Notwithstanding its economies and the greatly improved financial sit-uation, the Government has not yet been able to bring conversion of these Certificates any nearer up to date but we think this may be explained by the heavy mass of arrears other descriptions left by the Borda administration, and which

Death of the Tichborne Claimant. The death, in a lodging in Marylebone of Arthur Orton, the once well known Tichborne «Claimant,» recalls the story of the strangest importure that ever flourished upon human credulity. The document was discussed by the Cabinet yes-terday, and after the meeting a semi official statement was pub-lished to the effect that the Presid-ent would make no recommendation for the immediate recognition of Cuban independence, as the in-surgents had so far failed to establish a responsible Government There was much war talk at Washington yesterday, and in many quarters it was predicted that should the Presidential message prove too mild in tone, Congress would at once declare war. Competent judges, on the other hand, believe that should Mr. Mc-Kinley maintain his Conservative attitude both Houses of the Legis lature will follow his lead. Mem-bers receive letters and petitions urging them to make a stand for peace, all the papers of the better sort in the country take the same position, and it appears to depend on to-day's message whether peace shall be preserved or war declared.

Lord Salisbury, as Chancellor of the University of Oxford has re-ceived a letter from the King of Siam accepting with much pleasure the honorary degree of Doctor of Civil Law which the University has conferred upon him.

Endorsing the view of itsImprove-

ments Committee, the London County Council yesterday resolved that the City Corporation's suggestions for improving Cripplegate would not prove to be of such general advantage to the through traffic in London as to justify the Council in contributing any part of the cost. year's Chairman, gave his address, in which he cordially recognised the work of other religious commumons, and made certain sug-gestions by which London Con-gregationalists might become even more united, and «go forward» considerably in their united work.

At yesterday's sitting of the House of Commons Committee on Money Lending remarkable disclosures were made as to money lending transactions with ladies with or without the partial know-ledge of their busbands. In one case a promissory note was taken for 20,000l. on a signature which purported to be that of a nobleman, but which he repudiated.

An amusing action was tried yesterday in the Queen's Bench, when Mr. W. J. Grimes, a publican, sued Mr. T. Gill a gentleman in the same trade, for having slandered him by calling him a racecourse thief and other uncomplimentary epithets. The disagree-ment, it was said, arose out of a gambling dispute, and the feud had been kept up to the present time. After hearing evidence which caused a good deal of laughter in court, the jury found for the plaintiff and assessed the damages at 50%.

Before the magistrate at the Westminster Police-court the investigation was resumed of the charges against Dr. William Collins, formerly of the Horse Guards Blue, of performing an illegal operation upon Mrs. Uzielli, which resulted in her death. Couusel for the prosecution reterred to the visits of the deceased to the prisoner, and to her subsequent illness re-garding which Mrs. Uzielli's maid afterwards gave evidence. Accused was remanded, bail being refused.


