioner on the Mission of Inquiry to South America, sailed on Wednesday, January 26. We hear that the Associated Chambers of Commerce, who had appointed Sir Vincent Barrington to accompany him, have now decided since their representative has resigned, to await the return of Mr. Worthington; when, if the Council consider that necessity exists for further information, they may end out a commissioner of their own.

—The general opinion amongst merchants, with whom we have discussed the subject of this Commercial Mission, agrees with ours, namely, that it will be productive of but few results of practical value, on the lines indicated by the instructions to the Commissioner. The mere collection of samples and prices could have been affected by the aid of the Consuls and parcel post, or even more easily in the shipping ports of Germany and other rival nations. Merchants actually in the trade already know all they require in this direction. But there are many other ways by which this mission might have rendered services of inestimable value to the commercial body. It is a great pity that the Government has not taken full advantage of this opportunity. Perhaps the Associated Chambers of Commerce will do better.

—Sir Vincent Barrington has sailed for Venezuela, where he will remain for a few months.

SUNDRIES.

—Yesterday's telegrams referring to the loss of the U. S. S. «Maine» bring no confirmation of the story of a torpedo, which was probably the invention of an unscrupulous reporter desirous of making a sensation at the expense of Spain. President McKinley has caused the following sensitive note to be published in the *N. American papers*:—«Judging from information received from Cuba, President McKinley believes that the loss of the cruiser «Maine» was due to an accident, and hopes that this belief will be confirmed by the official investigation. Should it prove otherwise, the President will take decisive measures in accordance with the gravity of the attempt. Until the investigation is terminated, the Government must abstain from all resolution in the matter.» Notwithstanding this declaration, the jingo papers are doing their worst to provoke excitement against Spain, and are even promoting indignation meetings. According to an official statement published in Washington, there were 26 officers and 255 men on board the «Maine», and the exact number of victims is 246. Up to the present some 135 bodies have been recovered. A number of these were buried at Havana, on Friday, all the public authorities and a guard of honor from the «Alfonso XII» attending the funeral. The Municipality of Havana offered to bear the expenses, but Consul Lee declined the offer. Congress has voted a credit of \$200,000 to bring the relics of the «Maine» and the bodies of the victims to the United States. A motion in the U. S. Senate to establish a separate investigation into the catastrophe was rejected after a vigorous debate. Ten more of the injured have died in hospital at Havana. The wreck is being examined by Spanish and N. American divers simultaneously, though at first it would seem that the Spanish authorities made some objection to the presence of the latter. Divers representing the N. York papers will not be allowed to interfere. The excitement in Madrid is calming down. It is said the «Montgomery» will be sent to Havana to replace the «Maine.» According to a rather doubtful Washington telegram, an attempt will be made to raise and restore the «Maine.» A Company buying a concession from the State for the purpose of \$1,500,000 She represents some five million dollars. There are several extravagant statements in the telegrams that we hesitate to repeat.

WOMAN AS A RACE.

SPECTATOR.

All women have fathers as well as mothers. That is a fact of natural history which we do not suppose the most advanced of the crowds who are now writing about women and their progress are prepared definitely to deny, but they would certainly like to deny it if they could. The assumption which underlies all their views is that women are not only different from men physically, intellectually and morally, but that they belong to a different race, which may as time advances, have a destiny of its own. They write as if the great Hindoo logists, who hold that female property should descend only to females, had perceived part of a great truth, which is, that women are continuously separate from men, inherit nothing from them and are for ever advancing upon a line of their own which will in the end, or at all events may in the end, after what Mrs. Green calls an anarchic period, develop in them something probably superior to anything in men, or at the worst something radically different. The human race with these writers is male, but women are female, and therefore something quite other than human. Their strength and their weakness, their virtues and their failings, belong to themselves, and no more belong to a common humanity than the qualities of the felide belong to a common animal nature. They have a different line as well as a different line of progress, and will in the end develop into beings entirely separate from men, probably much higher, but at all events so different that to reason from the progress of one sex to the progress of the other is as futile as to reason that because wolves have in the

—The Rev. Dr. Dreas of Buenos Aires will conduct the services at the Methodist Church this morning and evening.

—We hear that Mr. and Mrs. W. Harvey of the London and Brazilian Bank are likely to spend a few days holiday here early in March. Mr. Harvey has been transferred from the Bank in Bahia to that in Rio Grande, and will take opportunity of stopping here on the way. We predict for them an enthusiastic welcome from their many friends here.

—A telegram mentions a terrible catastrophe which has just occurred on the coast of Finland. A storm which suddenly arose dislodged an enormous mass of ice on which many fishermen, according to custom, had taken up their abode, and 200 fishermen with their dwellings and domestic animals were precipitated into the sea.

—A French general has inaugurated a plan of permitting soldiers to sing when on the march, a privilege which has been strictly denied until recently. It has also been arranged that any soldier who can play on any of the smaller musical instruments shall be provided with such instrument at the expense of the State. In the Russian army the soldiers are encouraged to sing on the march, and the best singers in a regiment are told off to the front. Thomas Atkins occasionally bursts into song, but his efforts are not officially favoured, although a good song and chorus are capital things on a march. Some of our volunteer regiments have good marching songs, and sing them well.

—A telegram states that «Lord Gladstone» has returned to London, and is in satisfactory health.

—Yesterday was the 30th anniversary of the assassination of General Flores, one of the political crimes that have stained the chequered history of this Republic.

—Teacher: «Why did Joseph and Mary go down to Egypt by night?» Girl: «Please miss, because they hadn't paid their rent.»

—Cranberry growing is a large and profitable industry in New York State. A cranberry marsh needs little or no fertilizer, the most essential point being to see that the marsh is flooded with water at the right time and drawn off with equal precision. In consequence of this there is very little labour and less still of capital needed in conducting a cranberry marsh after the ground is prepared, the plants set out, and the marsh is in growing condition. Some twelve years ago a grower laid down about twenty-five acres of seemingly valueless low-lying land as a cranberry field; it now yields a return of about seventy pounds an acre.

—We call attention to the opening of the Girl's Evangelical School, Calle San José 257, which takes place on Tuesday, March 1st. Parents are requested to send their children for the opening, that the classes may be organised as quickly as possible. Special attention is called to the Kindergarten Department, which receives children from four to six years of age.

main ignorant—will, if the new thesis prevails, be silently given up, and we shall see as regards knowledge generally, what we see on the Continent as regards religion, an effective wish on the part of men that women should not be as enlightened as themselves. There is visible a coming dread of culture in women which, as men must rule—those who plough being inevitably masters of those who can only ask for food—will, so far as it goes, check education, and with it much hope for women, and men, and the world. Mutual understanding upon this point at least is essential to the progress of mankind, and as the idea of separateness can only develop jealousy lest one sex should be surpassed by the other—the theory being that they are rival races, not parts of the same race—we can but regard the new teaching with apprehension. It does not matter very much, may be, for after all to the end of time every son will presuppose a mother; but still, as far as it goes, it is like everything else that is false, distinctly injurious.

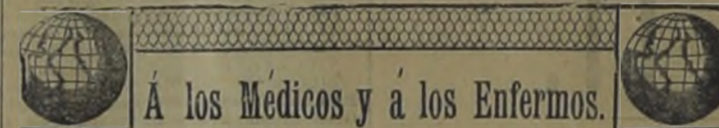
