## NEWS OF THE DAY

## POLITICAL NOTES.

The Council of State sat on Friday. Sr. Biengio Rocca's Bill respecting Cession of Property was approved in second reading, competing its sanction. The rest of the sitting was occupied with discussion of the Bill proposed by the Committee of Legislation, authorising the Executive to restrict the right of public meeting during the provisional period. Dr. Gonzalez Ramirez defended the Bill, asserting that its effect had been greatly exaggerated and that it was necessary in the interests of public order. He denied that it would produce any restriction on legitimate political meetings. Dr. Acevedo Diaz, who was supported by Sr. Gil, made a vehement attack on the Bill, which he said was of a dictatorial and oppressive nature. As we were now entering on a period of general elections, he claimed that the fullest liberty should be allowed to political meetings and manifestations of every description, otherwise the people would have the right to complain that they were deprived of the important liberty of expression of opinion. The discussion was still proceeding when the Council adjourned, and will be resumed tomorrow.

The doubt about the post of Marine Commandant and Captain of the Port has been solved by issue of a Decree conferring the post on Col. Carlos Gaudencio, who accordingly took charge yesterday. The post had been offered to Dr. Carlos Lenzi, but he declined it. The appointment of Col. Gaudencio has been well received by our native contemporaries.

It is stated that the Executive has ready the Message conveying the Budget for 1898-99, which will be forwarded to the Council of State early next week. As there has been no Budget for three years and as the new Budget is said to contain some radical reforms and economies, it may be regarded as certain that the sanction will not be complete by July 1st, when it should come into force. On this occasion, however, it has only one Chamber to pass instead of two, so there should not be any great delay. No particulars of the new Budget have transpired, but it is known to be based so far as administrative salaries are concerned, on the report and plan prepared by the Salaries Committee appointed for the purpose some five months ago.

Lieut. Col. Gregorio Lamas has been persuaded to withdraw his resignation as 2nd Chief of the Military Academy, which he presented some weeks ago, and will now resume the duties of the post.

It is stated that Sr. Cuestas is occupied with a scheme for the reform of military justice, amending the present Military Penal Code, and also simplifying the processes before the Military Tribunals. We would much sooner hear of his being occupied with the reform of the administration of civil law and processes, which is of enormously greater importance to the Republic in general.

The term of three of the members of the Directorate of the Bank of the Republic will expire tomorrow. It is expected that Sr. Cuestas will apply to the Council of State for authority to reappoint the same three, so that there will be no change in the Directorate. There are vague rumors that before long a new President of the Bank may be appointed, as it is evident that the feeble health of Dr. J. M. Muñoz is no longer equal to the duties.

The Government has instructed the police authorities to prohibit the representation at the Solis Theatre of a drama, written by a local author, called "Cavie," and dealing with the battle of Manila in the present war, and which it is said is conceived in a strain highly offensive to the United States. No doubt this will be another source of irritation to the Spanish Colony, but the Government has done perfectly right, and the resident Spaniards must learn to respect the neutrality of the Republic and cease from trying to make it a field for the exploitation of their quarrels.

## Natural Gas in the Past, the Present, and the Future.

When the industrial history of the last quarter of the present century is written, one of the most interesting chapters will be on the discovery and development of the few large accumulations of natural gas in the United States and Canada, and the almost criminal waste which, in spite of repeated warnings, continues to day, and apparently will continue until, within probably a few years, these reservoirs of energy will be exhausted, and communities now bustling with energy and full of the hum of industry will be silent and perhaps deserted. The accumulation of natural gas is analogous to that of the water supplying artesian wells, but in an inverse relation. Every richly productive gas pool is a dome or inverted trough, of porous or coarse grained sand or limestone geologically called an "anticline," and covered always by deposit or stratum of impervious shale or similar formation. These anticlines vary in area from a few square miles in most cases to over five thousand square miles in the case of the great Cincinnati arch which covers the Indiana and Ohio gas belts in the United States. The thickness of the strata varies in like proportion. The gas-reservoirs are in no sense cavernous, but merely more or less porous rock, impregnated with gas, often under enormous pressures, the more porous rocks when pierced by the drill being exhausted much more quickly than those of closer texture. Many ingenious and interesting theories have been advanced regarding the generation and origin of the gas and designed to account for the great pressures under which it is stored. The distribution and intimate relation of the carbon compounds all favour the theory of their generation by the decomposition of vegetable and animal organic matter under widely different variations and surroundings of temperature, pressure, and other forces and chemical influences, from the earliest developments of organic life to the present time. The gas is probably the product of slow primary decomposition, at low temperatures, of animal and vegetable organic matter contained in natural sediments. Its production may be seen in the shallow, undisturbed portions of freshwater lakes. The deposits of oil and gas in the peculiar geological formations from which they are being drawn for commercial uses are due to the accidental disposition of the anticlines and synclinals which act as reservoirs and do not necessarily indicate the restriction of their generation to any particular geological periods. —*Cassier's Magazine.*

## AUTO INTOXICATION FROM EXERCISE.

Methodical physical exercise is unquestionably a powerful factor in the maintenance of robust health but it is not everyone who is physically capable of deriving the benefit which rewards the efforts of the normal physiologically healthy individual. The emunctory organs require careful training before they become fitted for the perfect elimination of the poisonous products of active tissue change engendered by prolonged muscular exertion. The blood becomes charged with these products, and their presence manifests itself by disturbed rest when the still exhilarated amateur athlete seeks recuperation in slumber and fatigue on the morrow. There is, perhaps, no kind of physical exercise in which greater temptation exists to over strain of this kind than in cycling. Experience shows that serious physiological and visceral disturbance may be caused without anything of the nature of muscular fatigue to put the cyclist on his guard. Moreover, the effects of this variety of auto-intoxication are enhanced by the fact that the appetite is increased, and, at a time when the body, as a whole, is more or less jaded, the stomach is called upon to discharge an unusually large amount of work. As it is, for the time being, unequal to the duty thrust upon it, the food is but partially digested and fails to undergo complete oxidation, thus further surcharging the already overladen emunctories. Owing to the exaggerated excretion of water through the skin in the form of perspiration, the kidneys do not receive sufficient fluid to gush their tubular apparatus, which consequently becomes clogged. For the same reason there is a tendency to constipation. The nervous excitement which is associated with this form of prolonged exercise does not subside the moment the exercise is discontinued, and finds vent at night in the spasmodic jerks of the limbs with which cyclists are all familiar, much to their discomfort. The rational treatment of this condition is simple enough, and adds materially to the comfort as well as to the well-being of the cyclist. On arriving at his destination the first thing to think of is a hot bath, which reduces the excitability of the muscular system and assists the skin and other organs in getting rid of their arrears of work. This, moreover, affords an interval of rest which fits the stomach for its work, but even the then first meal after a ride should not be too copious. The food ought to be light and digestible, and alcoholic beverages should be taken only in strict moderation in order not to add one more straw to the proverbial camel's back. A sufficient interval should be allowed before retiring to rest, and a short stroll in the open will accelerate digestion and avert troubled slumbers. Women, for obvious reasons, are more susceptible of these disturbances than men, and should be correspondingly prudent. When touring cyclists generally will derive great benefit if they avail themselves of the first half days break in the journey to take a mild purgative, preferably of the saline type, the better to clear the decks for action.

## THE WAR.

Yesterday's war matter chiefly consisted of contradictions of the statements of the day before respecting the bombardment of San Juan of Puerto Rico, and consequently leave us completely at sea as to the real result. New York advices confirm that the forts and town suffered severely and that the American vessels were but very little injured, but they do not confirm the rendition of the town. Spanish advices exactly reverse the statement; the forts and town were but little injured, the losses were only eight or ten killed and wounded, and the American vessels were severely damaged. The Spaniards, in fact, are celebrating the engagements at San Juan and Cienfuegos as victories for their side. In the face of such conflicting statements it is useless to repeat details, especially as some of the telegrams are obviously fabricated (especially two long ones pretending to come from London) and enter into matters which they cannot possibly know.

The telegrams still insist that the Spanish fleet is at Fort de France (we find this is another name for Fort Royal, the seat of Government, but not the principal town, in Martinique) and have taken in coal supplies there (it) and the announcement of an important battle with Admiral Sampson's squadron is consequently expected any moment. The flying squadron under Commodore Winfield Schley has left Hampton Roads to join Admiral Sampson.

A Key West message reports the first landing of American troops in Cuba, at Cabañas, but as it adds that they immediately returned on board after having repulsed a Spanish attacking party, of which 10 were killed, the affair does not seem to be important.

After a long wait, Greece has at length proclaimed her neutrality in the war. The messages continue to contain conflicting statements about the attitude of the European Powers as regards intervention.

There is no confirmation of the alleged appearance of the Spanish

torpedo flotilla in the neighbourhood of New York, and it was probably a fabrication.

The latest message is to the effect that the American vessels have for a second time been repulsed and defeated in an attack on San Juan. This is of Spanish origin and obviously unreliable, especially as other messages place the American squadron on its way to Martinique, which is some 300 miles from Puerto Rico.

The "Tamerario" is reported to have turned up once more at San Sebastian. How much longer it is going to remain in Argentine waters?

## SUNDRIES.

Yesterday's *Siglo* contains a long and masterly letter from Dr. J. Sierra Carranza in which he boldly takes the side of the United States in the present war. He shows that the Spaniards have themselves to blame in provoking the conflict by their long period of misrule, cruelty and bloodshed in Cuba, their entire want of generosity towards the Cubans, and finally the obstinacy, approaching madness, with which they refused the Cubans home rule or any reforms until it was too late. It was the harshness of General Weyler and the cry "Cuba Española" that has lost them the colony. If two or three years ago they listened to the voice of reason and to the counsels given them from every side, and allowed the Cubans their independence, the whole trouble would have been ended, and Spain would have gained an ally. He also disposes of the absurd theories that the war is a race conflict between Saxons and Latins, and that the intervention of the United States is a threat to the independence of the Spanish Republics. He reproaches the River Plate Republics for the hostile attitude they have assumed in the matter, and points out that if they had been as near neighbours of Cuba as the United States are, they would certainly have viewed the matter in a different light. They are inconsistent, to say the least, in siding against Cuba and the United States whilst these are undergoing the same struggle and for the same reasons that they made for their own independence early in the century. The letter is not only a masterly exposition of the whole case, but is also remarkable as the first instance—at least the first that we have seen—in which a prominent writer has come forward in the River Plate to defend the action of the United States, since the war began. No doubt Dr. Sierra Carranza's bold exposition will bring down on him the enmity of the Spanish residents and the coarse abuse of the Spanish papers, but he is none the less to be congratulated on his views.

The only answer the *Siglo* can find to Dr. Sierra Carranza's letter is the worn out one that if the intervention of the United States in the present case be approved, it would form a precedent for intervention in the Spanish Republics in case of prolonged civil war and internal disorder. To which we reply—Just so, that is precisely the precedent advancing civilisation requires to see established. So far from being an argument against the attitude of the United States we regard it, for our part, as an argument in its favor. The policy of non-intervention has had its day.

A terrible attempt was made in Buenos Aires, on Wednesday last, by a woman who is to be seen very often wandering about the "basuras" heaps of this city. It happens that the woman, as she was passing a house where a little child of eight months old was toddling about in the "patio" by itself, took advantage of its mother's absence and carried the babe away and placed it on the railway line just as a train was

approaching. Luckily some persons who were standing near noticed her and managed to save the infant from a terrible death. The child was returned to its mother, and the woman, who must be a dangerous maniac, was placed in the hands of the police.

The *B. A. Standard* has achieved a decidedly remarkable feat. In its issue of the 13th instant it says:—"We received a copy of the *New York Herald* yesterday which estimates the respective losses at the Battle of Manila as follows, etc."—Now the Battle of Manila was only fought on the 1st instant, so that the copy of the *Herald* containing the account must have reached the *Standard* in about ten days! Did it come by steamer or by carrier pigeon? But the wonder does not end here. The sentences attributed by the *Standard* to the *N. Y. Herald* coincide to a comma with sentences used in the *MONTEVIDEO TIMES* of Wednesday last, so that there must have been unconscious telephatic communication between ourselves and the *Herald*. We wonder if the atmosphere of the *Standard's* famous "cellar" has anything to do with the mystery.

At the Solis Theatre the Passion Play will be repeated this afternoon, and in the evening will be given the old melodrama "30 Years of a Gambler's Life."

The debut of the Company at the San Felipe Theatre has been postponed until Saturday next.

"With the deepest sorrow," says the *B. A. Standard*, we announce to-day the death of Mrs. Drysdale, relic of our life-long friend the late Don Tomas Drysdale. She expired at her splendid residence, Mossley Hill, Liverpool, on Wednesday last at the Biblical age of 70 years. The deceased lady was beloved and esteemed by all who had the privilege of knowing her, and warmly seconded all her husband's philanthropic deeds during his honoured life. We offer all the members of the Drysdale family our sincere condolence on the sad event.

There is a prosperous little town in Wurtemberg that bears the Oriental looking name of Backnang. Therein—in its Orientalism—lies the sting. For when people address their letters simply to Backnang the missives simply go astray and wander about the Far East. An aggrieved burgher lately wrote to suggest that the name should be changed. He says that a Christmas parcel—a parcel of cake, and perishable—which should have taken two days to reach him, was travelling for fifteen weeks. It started from Cologne on December the first, 1896, and before it reached its destination in 1897, it bore the postmarks of Bagoan Palembang, Pembuang, and Ketabang.

"I'm not that fond of Macpherson," said Donald thoughtfully. "Not Why not?" asked his friend. "Well, ye see, he was pouring out some whisky for me, and I called out, 'Stop! And he stopped."

Friday was the anniversary of the abolition of slavery in Brasil, and yesterday that of the independence of Paraguay.

The mysterious disappearance is reported from on board the "Desterro" during her last voyage from Rio Janeiro, of one of the 1st class passengers. It is not known whether he fell overboard, committed suicide, or was the victim of a crime. His name is foolishly reserved, but he is said to be a well-known importing merchant of this market, with Brazilian connections.

The trial has just taken place of the woman Maria Ceiba, who, in April, 1896, was accused of causing the death of her servant girl Edelia Vega, a mere child, by continued ill-treatment, an affair which caused considerable sensation at the time. Although there was no doubt about the ill-treatment of the unhappy child, the jury declared themselves unable to find evidence of murder, and consequently the woman has been acquitted. We suppose we would lay ourselves open to another prosecution if we suggested that this was another miscarriage of justice.

The Superior Tribunal has imposed, in second hearing, a sentence of 23 years' imprisonment on Horacio Trinidad (a lad of only 16 years of age) for the murder of Antonio Morales, at Salto, in 1895, for which he was acquitted on the first trial. From acquittal to 23 years' imprisonment is a long step and is another illustration of the entire uncertainty of the criminal law in this country. Perhaps the sentence will be again reversed in a third trial.

Among the passengers leaving by the "Clyde" to day, will be Mr. P. H. Scott, formerly of Goddard & Co.; and Mr. E. Richard, Accountant of the London Bank, the latter being called home by the death of his brother-in-law Mr. J. S. Roberts.
