## COUNCIL OF STATE.

On Monday, a Message was presented from the Executive asking the approval of the Council for the Decree of the 5th instant regulating political meetings. The measure, it said, had been rendered necessary to repress the disorders promoted by a noisy faction that was endeavoring to obstruct the political reconstruction of the Republic, and had been approved by the conservative classes of society which demanded the maintenance of order. It rested with the Council to declare whether the Decree should be given a permanent form, or whether it should be declared merely transitory. The Message and Decree were referred to the Committee of Legislation.

Mr. Sembiat presented a Bill assigning 10% of the Stamp Taxes and Licenses in the Department of Salto to local improvements and support of the local Hospital. Referred to Committee.

Mr. Varela presented a Bill, the text of which has not been published, for the better control of the guaranteed railways. In introducing the Bill, he stated that its object was to carry out the idea that had long been present of reforming the actual defective system of estimating the revenue and expenditure of the railways and in distributing the same between the guaranteed and the non-guaranteed sections of the lines. He claimed that it could be shown that under the present system, the State was paying some 10% more on account of the guarantees than it justly should, representing a heavy charge. In 1895 there was \$85,000 more paid for guarantee than would have been the case if the accounts had been made in the form ordained by his measure. The Bill was referred to the Committee of Finance.

General Ventura Rodriguez having withdrawn his resignation, resumed his seat as a member of the Council.

The amendment in the Rural Code instituting a close time for wild birds, was approved in general.

The amended Bill of Permanent Civic Register was approved in general, without discussion.

Dr. Samuel Bixen was elected relating Secretary of the Council.

The sitting then terminated.

**POLITICAL NOTES.**  
The meeting of the "Colorado" Committee to name new Delegates for the discussion of the "electoral accord" was to have taken place last night, but we cannot yet state the result. Our contemporaries continue to express themselves very hopefully respecting the result, though, all the same, rumors have not been wanting to the effect that a strong faction of the "colorados," including Sr. Cuestas himself, continue averse to any concession and would prefer an electoral struggle. The same view is known to be entertained by the extreme "blancos," though fortunately their counsels have not prevailed. However, it is fully expected that a few days more will decide the matter and let us know what we are to expect.

We chronicle elsewhere Monday's sitting of the Council of State. It is to be regretted that the text of Sr. Varela's Bill for rail-

way control has not been made public, as it is a matter that will materially affect the guaranteed railways and consequently the interests of British investors.

The Council has approved in general the amended Bill of Permanent Civic Register, which is the first part of the electoral reform for which the country has long been waiting. The discussion will come over the second reading, but it is probable that this will not take place until the question of the "electoral accord" is decided, for it seems certain that the "colorados" are determined to measure the extent of electoral reform according to whether the "accord" is arranged or not, a decision which does not do them much credit.

Decrees have been issued separating the Uruguayan Consular-General in Argentina from the Legation with which it has previously been associated, and appointing Sr. Florancio Fernandez to the post of Consul General, in place of Dr. Mendilaharsu who, by arrangement with the Executive, has resigned that part of his duties, though retaining the Ministry. The Consul General is to receive as emolument the third part of the Consular fees. The reason for this is that it was found that the double post produced too great an accumulation of work for one man to attend to properly.

Yesterday's *Razon* criticises unfavourably, though not in an unfriendly spirit, the recent Decree of the Executive for the regulation of political meetings, which has just been referred to the Council of State for confirmation. It points out, among other things, that the Decree might be construed to the dangerous repression of the right of public meeting for political purposes that it is absurd and unjust to make the chairman of the meeting personally responsible because some person in the body, perhaps sent there for the purpose, creates a disturbance; and that the Decree attains no object which could not be equally well attained by strict enforcement of existing laws and regulations. The *Razon* overlooks, however, that it is left to the Council of State to make the Decree permanent or transitory, or to amend it.

Publication has been made of the Report by the Prefect of Police of the disorders in the meeting at the Stella d'Italia last week. He attributes the principal outbreak to an inflammatory speech made by Col. R. Flores, calling for the reprobation of those who, in violation of the laws, had destroyed the institutions of the Republic, and which gave rise to subversive cries against the present Government and public authorities. Col. Flores is still under arrest at the Cerro Fortress, and will be tried by the Military Tribunal.

The young men arrested as ringleaders of the disorders were released on bail last week.

We are threatened with the appearance of two "collectivist" or "herrerista" papers, *La Republica*, to be edited by Sr. Enrique Kubly y Artega, and *El Progreso* to be edited by Dr. Angel Floro Costa.

Notwithstanding the official denial published, some of our contemporaries are still harping on alleged abuses of privilege committed by foreign ministers. From some of their remarks, we think they are running their head against the introduction of goods for the use of foreign men of war in the port, and which are allowed duty free in all civilised countries.

Conversion has commenced of the Treasury Certificates corresponding to the month of June, 1897.

The Prefect of Police has notified to General Amuedo, president of the "collectivist" club "Ricardo Flores" that the proposed modification of the 19th instant cannot be allowed to take place, as in the present moments of political excitement it might give rise to disorders and unpleasant consequences. Though the measure is rather dictatorial, we think the Government is justified, for the "collectivists" have forfeited all claim to be considered or treated as a genuine political party, or as anything except enemies of public welfare and of honest and constitutional government. At the same time it is rather a pity that they were not allowed to exhibit their weakness in public.

Dr. Carlos Castro, whom leader of the "herrerista" faction in the late Chambers of unholly memory, arrived from Buenos Aires yesterday morning for family purposes. At first he was not allowed to land, but later on the prohibition was revoked. Owing to this it has transpired that the Government, in view of the recent disorders, has resolved to keep out of the country as dangerous the "herrerista" leaders at present in voluntary exile in Buenos Aires, at all events until the political situation has become regular—and it would do still better, if any of them venture to show their faces here, to clap them into prison and order their trial for treason to the Republic.

## THE CUBAN QUESTION.

President McKinley's Message was sent to Congress on Monday, after all, amid enormous excitement in Washington. Mr. McKinley expresses himself as opposed to the recognition of Cuban independence or even belligerence at the present moment, saying that it is the moral obligation of the United States to see the results of the recent reforms. At the same time he recognises the necessity, both from a humane point of view and of that of the interests of the United States, in seeing peace restored in Cuba without further loss of time, and relief given to the "concentrados" and the general misery caused by the acts of General Weyler, and for this purpose he asks authority to employ the naval and military forces of the Union, if the object cannot be obtained by other means. He refers to the Maine explosion, but only as a proof of the inability of Spain to keep order and maintain guarantees in Cuba. The Message was referred to the Mixed Committee. It seems to have been regarded with great dissatisfaction by the war party and the jingoes.

The agitation in Madrid, provoked by the declaration of the armistice, continues on a serious scale. The capital, or at all events the jingo element, is almost in open insurrection, the Government feels very insecure, and a military revolt would surprise no one. Generals Borbon and Castelnau have been arrested for promoting disturbances. The more violent papers accuse the Spanish Government of having shown the white feather and betrayed the cause of Spain, and are doing their worst in their insane desire to provoke war, feeding the Spanish people on bombast and falsehoods. It is only fair to say that the American "gutter journals" adopt the same criminal tactics.

The proclamation of the armistice in Havana is fully confirmed, though we are still in the dark as to details. It has caused great disgust among the exiled Spanish party there, whose sole policy all along has been to oppress and plunder and to applaud the cruelties of Weyler. The sensational story of an insurrection of the "exaltados" and volunteers against Governor Blanco is not confirmed, but on the other hand it is confirmed that they grossly insulted General Lee as he was departing. The sensational stories about the explosion of the Maine are contradicted, as we expected they would be remembering their unreliable source, (*The New York World* and the *London Daily Mail*) General Woodford is still in Madrid, but his departure seems expected any moment.

Notwithstanding the obvious endeavour of the telegrams to keep up the excitement and give every incident its worst aspect, we incline to the opinion that the chances of war are more remote than is pretended. It seems certain that neither the Spanish nor the United States Government, nor the sensible portion of both nations, desire war, and if they are forced into so terrible an extremity it will be by the noisy outcry of the jingoes, fed by the criminal propaganda of the lower press and excited by the falsehoods of unscrupulous sensational telegraphic correspondents. This will be a disgrace to both nations. Unfortunately the telegrams here give us all the noise and very little of the quiet common sense behind it.

**Football.**  
*Albion F. C. versus H. M. S. "Basilio."*

Despite the wet weather on Thursday morning the Punta Carrotas ground was quite dry in the afternoon and the match between these two teams was played before a scanty number of spectators. The Albions having won the toss decide to play against the wind in view of their only having 9 men, so as to be able to play with their full team at half time should the two men short turn up. For fully 30 minutes the play was give and take, Mantle scoring an easy goal for the "Basilio" just before half time. On resuming play the Albions were obliged to continue with only 9 men, unfortunately the wind which would then have been in their favor ceased and things were looking pretty shaky for them, until Ramsay was able to make matters equal scoring a nice goal from a penalty kick. This same player scored another goal which was disallowed on account of the Referee blowing his whistle for time just as the goal was being made. For the Navy Jones and Burnett were by far the best, whilst Mantle and Butler did good service. For the Albions no distinction could possibly be made, as each had worked very hard indeed. No doubt the two absentees Messrs J. R. and H. Sardeson made a great difference.

## Albion F. C. versus H. M. S. "Beagle."

Witnessed by some 600 spectators on Saturday, this game was an easy victory for the Albions, as they scored no less than 7 goals to nil. Craven who played admirably well as Centre-forward, opened the score, followed by another by Ramsay who was also in good form: Craven and Ramsay again scored 2 goals respectively, finishing the first half time with 4 points to nil. In the latter end of the game the Albions had it all their own way, 3 more goals being added to the score, which were obtained by Cutler, Ramsay and Craven respectively. For the "Beagle" Bank played a good game as back and Fallace worked very hard amongst the forwards. In the Albions the two brothers Sardeson, who made their debut in this match, played a fine game, the elder one as forward played very nicely, though probably he does a little too much dribbling for playing a strong team. The younger brother proved a great acquisition to the Club as a capital goal keeper. Negron, who was down from Buenos Aires for the holiday, played a splendid game as back, doing some pretty work at times. Decurnux and Stewart kept the ball well up the field and the forwards can thank these two players to a great extent for the large score.

**Albion F. C. 2nd XI versus American F. C.**

This match, played on Sunday, was another easy victory for the Albions by 9 goals to nil, and was remarkable for the number of spectators who witnessed it, estimated at some 1500 and they all seemed to enjoy it thoroughly. In the first half 4 goals were scored, 2 by Cutler, one by little M. W. Thomas, a plucky young player who kept everybody in continual laughter seeing him go for fellows double his size, and the other by H. Sardeson who for a time changed his place from goal-keeper to centre forward. Changing over, the Albion boys had it all their own way and J. Sardeson scored 4 goals in succession followed by another one by H. Sardeson which made the ninth. This was a very one-sided game and of the losers we can only make mention of Gaspar Swinden and E. Cardenal, the rest did not seem to care anything about the match, so much were they disheartened. The two Sardesons, Thomas and Lodge were the best of their side. Another player who promises well is Lodge, who in this match played for the first time in Montevideo. Two victories and a draw is a splendid opening of the season for the Albions and we can only say "May they keep it up." Next Sunday the 1st XI will play the Navy Combined at Punta Carretas and the 2nd XI will play the C. U. R. C. C. at Peñarol.

**Transport of Live-Stock.**  
*Another warning to Captains.*

At the Birkenhead Police court on March 4th, before Messrs. John Pennock and J. M. Kelly, magistrates, Captain Hopple, master of the steamship Harcelo, from Buenos Aires, was summoned on three informations for breaches of the Foreign Animals Order of the Board of Agriculture. Mr. J. T. Thompson prosecuted on behalf of the Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, and Mr. Finch (Messrs Hill Dickinson, and Co.) defended.

Mr. Thompson stated that on Feb. 21 Inspector Hampshire boarded the Harcelo at Wallasey Stage, and saw that the sheep and cattle pens were much larger than the regulations permitted, one pen measuring 64 feet by 10 feet, instead of 10 feet by 9 feet. The cattle fittings generally were defective and the stanchions between the pens were not fitted securely into iron sockets, as required by the order. The vessel had an iron deck, and was unsuitable for the cattle-carrying trade. On the voyage from Buenos Aires she lost 26 cattle and 85 sheep, and there was practically nothing to protect the animals from the weather. Mr. Thompson asked for a heavy penalty, stating that there had been in the Birkenhead Court 45 prosecutions for similar offences, and it appeared to him that those who carried on that traffic tried to run the gauntlet of the court, and a small fine was nothing compared with the freight received for the animals brought across.

Inspector Hampshire gave evidence that not a single stanchion was fastened to the deck. Many of the animals were in very poor condition "stuck up," bruised, and badly knocked about. When he spoke to the captain, the latter admitted that the animals had had several duckings.

Evidence as to the fittings was also given by Mr. May, inspector under the Board of Agriculture, and Inspector Pocock, of the R. S. P. C. A., the latter describing them as the worst fittings he had ever seen coming into the port of Liverpool.

For the defence, Mr. Finch admitted that the pens were too large, but explained that many of the division boards had been taken down during the voyage, that the cattle might be attended to. This was the first voyage on which the defendant had carried cattle, and he knew nothing whatever about the regulations. Of the animals lost, a considerable number died from exhaustion, in consequence of the hot weather early in the voyage. As for the fittings, none of the stanchions were broken, and, generally, they remained intact until port was reached. In the course of cross-examination the defendant said that 28 sheep went overboard during one night. Wherever one went several would follow, and he supposed they had jumped overboard.

The bench considered the charges proved and imposed a penalty of 10l. and costs in each case, making 32l. 2s. in all.

## SUNDRIES.

—There was a large congregation at Holy Trinity Church on Easter morn. The Church was tastefully and profusely decorated with flowers, and the renovated organ was heard by the congregation for the first time. Mr. G. Lloyd Davies and Mr. Wainwright both playing Mr. Barling and Mrs. G. Lloyd Davies sang a duet in the morning service, which was fully choral, and the same lady sang the anthem solo in the evening service.

—The French authorities have not yet done with the persecution of Mr. Zola, in relation to the Dreyfus case. The Military Tribunal, which he attacked for its decision in the Esterhazy trial, has resolved to prosecute him anew before the Assize Court. However, the new trial will take place at Versailles instead of Paris, so there will be less opening for agitation. We think they would have been much wiser to have left him alone, for they are only condemning themselves in persecuting him. A sensational telegram appeared a few days ago stating that documents had been discovered in the Italian Legation at Paris proving the innocence of Dreyfus and the guilt of Esterhazy, but as no confirmation has appeared it is probably a canard.

—At the recent Postal Congress attention was directed to the fact that two thirds of all the letters which pass through the post offices of the world are written by and sent to people who use the English language. The South and Central American countries in which either Spanish or Portuguese is spoken do comparatively little post-office business, the total number of letters posted and collected in a year in all the countries of South and Central American and the West Indies being less than in Australia. Chili and Argentina are, in fact, the only two South American countries in which any important postal business is done, and most of the letters received from or sent to foreign countries are not in Spanish, but in English, French, German, or Italian.—*European Mail*

—The Oceanic Circus of the Brothers Holmers will give another performance tonight, with new items in the programme. It continues to be well attended.

—A telegram announces the death of Msgr. Bandini, Archbishop of Lima.

—On Monday a young man named Alberto Nadal, aged 19, cigar-maker, living at Magallanes 197, committed suicide by blowing his brains out, performing the act on the Santa Ana beach, where his body was found just below high water mark, some hours after. No reasons are assigned. These frequent suicides of boys not out of their teens are very terrible. In this case the victim was the eldest son of a widow with a large family.

—Here is "The Spectator's" latest dog story:—"Zulu," who sleeps in the basement of a large house in a fashionable quarter of one of our largest cities, was early one Sunday morning lately roused by an outbreak of fire, which had apparently been smouldering for some time between the floor of the dining-room and the ceiling of the room below. He, after repeatedly scratching at the bedroom door of one of the servants, succeeded in waking her. Thinking the dog must be unwell, she let him into her room, and got into bed again, but was not allowed to sleep, as "Zulu" sitting close by her bedside kept "talking" to her (as she describes it) so vigorously that she suspected something must be wrong. On getting up the dog appeared so delighted that she followed him out of the room, and on looking into one of the rooms discovered the ceiling burning. Upon rousing the owner of the house, who immediately had the fire-alarm rung (which was fortunately close at hand), "Zulu," seeming to know he had done his duty, rushed upstairs to his mistress and left the house with the children, evidently satisfied that he had fulfilled his



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part. On the fire brigade's arrival it was found that the fire had taken serious hold. The timely action of the dog, however, saved the dwelling, and the Alliance Insurance Company, with whom the premises were insured, have awarded a silver medal to "Zulu."

LONDON NOTES

MONDAY, MARCH 14. The Queen arrived at Nice yesterday, being met at the station by the Crown Prince and Princess of Roumania and a distinguished company.

The sinister rumours current on Saturday with regard to the United States and Spain are denied by a Washington Correspondent, on the strength of statements made by officials close to the President.

At a Council of Ministers at Cairo, presided over by the Khedive, yesterday, it was decided not to prohibit the pilgrimage to Mecca this year on account of the plague, but to take every means of discouraging it.

A telegram from Bangkok states that the editor of "The Free Press" has been expelled from Siam for publishing articles insulting to the King, and advocating a French expansionist policy.

Lord Charles Beresford was the principal speaker at a dinner of the Navy League, on Saturday. Whilst admitting that much had been done lately to strengthen the national defences, he contended that the fact was irrelevant to the real question, "Had we done enough?"

Sixteen of the nineteen miners who were entombed by the flooding of the Muirkirk Colliery on Friday were rescued on Saturday. The other three were drowned.

The match between the English team and an eleven of Victoria was continued on Saturday. The home team, who had made 283 for nine wickets, completed their innings for 328, and the visitors then went in. They remained at the wickets all day, and when stumps were drawn had made 238 for seven wickets.

The great Rugby football match between England and Scotland ended at Edinburgh on Saturday in a draw, with a try to each side. There were nearly 20,000 spectators of the play, which was largely with the forwards. England would have been beaten but for the possession of a wonderful defence in the Football League matches were won by Sunderland, Sheffield Wednesday, Aston Villa, Derby County, Bolton Wanderers, and Liverpool. The Corinthians beat Queen's Park, Glasgow, at the Queen's Club, by five goals to one.

"It is so quiet out here. It is nice to forget for awhile there is any one else in the world."

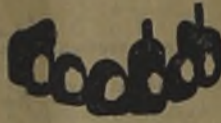
"Had you forgotten it?" The words broke from him irreflexively. She looked at him a little surprised. "Perhaps not. It is not always easy."
