POLITICAL NOTES.
The resignation of Dr. Joaquin Salterain as Minister of Foreign Affairs is fully concerned, and has occasioned general regret, as, though he can hardly be called a political personage, he has been recognised as a staunch and honorable factor in the present situation. The precise reasons for his resignation are not known. The Tribuna maliciously insinuates that he was dissatisfied with the policy recently pursued by Sr. Cuestas and that there had been serious disagreements between them, but this we know to be entirely without foundation. His resignation, though it has taken the public by surprise is not the outcome of a sudden resolution, and the reason may more probably be found in a friendly arrangement with Sr. Cuestas by which the latter is left free to strengthen his Cabinet from the party point of view, a not unwise step in the present perturbed situation. So far no certain forecast can be made as to Dr. Salterain's successor in the portfolio. Various names have been mentioned, but none on which reliance can be placed. In fact, it is not yet certain that Dr. Salterain may not retain his post.

As to the rumors of other ministerial changes, nothing certain is known, nor have we much credence in them. As regards Mr. MacEachon we can give an authoritative denial to the rumors of his resignation.

General Nicomedes Castro took possession of his portfolio as Minister of War yesterday, with the usual formalities. General Salvador Tajes was installed as Chief of Staff on Tuesday.

It is confirmed that the Government has applied, through the Director of Customs Sr. Gratin, to various commercial houses of the market for a loan of \$200,000 at 6% interest, to be repaid in four fortnightly instalments out of the product of the additional 2 1/2 %

Duty when reestablished. The amount is to be employed in assisting the redemption of the Treasury Certificates for October. The *raison d'être* of the operation is not at all clear. So small an amount will make no appreciable difference in the heavy arrears of the Certificates, and, in any case, the Government, if it is really in difficulties as regards the next conversion, might have drawn upon its credit with the Bank of the Republic, which is generally understood to be more or less intact. Anyhow, we learn that there has been a ready response to the application for the loan, showing that the Government enjoys good credit in the market.

The *Siglo* continues to express its dissatisfaction with the manner in which the Government is facing the problem of the Treasury Certificates. It insists that the only plan is to unify the unconverted Certificates into a Debt and then return to cash payments. For this purpose, according to its calculations, there would be necessary a Debt of \$5,076,000 at 6% interest and 7% annual amortisation, issued at 64%. This would give a practically exact compensation to the present holders of the Certificates, and would require an annual service of \$406,080, to which, the *Siglo* proposes, might be applied the profits of the Bank of the Republic and such other resources as the Government might devise.—We cannot say we view with favor this proposal to add another \$400,000 to the already enormous permanent obligations of the country, and we are surprised that it should be made by the *Siglo* which, in previous times, has so consistently combated any increase of the public debt. We believe that some better expedient may yet be found. It is unfortunate the discussion should have arisen at a time of the year when the revenue is slackest. The best thing would be to tide over the present months without change, and devise some better plan to come into operation towards the end of the year, when the revenue improves and the new Budget should be in force.

Considerable amusement has been caused here by the news that Dr. Julio Herrera and the exiled musicians in B. Aires held a banquet there on Monday to celebrate the anniversary of the Constitution. The idea of men who have so shown such little respect for law or Constitution holding such a banquet is decidedly ludicrous.

Various changes are announced in the Departmental Prefects, mostly of a political character. Sr. Aurelio Nobox has resigned the Prefecture of Salto and will be succeeded by Col. Bartolomé Gaballero, an appointment which does not seem to have made a good impression, as he is regarded as too much of the «old school» Col. Angel Casalla will probably be transferred from Paysandu to Minas, Col. Elias Borches will be appointed to Paysandu, and Col. Isabel, at present Prefect of Minas, will resume his former post of Police Inspector of the South.

The Presidential reception usually held on Wednesday evenings was suspended yesterday on account of the serious illness of the mother of Sr. Cuestas. The venerable lady, who lives at La Plata, is 88 years of age.

We have omitted to mention an interesting ceremony which took place on Monday last, namely the presentation to Col. Pollo, Chief of the Chasseurs, of a sword of honor, subscribed for by the residents of the Cordon in recognition of his valiant resistance to the military mutineers on the 4th instant. The incident is worth recording as it is another proof of the outrageous falsity of the assertion of the mutineers that their cause was supported by public opinion. Col. Magallanes, Chief of the Urban Battalion, has also been the recipient of a similar testimonial raised by spontaneous subscription among the residents of the 4th Section.

Uruguayan Products for Cuba.
It is worth noting that the occupation of the province of Santiago of Cuba—nearly one-fourth of the area of the whole island—by the United States, reopens the Cuban market, closed for some time past, to Uruguayan jerked beef and other meat products. The blockade of the ports of the province has been lifted, and vessels may now enter freely. We cannot yet state, though, whether duties will be charged according to the Spanish or the United States tariff—probably the latter, which is much the lower of the two. All cargoes intended for the island should be entered at the U. S. Consulate in this city. It is quite possible that by the time they arrive the entire island may be under U. S. control and consequently all the ports open.

The importance of this should not escape the notice of saladeros and produce exporters.

Sport.
Albion F. C. versus C. U. R. C.
C.—This football match was played at Punta Carretas on Monday before some 2000 spectators, in magnificent weather, and resulted in a victory for the Albions by 2 goals to nil. In the first half no goals were scored, though the Albions had much the best of the game. In the second half, one of the Railway players put the ball through his own goal, which scored a point for the Albions. Soon after Poole put through a beauty from a long shot sent in by Ratcliff. On the whole the better team won and the C. U. R. C. was lucky in not losing by a larger margin. For the winners Ratcliff played a clever game as centre half-back, his tackling and powerful kicking being the hit of the match. Deurnex was very safe as back. Poole and Lanza were the best of the forwards. Sardonson for goal was never troubled. For the C. U. R. C. S. Davies in goal saved some good shots, Rios, Craven and Buchanan did some good work.

Mr. Crawford's New Book.
We copy from the *South American Journal* the following account of the new book «South American Sketches», just published by Mr. Robert Crawford, M.A., M.J.C.E., and of which it is to be hoped the English Club will lose no time in procuring a copy. It is issued by Longmans, Green & Co. at 6s.

«Mr. Crawford is already well known to many of our readers, both professionally, as a civil engineer, who has done much construction work on South American railways, and as an author. His first work, «Across the Pampas and the Andes», was a record of his experiences whilst engaged in the survey for the Buenos Aires and Pacific Railway, and it was widely read and much appreciated for its racy style and accuracy of delineation of South American scenes in 1888. Mr. Crawford was appointed chief engineer of the Central Uruguay Northern Extension, from Paso de los Toros to Santa Ana de Libramento, on the southern frontier of Brazil. The present book is the result of his observations and adventures whilst engaged in the construction of that line. Consequently, it refers almost entirely to Uruguay, and to a part of that country as yet but little known to ordinary travellers. As might be expected it gives much information about the Banda Oriental and its railways; but Mr. Crawford is a discursive writer, and dearly loves to let his pen run away from technical subjects into the realms of natural history, sociology, and other topics, always mingled with the general banter inherent to his countrymen from the «Green Isle», so that his work will be welcome reading to other than railway engineers and shareholders. One impression the book will probably give to these latter is that the Northern Extension of the Central Uruguay Railway was built in advance of the requirements of the country, as indeed has since been proved by its traffic returns. Pastoral industry seems to be the only business in the section traversed, and it does not appear likely to develop any other. The future of the line will much depend upon measures being taken by the Uruguayan and Brazilian Governments to put down the contraband trade which has so long flourished in this region. We have much pleasure in calling the attention of our readers to the book.»

Mr. Parish Robertson.
We quote the following very interesting historical sketch from the *B. A. Standard*.—«One of the most remarkable Englishmen who visited South America was John Parish Robertson, who was born at Kelso, Scotland, in 1792. His father was assistant secretary of the Bank of Scotland, and his mother, Juliet Parish, daughter of a Hamburg merchant. He began life at 13 years of age as powder monkey aboard one of Admiral Stirling's vessels in the attack on Montevideo in 1805, his father having come out to establish a house of business in the River Plate. When Montevideo was evacuated by the British his father sent him home to

—A few years ago Bahia Blanca was considered somewhere outside the borders of civilisation. It is now up to date and has just opened a handsome theatre.
—There was a shocking tragedy on Sunday morning at the Boca, Buenos Aires, where a sailor named John Davidson, a man of bad character, stabbed a ship broker named Luis Agustin in the heart, and killed him on the spot. The murder was committed on board the British barque Arizona, and all for *five cents* which the unfortunate broker refused to give his cowardly murderer.
—On Saturday last there took place in the English Church, Quilmes, the marriage of Miss Mansfield Parkyns of Woodborough Hall Nottingham, and Mr. A. W. Battynay of the Ensenada Railway Company.
—When the United States has got all the ships in commission now ordered, it will have 12 first-class battle ships, 2 second class battle ships, 5 double turreted monitors, 11 single turreted coast-defence monitors, 9 first-class cruisers, 11 second-class cruisers, 12 third-class cruisers and 17 torpedo-boats.
—We are requested to remind the ladies and gentlemen taking part in Mr. Still's opera «Jeannotte» that there will be a rehearsal this evening at which it is hoped there will be a full attendance. We learn from Mr. Still that he hopes to be able to produce the opera about the middle of next month.
—Holden's fascinating Mariette's perform again at the Cibils Theatre this evening, when an almost complete change of programme will be introduced, including some very pleasing scenic and mechanical effects. Amongst the new items are, The Telescopic Couple, The India rubber Man, Beauty and the Beast, The 5 Chingse, a Snow-storm, English Dance, The Mysterious Bed, etc. On account of the great success of the afternoon performances, another will be given next Sunday.
—The intercollegiate boat race at New London, U. S., was rowed on the 23rd of June between Harvard, Yale and Cornell college crews. The last named won by 3 1/2 lengths over Yale. Harvard coming in third. This is the second time Cornell has won the race. Lehmann, the English oarsman, coached Harvard, Courtney Cornell, and Cook Yale.
—One of the best known of New York booksellers spends thousands of dollars every year in advertising his name and address, with—instead of a detailed description of his wares—the simple appeal: «Empty your purse into our head.»
—The inimitable Fregoli is again appearing at the Alhambra, London.
—It is believed that Mr. Zola has escaped from France, in order to avoid fulfilling the sentence of imprisonment just passed upon him. It is about the best thing he could do.
—According to a London telegram, Mr. Balfour has announced to the Commons the intention of the Government to abolish compulsory vaccination.
—It is telegraphed that the state of the Prince of Wales is satisfactory, and no complications are feared from his accident.

LONDON NOTES.
TUESDAY, JUNE 21.
A somewhat longer sitting of the House of Lords than usual was held yesterday. The Sea Fisheries Bill was read a second time, and the Aliens Bill passed through

telegrams now deny that any overtures have yet been made, directly or indirectly. In Madrid, the Government is trying to shift the responsibility for the surrender of the entire province of Santiago on to General Blanco saying that it only authorised the surrender of the city.
The bombardment of Manzaniello is confirmed, but there are contradictions as to the results.
Mr. Goschen, questioned in the Commons, has denied the absurd tale that Admiral Dewey's fleet was manned by British gunners.

THE WAR.
There was little news of importance yesterday in Santiago the Americans are steadily putting matters in order. The great problem seems the one of good. The Red Cross Society have some 40,000 persons on their hands all in want, but it is said that 20 vessels with provisions have already arrived. According to one telegram the refugees have hailed the occupation of the Americans with open arms and do not conceal their joy at the termination of the struggle. General Alger reports having already received 10,000 rifles and 10 million cartridges. The surrender of the outside garrisons of the province is not yet accomplished, but it is not imagined that there will be any serious difficulty 22,789 in givon officially as the number of the Spanish troops included in the surrender. The U. S. authorities are in possession of the cable and the telegraph offices, which cuts off all communication between General Blanco and his Government (this has been said before.) President McKinley has issued a Decree establishing autonomous government of the island under guarantee of the United States. The aqueduct is being rapidly repaired. General McKibben, the Military Governor has proclaimed complete liberty of commerce, with the exception of restrictions on the sale of liquors. A number of political prisoners have been set at liberty. An English Navigation Company has offered to convey 18000 men to Spain for £125,000. Yellow fever is reported to be making great ravages among the Spanish garrisons of Caimanera and Guatanamo where only 3000 men were found in good health. There has been an unpleasant incident with Mr. Seovel, correspondent of that notorious paper the *N. Y. World*. It is said that he tried to raise the flag of the Cuban Republic on the Government House at Santiago, but was turned out by the U. S. officers. He then had a violent interview with General Schafter, whom he insulted and, it is said, even struck. He has been sent to Tampa as a prisoner.
Though the Spaniards seem to expect hourly the appearance of an U. S. squadron off the coast of Spain, according to Washington advices it has not yet started, but is still taking in smokeless powder at the rate of 8,000 lbs the day.
As regards peace, there is no advance in the situation Washington

the Committee. The Reserve Forces Bill was read a third time and passed. Other measures were advanced a stage.

In the House of Commons the First Lord of the Admiralty made it clear that it was a desire not to trench upon the reserves of coal, in view of the continued serious character of the South Wales strike, that had led to the abandonment of the Naval Manoeuvres, the consumption on manoeuvres being about 50,000 tons.

A Conference was held at the National Liberal Club yesterday afternoon to consider the question of a memorial by the Liberal party to commemorate Mr. Gladstone's long and illustrious leadership.

Mr. Kotze, late Chief Justice of the Transvaal, was entertained by the Anglo-African Writers' Club at the Grand Hotel last evening.

Last evening the annual dinner of the Women Writers was held at the Criterion Restaurant.

Madame Sarah Bernhardt last night made her first appearance in London this season, at the Lyric Theatre, in M. Coolus's Comedy "Lysiane," one of the recent productions of the Renaissance Theatre, Paris.

Seven yachts yesterday made a start in the annual yacht race from Dover to Heligoland for the cup offered by the German Emperor.

Charming weather favoured the opening of the Annual Show of the Royal Agricultural Society at Birmingham yesterday. The entries compare favourably in number with those of exhibitions held at other centres during recent years.

Both the Oxford and Cambridge Eleven were engaged in out matches yesterday—the Dark Blues appearing against Surrey at the Oval, where they had a long day in the field, and the Light Blues appearing against Sussex at Brighton, where they were seen to considerable advantage.

Further progress was made with the hearing of the Tatton Sykes case in the Queen's Bench Division yesterday. On the termination of Sir Edward Clarke's address, Sir Tatton was called, and gave evidence in support of his counsel's opening statement.
