POLITICAL NOTES.

There is next to nothing to report from the political world. The Report of the Minister of Foment has been approved by the Cabinet and the matter will be presented to the Council of State. Outside official circles the main subject of interest is the arrangements for the approaching elections, though, now the "accord" is arranged, the people only take a secondary interest, and the only point really at issue is the selection of candidates by the respective parties, which, as usual, will be worked by the managing cliques. The Siglo has been examining the idea of holding a plebiscite in favor of the electoral accord and finds that it has quite as many drawbacks as advantages. Such things only serve where the party organization is far more complete than it yet is in this country. We can see little in it but another excuse for political agitation.

The Note of the Executive to the Tribunals is now said to be by no means so fulminating as was at first represented, and mainly refers to the congregation of prisoners who are kept awaiting trial for exaggerated periods, overworking the prisons and proving a burden to the State. This has been notoriously the case for a long time, and indeed is generally the case in all those Republics, where the march of justice is neither swift nor sure.

The Report of the Finance Committee of the Council of State on the question of postal tariff for newspapers and printed matter has been published. As anticipated the Committee opposes the entire removal of the tariff; but recommends that it be reduced by one-half, namely to 1/2 cent per 100 grammes also giving option of fortnightly payments to those publishing establishments furnishing sufficient guarantee. This only applies to matter printed in the Republic and posted for circulation within the same. No alteration is proposed in the tariff for foreign postage.

It has been discovered that during the civil war last year, certain of the government military leaders issued a number of certificates of service to officers and others who never took any part in the campaign but are now presenting them for payment. The Government has ordered an investigation into the affair, which is an obvious attempt to defraud the Treasury.

Sr Orlando Ribero has been ordered to conduct an investigation into the affairs of the Office of Civil Registry. This Office is in receipt of an income from registration fees of \$800 to \$900 the month, of which it seems no account has been rendered for a long time past, and the Government not unreasonably imagines that there should be a considerable sum to its credit the whereabouts of which it is desirable to know.

Reports are again in circulation of the approaching retirement of General Gregorio Castro from the Ministry of War, on account of his advanced age and delicate health. We believe he is 73 years of age.

THE PROPOSED AMERICAN INTERNATIONAL BANK.

On the subject of this proposed Bank, Mr. W. H. T. Hughes, of New York, has said:—

"Once the bank is established, and its agencies in the various business centres of Central and South America are under way, it will be as simple an operation for a manufacturer in the United States to fill an order for a customer in Rio de Janeiro, Buenos Aires, or Valparaiso, as it is to-day to fill one for a customer in Boston or New York. English banking institutions directly connected with South America are already beginning to see the advantage of looking after the American business, and, among others, we have already established in New York agencies of the London and River Plate Bank, Limited, the London and Brazilian Bank, and the British Bank of South America, Limited, and if we do not go into the banking business ourselves pretty soon, our good cousin John Bull will have monopolized our banking business as thoroughly as he has already monopolized our carrying trade. The banks referred to have agencies established in all the important points in South America, and the London and River Plate Bank, Limited, which is devoted exclusively to the business similar to the one in which the American International Bank would engage, is one of the most successful banking institutions in the world, and pays large and regular dividends to its stockholders. It has paid, I believe, as high as 20 per cent per annum, and has in the meantime accumulated a surplus fund of about £1,000,000 sterling.

"The opponents of the scheme claim that London is the banking centre of the world, and that it is useless to attempt to divert the natural course of banking and trade. I will admit that London is to-day the banking centre of the world, and the clearing-house of the commerce of the world; but that is no reason why it should always be so. There was a time when we could not build a railroad in this country without first consulting the bankers of London as to ways and means, but it is not so to-day. There was a time when London ruled our New York Stock Exchange, and prices went up or down in sympathy with London. It is not so to-day. Why may not Greater New York, with the aid of her many enterprising citizens, become first the clearing-house of the business of this hemisphere, and, later on, the clearing-house of the commerce of the world?

"Some people laugh when you tell them that much of our legislation is controlled by English influences, but you may rest assured that no attempt is ever made to enact a law in favour of American shipping, or to pass a Bill relating to banking or commerce like the one to incorporate the American International Bank, that it is not quietly and generally successfully opposed by a lobby in the interest of the British Embassy in Washington. British diplomats understand their business, and do it well. They are trained to it. They look after the interests of their Government and always endeavour to stop the passage of any legislation which will be in any way detrimental to their own commerce. England does not want the United States to get any footing in the South American market; she has already one active competitor in Germany, and she does not want any more.

"What is most needed, if we wish to extend our commerce with the countries south of us, besides banking facilities and ample transportation, is the establishment of distinctly American business houses in those countries. An American merchant in any of those places is about as rare as an American ship. The young Englishman or German is, after a training in the counting-house at home, sent abroad to take a position in some business house. When he comes back he knows the wants and customs of the country he is dealing with, and when he again enters the counting-house at home is able to conduct the business in an intelligent manner.

"The establishment of the American International Bank would lead to the employment of many of our young men to fill positions in its various agencies. When they return home they will do so, speaking and writing the language, and knowing the ways of those people; this, with the friendships they will naturally form abroad, will do more to increase our foreign commerce than all that can be done by our Chamber of Commerce, Board of Trade and Philadelphia Museum.

"We cannot expect to do a business of any magnitude with a people we do not know, and who do not know us. If we want to extend our commerce with them we must have free intercourse. How can we do this? Only by establishing regular and fast steamship communication, and having ample banking facilities.

"The European capitalist is always ready to entertain proposals for building railroads in foreign countries. He is always ready to subscribe to the establishment of steamship lines to foreign ports. If you mention such a thing to an American capitalist, he buttons up his pockets, and tells you it is 'too far from the Bowery.'

"As a people we have taken too little interest in our foreign commerce. In 1876 the United States Government sent Commodore Schufeldt in the United States steamer Ticonderoga on a cruise around the world. He visited all the prominent ports and places, and many in which the American flag had never been seen. Commodore Schufeldt, who was a navy officer with a business turn of mind, made his officers gather samples of the products, and also the foreign goods used in every country visited. All these data were forwarded to the Navy Department, with an exhaustive report. Commodore Schufeldt's idea being to have these samples exhibited by our Government for the benefit of our manufacturing interests. Where are these samples, and where is this report? Probably in some garret in the Navy Department in Washington.

"I cannot think of a more appropriate conclusion to this paper than to remind you of the last words of the late William Windom, uttered, I believe, at a banquet given by the New York Board of Trade and Transportation:—'Give us direct and ample transportation facilities under the American flag, and controlled by American citizens, a currency sound in quality and adequate in quantity, and an international bank to facilitate exchanges and a system of reciprocity carefully adjusted within the lines of protection, and not only will our foreign commerce again invade every sea, but every American industry will be quickened, and our whole people feel the impulsion of a new and enduring prosperity.'

The Right of Self-defence.

The right of self defence is by some old writers declared to be inherent in all men by the law of nature. Now these "natural rights" are all very well, but they are not recognised by the law of Great Britain simply because they are natural rights. And I do not advise any of my readers to act upon any "natural rights" that he may think he has. It is the law that a man may defend himself, his wife, child, or servant, from physical aggression. He may also repel by force a forcible attack upon his property. Having stated these propositions broadly, I will proceed, after the manner of lawyers, to narrow them down to their safe and proper limits. When you, or your wife, child, or servant are attacked, or threatened with violence in such a manner as reasonably to lead you to believe that violence is about to be used, you may resist the aggressor. And as the best mode of resistance is, very often to attack, you may lawfully follow the advice given by an old prize-fighter to a pupil. The pupil had been taking boxing lessons, and one day he said to his instructor, "I think I shall be able to take care of myself in a row, now." "Right you are, sir," replied the pugilist; "but take my advice, and always get in with the first whack."

But self-defence must be moderate. It must not be totally disproportionate to the attack. For instance, if a hulking ruffian runs at me with a knife, I may shoot him. But if he runs at me merely with his fists clenched, and I shoot him dead with a revolver, I shall probably be hanged by the neck. I do not intend you to understand that the law expects a man to be calm and cool and collected in all circumstances. By no means. For instance, if the said burly ruffian rushes at me with clenched fists, evidently meaning mischief, and I hit him with a heavy stick on the back of the ear, I may kill him. But I shall not be hanged for that. I had a right to use the stick; and in the circumstances I am not to be supposed to be cool enough to aim for a spot not likely to be fatal. Again, self defence must not develop into revenge. Thus, if I am threatened with a knife, and by the timely display of a pistol I frighten my assailant so that he runs away, I must not shoot after him. If I do, I am just as liable as though he had never threatened me, because I shoot at him not in self-defence, but by way of punishment or revenge.—Cassell's Family Lawyer.

THE WAR.

There being little fresh news of importance, yesterday's telegrams mainly occupied themselves with the bombardment of Matanzas, about which they indulged in the most bewildering and absurd contradictions. The bombardment was a "butchery"—the Spanish losses were 65 men—the Spaniards suffered no losses—the forts were completely destroyed—the bombardment was ineffective—the American vessels speedily retired under the fire from the ports—and so on. It is hopeless to extract anything reliable from such contradictions as these, so we leave it alone.

Hardly less bewildering are the tales about the Spanish fleet at St. Vincent. The vessels are short of coal and provisions—the vessels have plenty of both—they left two days ago—they are still there—the Scotch stokers have all struck in obedience to orders from the British Government (!!)—the stokers are loyal Spaniards and have not struck—Portugal has ordered the fleet to leave—Portugal has done no such thing—and so forth. The latest tale is that the fleet left St. Vincent yesterday morning in an unknown direction, and with this we must be content until the next contradiction appears.

Havana, which was reported to be suffering from hunger two days ago, is now said to be amply provisioned for two months.

The U. S. cruiser "Massachusetts" is said to have run aground off Pinar del Rio.

It seems very probable that the first real naval combat will not be in Cuban waters at all, but in the Pacific, namely between the U. S. squadron from Hong Kong and the Spanish squadron from Manila.

This performance was announced for yesterday, to-day, tomorrow, or any day next week.

The disembarkment of the American troops in Cuba is also announced for a similar series of dates.

The transatlantic liner "St. Pauls," converted into an armed cruiser, is now ready for the sea, and will be placed under the command of Capt. Sigbee of the "Maine."

The U. S. Senate is said to have approved a scheme for a Pan American Exposition to be held in Cuba in 1901.

Great sympathy with the United States is being shown in Japan, and it is being proposed to send the Japanese fleet to cooperate in the attack on the Philippines.

The large store of explosives of the Atlantic Company at Eastport, Maine, has been blown up. Coming so soon after the explosion of the powder factory at Santa Cruz, suspicion has fallen on Spanish workmen. It is also alleged that Spanish residents are plotting to destroy railway bridges and to blow up the trains transporting troops to Tampa and Key West.

The steel steamer Guido, 3133 tons, taking provisions and munition from Coruña to Havana, has been captured by the "Terror."

The British cruisers "Cordelia" and "Pelican" have been ordered to St. John's, Newfoundland, to prevent the Spanish vessels taking coal supplies there.

The bombastic and absurd proclamation of the Governor of the Philippines has turned public opinion in Hong Kong completely in favor of the United States.

The London papers are commenting unfavourably on the fact that the Spanish Minister there has opened a subscription list in favor of the war fund. They consider this an abuse of his diplomatic position. A question will probably be asked about the matter in the Commons.

According to the Morning Post of London, the Austrian Emperor has given £20,000 to the Spanish national war fund, and has authorised several Austrian officers to enter the Spanish army. The Archduke Eugene has gone to Madrid to remain at the side of the Queen Regent (she is an Austrian Princess) and the Emperor promises to send troops to aid her in case of a revolution.

SUNDRIES.

—According to a London telegram of Thursday night, Mr. Gladstone's condition was most serious. He was in a high fever and his strength falling rapidly. His physicians have little hope of a recovery. —There is a great jubilation in racing circles over the news that the Montevideo "crack" Imperio won one of the events in a meeting at Newmarket last Tuesday (more

probably Wednesday when the 2000 Guineas was run.) Details are anxiously awaited by post. This is said to be the first victory of a River Plate horse on the English turf.

—The Razon declares that it will not issue war bulletins unless there is news of sufficient importance to warrant it. Some of three other papers would do well to follow the example, and cease from pestering the public with bulletins which contain nothing but trash, trivialities and repetitions.

—The robbery of which the well-known broker Sr. Gabriel San Juan was the victim in the Bolsa on Thursday afternoon was of a peculiarly audacious character. The plunder, bonds and notes to a value of between £4000 and £5000, was taken out of his safe, which stands behind the door of his small office which opens directly on to the central Hall of the Bolsa. He had left the office to join the second "ring" and returning in less than fifteen minutes found the safe open and empty. The only persons who had been in his office during the day were his clerk and two men, both known to him, who came to negotiate for discount of a bill. The bonds were the property of a client, and Sr. San Juan's despair at discovery of their loss was such that he tried to shoot himself, but was prevented by his friends. The police were promptly called in, but we have not yet heard that they have succeeded in finding a clue.

—The Passion Play at the Solís Theatre will be repeated this evening. There was a fairly large audience at the opening performance on Thursday evening and the general impression is said to be not unfavorable. The play is given with care and in a duly reverent spirit, but it is difficult to remove the impression that the sacred incidents are out of place in a Theatre. The dresses and scenery are said to be remarkably good—better than the acting. The play is in verse and is the composition of a well known Spanish poet Sr. Enrique Zúnel.

—At the Cibils Theatre this evening, Sr. Colombino, the clever young imitator of Fregoli, will take his benefit. The chief item will be a parody of "Cavalleria Rusticana" in which Sr. Colombino will impersonate all the characters. He will also repeat "Mimi" and "El Ladrón." The Modena Company will appear in two farces.

—The death occurred on Thursday of Sr. Francisco Zugarramendi, the doyen of all the dentists of the city. He was a Spaniard, 73 years of age and unmarried.

—A memorial to Dr. Arnold, of Rugby, has recently been placed on the north wall of Laleham Church. Dr. Arnold lived at Laleham, in a house occupying the position of the present vicarage, during the years 1819-1828. The inscription, in carved brass letters in relief, was written, at the Vicar's suggestion by the late Dean Lake, and is as follows: To the memory of Thomas Arnold, D.D., Head Master of Rugby School 1828-1842. Regius Professor of Modern History in the University of Oxford 1841-1842, scholar, historian, and theologian, who as the head of a great public school raised the character of all English education, powerful to rouse, and train the intellect, but desirous above all to impress religion and duty upon the hearts of his pupils. In this parish, beloved by him as the home of his early labours, is offered this grateful tribute of respect and admiration. Born at West Cowes, June 18, 1795. Died at Rugby, June 12, 1842. Erected March, 1898.

—We entirely agree with the following by no means unnecessary remarks from the B. A. Herald.—"The Spanish-American War should be confined to a certain locality and not brought here to be fought over again. There is no reason whatever why the war should in the least degree change the relations of the citizens of either country living here, and it will not do so with serious and sensible men. When any one gets where he cannot let the matter alone, he should leave and join one or the other of the contending forces."

—The presentation to the Rev. Dr. (Padre) Smith of Buenos Aires, on the occasion of his leaving for England, took place at the Prince George's Hall on Wednesday evening in the presence of a very large and representative gathering of Scotch and English residents. The purse subscribed reaches some \$10,000 paper, and the presentation album contained over 2500 signatures, showing the great popularity of the venerable pastor. Mr. R. Inglis Runciman, the Rev. J. W. Fleming and Mr. Mohr Bell were the principal speakers. —The orange crop in Paraguay is reported to be a failure this season, on account of the drought. —As a sign how quickly the Chinese absorb foreign ideas, it is stated that Chinese ladies who, twenty years ago, would have been

FRIDAY, APRIL 1. By command of the Queen, the Duke of York yesterday held a Levée at St. James's Palace.
