The Commercial Commission. We quote the following notes from the S. A. Journal of January

-We are informed that the Board of Trade has decided that the visit of their Commissioners on the South American Commercial Mission is to be limited to Southern Brazil, the River Plate and Chili.

-Mr. Thomas Worthington, the Board of Trade Commissioner on the Mission of Inquiry to South America, sailed on Wednesday, January 26 We hear that the As-sociated Chambers of Commerce, who had appointed Sir Vincent Barrington to accompany him, have now decided since their representative has resigned, to await the return of Mr. Worthington; when, if the Council consider that necessity exists for further information, they may end out a com-missioner of their own.

-The general opinion amongst merchants, with whom we have discussed the subject of this Commercial Mission, agrees with ours, namely, that it will be productive of but few results of practical value, of but few results of practical value, on the lines indicated by the ins-tructions to the Commission-er. The mere collection of samples and prices could have been affected by the aid of the Consults and parcel post, or even more easily in the shipping parts of Germany and other rivel ports of Germany and other rival nations. Merchants actually in the trade already know all they require in this direction. But there are many other ways by which this mission might have rendered services of inestimable value to the commercial body. It is a great pity that the Government has not taken full advantage of this opportunity. Perhaps the Associated Chambers of Commerce will do better.

-Yesterday's telegrams referr-ing to the loss of the U.S.S «Maine» bring no confirmation of the story of a torpedo, which was probably the invention of an unscrupulous reporter distrous of making a sensation at the expense of Spain. President McKinley has caused the following sensible note to be published in the N American papers; - «Judging from information received from Cuba, President McKinley believes that the loss of the cruiser «Maine» was due to an accident, and hopes that this belief will be confirmed by the official investigation. Should it prove otherwise, the President will take decisive measures in accordance with the gravity of the attempt. Until the inves-tigation is terminated, the Government must abstain from all resolution in the matter.» Notwithsstanding this declaration, the jingo papers are doing their worst to provoke excitement against Spain, and are even promoting indignation meetings. According to an official statement published in Washing-ton, there were 26 officers and 255 men on board the «Maine», and the exact number of victims is 246. Up to the present some 135 bodies have been recovered. A number of these were buried at Havana, on Friday, all the public authorities and a guard of honor from the «Alfonso XII» attending the funeral, The Municipality o Havana offered to bear the expenses, but Consul Lee de-clined the offer. Congress has voted a credit of \$200,000 to bring the relics of the «Maine» and the bodies of the victims to the United States. A motion in the U. S .Senate to establish a separate

investigation into the catastrophe was rejected after a vigorous debate. Ten more of the injured have died in hospital at Havana. The wreck is being examined by Spanish and N. American drivers simultaneously, though at first it would seem that the Spanish authorities made some obection to the presence of the latter. Divers representing the N. York papers will not be allowed to interfere. The excitement in Madrid is calming down. It is said the «Montgomery» will be sent to Havana to replace the «Maine»

In the Russian army the soldiers are encouraged to sing on the march, and the best singers in a regiment are told off to the front. A cranberry marsh needs little or no fertiliser, the most essential point being to see that the marsh is flooded with water at the right time and drawn off with equal precision. The hostility comes out in women's writings much more for citily, and is already producing in certain classes an unmistakeable evil-a certain difficulty of com-prehension, or shall we call it a certain indefinite dread ? Permanent, or even long-continued, enmity between the sexes is impossible, but a deep misconception be-tween them may arise, did arise of all practical arguments-that no race can be cultivated thorough-
