POLITICAL NOTES.

Except polemic, there is not much from the political world. Dr. Costa's latest *"menippea"* has fallen very flat, and has moreover received a thorough exposure as regards some of its assertions from the very paper in which it was published, the *Razon*. The truth is that the public are getting tired of Dr. Costa's interminable diatribes—they never had much basis, and now they have ceased even to be amusing—and he would do well to retire into private life and acknowledge the failure of his retrogressive propaganda. In this connection, we may mention that the Military Judge of Instruction Col. Villar has supported the views of the Military Fiscal as regards the arrest of the military officers who publicly adhered to one of Dr. Costa's scurrilous letters, and they will accordingly be arrested and sent to keep company with Col. Escobar in the Cerro fortress.

Yesterday's *Siglo* has some very sensible remarks respecting the criticisms on the Guerrard port scheme. It applies the parallel of a man dangerously ill, and whose family call in two specialists to advise on his case. The opinion given by these experts gains nothing by being discussed by profane persons who have little or no understanding in the matter, and the usual and sensible course in such cases is to follow the advice given and accept the consequences. It is quite possible that if two other experts were called in they might give a different opinion, and so again with other two, but it is evidently impossible to go on seeking opinions *ad libitum*, therefore the only course is to take the scientific advice first offered—or to remain without altogether Sr. Borrada's Government, amid all its errors and faults, did consult two men of eminence in the engineering world, Herr Kummer and Mr. Guerrard, and there is no valid reason yet advanced why their decision should not be accepted. It is true that their scheme has been challenged and unfavorably criticised, but this would be the case with any and every scheme that could be prepared, if for no other reason than from professional jealousy and competition, and on account of conflicting interests involved. Supposing that the government rejected the present scheme and engaged two other equally eminent engineers to prepare a new one, at another considerable expenditure of public money, exactly the same thing would happen, and so on *ad infinitum*, until amid the multiplicity of schemes there would be no port at all, and the fable of the ass starving amid the bundles of hay would have another realization. The only advice the *Siglo* has to offer in the matter, is to extend the dragging of the entrance channel and ante port to 8 metres instead of the 7 1/2 metres (24 1/2 feet) at present proposed. The whole tendency of modern ports is towards greater depth, to give accommodation to the new vessels of deeper draught.

The number of inscriptions in the Civic Register on Thursday was 343, making a total to date of 2141. Among those inscribed was the President of the Republic Sr. Cuestas. We hear nothing of the progress of the inscription in the interior of the Republic.

The Legislative Committee of the Council of State is said to be studying the various Bills before it treating of the naturalisation of foreigners. So far it has not arrived at any decision on the point.

Yesterday being the Saint's Day of the President of the Republic, he was the recipient of a great number of congratulatory visits from all classes of persons official and otherwise, and also of innumerable cards and telegrams. Among the various presents offered him were two handsome bronzes from the Officers of the 1st Chasseurs regiment.

Great Britain is the leader in varnish with 2,000, out of a total of 4,000, the United States 800. Germany has the monopoly of wine bottles.

Great Britain has the entire supply to herself in iron and lead piping.

Great Britain has almost the whole supply of coal in her hands, for out of 200,000, she has sent 199,000.

Belgium has the market to herself in iron beams and pillars with 17,000, out of 18,000.

Great Britain sends out of a total of 16,000, of iron bands, 14,000.

Great Britain supplies out of a total of 41,000, of iron bars and plates, 39,000. Belgium follows with 10,000.

Great Britain has the monopoly in galvanised roof iron plates.

Great Britain has the monopoly in tin plates with 12,000, out of a total of 14,000. Germany has lost ground in this article, and sends only one-half as much as she did last year.

Belgium is first in plate glass and looking-glasses, and supplies 5,000, out of a total of 8,000. Germany follows with 2,000, and Great Britain with only 400 (a field for Great Britain).

France has the lead in cotton-wicks for lamps, the United States following with 500; but the former has 3,000, whilst Great Britain has only 100.

Germany sends 20,000, of printing paper, Belgium 10,000, France 6,000, Italy 4,000, the United States 4,000, Great Britain 5,000, out of a total of 46,000.

Great Britain is ahead in paint, and supplies out of a total of 16,000, 10,000. Belgium and Italy follow with about 1,500 each, and Germany with 1,000.

France heads the list in carriage springs, and supplies 1,600 worth out of a total of 2,500. Belgium comes next with 500, Great Britain nil.

Great Britain supplies all the soda that reaches Uruguay.

Belgium supplies 6,000 worth of Roman cement out of a total of 17,000. Great Britain 4,000, and France 3,000.

Belgium comes first in window-glass, and out of a total of 8,000 she supplies 7,000. Great Britain only 400.

Great Britain sends all the zinc. Belgium has the monopoly of zinc plates.

Great Britain is credited with 46,000, of various articles of industry and articles free of duty out of a total of 109,000.

Great Britain and Germany supply about an equal quantity of bicycles, some 100 each out of a total of 200.

Great Britain has the monopoly in iron sales.

Belgium leads in table glass with 11,500, Germany next with 8,000, and Great Britain last with 2,000, out of a total of 25,000.

France supplies in drugs 40,500, worth, Germany 8,000, Great Britain 7,500, Italy 6,000, and the United States 5,000, out of a total of 70,000.

Belgium is alone in the supply of sporting guns.

Great Britain and Germany supply about an equal amount in iron stoves.

Great Britain leads in the supply of ironmongery, and out of a total of 130,000, worth which reaches the country she sent 44,000. Belgium comes next and sent 33,000 then Germany with 31,000.

Spain sends most of the soap of an inferior quality which is brought to Uruguay, the finer classes come from Great Britain, France, and Germany.

Great Britain is far ahead in the supply of china and porcelain wares, and sends out of a total of 26,000, worth, 14,000, France 2,000, and Belgium 2,000.

Germany is first in merceries with 40,000, France close up with 45,000, and Great Britain with 33,000, out of a total of 120,000.

Germany leads in house furniture, and sends 6,000, the United States 2,000, and Great Britain 1,200, out of a total of 14,000.

CONSULAR REPORT.

THE TRADE OF URUGUAY IN 1897.
(Continued from our last.)
Germany sends most cotton coverlets; out of a total of 17,000, she has 8,500, followed by Great Britain 4,000, then Belgium with 3,000.

Belgium is first in blankets with 800, Great Britain follows with 400, then France with 100, out of a total of 1,600.

Great Britain is ahead of all competitors in mixed woollen and cotton blankets, and sends 5,000, out of 8,000, that reach this country.

France is first in silk neckties, and sends 4,000, out of a total of 5,000.

Great Britain and France supply an equal amount in caps.

France is the leader in kid gloves with 1,900, then comes Great Britain 1,000, followed by Belgium 600, out of a total of 4,000.

France sends most umbrellas, 1,500, then Italy 1,300, and Great Britain 1,200, out of a total of 4,000.

Germany is first in towels and napkins with 4,000, Great Britain second with 3,000, Italy 3,000, out of a total of 12,000.

France has the monopoly in kid skins, and supplies 7,000, out of 8,000.

Great Britain has the monopoly in sheepskins, with 5,000 worth out of a total of 6,000.

The United States has the monopoly in ploughs, and sends 13,000 worth out of a total of 14,000. I may here remark that these ploughs are wooden framed, and that they are preferred in Uruguay to iron ones as used in Great Britain.

Great Britain supplies nearly all the hoes, Belgium scythes.

The United States has the monopoly in pitchforks. Great Britain in rakes.

Great Britain is foremost in the supply of windmill machinery.

The United States sends the majority of the reaping machines that are used in Uruguay.

Great Britain is alone in the supply of threshing machines.

Great Britain supplies 4,000, worth of sulphate of copper out of a total of 7,000, but has lost ground in this article compared with former years. Germany has advanced considerably, and now sends 1,700, against 400, worth which she sent in 1896. The United States has also increased her supply from 300, to 1,200.

The United States supplies the majority of axes, Great Britain spades.

Great Britain supplies 4,000, worth of various tools out of a total of 12,000, Germany 1,200, and France 1,000.

Germany is at the head of the list with 5,000, out of a total of 11,000, in sewing machines. Great Britain follows with 2,100, The United States 2,000, and Belgium 1,300.

Great Britain sends 6,000, worth of twine. Here again she has not made the progress that Germany has in the supply of this article, for last year she sent an equal amount, but Germany has increased her supply from 1,000, worth in 1896 to 3,000 in 1897. Italy now sends twice as much as she did a few years ago.

Great Britain has so far the monopoly in sewing thread.

The United States has the larger share in string for reaping and binding machines, and sends 30,000 worth. Great Britain only 3,000, out of a total of 36,000.

The United States supplies most of the timber, such as oak, cedar, walnut, and various hard woods, but the supply of pine is shared with Canada.

The United States sends all the tar which reaches Uruguay.

The imports of hawsers and rope (hemp) are equally shared between Great Britain and Italy.

Great Britain is second to Germany in the supply of wire for fencing purposes. Out of a total of 10,000, the former sends 3,000, the latter 4,000, then comes Belgium with 2,000.

Great Britain supplies of a total of 6,000, of starch only 1,000, Germany 4,000.

Germany sends 2,500, of blue out of a total of 3,000, Great Britain 100.

France has the market to herself in tiles.

There is nothing of importance to add to the account of the terrible murder of the Sra. Dassori on Wednesday night. The unfortunate victim was buried yesterday with a large and sympathetic attendance of the neighbors. Her murderer and unworthy husband shows the greatest nonchalance. It appears that he had attempted her life twice before, the first time some years ago. One of our native contemporaries, with that extraordinary reluctance to call crime by its proper name which is characteristic of this part of the world, calls the whole affair a «misfortune» (*desgracia*). This is indeed a remarkable term to apply to a case in which a man systematically ill-treats his wife, neglects his children until they are reduced to begging while he squanders his earnings in loose living, and finally murders her brutally while her babe is clinging to her breast. For our part we can hardly imagine a more abominable crime, and hanging is too good for such a wretch.

—*Misfortune*, for sooth.—Bah!

—At the Solis Theatre this evening will be given, for the first time in Montevideo, the brilliant comedy «*Scamparo*» by Bisson, the latest great success in Paris, where it has had a run of 400 nights. Sra. Mariani does not appear in this, but will play the principal part in the charming comedia «*La Figlia da Jette*» which precedes it. The visit of this excellent Company is rapidly drawing to a close.

—The Zarzuela Company at the San Felipe Theatre having omitted to send us the customary press tickets, we are unable to make any remarks on their performance. We note that it is only Spanish Companies that are guilty of this discourtesy, though they are never slow in claiming preliminary puffs.

—There has been a fearful storm at Port Arthur, causing great losses. A Chinese cruiser anchored in the port was sunk and 130 lives lost.

—The soul-stirring news is telegraphed from Madrid that Alfonso XIII, the juvenile King of Spain (for how much longer?) has been confined and has taken his first communion. For some unknown reason the telegram reverses the operations.

—The Chamber of Deputies at Cape Colony has passed a vote of censure on the Cape ministry by 47 votes to 36.

—Mr. Chamberlain has graciously contradicted the rumors that were circulating to the effect that he was about to resign from the British Cabinet «because his colleagues did not give sufficient support to his policy» (as if he were Premier!).

—Invitations have been issued in Buenos Aires for the wedding of Mr. Huntington to Miss Eva Thomas, which will be celebrated on the 30th, inst at the American Church.

—Mr. Gladstone was once five feet eleven in height, but with the weight of years his frame had shrunk, and when he was Prime Ministry the last time he was only five feet nine.

—The Argentine Government has made a grant of \$1000 in aid, to defray his expenses home, to Armadale, who was brought out from England in connection with the fraud on the British Bank, and eventually acquitted for want of evidence. Under the circumstances it could hardly do less.

—We quote from the *B. A. Herald*.—Dr. George MacNally, one of the two brother-dentists in Calle Florida, corner of Corrientes, died on Wednesday afternoon of heart-failure. Dr. MacNally was one of the best known and most esteemed of American residents in this city. Successful professionally, he was also beloved for his personal qualities. He leaves two brothers in this city, Mr. Alexander MacNally and Dr. John, his partner in business. His mother and sister left for New York a few months since. The family will have the sympathy of their large circle of friends in their great bereavement.

—Yesterday being St. John's Day, all the Johns, Jacks, Juans, Jennies and Juanitas in the city, from the President downwards, were in fête. For Masons the great event was the annual banquet, at which Mr. Hagenbuck was installed as W. M. of the Acacia Lodge for the year.

—Mr. Gladstone's head was, it is well known, of exceptional size. The story he told at Lord Ripon's once about the man who could not get a hat large enough till at last the hatter called in desperation for an Aberdeen hat, may well enough have been his own experience. The compliment to Aberdeen was, no doubt, relished in the granite city. Dr. Collins once gave to the world the result of a special study in hats, in the course of which it was mentioned that Mr. Gladstone's number in hats was 7 3/8. The hatters' number is arrived at by taking the mean of the length and breadth. Thus a hat 7 1/2 by 6 1/2

THE WAR.
Yesterday's war news was full of wild contradictions, but amid them all we think we may safely settle down to the belief that General Shafter's invading expedition has effected a safe landing on Cuban soil. Spanish advices assert that the U. S. forces attempted landings at Concha, Siboney and Baiquiri, being rejected with serious loss, but they acknowledge that they eventually effected a landing at Berroco, said to be 20 miles from Santiago. American and other advices say nothing about Berroco, but are fairly consistent in the assertion that the entire force was landed at Baiquiri (possibly another version of the same name) without any effective resistance on the part of the Spanish, and without any loss at all except of one Cuban soldier wounded. The rebels gave them valuable assistance in keeping back the Spanish troops. The latter fired a few ineffectual volleys and then retreated. The whole coast between Baiquiri and Santiago is said to have been cleared of Spanish forces by the fire from the U. S. vessels. Perfect order and discipline was shown in the disembarkation and the U. S. troops now occupy an encampment some six miles in extent. The operation took about ten hours, concluding at 1 a. m. on Thursday. In addition to this the armour clad Texas has reduced to silence and apparently destroyed the formidable battery of Sacapa, which had hitherto resisted all the attacks of Com. Schley's squadron. A Spanish shot went through (I) the Texas and one man on board was killed. The forces from Admiral Cervera's squadron are said to have been landed in order to join the Spanish troops in operations by land. They are now reduced to half rations. Even the Spanish telegrams now admit that the situation of Santiago is most critical.

The alleged landing of German forces to occupy Manila is roundly contradicted in a telegram from Berlin, but partially confirmed from other sources. The probable truth is that it has been arranged that they shall land if necessary to protect life in the city. The murder of the wife and child of General Augusti is not confirmed, but they are in the hands of the Tagalos, who are said now to be practically masters of the entire island except a reduced portion of the city of Manila still defended by the Spanish garrison.

The Spanish Cortes are to be dissolved to day, and after that it is expected the Cabinet will take a resolution respecting its resignation.

According to the *Paris Herald* there has been a hostile manifestation in front of the British Consulate at Cadiz, which had to be dissolved by the police. The Cadiz correspondent of the *Herald* has been arrested at San Fernando.

It is now said that Admiral Camara's squadron has passed Sicily on its way to the Suez Canal. It is doubted if it will be able to obtain coal for a voyage to the Philippines, and in any case it will arrive too late to be of use there.

SUNDRIES.

Where is that Spanish paper which carefully translated Mark Twain's «*Jumping Frog*» into stately Castilian and then quoted it as a faithful account of American customs? Anyhow, it would not be a whit more grotesque than some of the absurd articles printed by the Spanish papers as descriptions of life and manners in the United States.

threatening at Madrid in consequence of differences among the Ministers over the financial proposals.

Cricket was carried on yesterday under more favourable conditions, though the sky in London was overcast and the light often bad. Gloucestershire appeared against Surrey at the Oval, and thanks mainly to some hard hitting by Hale, ran up at score of 205. Surrey made 41 without loss. Leicestershire was opposed to the M.C.C. at Lord's the game being left in an even position. Warwickshire against Lancashire, at Liverpool, after making 178 themselves, got rid of seven of their opponents for 67. Somerset put a weak team in the field against Oxford, and had rather the worst of the day's play. At Cambridge the University gave a good account of themselves against Mr. A. J. Webb's eleven.

Play in the fifth and sixth rounds of the competition for the amateur golf championship took place at Hoylake yesterday. To-day Mr. F. G. Tait, of the Black Watch, and Mr. J. Murray Ferguson, of the Royal and Ancient, will meet in the final. An order was made by the Master of the Rolls and two Lords Justices in the Court of Appeal, yesterday, on appeal by the liquidator of Olympia (Limited), making Mr. Montagu Gluckstein, as promoter and director of the company, liable for the repayment of a sum which it was alleged he and his colleagues had obtained as a secret profit in the course of transactions for the purchase and sale to the company of Olympia.

Mr. John Troutbeck, the Westminster Coroner, yesterday concluded his inquiry into the cause of the disaster at Abbey Mansions, which resulted in the deaths of seven workmen. The jury found that the cause of the collapse of the building was due to the faulty design in the construction of the pier and to the culpable negligence of the architect—a verdict which the coroner said was equivalent to one of manslaughter. Accordingly he committed the architect, Mr. Pawley, for trial. Bail was allowed.
