POLITICAL NOTES,

Our contemporaries of Sunday all devote articles to the opening of the civic registers, and publish exhortations to inscription from the various party committees. The Siglo points out that the country has had no genuine elections since 1872; now, however, electoral reforms have been made which satisfy all aspirations, and there is not a single obstacle to the reconstruction of the institu

Notwithstanding this propaganda, the first day of opening the re-gisters does not seem to have been a great success. In some of the sections, the inscribing tables could not be opened owing to the non attendance of suffi-cient members, and in several doubts and difficulties have arisen as to the interpretation of the new Law. This however, is not sur prising; the Law is intricate and it may take some little time to get the new machinery into working order and to remedy defects of drafting. Neither was there any great enthusiasm show to register and the total number of voters in scribed in the capital was only about 270, or less than 20 in each section. This, also, is not extraordinary, for inscription is always one of the things left to the last moment.

On Sunday evening, President Cuestas held a lengthy conference with the leading «colorado» mem bers of the Council of State, his object being to persuade them to modify their views respecting some points of the Electoral Law still in discussion, and especially as regards the exclusion of milit ary officers from the Electoral Boards.

Dr. Angel Floro Costa contributes to Sunday's Siglo another lengthy and violent attack on the situation, which he tries to show contains less of electoral and policontains less of electoral and political liberty than the worst period of the preceding regime. He is also of the opinion that Sr. Cuestas should resign his candidature to the presidency, which, he pretends, is being shamefully opposed on the people, and is contrary to the wishes of the great majority of the «colorado» parmajority of the «colorado» party who only see in Sr. Cuestas an ally of their enemies! It is difficult to imagine that anyone can take this seriously. One need only look at the difference in the character and number of men supporting Sr. Cuesta's govern ment, as compared with those who supported its predecessors, to see the absurdity of Dr. Costa's attack. If it be true, as he says, that the large majority of the «colorado» rough. party are opposed to Sr. Cuestas' candidature, then it only proves, what we have often said, that the «colorado» party is the antagonist of the country, there is not the slightest doubt that the very large bulk of the coun-try is behind Sr. Cuestas. Dr. Costa discusses the whole ques-tion from the narrowest of party views. He forgets that the ae

We would like to hear Dr. Costa explain by what right the *colorados - or the faction of them that he represents - claim a monopoly of selecting presidential candi dates?

LONDON NOTES

MONDAY, MAY 9.

Admiral Dewey's dispatches re-lating to the battle of Manila were received in Washington on Satur-day. All the Spanish ships were destroyed, the Spanish casualties destroyed, the Spanish casualties amounting according to the Governor's own report to 618 killed and wounded. When the troops appeared the rioters threw up barricades, constructed with the furniture taken from adjacent houses, and offered a terce resistance. As the soldiers advanced they were received with showers of stones, while from windows and roofs, tiles and bricks and articles of furniture were rained down upon them. At an early stage in the day the Genan early stage in the day the General commanding the army corps centred at Milan was given full powers. He promptly proclaimed a state of siege, and acted with great energy. Nevertheless, the fighting when suppressed at one point recommenced at another, and order had not been restored at a late, hour last night. The latest a late hour last night. The latest telegram received in Rome from the General commanding stated that artillery had had to be em-ployed against the rebels, and that the cannons were still booming. It is said that the number of the killed reached 300, and that 1,000 were wounded.

Sir William Harcourt was the guest of the Eighty Club and the Cambridge University Liberal Club at a dinner at Cambridge on Saturday. Having expressed gratification at revisiting the old University which was the scene of his youth, the Liberal leader in the House of Commons gave weighty House of Commons gave weighty reasons why the adolescent patriot should ally himself with the party of which Mr. Gladstone had been leader for more than a generation. Turning to Lord Salisbury's recent speech at the Albert Hall, Sir William contended that when judged by results, as he asked it might be, the Prime Minister's policy either. the Prime Minister's policy either in the near or lar East must be pronounced a signal failure. In conclusion, he expressed warm sympathy with America, for the sympathy of the Liberal Party had always been with the side that made for freedom.




