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

BANK OF THE REPUBLIC.

We condense below the balance sheet of the Bank of the Republic dated July 31, adding for the sake of comparison some of the figures from the balance sheet of the previous month.

The diminished figures in some of the items are an indication of the general business depression that was felt during the month.

POLITICAL NOTES.
The political world remains remarkably quiet. Almost the only topic our contemporaries can find is the rather tedious one of "Colorado conciliation." With respect to this, news is anxiously expected of the mission of General Tajes and Dr. Campisteguy to the north of the Republic to "convert" General Villar.

An effort is on foot, and probably will be successful, to extend the conditions of the "electoral accord" of April last to the elections of the Municipal Boards, which will take place in November about the same time as the parliamentary elections.

Though it is now nearly a month since the Port Question was passed to the Council of State, it would seem that the Committee of Finance has not yet made any attempt to study it, a delay which is giving rise to some comment. At present the Technical Committee is engaged in drawing up the conditions under which the tenders for the construction of the Port will have to be presented.

Dr. Gonzalo Ramirez presented his credentials as Minister to the Argentine President on Thursday afternoon. The usual complimentary speeches were exchanged, and there was no lack of cordiality in the proceedings. Dr. Ramirez is no stranger in Buenos Aires, having held the same post about ten years ago.

The inscriptions in the Civic Register on Thursday reached the number of 341.

The *Stiglo* makes a justified complaint about the time that is being lost over the Budget. The Budget Committee has taken nearly three months to issue a Report which reveals no very profound study, and in which, it confesses itself, no radical amendments are proposed. This might have been done just as well in a fortnight and three weeks. The previous Budget was prolonged to July 31st, but nothing has been

said about the matter since, and at the present moment the country is in the very irregular position of being without a Budget even *pro forma*. This should be remedied without further delay, and the *Stiglo* wisely advises the Council to sanction the Budget at once, confining discussion to the points amended by the Committee and without entering into details which make the discussion interminable.

After the above was written, we learn from a late afternoon telegram in the *Tribuna* that General Tajes and Dr. Campisteguy have had their journey for their pains, as General Villar refuses to enter into the "Colorado conciliation." We cannot say that we attach any very great importance to this. We are not aware that the destinies of the Republic rest in any degree on the good or bad will of General Villar, or that the Government of Sr. Cuestas is likely to break down for want of his support. Indeed, we do not know why so much trouble was taken to convert him. If General Villar, as a "Colorado," cannot give his support to the most decent government his party has given the country for many years, the discredit and loss are his, not the Government's. The man who was loyal to so entirely bad and unworthy a president as Idiarte Borda, has not the least excuse for being disloyal to a good and worthy president like Cuestas, except on the confession that he actually prefers bad and corrupt to good and honest government. We are afraid that henceforth General Villar will have to be counted among the "collectivists" and the enemies of the country.

The ex-senator Sr. F. Bauzá has entered into the "Colorado conciliation" and accepted a post on the Directive Committee.

Gibbs Theatre.

The Circus Company at this Theatre made its debut on Thursday evening before a rather limited audience, but with a flattering amount of success. In reality it is more of a Variety than a Circus Company, for the only two horse riding items on the programme were rather feeble and might have been omitted without great loss. Among the variety artists there are two that are really notable and who will in themselves suffice to draw large audiences. These are Mr. Boller, whose feats with the bicycle—sometimes on two wheels, sometimes on one, and some times with a wheel on each foot—are simply marvellous, and are moreover performed with an ease and an unassuming manner that adds to their effect. The other is Mr. Carro, an exceptionally clever ventriloquist, with a large family of dolls which he manages in a very humorous and original manner. There were several other good items, though of a more a familiar description. Amongst these were the acrobatic exercises of the Brothers Mauri, the five horizontal bars by the Brothers Derval, the wire-walking of Mr. Theodore, and the trapeze act of Miss Marina. The Icarian games of the Brothers Colon would have been better omitted, as they were not particularly well done, and it is not pleasant to see young children doing such exercises—in fact in most countries it is prohibited by law, and so it should be here. Sr. Salvini's trained monkeys were amusing but their performance was unnecessarily spun out. The clowning of Laplace, Tonino and Antonet was good, and more of it might be introduced on the programme with advantage. The orchestra was of a rather soporific character. The entertainment on the whole was well received, and there was plenty of applause.

Football.

The Albion team leave in the "Eolo" this afternoon to fulfil their arrangements in Buenos Aires with the Lomas, Belgrano and Lobos Club, on Sunday, Monday and the Tuesday, the first match being played at Lomas and the other two at Belgrano. The Albions suffer a severe loss in not being able to take Buchanan and the two Sardasons. Only nine players can be got in Montevideo for the trip, but arrangements have been made for J. Negron and W. Leslie to fill the vacancies in the match against Lomas, and W. Williams and another in the other two matches. Several of the members of the Albion Club will accompany the team, and we hope they may return covered with laurels. The following are the teams they will have to meet.

THE WAR.

Suspension of Hostilities.

The most important news yesterday was a brief telegram from Washington which stated that early on Thursday morning the U. S. War Department telegraphed to Generals Wesley Merritt (in Manila) Miles (in Puerto Rico) and Schaffer (in Cuba) to suspend all military operations against the enemy. The statement may, however, be premature like many other similar statements that have appeared in the telegrams, for there is no news of the Spanish Government having taken a similar step, as would be necessary, nor is the signing of the peace protocol yet announced. It is, however, reiterated that the Spanish Government has resolved to accept the terms of peace as basis, and on Thursday evening authority was sent to Mr. Cambon to sign the protocol, which we imagine should have been done yesterday. It is said that the protocol provides for the immediate evacuation of the capitals and

Cyclists' Sore Throat.

After a "spin" along a more or less dusty road the cyclist sometimes experiences a dry and subsequently sore and inflamed throat. Headache and depression often follow and the symptoms generally simulate poisoning of some kind. When the bacteriology of road dust is considered these effects are hardly to be wondered at. Hundreds of millions of bacteria according to the nature of the locality are found in a gramme weight of dust and the species isolated have included well-known pathogenic organisms. Indeed, there can be no reason for doubting the infective power of dust when it is known that amongst the microbes encountered in it are the microbes of pus, malignant oedema, tetanus, tubercle, and septicæmia. The mischief to riders as well as to pedestrians would probably be largely averted if, as nature intended, the respirations were rigidly confined to the nasal passages and the mouth kept comfortably though firmly shut. As investigators have shown, the microbes in the air seldom pass beyond the extreme end of the nasal passage, and consequently never to the pharynx or bronchial surfaces. A useful precaution, therefore, in addition to exclusively breathing through the nostrils would be to douche the nasal cavity after a dusty run or walk with a weak and slightly warm solution of some harmless antiseptic.—*Lancet.*

Acetylene Gas.

We quote from a recent London paper.

The public had an opportunity lately of seeing acetylene gas in operation and in process of manufacture at the Imperial Institute. An installation on a larger scale was made last evening at the Earl's Court Exhibition. The bright white light flashed from the Victoria Tower and lamps were fixed in various parts of the ground. The history of the gas is interesting. It was discovered by Sir Humphry Davy about sixty years ago whilst experimenting with potassium. In 1859 Berthelot named it "acetylene," but no commercial benefits resulted from the discovery owing to the difficulty of producing calcium carbide on a large scale. Subsequently a French chemist and an American chemist simultaneously hit upon the method of coke and lime fusion by the heat of the electric arc. It is said that there are now about a score of manufactories of carbide in different countries. As the manufacture increases the cost of the material will be reduced to a point that will make the gas the cheapest artificial light in the market. Its photometric value as an illuminant is given as fifteen times that of coal gas. It is comparatively cool and free from noxious vapours. The production of acetylene by the new process is an easy matter. In the generator is placed a charge of calcium carbide, and the lid screwed down. When a light is wanted a small quantity of water is allowed to mix with the carbide, which at once forms the gas ready for use. It is important to know that there is no danger in connection with the operation Carbide calcium is not an explosive. It throws upon the fire it will not burn, nor will it emit any light if hammered to powder. It becomes effective only by the action of the hydrogen of water. The installation at Earl's Court covers the largest area of any display of the kind in England at the present time. It represents more than 12,000 candle power, with a search light which on clear nights has been seen from Epsom Downs.

Messages appear referring to further skirmishing in Puerto Rico, but it is difficult to say whether they refer to new combats or to these already known. Anyhow, the advantage has been entirely with the U. S. troops.

The New York papers are vigorously denouncing the serious deficiencies in the sanitary service of the troops in campaign.

The death is announced from Kingston, from fever, of Mr. T. W. Ramsden, British Consul at Santiago de Cuba, whose name figured frequently in the war despatches.

Of late, says the *B.A. Herald*, the Civil Registry has been entering natives of Ireland as "Irish." There is no such legal nationality, and if the authorities begin to use provincial terms they should use them entirely with the U. S. troops.

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We are requested to state that in deference to the rehearsals for Mr. Still's operetta, the reception and dance which Mrs. Frank Henderson had proposed to give on Friday the 19th instant have been postponed until the Friday following, August 26.

The health of the Pope continues to give great cause for anxiety, though according to the latest telegrams he is again somewhat better. In the course of nature he can hardly be expected to last very much longer.

Here's an interesting scrap of gossip from a contemporary.—Lady Monson is beginning to go into society again, for she and Sir Edmund Monson dined with the Prince and Princess Wagram on Tuesday night, and remained for the reception which followed the dinner. Lady Monson is having her miniature painted by Mlle. de Merbitz from a portrait taken before her marriage (when she was Miss Monroe of Montevideo). Although still very pretty, tall, slender, and very elegant, she was remarkably so then. The pose is very charming, the head dropping slightly forward in a natural and graceful manner. The miniature when finished will, from the talent of the artist and the beauty of the subject, be quite a work of art.

The Chambers of Commerce of the United Kingdom, says a telegram, have agreed to appoint Lord Charles Beresford their commissioner and representative in China. Lord Charles will be sent on a mission to study in China the most convenient means of importation and exportation with relation to British interests. He will leave on the 25th inst. (We always thought Lord Charles was more of an authority on naval than on commercial matters.)

The Right Hon. His appointment to the high and responsible position of Viceroy of India may therefore be regarded as a very fitting one at a time when af-

LONDON NOTES

FRIDAY, JULY 15. Santiago has surrendered. The whole of Eastern Cuba is to be handed over to the United States, and the Spanish troops are to be sent back to Spain. The news was received in Washington yesterday afternoon with great rejoicing.

A short sitting of the House of Lords was held yesterday. The Colonial Marriages (Deceased Wife's Sister) Bill passed through Committee, and several other measures were advanced a stage.

In the House of Commons the St. Marylebone Churches Bill was read a second time, a motion for the adjournment of the debate, on the ground that it made perpetual the one remaining instance of church rates in the country, being rejected by 217 votes against 108.

Mr. Curzon answered a number of questions relating to the petition of affairs in Crete, and the communications which had passed between the country and the Government of China respecting the Yang-tse provinces. The twelve o'clock rule having been suspended, the House proceeded with the report stage of the Irish Local Government Bill.

Addressing his Diocesan Conference at Lambeth Palace yesterday morning, the Archbishop of Canterbury referred to the agitation concerning the Ritual observed in the Church. The methods of the people concerned would not, he thought, commend themselves to the English nation or to English Churchmen. He denied that there was any conspiracy to Romanize the Church of England, and expressed his belief that the clergy would cooperate with the Bishops in the restoration of that peaceable order which would give the Church more strength than anything else possibly could.

Further progress was made yesterday with the hearing of the singular will suit having relation to the testamentary dispositions of the late Mrs. Harriette Howard, of Blackpool, who died leaving property amounting to 99,000l. Dr. Kingsbury, one of the executors of the will propounded, in reply to Mr. Justice Barnes, stated that a sum of 10,000l had been lent him by Mrs. Howard on some property was purchasing, and he had given no mortgage or security, only a receipt. She never asked for it, and the subject was never discussed. With regard to the hypnotic part of the case, Sir William Broadbent was called as a witness. Dr. Kingsbury's treatment of Mrs. Howard was, he said, the best. The case for the defence was opened before the Court rose for the day.

Mr. Mead, the magistrate at the Worship-street Police-court, yesterday sentenced Mr. Stephen McCarthy, a bookmaker, to a month's imprisonment for keeping premises in Hoxton as a betting house. The magistrate remarked that fines in these cases were no use as those engaged in the business amassed large sums. Notice of appeal was given, and the defendant was released.

The French national fête was celebrated throughout the country yesterday in fine weather. M. Faure was present at the annual grand review at Longchamps, which was made the occasion of a demonstration in favour of the army. General Pellieux, who was a prominent witness for the prosecution at the recent trial of M. Zola, was enthusiastically cheered.

Captain Bainbridge, of her Majesty's ship Nile, presided over a court-martial held at Devonport, yesterday, for the trial of William Matthews, a young signalman of the training ship Ganges, who was charged with having stolen a copy of a confidential signal book and with desertion. Prisoner pleaded guilty, and was sentenced to eighteen months' imprisonment with hard labour, and to be dismissed with disgrace from her Majesty's service.

Varying conditions for shooting were experienced at Bisley, and as a consequence some curious changes in the relative positions of competitors occurred. There was a remarkably keen struggle amongst the public schools for the Ashburton Shield. The trophy was eventually won by Charterhouse with a score of 487. Wellington was second, two points only behind. The Spencer Cup was taken by Sergt. P. W. Stewart, Blair Lodge. First place in the Albert Competition was secured by Lieut. Paterson, 1st V.B. Gordon Highlanders, with 141 points for the three ranges. The Portsmouth team of R.M.L.I. won the Duke of Coburg's Cup, and Guy's the United Hospitals Competition.

Three individual scores of over a hundred were made in the course of yesterday's cricket, Mr. Troup, with 164 not out, heading the list in the match between Gloucestershire and Somerset at Bristol. When stumps were drawn Gloucester had scored 431 for the loss of half their men. Middlesex had got together a strong side against Sussex at Lord's, and the day's play went rather in their favour, they themselves scoring 258, and
