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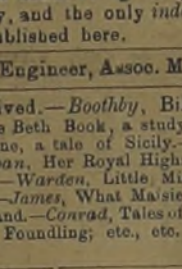

POLITICAL NOTES.

Though our more weighty contemporaries are doing their best to reassure the public mind, some of the minor papers still try to keep up the alarm, probably more from a love of sensation than anything else. Thus tales have been current of risings in the interior, of the imminence of an invasion on the frontier, and of wonderful plots to blow up the barracks by means of subterranean mines. There is very little foundation for any of these tales, and certainly none to cause alarm. The Government has received telegrams from the principal parts of the interior and from the Consuls on the frontier towns, all assuring it that everything is perfect normal and tranquil. We may be sure that, in view of recent events and of the notoriety of the fact that the exiles in Buenos Aires are bent on conspiracy, its agents have been instructed to keep an extra careful watch on every suspicious movement. Two or three Companies of the Artillery Regiments—which are still regarded with a doubtful eye after their late outbreak—have been sent to the interior. The movement of these seems to have been one of the sources of the alarm, though the temporary breaking up of regiments whose fidelity is not above suspicion, seems to us both wise and necessary. The new Minister of War and Chief of Staff have been paying personal visits of inspection to the garrison barracks, and have imparted reserved instructions to the Chiefs, another precautionary measure which some have tried to convert into a source of alarm. The only other remaining source seems to be that anonymous letters have been received by the officers of the 3rd Chasseurs—a regiment which seems to have become a special object of hatred on the part of the conspiring "collectivity"—conveying warnings that the barracks were undermined and that it was intended to blow them up. Probably this was nothing more than a stupid practical joke—the sending of threatening anonymous letters to all sorts of persons seems to be general just now—but careful search was made, the flooring taken up and the foundations tested, without anything suspicious being found. A contemporary reports that a similar thing has occurred with the Planter de Artilleria in the Pavilion but this we believe to be untrue. It might easily be asked, how could such barracks be undermined without anyone knowing anything about it?

THE WAR.

The expedition for the invasion of Puerto Rico sailed from Guantánamo on Friday or Saturday. This consists of 3000 troops and 5 field batteries, under the command of General Miles. It is proposed to land them at Guantánamo on the south-west of the island. Another expedition is to land at Fajardo, on the south east of the north coast. Altogether some 40,000 men will be landed. The expedition is accompanied by a squadron of pontoons and barges carrying materials for moles and bridges for landing the guns and horses. Arms are also being taken for distribution to the natives. A late New York telegram asserts that General Miles effect a landing on Sunday, and that a combat with Spanish troops from San Juan was expected to take place yesterday, but this announcement is probably premature.

The telegrams are very reticent about the question of peace, probably owing to the strict censorship maintained in Spain. The Madrid correspondent of the London Times reports that negotiations have been opened directly between Madrid and Washington, and that public opinion in Madrid is now in favor of the annexation of Cuba to the United States, thus defeating the ambitions of the traitorous rebels. There is trouble in Madrid between the Government and the newspapers, the latter threatening to suspend publication if the order of "previous censure" is not revoked. We understand the Government has promised to do so as soon as circumstances permit. The

movements of the Carlists are occasioning serious alarm. A number of the leaders have disappeared and it is thought they have gone to join Don Carlos who is believed to be somewhere near the French frontier. The sensational statement has appeared that the letter of Calixto Garcia to General Shafter, declaring a rupture, was forged by a newspaper correspondent named Arms! This is probably a yellow press invention, for the rupture seems fully confirmed. Other telegrams state that General Shafter has written an explanation to Garcia which the latter has accepted as satisfactory, and also that the U. S. Cabinet has found Garcia's letter justified! General Miles had asked Garcia to supply him with 50 picked Cubans to act as guides and interpreters in Puerto Rico, but it is not stated whether they were sent.

The Spanish residents in Cuba are said to be surprised and delighted at the proclamation that their property and persons would be respected. (Did they think the Americans were a horde of pirates?) 20,000 Cubans in Santiago who took no active part in the struggle are addressing a letter of gratitude to President McKinley for their deliverance from Spanish oppression, and expressing the hope to see the administration of the city in Cuban hands. There is still great scarcity of food in the city. The first embarkation of the surrendered troops for Spain will commence in a day or two, vessels already having arrived. One of the shipping companies which put in a rival tender, has made a claim of \$100,000 (!) damages against the Spanish Transatlantic Company, asserting that it obtained the contract illegally and under false pretences. Some of the American papers are criticising the U. S. Government for giving the contract to a Spanish Company, saying that it has helped to furnish the enemy with vessels and funds. Most contradictory accounts continue to appear about the number of men to be transported.

There is no confirmation that the attack on Manila has commenced. A Washington telegram presents Admiral Dewey as declaring that the Tagalos are much more fit for self-government than the Cubans and as commending the first steps they have taken. A Spanish telegram represents him as saying that they are entirely unfit to be trusted with the government of the island. War vessels of various European powers are said to have arrived at Tangiers in anticipation of the appearance of Com. Watson's squadron. Washington telegrams, however, continue to assert that Com. Watson will not be given sailing orders until Puerto Rico is published off.

FOOTBALL.

Albion F.C. versus C.U.R.C.C. 2nd XI's.—This match was played at Punta Carretas on Sunday, and resulted in a draw for one goal each, scored by Lindblad and A. J. Shaw respectively. Owing to the early hour of starting only 9 men a side turned up, so that the game was deprived of all combination, and this, added to the strong wind blowing, made accurate play impossible. Thomas, Gardinal and H. Sardeson played well for the Albions, and G. Davies, Fabre (in goal) and M. Rios for the visitors.

Albion F.C. versus "I Zingari."—This match, played on Sunday immediately after the above, also resulted in a draw, for 2 goals to 2. Followes and Donaldson scored for the Zingari in the first half, and for the Albions Lodge in the first half and Buchanan towards the end of the game. Both these points were rushed through. Buchanan also scored another goal, which was disallowed by the referee. The strong wind spoilt accurate play and combination. For the Zingari, Followes was the best of the forwards. Donaldson played a dashing game but his constant kicking out aggravated both players and spectators. For the Albions J. Sardeson was the best of the defence, and Lodge and Buchanan the pick of the forwards. Some 4000 spectators visited the field in the course of the afternoon.

SUNDRIES.

—In the River Plate there are, according to a list published by a contemporary, some eighty clubs for the pursuit of various athletic sports and games, nearly all established and supported by young Englishmen, for the culture of the body. This is not counting clubs for merely social purposes, of which there are also many. Of clubs for the culture of the mind we do not know a single one. Art, science and literature do not merely "take a back seat," but are entirely forgotten in the present mania for athletics. This is bad—bad for the present, worse for the future. Even now, it is no exaggeration to say that the young man who prefers the cultivation of his mind to that of his body, is looked upon contemptuously as an "outsider" and a "duffer" by nine-tenths of his contemporaries. The two ought to go hand in hand, but as matters stand at present, the one receives a monopoly of attention and the other is entirely neglected. This has been going on for many years, and there is yet no sign of a change for the better. The average young Englishman seems daily to become more athletic and less intellectual, and not merely that, but he is positively learning to despise every pursuit not of an athletic nature. Athletics are all very well in their way, but cultivated to this excess and to the exclusion of every thing else, sometimes even to the exclusion of the most ordinary social duties and civilities, they become a danger and a detriment.

—We often wonder to ourselves what kind of middle and old age is in store for the modern athletic young man, when he is no longer able to practice his only object in life, and finds art, science and literature (except the trashiest of novels) closed books to him. The young man who studies music or painting or languages, or who takes up some branch of science, if only as a "hobby," or who becomes a student of any branch of literature, acquires an interest which will last him all his life and will provide an inexhaustible source of entertainment and

improvement. The young man who cultivates athletics and nothing else, as a great many unfortunately do, when he reaches 30 or 35 years of age has little else than a blank to look forward to.

—There is nothing more important for young Englishmen coming to this country than to learn the Spanish language, and the more promptly and thoroughly they do this, the better their chances of advancement and success. Why do we not hear of them forming afternoon or evening classes for that and other purposes of self-improvement? Is it that they have no time to spare from the cricket and football field? Young Germans who come out here learn the language in a few months—when they do not know it already—and do not hesitate to devote themselves to the study of that and other things that will advance them in life. Hence we see them get on much more rapidly than young Englishmen, and in some departments they are pushing them rapidly from the field. But then the young German recognises that life is not bound up in the cricket field, but has other objects worthy of attention and despite this and despite their studious habits—we think the young Germans we see here will stand physical comparison with the Englishmen any day.

—We are aware that it is terribly unpopular to decry the athletic mania, but we are not afraid to do it, all the same. —The *B. A. Standard* has the following vigorous remarks on the payment by the Argentine Government of the high price of \$25,000 gold to the Uruguayan painter Bienes for his picture, "The Conquest of the Desert."—"Of all the scandals that have ever been heard of in this country, the payment of £5,000 stg. by the National Government for a picture by Bienes, the painter of "The Conquest of the Desert" is the worst; and we feel certain that the President elect will be the first to protest against such an outrageous waste of public money, when Retrenchment is the public cry of the day; when the Treasury is bleeding at every pore for war expenditure, when the gallant soldiers of the nation are left without food or clothes in the very middle of winter; when the papers are filled daily with the walls of starving State School teachers whose salaries are unpaid for months and even years. The Finance Minister can find no money to meet these sacred obligations of the State, yet with a light heart he finds £5,000 stg. for a daub by an unknown (except locally) painter. This price is half the value of a picture by the world-renowned English painter Turner, in possession of an old and well-known British resident, who exclaimed yesterday when he heard of the scandal, "Why if a Bienes is worth £5,000, my Turner must be worth £100,000." It is of no avail to say that Congress voted the money."—Perhaps the *Standard* is not aware that its pet, the President-elect, General Roca, is the centre figure in the picture (large as life and twice as natural) which may account for the purchase.

—A London telegram reports the Prince of Wales as much better from his recent accident. The issue of daily medical bulletins of his condition has ceased. —Mr. Zola, a fugitive from French military injustice, is said to have turned up at a London Hotel. He will assuredly find many friends and sympathisers there. —A terrible camp tragedy is reported from Marmaraja, Dept. of Minas. A free fight occurred in a quarrel over a horse, with the result that three men were killed and two seriously wounded. One of the killed was Sr. Manuel Montañó hijo, proprietor of the estancia where the affair occurred. The one to begin the fight was a gaucho of bad character named Cándido Rodríguez, who was himself killed. The other victims were peons employed on the estancia.

—A great deal of the impunity with which locusts harry our camps is due to the wanton cruelty of the children, principally of sheep farmers in the camp, who have nothing better to do than to hunt and torture birds. We know from long experience in the camp that, with few exceptions, children are far from being told that it is cruel and wrong to hurt and kill dumb animals, but are often encouraged to destroy the "vermin," "reptiles," "bichos," or whatever name is misapplied to these dumb and often interesting and harmless creatures. The farmer's child is usually the best ally of the locusts' enemies which may approach the house: such enemies are the polecat, weasel, opossum (comadreja), armadillo (peludo or tatú), rat, mouse, monkey, toad, frog, snake, chimango, carrancho, gaviota, gavián, &c. A close season of several years should be decreed, not only for the killing of all birds, reptiles and animals, but also for bird-nesting. This latter

pastime is practised largely in the camp; yet a genuine collection of birds' eggs is very seldom seen.—*B. A. Herald.*

—A curious fact from the report of the Deputy Master of the Mint is that in the Queen's Diamond Jubilee year not a single sovereign was coined in England. Gold coins dated 1897 are from the branch mints at Melbourne and Sydney. All the English issue in 1897 was coined in 1896.

—The official report published at Washington says 23,000 men capitulated with Santiago. The official report published at Madrid says only 10,000 men capitulated. Which is the liar?

—An acrobat has determined to walk on his hands from St. Petersburg to Moscow, and thence to the Paris Exhibition. Very edifying, such a spectacle, and of great service to humanity!

—Christopher Columbus has been waiting a long time for a tomb stone. His remains were taken in 1636 to Santo Domingo. They were lost till 1877, when Mgr. Rocchia, archbishop of that republic, announced their discovery. The Italian sailing-vessel "Blanca Aspiara," has just received the monumental works which are to be placed over his grave.

—The most awkward man in the world without doubt lives in Tennessee. He recently shot a dog, says the "Daily Mail," and in explaining the accident to the dog's owner shot him. Later, in showing how the tragedy occurred, he shot the coroner. He has been liberated now for fear he will try to explain it to somebody else.

—Chevalier Eduardo de Martino, marine painter to her Majesty, has been just gazetted an Honorary Member of the Fourth Class of the Royal Victorian Order. Sr. de Martino will be well remembered by many persons in Montevideo, where he was resident for many years.

—We call attention to the announcement of a novel Entertainment in the form of a "Japanese Tea" which will be held on Saturday evening next at the house of the Rev. G. Howard, in aid of the Fund for building a Temple to the memory of the late Miss Frances Willard, of the Woman's Christian Temperance Association.

—La Scala, the famous opera-house of Milan, has been closed during the past year or two, owing to the reluctance of the Municipality to further heavily subsidise it. This, beyond question, has been a serious loss to music in Italy. Verdi, however, with others, has now come to the rescue, and a compromise has been effected. Verdi acquired a share, and he and his fellow-shareholders have promised to subsidise the opera house to the extent of £4,000 a year, the proprietary box-holders contributing another £4,000, and the Municipality £8,000 for a period of three years. If the Scala, which is rent free and will have a subvention of £14,000 a year, cannot now make two ends meet, it will be strange indeed.

LONDON NOTES

SATURDAY, JUNE 25.

The American army in Cuba has advanced about half-way from Baquiri towards Santiago. Some skirmishes have taken place. The Spaniards are falling back on the city. Juragua which was held by 1,500 Spaniards was hastily abandoned and occupied by the Americans on Thursday night. At Sevilla the next place on the road to Santiago, it is expected that the Spanish forces will make a stand. The American vanguard were much exhausted by the forced marches and the heat, and had come nearly to the end of their rations. Mules and stores were, however, landed yesterday.

Sixty-nine thousand school children yesterday passed in review before the Emperor Francis Joseph at Vienna in celebration of the fiftieth year of his reign.

At the second ballots at Berlin yesterday the Social Democrats failed to retain their usual five seats in the Reichstag, losing two to the Radicals, who were supported by the National Liberals and Conservatives. The moral effect of this reverse will be a considerable one as the Socialist position at Berlin had hitherto been regarded as almost unassailable.

Just over half an hour sufficed to dispose of the business in the House of Lords yesterday. Several private Bills were advanced a stage. On the proposition of the Duke of Devonshire the Poisons Bill was read a second time, the object of the measure being to enable the Privy Council to make further regulations as to the use and sale of certain poisons.

Mr. Curzon, in the House of Commons gave details of the areas affected by the recent Convention signed with France with respect to West Africa. Debate on the Coal Dispute in South Wales was raised as a matter of urgent public importance. Sir William Harcourt joining with other members of the

district in an appeal to the President of the Board of Trade to put the Conciliation Act in force.

Mr. Alderman Alliston and Lieut-Colonel Probyn, L.C.O., were yesterday elected Sheriffs of London for the ensuing year.

Rain considerably interfered with the progress of cricket yesterday, and in four matches play had to be postponed until to-day.

Judgment was delivered yesterday in the House of Lords in the appeal brought by the Maxim-Nordenfeldt Gun and Ammunition Company, the respondent being Mr. Anderson, the Director General of Ordnance Factories.

In the Queen's Bench Division Mr. Justice Bruce and a special jury had before them a suit in which Mr. Thomas Aspin sued Sir E. Ashmead-Bartlett, M.P., proprietor of the newspaper called "England" for £151, representing three months' salary in lieu of notice and commission on money stated to have been raised for the conduct of the paper.

Sir Charles Hall, the Recorder, sitting at the Central Criminal Court yesterday, passed sentence of ten years penal servitude upon William B. Norris, a solicitor who had pleaded guilty to a series of frauds upon clients, and to having effected and concealed them by means of forged deeds and affidavits.

MONDAY, JUNE 27.

On Friday morning the Americans started out from Juraguá on the march towards Santiago. Information had been obtained that a force of 2,000 Spaniards was holding a position near Sevilla.

The Spanish squadron under Admiral Camara has arrived at Port Said. With few exceptions the results of the second ballots in Germany are now known.

At Windsor, on Saturday, the Queen conferred the decoration of the Victoria Cross upon Lieut. T. C. Watson, Royal Engineers, and Private E. Lawson, Gordon Highlanders.

Prince and Princess Christian yesterday visited Windsor parish church and were present at a special service that had been arranged for the dedication of the new chancel screen erected by the parishioners as a memorial of her Majesty's long reign.

Writing from Fulham Palace, the Bishop of London has addressed

ed a circular letter to London incumbents on the subject of High Church ritual.

Nearly twenty-three thousand persons visited the Crystal Palace on Saturday, when the musical commemoration of the sixtieth anniversary of the Coronation was given.

Demonstrations by thousands of temperance children were held in several of the metropolitan parks on Saturday afternoon in promotion mainly of the Sunday Closing Movement.

A Cardiff Correspondent telegraphs that a further advance of 10 per cent. in wages has been granted by several of the non-associated colliery owners, and the men have decided to pay the amount of the increase into the Central Strike Fund.

Twelve of the victims of the Blackwall disaster were buried on Saturday at the East London Cemetery, at Plaistow. The Queen has sent a donation of 50l. to the relief fund, which now amounts to about 1750l.

Rain fell pretty generally throughout England on Saturday, and as a result the cricket matches between Surrey and Middlesex, Gloucestershire and Lancashire, Sussex and Oxford University, and Eton and Winchester could not be brought to a definite conclusion.

"I can't be the first to break through our holiday compact. The others would cry 'shame' on me." Whereat Mr. Paton only threw back his head and laughed.

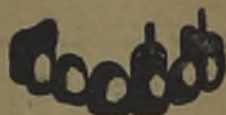

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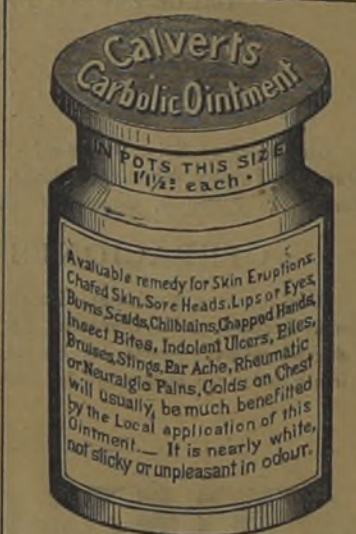
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
