POLITICAL NOTES.

The Council of State sat on Friday. A Message was received from the Executive forwarding the law of wheel taxes for the year 1898-99. Referred to Committee. A short Bill was passed determining the process to be observed by the Committee of Accounts in examining the accounts of the Director of the Department of the Interior. The subject of the law of Electoral Reform, with which some further progress was made.

An interesting and perhaps unique ceremony will take place to-day, namely the destruction by fire of the fraudulent civic registers of the Herrera and Borda periods, which served as the instruments of those bad presidents in falsifying the suffrage, suffocating the will of the people and evading the Constitution. A whole epic might be written around these registers. In fact, we think it is almost a pity that, instead of being destroyed, there are not sent to the National Museum to be kept there as an example and warning to future generations of how low the Republic had fallen politically in the period 1890-97. Yesterday's *Siglo* has a very amusing and eloquent paragraph on the subject, which unfortunately does not lend itself to translation. The cremation will take place in the furnaces of the Electric Light Company.

We learn that the United Finance and Foment Committees of the Council of State will commence study of the Port question during the present week.

A peculiar circumstance seems to have escaped the notice of our contemporaries, namely that since the 1st instant the country is without a Budget even in form. The Budget for the new financial year has not been passed—there is as yet no hint of when discussion will commence—nor has the Council of State passed the usual formal Bill prolonging the previous Budget until the sanction of a new one. We are therefore without a Budget, even in theory. Practically the situation is no novelty, for there never was really any proper Budget passed during the Borda period and only one during the Herrera period, and such Budget as there was, might have been waste paper for all the attention the Executive paid to it. Fortunately, the Government of Sr. Cuestas is far more to be trusted without a Budget than were the Governments of his predecessors with one, so there is no cause for alarm. Still, the Council of State should lose no time in sanctioning one, if only to put an end to one of the irregularities of the situation.

An absurd rumor has been started and it has been echoed by one or two of our contemporaries, to the effect that Sr. Cuestas, dissatisfied with the results of the civic registration, is desirous of prolonging the "provisional" situation, avoiding a presidential election next March! It is difficult to imagine a less reason for such a step, nor would it be consistent with Sr. Cuestas' attitude since he has occupied the Executive Power. We expect it would not be difficult to trace the rumor to "collectivist" sources, being one of their numerous manoeuvres to disturb and depress the

situation. They are never happy unless doing some mischief.

The new municipal Budget, prepared by the competent hands of Dr. Carlos María Peña, is about to be presented. We understand that it embraces very substantial economies, especially in the suppression or rather the coalition of a number of the suburban auxiliary Boards, thus greatly reducing the machinery.

Dr. Alfredo Vidal y Fuentes has been named member of the University Council. Dr. Adolfo Porchat de Assis has been named Uruguayan Consul in Santos, and Sr. J. M. Briscoe Vice consul in Pilar (Paraguay).

The five or six young men arrested last Sunday for uttering subversive cries in the meeting at the Centro Gallego have been released on bail. It is to be hoped the temporary confinement has cooled their tempestuous spirits.

IS ARGENTINA NEUTRAL?

We quote the following paragraphs from an article in the *Review of the River Plate*, as they are in great measure applicable here. The *Review*, however, overlooks the strongest proof of all of the violation of neutrality, namely that the Spanish and their friends are allowed and exercise a public propaganda impossible to the other side. It is only necessary to imagine the consequences that would ensue if the N. Americans and their friends employed a similar propaganda, if they raised public subscriptions for the war and exposed disgusting caricatures insulting the Queen Regent and the French President, to see how very little neutrality there is in the matter. In fact there is no neutrality at all where a license and advantage are accorded to one side which are impossible to the other.)

If the above question were fired pointblank at any member of the Argentine Government at the present time, there is little doubt that he would answer it, perhaps somewhat indignantly, in the affirmative, but the average observer of Argentine affairs might well be excused if, when contemplating the state of the Republic, he found in this republic, the attitude of the press which represents their particular interests, and of its Argentine contemporaries, he permitted himself to think that it is extremely difficult to distinguish Argentine neutrality from furious partisanship. We had presumed, in the first place, that if Argentina were neutral, then every resident in the country would be bound to participate in that neutrality, and that, however much we might sympathize with either belligerent, we must refrain from any public demonstration of such sympathy; but it would appear, from what has taken place in this country since the outbreak of hostilities between the United States and Spain, that this presumption is unfounded, and that, although the Argentine Government has declared itself neutral, and although all foreigners, be they Spaniards or Americans, or of any other nationality, have precisely equal rights under the Constitution, to the Spanish residents is accorded a liberty of speech and action, which has already degenerated in license, and may easily culminate in overt acts of violence against English or Americans here, which would bring very serious responsibility upon Argentina. . . . Furthermore, we should like to know whether the attitude of the Argentine Government would have been precisely the same if the number of Americans resident in Argentina had been equal or nearly so to that of the Spaniards, and if the Americans had held public meetings for the purpose of augmentation of military supplies or arms for their side, or had allowed themselves to reply to the horribly bestial insults to which they and the English have been equally subjected by the papers which profess to represent Spanish interests in Buenos Aires. Would the Argentine Government have given the same license to the Anglo-Saxon as they have given to the Latin foreigner? and whom would they have held responsible for the consequences of that license? We have said in former articles that we understand the attitude of the Argentine press in the question, and we appreciate the fact that, whatever may be their private opinions, they are compelled by considerations of self-interest to cultivate Spanish sympathies but, we frankly do not understand why the Government continues to allow the Spanish press to violate every precept of decency and culture by gross and bestial insults, pictorial and otherwise, directed against the citizens of the United States, who have at least an equal claim to the hospitality and goodwill of the Argentine Government and people.

We have no hesitation whatever in saying that in no country in the world with the smallest pretensions to civilization or culture would such a horrible

production as *Don Quijote* be allowed to exist for an instant, and public decency, if it were anything more than an expression in Argentina, would long ere this have caused its suppression. . . . The attitude of the Spaniards in Buenos Aires in relation to the sympathy shown some little time ago by Argentines and others towards Cuba, and now assumed towards Americans and English with reference to the Spanish American War, clearly demonstrates their belief that they have rights and privileges here which other foreigners have not, and it behoves the Argentine Government to correct this view with as little delay as possible, or the time may come when they may have cause to regret the pusillanimity, to call it by a no stronger term, which has been manifested by them since the war broke out.

There was important news yesterday, though the telegrams are confusing and contradictory, as usual, in the details. The U. S. forces commenced the attack on Santiago early on Friday morning. The principal struggle was at the village of Canay, some 5 or 6 miles to the north of Santiago, while at the same time General Lawton's column advanced on the north west of the city. There seems to be have been some hard fighting, but, if the telegrams are to be trusted, the Spanish forces were eventually driven back, and the U. S. forces occupied the outer retranchments or fortifications of the city, and are holding their position. Accounts as to the losses differ, but they have evidently been the heaviest of any engagement since the war began. A N. York *Herald* telegram says 400 killed and wounded on the American side, and a later Washington telegram "officially" raises the number to 500. It is added in the latter that reinforcements to the U. S. troops had come up and they were preparing for another attack yesterday. One U. S. company was completely cut to pieces. There is no account, yet of the Spanish losses, but the Spanish telegrams are making no reference to the combat. Further news should appear to-day. The squadron also took part in the combat, bombarding the forts. It is said the dynamite gun was also employed. According to one telegram the entire combat was merely a feint, the object being to complete the destruction of the Morro fort (once more!) so as to leave the entrance to the bay free. Admiral Cervera's squadron seems to have remained inactive; according to one account his vessels have been partially dismantled. A spy apparently confirms the sinking of the *Reina Mercedes*; but it is now pretended that it was sunk purposely by the Spanish themselves in order to block the channel (and help to bottle themselves in).

In addition to the above, four U. S. cruisers have bombarded Manzanillo. They did great damage to the forts, but also suffered in turn, one of the cruisers (name not transpired) being disabled and towed away by her consorts when they retired.

According to a *Herald* message, 70 dead were taken into Santiago after the combat of Juraguá on Wednesday, raising the Spanish losses to 110 against only 18 American. A Spanish telegram claims that the American losses were 200. There are said to be serious disagreements between General Blanco and Admiral Cervera owing to the complete inaction of the latter. 100 deserters from the Spanish forces at Santiago surrendered to the Americans.

Contradictions accumulate about Admiral Cámara's squadron. After having been told that it had passed the Suez Canal, we are now told that it is still hanging around Port Said. The difficulty seems to be with the coal, the U. S. Consul at Port Said is said to have bought up all the coal there (the Spanish could not have taken it anyway without a breach of neutrality) and some Americans have paid a fancy price for two cargoes of coal awaiting in British (Djessels in the Red Sea. The tales about the squadron carrying a sufficient supply of its own transports are probably mere boasts.

Lieut. Carranza, formerly attaché of the Spanish Legation in Washington, has mysteriously disappeared from Montreal when it was notorious that he was acting as a centre of information in Spanish interests. This has given rise to a report that he has been kidnapped by the Yankees and taken to U. S. territory where he will be treated as a spy.

The latest tale, but not a very credible one, is that as soon as Santiago is taken, the bulk of the American fleet will be withdrawn from Cuban waters and sent to operate on the Spanish coasts. It is again said that a large force is being prepared for the invasion and occupation of Puerto Rico (we were

told this idea had been abandoned a few days ago.)

At Bulacan in the Philippines the rebels have taken the Governor and his family prisoners, and have captured a Spanish vessel the *Bohuelo* whilst disembarking 500 troops all of whom were captured and the Commandant killed. From Manila the only news is that Agutaldo is in trouble with his subordinate officers, who resent the restrictions he places on pillage and slaughter. The *National Zeitung* of Berlin declares that if the U. States conquer the Philippines, Germany will not dispute them, but will only interest herself in case Spain loses them and the U. S. do not occupy them.

SUNDRIES.

—Tomorrow is the 4th of July, American Independence day. In anticipation of the date we extend a most cordial salute to our American friends, and readers, prompt and successful issue to their present troubles. The sympathy between the British and American nations, sympathy of blood, race, language and kindred idea was rarely, if ever, stronger than at the present moment, and it is to be hoped that when the war is over, if not before it will find expression in a treaty which will prove an indissoluble tie between the two nations, and enable them to face the rest of the world as a united and compact whole in all questions of mutual interest.

—Though the weather yesterday was still rather dull and unsettled, there are hopes that rain will hold off today, in which case the great outdoor event will be the international football match at Punta Carretas between the Albion F. C. and the Lobos team from Buenos Aires. Play commences at 2.30 p. m. Very neat cards have been issued for the occasion with the names and positions of the players marked in gold, surmounted by the Uruguayan and Argentine coats of arms. These cards are a great help to spectators to understand the match. We learn that the authorities have permitted the use of national flags on the occasion, and will send some policemen to assist in keeping the course clear. The Lobos team is reputed a strong one, and the Albions will have to play their best to save their reputation.

—In a speech which he delivered on Friday, the Marquis of Salisbury said that it was the duty of Great Britain to abstain from the exhibition of any preference towards either of the belligerents in the Spanish-American war, as both nations are deserving of every consideration. He also expressed the hope that peace would soon be established. Referring to matters affecting the Empire, he said that all possibility of an encounter with France had disappeared; and as regards the policy of Great Britain in China, it was the object of the Government to promote the interests of the Country and prevent the dismemberment of the Celestial Empire.

—The Inspector General of the Municipality of Buenos Aires having called the attention of the Intendant to the «posters» on the walls relating to certain cigarettes bearing the name of «El Chanchó» which are obviously intentionally offensive to the United States in reference to the war with Spain, and as Argentina is strictly neutral in the war, the Intendant has ordered that the said posters shall be removed from the walls.

—A misplaced comma will sometimes lead to serious consequences, as an unfortunate American editor has just discovered. Among the advertisements in his paper was one which extolled the merits of a patent medicine, and it was a testimonial as follows: «I

am now completely restored to health, after having been at death's door, through having taken five bottles of your medicine.» Unfortunately the comma after «death's door» was omitted, and the advertiser is proceeding for damage on the plea that serious injury has been done to him by making it appear that his remedy kills instead of cures.

—In addition to the performance at the Solis for to-night, an extra performance will be given to-morrow when Ibsen's «Nora» (The Doll's House) will be played here for the first time. There is great curiosity to see this play, the most popular if not the most characteristic of the great Norwegian dramatist.

—H. M. S. «Mohawk» has annexed 18 small islands in the Pacific known as the Santa Cruz archipelago. (Probably the Queen Charlotte's Islands, in the S. W. Pacific, between the Salomon Isles and the New Hebrides lat. 8° to 12° S. long. 165° to 168° E. There is a fine harbour in the chief island. They were discovered by Mendana in 1595 and again by Carteret in 1767.)

—The reinforcements for the Sudan expedition embarked at the Albert Docks, London, on Friday, amid great enthusiasm.

—We hasten to explain. The Cinderella Dance mentioned in our last is likely to be held on the 18th or 20th instant, is not being organized by the Ladies' Committee, but by a Bachelors' Committee which thus intends to make some return for the hospitality of the Ladies. The next Dance of the latter will take place on August 17. There are thus two dances to look forward to instead of one, and the two Committees will enter into a friendly rivalry to see which can do the best. As to the thought that the rivalry should be anything but friendly, we shudder to contemplate the results. If the ladies were to refuse to go to the gentlemen's dance, and the gentlemen to that of the ladies—where would be the dance? For our part, we say the more Committees and the more dances, the better, and we wish the fullest measure of success to each and all.

—We are requested to state that it is not Mr. J. Smith who has been arrested on charge of stealing the blind man's dog, but some other gentleman of the same name.

—A negro has been elected to the French Chamber of Deputies. He is a legitimate negro and not an Asiatic Caucasian, like Lord Salisbury's «Black Man.» His name, too, is Legitime.

—Mr. Drabble, chairman of the Board of Directors of the London and River Plate Bank in London, has received a telegram from General Roca, assuring him that the question of limits between Chile and Argentina will soon be definitely settled.

—Sarah Bernhardt seems to have at last relented from her decision not to appear in Germany. It is said that she will soon go to Berlin with a company and give a series of dramatic performances, to the great delight of artistic circles in that capital.

—Do any of our readers remember a banker here of the name of Larnach? The London Correspondent of the *B. A. Standard* says: «Mr. Larnach, the winner of the Derby, is the son of a deceased banker of that name, a relative of some of my old friends in Montevideo.»

—Says the *Times of Argentina*: «We have to inform our readers, especially those connected with well known commercial concerns having connections with the provinces of a new form of swindle. Two men act in collusion, one in the provinces and the other in the city. One sends a telegraphic order to the other telling him to collect from a certain house in this city a sum of money against goods sold, signing the telegram with the name of any well known firm that may do business with another here. He also notifies the firm here, in the name of the provincial firm, of his orders, and the order is paid at sight. Commercial firms will therefore have to treat telegraphic orders for payment with care and not to pay them without looking into the matter.»

—Weather permitting, there will be races at Maroñas this afternoon. The Stud Gordon is the favorite for the second and third events, and for the others Musette, Fainitza and Caramuru.

—A repetition of «Magda» is announced at the Solis Theatre this evening for the final appearance, of the Marini Company, which has given us so many artistic and enjoyable performances.

BUENOS AIRES.
—To-day there is no longer an Ensenada Railway. It belongs henceforth to the Southern. The F. C. S. has arranged with the former of the line from Temperley to La Plata, and of those from La Plata to the port, and from Tolosa to Elizalde.

Thus the F. S. S. will have the monopoly of all the lines that converge on the provincial capital.

The Executive has permitted the Southern Railway to temporarily open its new line from Rio Colorado to Choele Choele. On Thursday night, at the American Church, Calle Corrientes, the marriage was celebrated between Mr. Ralph Walter Huntington and Miss Annie Newbery Thomas, both well known in American and English Society in Buenos Aires.

The official enquiry into the death of the Argentine explorer Ramon Lista, opened by order of the National Government and directed by a magistrate independent of the provincial authorities of Salta, has demonstrated that the evidence of Dr. Gay de Granval was perfectly correct. The explorer was murdered by Marceoz, who was denounced by Lamadrid. The latter was then murdered by the accomplices of the assassin, and Dr. Gay narrowly escaped the same fate.

In the year 1897 there were apprehended 5,045 criminals in this city. Of these 40 were Germans, 1938 Argentines, 861 Spanish, 167 French, 37 British, 2083 Italians, 303 Uruguayans and 216 of various other nationalities. In comparison to the number of adults, the Argentines convicted outnumber the foreigners.

LONDON NOTES

SATURDAY, JUNE 4. Commodore Schley's official report of the reconnaissance at Santiago on Tuesday has been received in Washington. He says that there is no reasonable doubt that Admiral Cervera's fleet is inside the harbour. He adds that the object of the American fleet was to develop the enemy's batteries, and that the result was entirely satisfactory. No American vessel was hit and no man was hurt.

Yesterday voting took place in New South Wales, Victoria, and Tasmania on the Australian Federation proposals. The figures to hand show that these were carried in the two last-mentioned Colonies but in New South Wales only 75,000 votes had been recorded in their favour, and it was believed that the necessary 80,000 could not be made up. To-day voting takes place in Southern Australia.

Early yesterday morning the cruiser Terrible completed her experimental steam trial to Gibraltar and back, her arrival at Spithead being considerably over programme time. Mr. Goschen, the First Lord of the Admiralty, and Mr. Austen Chamberlain left about nine for London.

The Queen has commanded that the India Medal, with clasps, shall be granted to the troops employed in the recent operation on the North-West Frontier.

chair was taken by Lord Coleridge, and amongst the speakers were sey, Col. Taylor (President of the American Society in London), Sir G. W. des Voeux, Mr. R. Newton Crane, Dr. Clifford, Professor Dicey, Mr. G. Washington Cable, and Sir F. Pollock. Every allusion to the growing friendship between the two countries was received with enthusiasm.

The Oddfellows A.M.C. held its final sitting at Oxford yesterday. Mr. Thomas Edmondson, of the Skipton district, was unanimously appointed Grand Master for the ensuing year. Four candidates were nominated for the post of Deputy Grand Master, and the voting resulted in the election of Mr. T. Hughes, of Llanelli.

At the annual meeting of the Essex Hall Temperance Society (Unitarian) last night, Miss Harriet Johnson, of Liverpool, stated that in the more rural parts of twelve counties and in about 125 towns the sale of drink to children under 13 was now prevented by the efforts of magistrates, Borough Watch Committees, and County Standing Joint Committees. A resolution was submitted urging action to bring about like results in all parts of the country.

We regret to record the death of Mr. Samuel Plimsoll, who formerly represented Derby in the House of Commons. The sad event occurred at Folkestone, early yesterday morning.

In the railway disaster which occurred on Thursday night at Leyland, near Preston, the list of killed has been reduced to two, instead of three, as at first stated; but, as against this, the number of persons injured has risen from twenty to about sixty, and the injuries of several of them are of a very serious character.

After the recent rains batsmen yesterday found run-getting a difficulty, and in all the matches set down the scoring was small. Townsend accomplished a fine bowling performance for Gloucestershire at Lord's, taking nine Middlesex wickets in the first innings for 48 runs. On the day's play the home side were 44 on with seven men to go in. At Leyton Essex made a capital fight against Yorkshire, the Northern County now having 126 to win with nine wickets in hand. In their first innings they made 118. Brann at Brighton hit up 118 of the 202 made by Sussex against Somerset.

The summons taken out against Henry Norris, a barman, employed at the House of Commons, for il-

legally supplying intoxicating liquor to a member of the public, Bow-street yesterday morning, was by mutual consent adjourned for a week. It was stated at yesterday's statutory meeting of Lipton (Limited) that the register of shareholders numbered 74,262, and that it was the largest in any industrial undertaking in this country.

"My dearest Cornelia," she said, "you will have your hands full. Major Callender! He will be even more difficult to manage than Mr. Poltimore."

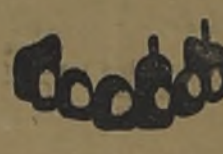

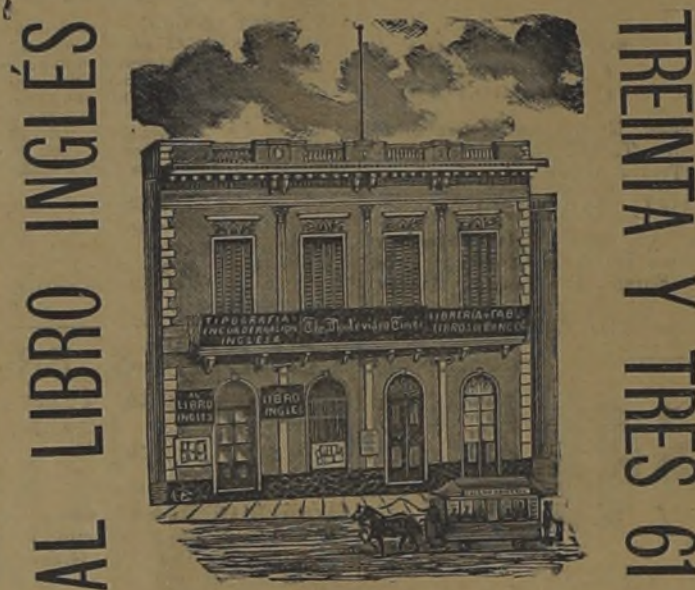
