NEWS OF THE DAY

Saints Matilde and Florentina.—Admiral Earl St. Vincent died, 1823.—74 days past, 261 to the end of the year.

POLITICAL NOTES.

The "electoral accord" and the elections continue to be the predominant topics. The delegates of the three parties met on Saturday, and agreed without difficulty on the two preliminary bases of the candidature of Sr. Cuestas to the future presidency and of the complete annulment of the existing civic registers and the formation of new ones according to the reformed law. Then, however, came the bone of contention—and it seems likely to prove a serious one—in the shape of the proportional division of seats. The "colorados" proposed to maintain the proportion in the present Council of State, namely 58 "colorados," 24 "biancos" and 6 "constitucionalistas." The "biancos," however, claim 30 seats as more in proportion to the strength of their party, and regard even this as making a concession. How it will end it is not possible to say. When this question is solved there is yet another difficult one awaiting the delegates in the proportional allotment of the seats between the two Chambers, besides other difficulties which may yet crop up. However, the delegates are said to be meeting each other in the most friendly spirit, so for the present there is no motive for alarm.

There is nothing to report from the Government House, where all remains tranquil. It would seem that all idea of reconstructing the Cabinet has disappeared for the present. Some further decrees of appointments are expected in the course of the present week.

It is stated that the "collectivists" are not going to allow themselves to be consigned entirely to oblivion, but intend starting a new paper defending themselves and in opposition to the new situation. We think they may save their money and trouble. Not even their facility in the handling of sophism and falsehood will succeed in convincing the people that the late regime was satisfactory, or in undoing the revelations that have been made on every side of "collectivists" dishonesty, corruption, extravagance and robbery. They had better let well alone, and be satisfied that they have been submitted to no severer punishment yet than the contempt and hatred of their fellow countrymen.

The Superior Tribunal of Justice has issued a resolution suspending Dr. Antonio W. Parsons from practice as a lawyer on account of disrespectful language in documents presented to the Court. This is in relation to the same case—a lawsuit in which Dr. Julio Herrera is concerned—which has already led to the suspension of Drs. Perez Petit and Veiga, also for the use of disrespectful language. What the real origin of the quarrel is, is more than we can say, but it seems to point to unsatisfactory relations between the Tribunal and some of the lawyers.

With regard to the irregularities discovered in the Custom House Department that is to say the wholesale advances made to employees, the Government has resolved to give them a severe admonishment and to stop one-third of their salaries until the advances are paid off. This is all very well—but how about those who have been or may be dismissed and consequently have no salaries to stop? Is no restitution to be demanded from them?

Important Sale of South American Wools in Bradford.

A NEW DEPARTURE.
It is very significant, but this last few years has seen a very marked development in demand and consumption in the premier market of Yorkshire. Bradford buyers were compelled for years to journey to Antwerp, until, as they say in Yorkshire, they were "stalled," and by strong pressure Buenos Aires and Montevideo merchants were persuaded to consign to Liverpool a good weight of the yearly clip for sale there. To Liverpool Bradford buyers faithfully went and have always consumed from 80 to 90 per cent. of the wool sold there. Now, however, we are pleased to chronicle another step forward in the right direction, and last Tuesday, in the city of Bradford, there was inaugurated a system which we hope to see further developed. The growers of the staple and the buyers were brought together in a way which must inevitably work to the mutual advantage of both, and in one particular at least, South American pastoralists are ahead of their Australian competitors.

Last Tuesday afternoon the first action sale of direct imported River Plate wool in Bradford took place at the Mechanics' Institute. Mr. J. G. Best being the auctioneer on behalf of the Bradford Wool Company, Limited. There was a very large attendance of men associated with the Bradford trade, and buyers from other parts of Yorkshire, those present being thoroughly representative of the woolen and worsted trade as a whole. At the outset Mr. J. G. Best explained that this was an experimental sale, and that upon the measure of success attained the future course of the Bradford Wool Company to a large extent depended. Bidding was at once very brisk, and the whole of the wool offered 945 bales of cross breeds—was sold without reserve. The prices realised varied from 6 1/2d, at which very few lots were sold, to 7 1/4d., according to the quality of the particular lots dealt with. The great bulk of the wool went at 6 3/4d., there being a keen and eager demand for everything knocked down at that figure. The prices as a whole were equal to full quotations at Buenos Aires for shaggy coarse wools, while medium and fine cross breeds realised from 5 to 8 per cent less than quotations from Buenos Ayres. Although the Bradford trade got the wool at its own price the very general support given to this new sale was considered by the vendors to justify further sales in the future on a large scale.—S. A. Journal, Feb. 19.

River Plate Wool Auctions.

Messrs. Ronald and Redger, brokers in their Liverpool circular, dated 16th Feb., report as under:—

The third auctions for this season took place to day, and the quantities offered and sold were as follows:—

The selection included lever of the best known and highest class flocks of Lincolns and cross-breeds from Buenos Aires, but some parcels of almost equal merit under various marks, which testify to the general progress made of late in careful breeding and assortment. The Bahia Blanca clips show also some improvement in style, though their condition is relatively faulty, not so much as regards grease and burrs, but the quantity of earth they carry in the staple which detracts so much from their appearance. The Montevideo's were principally merinos of fine staple and superior condition, the comparative freedom from burrs being remarkable. The excellent tone at the late London auctions has scarcely been followed to its full extent at the leading consuming centres, but a more confident feeling all round has been particularly prominent as regards the position and future of merino wools, the shortened production of which, owing to the drought in Australia and cross-breeding everywhere, is becoming a dominant factor in the market.

Library.

Messrs. Macmillan have favored us with copies of three of their recent publications.

"Plan Living" (Colonial Library) is a bush idyll by the popular Australian writer Rolf Boldrewood. It is in his usual vigorous style, full of incident, and will well sustain the reputation he has made.

"A Chapter of Accidents" (Colonial Library) by Mrs. Hugh Fraser

is a pleasant and readable book, with some entertaining sketches of youthful life and a sufficient fringe of romance. It is the kind of book that will be specially acceptable to younger readers.

"A Bride Elect" by Theo Douglas, though short, is of higher literary pretensions than the two preceding works and deals with a more serious side of life. We reserve fuller notice of this until we have had time to read it carefully, as it deserves.

SUNDRIES.

Private commercial telegrams received here from New York state "war imminent" and later that there is a war panic on the Stock Exchange and in the business market. The press telegrams, however, reveal nothing very serious, and in fact are rather quiet than usual. The Report of the "Maine" Investigation Committee, it is now said, will not be presented for another fortnight, and members of the U. S. Government are stated to have denied that they yet have any definite knowledge of the cause of the explosion. Nevertheless some New York papers insist on anticipating an unfavorable conclusion to the Report, asserting that it is practically proved that the explosion was caused by a submarine mine directly under the vessel. We do not think any reliance can be placed on any of these premature assertions, the jingo object of which is apparent. It is again asserted, this time from Madrid, that Germany will assist Spain in case of war, but that the other Powers have signified their intention not to intervene. The Commandership in Chief of the U. S. army is said to have been offered to General Merritt. An idiotic telegram from Paris says that the European powers unanimously advise the United States not to declare war, "because Great Britain, Russia and Germany will not permit it." In reply to various diplomatic enquiries the Pope has stated that he could only intervene if asked to do so by one of the Powers directly concerned. Preparations for war continue in the United States, and bodies of troops of the line are being sent south ready for embarkation in the transports of the North Atlantic squadron. To Senator Hanna is attributed the declaration that President McKinley, of whom he is an intimate friend, entertains the belief that war is inevitable. The telegrams are mainly occupied with heat-says and newspaper opinions to which no great value can be attached, but the recourse of the correspondents to these to keep up the excitement seems to us a sign that the situation is less serious than it was—at all events it shows a paucity of facts for them to work upon.

Her Majesty has arrived safely at Cimiez, near Nice, and is reported to be in capital health.

President Faure is confined to his bed with an attack of influenza, which, however, is not considered very severe.

Mr and Mrs. W. E. Harvey, having returned from Buenos Aires on Friday, left yesterday morning in the steamer "Santos" for Rio Grande, where Mr. Harvey will take charge of the London and Brazilian Bank. Early as was the hour of departure, there were several friends to see them off. Now that they are so much nearer Montevideo, it may be hoped that they will favor their many friends here with more frequent visits.

According to telegrams that have appeared recently, Professor Sanarelli has been very successful in San Pablo in his experiments with his serum for the cure of yellow fever. Out of 30 serious cases, he effected a complete cure in 23, equivalent to 70%, and was uniformly successful in arresting the fever in incipient cases. Since his first experiments he has increased the strength of the dose with improved results. The Professor is expected back here on Saturday next, on his way to the Congress of Hygiene at Madrid, when it is hoped he will give a more scientific account of his experiences than was possible in the telegrams.

Dr. Isidoro Errazuriz, Chilean Minister in Rio Janeiro, died in that city on Saturday last, from yellow fever. He was one of the most distinguished of Chileans, shining as statesman, diplomat and man of letters. He had occupied seats in the Chambers, the Cabinet, and various important public posts, and had more than once figured as a political exile. The Brazilian Government gave him a pompous state funeral.

Mr. Phipps, the British Minister in Rio, has declared that the Rio Branco Question has terminated satisfactorily, both for Britishers and Brazilians. A Treaty is to be entered into shortly between England and Brazil for settling, once and for all, the Guiana boundary dispute.

On Wednesday last, in Buenos Aires, Miss Cousens, who

came out in the "Magdalena" last November, was married to Mr. Edye son of Dr. Edye of this city.

Miss Cousens is the daughter of the Revd. Roland Richard Cousens, rector of Newcastle, Staffordshire.

They are happy in Buenos Aires at last. They have a real live Prince, not merely as a flying visitor, but as a resident; namely, Prince Casati, the new Secretary of the Italian Legation there, who arrived in the "Magdalena" accompanied by his wife, who belongs to an old noble Neapolitan family.

The high mortality amongst cattle and sheep shipped from the River Plate to England has attracted attention in Parliament and the Government was questioned about it in the House on Friday. It appears that the mortality amongst animals crossing the North Atlantic, stormy as it is, is only 27 per mil, whereas it is 97 per mil for sheep from Buenos Aires. It is, of course, mainly due to the fact that the poor beasts are shipped on board steamers that were never meant for the cattle trade.

The B. A. Standard states with much pleasure that Miss Thurburn, sister of Mr. E. A. Thurburn, manager of the London and River Plate Bank, is now quite convalescent, and completely recovered from the effects of her loss out of her pony carriage.

We quote from the B. A. Standard.—Drs. Harnandez and Carreras, instructed to report on the mental faculties of Etcheagaray, who more than a year ago killed our old friend Mr. John B. Wanklyn, have resolved to make a fresh examination of the prisoner on Tuesday next and for that purpose will repair to the Penitentiary at 9 a. m. Why, since the deed was committed the man has had time to become sane and go mad again half dozen times! What a miserable farce it appears. Such evidence to carry weight should be taken within 72 hours from the moment when the affair took place. What sort of justice is it that provides such rulings? We are not here expressing any opinion about the horrible and most deplorable homicide; but are merely criticising the legal system that permits of such a wretched anomaly so utterly opposed to all ideas of equity—may we common sense it is simply making Argentine Justice the laughing stock of the civilized world!

The telegrams say that the insurrection in the Philippines is extending and likely to prove serious. They likewise say that it has already been effectually suppressed. We do enjoy variety in our telegraphic news.

What cannibals they must be in Switzerland. An advertisement in a Swiss paper says—"Wanted a servant who knows how to cook and take care of children."

The latest estimate of the population of the United States is 73 1/2 millions of people, and that of Spain 17 1/2 millions.

It is said that two or three duels are on foot on account of recent publications and incriminations concerning the conduct of the revolution, possibly including one between Col. Lamas and Dr. Duvinoso Terra. This is a sorry way of settling matters. Surely there has been fighting enough already with recourse to the folly of duels to settle matters of opinion.

The frequent wet weather of the present summer seems to have brought about a plague of mosquitoes. We rarely remember them so troublesome.

Here is how an Alpine accident has occurred in Vienna in the middle of winter. A tourist's ball (says our correspondent) was given one Saturday night by a section of Alpinists, and the background of the ball room had been decorated with a beautiful view of the Austrian Alps, which, according to the realistic tendencies of the times, was finished off with a real hill in front, on which grew alpenrosen and edelweiss. It was the ambition of all the ladies present to climb this hill in their short skirts and nailed boots which are essential for a tourist's ball. A lady of fifty-four successfully ascended the height and expressed her triumphant joy by bursting into a hearty jodel, when her foot slipped and she was precipitated down the rickety pasteboard hill and broke both legs. The doctor who attended to her was in leather breeches, with bare knees, and green stockings, and a woodcock's feather in his hat.

The golf season opened on Sunday, in beautiful weather, with a match between President's and Vice-president's sides, the latter winning by 30 to 5. Individual play was as follows.—F. Handerson beat Richards by 1. Costabadie beat Dr. Chambers by 1. Reid was beaten by Cameron 8. Marshall beat Crocker by 3 Hill and Jones a tie. Lane was beaten by Fraser 10. Thomas by Dunbar 8. Benedict by Jas. Oldham 3. Nuttall by Kerr Connell 1.

The racing season opened at Maroñas on Sunday, with glorious weather overhead though a rather soft course, and a good attendance. The new season's horses, trotted out in the Premio Ensayo were the centre of interest, though some thought that the show was hardly up to the usual mark. This event was won by Maravilla, Salto 2 Mi Carta 3. Sport, \$5.93; place \$4.02 and \$6.85. The other results were; Premio Apertura; Revoloso and Sylvia dead heat, Croupier 3. Sport, Revoloso \$22.32, Sylvia \$5.79; place, \$4.81 and \$28.23.—Premio Montevideo; Centella 1, Jeannette 2, Lautaro 3. Sport, \$6.09; place, \$3.86 and \$5.63. Premio Triunfo; Lebel 1, Piloto 2, Cañonera 3. Sport, \$10.23; place \$5.55 and \$6.01.—Premio Tucapel; Camaruro 1, Imposible 2, Ay de Mi 3. Sport, \$5.62; place \$3.33 and \$4.80.

Latest advices from Europe say that General Booth, of the Salvation Army, arrived at Toronto on February 4th, after having addressed large and enthusiastic gatherings at Kingston, Hamilton, London, and other places. He held a reception, and a meeting took place at the Massey Hall, which was very largely attended. Mr. A. S. Hardy, Premier of Ontario, was in the chair. Mr. Shaw, the Mayor, and aldermen welcomed General Booth on behalf of the city. The General has also paid a visit to President McKinley at the White House in Washington. They had a long conversation, and the President expressed the keen interest he had long taken in the great world-wide organization known as the Salvation Army.

Another distinguished visitor to the River Plate by the "Magdalena" is Admiral Fairfax a Buenos Aires contemporary greets him as follows.—"We have great pleasure in saluting on his arrival here Admiral Sir Henry Fairfax K. C. B., who some twenty years ago was the Commander of this station in the "Volage." Few men have enjoyed a greater degree of popularity in our community, but there are few here remaining to-day who had the privilege of his acquaintance. If we remember aright he was recalled from this station by telegraph to take command of the Britannia, when the Royal Princes became cadets, and on his departure a banquet was given to him at the Café Paris by a number of the British residents. The "menu" of this dinner was designed by George Higgin, the head of Bateman and Co., one of the best fellows possible and certainly the most popular of all our residents for the last thirty years. Captain Fairfax subsequently was in command of the Monarch at the bombardment of Alexandria, and afterwards was Military Governor of Suez when it was the haunt of the vilest cutthroats of Europe. Shortly after he paid another visit to the River Plate, and then invested in some of the Southern Camps, which he still holds. The head of the family to which Admiral Fairfax belongs is the Hon. Baron Fairfax, of Cameron, who is a born citizen of the United States, and an M.D. residing in Maryland, U.S.A.

The Journal of Education occasionally ministers to the gaiety of the general public by the publication of a few "howlers," warranted genuine by the sender. To the question, "What do you know of Lord Wolsey?" the answer was given, "He was a Minister of Henry VIII., who exclaimed, 'If I had served my God as I have served my King, I should not have been beheaded!'" The confusion between Wolsey and Wolsey is perhaps not remarkable, but a post mortem speech of this kind deserves notice. A better story, however, is of a definition of "ethics" which will be of special interest to the Church and Stage Guild—"things worn by ladies in circuses and pantomimes."

The weather for the last two days has been simply glorious, and most refreshing after what preceded it. The fall in the thermometer has been notable, the temperature on both days being barely over 70° Fahr in the shade, which is not even summer heat. As autumn commences next Sunday, it is time we had a change, but it must not be supposed the hot weather is all done with yet.

Dr. Nansen's impressions of the United States, it seems, were not altogether pleasant. He was received with courtesy and enthusiasm, but in his opinion American life has some drawbacks. One of these is the American reporter. Dr. Nansen was plagued morning, noon, and night by the representatives of enterprising newspapers wishing to interview him. On one occasion he was awakened at two in the morning by a reported who desired to know at what time he intended to leave the town next day. At first Dr. Nansen thought the man was the hotel porter, and on discovering his mistake his language was more vigorous than polite.

LONDON NOTES

MONDAY, FEBRUARY 14.

Writing from Hatfield, Lord Salisbury states that the foreign policy of the Government has been the object of much adverse criticism which has been exceptionally hasty and ill-informed.

A Correspondent in the Sudan has reached Meroweh from Korti in company with the Warwickshire Regiment. He reports that the country is well under cultivation, and the natives genuinely friendly. Every preparation is being made at Meroweh, and the whole camp is within a strongly fortified position.

Plans are actively on foot, says a Calcutta telegram, for fresh operations against the Afridis. The Government have ordered a survey to be made for a railway line from Jamrud to Lundi-Kotal.

General Billot, the French War Minister, declared once more in the Chamber on Saturday that Dreyfus had been legally condemned. At the trial of M. Zola, Colonel Picquart continued his evidence. An altercation having arisen upon a point in dispute between the witness and Colonel Henry, the latter charged him with lying.

A telegram from Vienna announces the death on Saturday of Count Kalnoky, Austrian Minister of Foreign Affairs from 1881 till 1895.

Viscount Peel presided over a large gathering at the Passmore Edwards Settlement, Tavistock-place, on Saturday night, when Mr. Morley, M. P., delivered an address upon the need for Settlements in London, and on their usefulness and functions. They were not, he pointed out, beset with dangerous formalisms, officialisms, and mechanisms, and they did not rest on materialism and soulless secularism. Sentimentalism and professionalism were excluded, and they recognised the grave responsibility and the stern side of everything. The system was not monastic, and those who worked were in daily and actual contact with human interests.

Under the presidency of Mr. Carl Hentschel the fourteenth annual dinner of the Playgoers' Club was held last night. Sir Henry Irving, who was the principal guest, delivered an interesting address on the position and prospect of the drama. Different critics suggested different reasons for the alleged decline of the drama. For his part, he could not help suspecting that the chief difficulty of a manager, under even the most artistic and least commercial conditions, would always be, not to check the inordinate proportions of success, but to secure plays which succeed at all.

There was again a large attendance at the midday celebration of the Holy Communion at St. Ethelburga, Bishopsgate, yesterday. Water was ceremonially mixed with the wine in the chalice by the officiating clergyman. Protestants went to the altar and received the bread, but on the cup being offered declined to accept it, and left the church. The scene was a painful one, though external quiet was observed.

A hearty welcome was accorded the officers and men of the cruiser St. George at Portsmouth on Saturday on their return home from the West Coast of Africa. Crowds gathered in the streets, many of which were made gay with bunting, and the ship's company were repeatedly cheered on their march to the Town Hall. Here they were received by the Mayor and Corporation, and were entertained at dinner.

The passengers and crew of the liner Veendam, of the Netherlands American company, have been rescued and landed at New York by the American liner St. Louis. The Veendam is reported to have struck a submerged wreck which tore a hole in her bottom and made it necessary to abandon her.

The cricket match between Mr. Stoddart's team and New South Wales was concluded on Friday. The second innings of the Englishmen closed for 363, and the Colonials were therefore victorious by 239 runs. McLaren only added 5 to his overnight score of 135. Hayward carried off his bat for 64.

The second round in the Association Cup competition gave Saturday's football its chief importance. There were eight ties, and nearly the whole of these were closely contested. Derby County, Bolton Wanderers, Southampton, Notts Forest, Burnley, and West
