Whereas the wool exports of Punta Arenas have more than doubled since 1894, those of the Falkland Islands have decreased considerably since that date, and have practically remained stationary during the past three years, owing to the area of its pastoral lands being incapable of expansion.

Captain his Royal Highness the Duke of York's appointment to the Crescent, first class cruiser, is officially announced at the Admiralty. The command dates from June 8.

—Apropos of Mr. Gladstone's death, a London contemporary recalls that the month of May seems a fatal month to English statesmen. It was on May 11, 1778, that the elder Pitt, the great Earl of Chatham, died. Thirty-four years afterwards, to the very day, on May 11, 1812, Mr. Spencer Perceval, the Prime Minister, was assassinated by John Bellingham in the lobby of the House of Commons, and on May 6, 1882, Lord Frederick Cavendish, who had just been appointed Chief Secretary for Ireland, was assassinated in the Phoenix Park, Dublin.

—At last, says a London paper, the truth is out regarding Sir William Crookes's experiments to see if he could substitute Dr. Emmen's claim of the transmutation of silver into gold. In his last experiment he assayed a large number of Mexican dollars, and found among them two which were free from gold. Discs were cut from the centre of each, and these two discs were treated as directed by Dr. Emmen in private letters for nearly 100 hours. The result of this attempt to change silver into gold was an utter and blank failure. Dr. Emmen has since written to Sir William about the experiment, giving many reasons why it should not have been successful; but the English chemist has announced his intention of making no more attempts at transmutation.

—Here is a situation that has never yet been imagined even by a writer of farcical comedy. The police magistrate at Montpellier had a case before him in which a guilty wife and her lover were prosecuted criminally in accordance with French law, and the respondent, if he may be so called, was the wife's first husband, from whom she had been divorced. The magistrate seems to have thought that, considering their former intimate relations, the guilty couple did not deserve any very severe punishment, and he sentenced the man to six days' and the woman to two days' imprisonment. A divorce suit will follow, in which, of course, the second husband will be the plaintiff and his predecessor the co-respondent.

LONDON NOTES

TUESDAY, MAY 17. The position of the rival fleets in East Indian waters is now a mystery which will probably not be definitely solved until an action has taken place. We now learn from the Hague that nothing is known there of the reported presence of the Spanish Fleet at Curacao. Admiral Sampson is supposed to be at Cape Haytien. Three more Spanish cruisers are reported to be off Martinique.

Señor Sagasta yesterday tendered to Queen Christina the resignation of the Government. He was at once entrusted with the task of reconstructing the Cabinet. In the House of Lords the Merchant Shipping (Liability of Shipowners) Bill was yesterday read a second time and referred to the Standing Committee. Answering the Viscount Sidmouth, the Earl of Hopetoun stated that it was not thought advisable to convert the port of Durban into an Imperial coaling station on account of the shifting bar at the entrance of the harbour.

Mr. Brodrick stated in the House of Commons that the garrison of Hong Kong was being reinforced. Mr. Curzon declined to make a statement on events in West Africa, which were the subject of negotiations between the British and French Governments. Following upon inquiries as to suggested date of the resumed debate on the Foreign Office Vote, Sir William Harcourt, amidst cheers, urged the necessity of discussing the Birmingham Foreign Policy. The Speaker ruled a question by Mr. Davitt as to Mr. Chamberlain's speech to be out of order. The Committee stage of the Irish Local Government Bill was resumed.

Upwards of a hundred veterans who had seen service in the Crimea and the Indian Mutiny travelled from Bristol to Windsor yesterday and paid a visit to the Castle. After they had been hospitably entertained in the Royal Riding School, and had made a tour of the State Apartments, the men were

paraded in the Grand Quadrangle, and were inspected by the Queen. Last night's bulletin stated that Mr. Gladstone had passed a comfortable day, and had taken nourishment well. His strength was consequently well maintained. The condition of the right hon. gentleman was, indeed, such that Dr. Dobie did not call a second time at the Castle. It is stated that the Queen has sent an autograph letter expressing her gratitude for the work Mr. Gladstone has done for the country. A long telegram has also been received from the Princess of Wales.

An International Congress of Actuaries is being held in London this week. The opening meeting yesterday was presided over by Mr. T. E. Young. News was received in Liverpool yesterday of a disastrous collision which occurred off the Anglesea coast on Sunday, resulting in the sinking of a steamer and the loss of ten lives.

Interest in metropolitan cricketing circles centred yesterday in the opening match of the season between Essex and Surrey at Leyton. On a soft wicket the visitors only succeeded in hitting up 188, and as Essex in reply made 108 for five wickets the game at the drawing of stumps was left in a very even position. Somerset had rather the worse of the day's play with Yorkshire gaining a lead of 59 on the first innings, thanks in no small degree to the bowling of Rhodes. At Trent Bridge, Derbyshire kept the Noits men in the field all day, and ran up a total of 322 for the loss of half their side. Matches were also in progress at Oxford and Cambridge.

Mr. McConnell and the other Justices of the County of London Sessions, Clerkenwell, yesterday affirmed the decision of Mr. Shell, the magistrate of the Westminster Police-court, convicting Harrod's Stores (Limited) for unlawfully selling a candelabra to which a false trade description, namely Dresden, had been applied. A fine of 20l., with twenty guineas costs, had been imposed. The defence was that Dresden china derived its name from the style and decoration of the article, and not from the place in which it was produced.

Several summonses arising out of the recent disturbance at the Church of St. Michael, Finsbury, were down for hearing at the Worship-street Police Court yesterday. The only one proceeded with was that against Mr. Hone for brawling Evidence having been given as to the use of holy water, the employment of a monstrance containing the holy water, and the presence of a tabernacle in the church, the curate, the Rev. A. Vowler, was called, but the magistrate refused to allow questions to be put to him concerning the character of the service conducted. Accordingly the whole of the cases were adjourned sine die pending an application to the High Court as to the admissibility of evidence on the question of what did and what did not constitute 'Divine service.'
