OUR LAW SUIT.
The following is a translation of the article-letter addressed by us to the *Razon*, in reply to certain comments made by the Editor of that paper, Dr. C. M. Ramirez, and which was published in the *Nacional* of Wednesday. In this article we restate the antecedents of the case, which are being forgotten or lost sight of in the lapse of time and the complication of legal processes.

You desire, Sir, to deny me the right of criticising or protesting against a sentence of the Tribunals. It is a «chase judge» and there is nothing more to be said—the matter cannot be reopened. But, does not it seem to you that you have committed a similar fault to mine when you comment so unfavorably on the sentence of the Correctional Judge condemning me? The only difference is that you have criticised a condemnatory sentence and I an absolutive one—you have invoked legal grounds, I invoked social and moral grounds. Is there any constitutional or legal precept that permits the one, but forbids the other? I imagine not, for it is evident that the liberty to comment on a sentence cannot be limited according to its condemnatory or absolutive character; and, moreover, if it is allowable to criticise a sentence in first hearing, as you have done, it must be allowable in second and in third hearing. The liberty of the press to examine and comment upon the acts of the Tribunals and the effects of the laws and of their application, if it exists at all, cannot have any such limitation. The «offence against the Tribunals» of which the Judge speaks in his sentence against me, is not to be found in any of the Codes of the Republic.

I acknowledge frankly that the terms of my article cited by you and by the Judge, are somewhat violent, but I made them so on purpose in order to call public attention to what seemed to me and to many others to be a miscarriage of justice highly dangerous to society. I had no other object, and this object and no personal purpose is plainly evident if the articles which I published in the *Montevideo Times* and the *Dia*, and which gave rise to my prosecution, are judged in their entirety and not by a few isolated phrases.

Before condemning me for having done this, it is necessary to know the exceptional antecedents of the affair, which I will now set forth briefly and without using proper names.

An employee, recently suspended from his employment, kills his superior with a revolver shot, there being no witnesses of the deed. In his flight, he confesses to someone that, «I shot him because he refused to give me the certificate of good conduct.» Being brought to trial, he defends himself with the pretence of having received a blow or buffet, a plea that has no further proof than the mere affirmation of a man interested in defending himself from a most serious charge, and which, given the moral and physical conditions of the two actors in the tragedy, is incredible and improbable in the highest degree.

Nevertheless, the jury finds in this pretended buffet a sufficient excuse for the homicide—murder would be the better term—and accepts it as *legitimate self-defence!* Was I not right, Sir, in protesting with all my force against an acquittal so highly dangerous to society? In what civilized country is it permitted and lawful to kill a man for a mere blow—and, in the

present case, for a pretended and incredible blow? Where is the protection which the law should extend to human life, and where the support which the law should give to the authority of the industrial or commercial superior over his employee or subordinate? Even granting the blow—possibly provoked by insolence—does a mere blow justify the bloody death of the striker? If so, it follows that a blow is the most serious offence in the Code, for it is punished with the extreme penalty.—No, Sir. In every part of the world, the defence has to be proportionate to the attack, and a blow, although an offence to dignity, is not an attack so serious and so dangerous to life that it exacts and justifies the use of a deadly weapon and the death of the striker. To kill one's neighbour without more provocation than a blow, is not and cannot be «self-defence», either legally or morally, it is an extreme and bloody vengeance which deserves severe punishment.

Here, then, is the essence of my offence. I have maintained and still maintain that to kill a man with a revolver shot in answer to a mere blow is not legitimate self-defence, but is a serious crime which should be severely punished in protection of the interests of society—and still more so, when, as in the case I am dealing with, the existence of the blow is extremely doubtful and incredible. For having maintained—perhaps with some excess of warmth—this theory and for having protested against an acquittal of such an act, I have been prosecuted for offence against the honor and private tranquillity of the man acquitted, and I have been condemned by the Correctional Judge to the severe fine of \$1000! What is your opinion of that, Sir?

It happens, moreover, that I am not alone in my opinion. In the case of which I am treating, the plea of «self-defence» was not accepted by the Judge of Crimes in the first trial, who signed dissent with the absolutive verdict of the jury; it was accepted neither by judge nor jury in the second trial, when the accused man was sentenced to nine years' imprisonment; and it was not accepted by the Judges of the Superior Tribunal in the third trial, who also signed dissent with the verdict of acquittal. It follows, therefore, that I am condemned and fined for sharing the opinion of all the Judges and Fiscals who have had to do with the case! If I sin, I certainly sin in good company.—I also happen to know that one of the same Superior Judges has not hesitated to qualify the acquittal as a scandal and a miscarriage of justice. What more have I done myself?

To criticise and protest against an absolutive or insufficient sentence, when that sentence appears dangerous to society—can that be considered as a «personal injury» to the party absoluted or sentenced? I imagine not, when the motive is public and not personal, as is plainly evident in all my articles upon the point. For example, if I were to publish articles maintaining that thirteen years' imprisonment is insufficient to punish the assassination of a President, could that be considered as a «personal injury» to Avellino Arredondo? (who killed President Idiarte Borda). The idea is most absurd.—Who is offended by a protest against impunity for acts of violence, or a propaganda in favor of severe and more efficacious punishment for murderers and homicides? Not society, nor any innocent, peaceable, honorable and well intentioned man. It only offends those who kill, men of violence and of bloody revenge, enemies of society, and born assassins. Then, out of consideration for these, for the bad elements of society, must the press silence its clamor, leave social interests undefended, and pass over without comment a miscarriage or error of justice, or a defect in the application of the law, however great or dangerous it may be?

Should my condemnation be confirmed, there will follow the inexplicable anomaly that the law acquits him who kills, the man who commits an act of extreme violence; whilst it punishes severely the peaceable man whose only offence is having protested against an acquittal that is unjustified and dangerous for society. It is perfectly pardonable when an employee kills his master without further excuse than an imaginary blow, but it is unpardonable to call for a more efficacious application of the laws against assassins and murderers. It would seem, then, that the critic on the other side of the River Plate was perfectly right when he said recently that in this part of the world it is very much more dangerous to denounce a crime than to commit it! The criminal escapes, and it is the denouncer who is punished!

Again, if my protest is repressed, there will result established the precedent that any employee who is vexed with his master, may

enter into the office of the latter, and, being alone together, may kill him with a revolver shot, with entire impunity, excusing himself afterwards with the fiction of having received a blow. What a delightful prospect for the masters!

There will also result the still more monstrous anomaly that, not only may one man thus kill another with entire impunity, but that later on he may convert the act into a resource for his personal profit, prosecuting and fining the papers that protest against his acquittal! If this should prove true, what idea will it give of justice, of civilization, and of respect for human life in this Republic?

One word more. You endeavour, Sir, to draw a parallel with what would happen in England in a similar case. I assure you frankly that if such an acquittal occurred in England—which is very difficult to imagine—there would not be a paper in the kingdom which would not protest, perhaps in terms as forcible as those which I used, and their outcry would not cease until the scandal had been remedied and its repetition made impossible. This very day I have received a London paper containing a vigorous protest against a miscarriage of justice in the acquittal of an accused person, and it is quite certain that no one will dream of bringing an action against the paper for personal injuries to the individual thus acquitted, for it is recognised and admitted that such protests and comments are of public and social interest. When an offender escapes justice in this fashion, he generally considers himself lucky enough with his escape, and tries to hide himself in silence before the justified protests of the press and of public opinion.

As regards foreign papers in England, they enjoy, as I believe is also the case here, precisely the same liberty as the national press, and there is no such penalty there, neither for foreign journalists nor for anyone else as the «expulsion by order of the police without further process» which you imagine.

(Note.—According to Uruguayan law, the Judges are compelled to deliver sentence according to the verdict of the jury, even when they dissent from it, and have no power to set aside the verdict or to order a fresh trial. This is an obvious defect in the law which requires reform.)

POLITICAL NOTES.
The Council of State held a short sitting on Friday, Dr. J. C. Blanco resumed the Presidency of the Council. The entire sitting was occupied with discussion of the supplementary law of electoral reform, which was eventually fully sanctioned. The Budget consequently remained over until the next sitting, which will be tomorrow.

Yesterday's *Razon* devotes nearly two columns to discussion of what it calls the «imperative mandate» of the future legislators to elect Sr. Cuevas to the President of the Republic, according to the fifth clause of the «electoral accord», and which the opponents of the present situation have loudly denounced as immoral and subversive of the Constitution. The *Razon* combats this obviously absurd theory with considerable skill, citing the case of the presidential election in the United States, where, although the Constitution confides the election to an Electoral College expressly elected for the purpose, it invariably results in practice that the members of the College contract a moral compromise of which no violation is on record, to vote for the President chosen by their constituents or electors, so that, although in theory the election of the President is indirect, in practice it becomes the direct vote of the people, and the result is known with absolute certainty as soon as the composition of the Electoral College is known, so that the vote of the latter is reduced to a mere formality. The question seems to us one of very easy solution, even here where the presidential election is confined, not to an Electoral College, but to the members of the two Chambers combined in General Assembly. The Legislators are elected by the people to represent their views, and consequently it is their duty, from which they cannot depart without breach of faith, to represent their views in the presidential election as in other matters, and therefore to vote for the candidate preferred by their electors. If they are unable conscientiously to do this, the only honorable course left them is to resign. So primitive and obvious a fact as this would never have been

lost sight of, had it not been for the political immorality and electoral corruption of recent years, which completely severed all connection between the electors and their so-called representatives, making the latter mere nominees of the Government who went to the Chambers, not to represent the votes of the people, as was their constitutional duty, but to represent the immoral interests of an oligarchy. So far then, from the «imperative mandate» being immoral and unconstitutional, it seems to us that the immorality and the unconstitutional ally lie in the idea that the legislators should go to the Chambers except to represent the views and interests of their electors. The idea, in fact, is worthy of the «collectivity» with which it originated, and shows once more how absolutely perverted are all their notions of political morality and of government. The *Razon* may be congratulated on the able manner in which it has combated the notion.

The Treasury Balance for July has just been published and shows the sundry expenses or «eventuales» of the five Ministries during the month—the month of the military mutiny—to have been only some \$5000. This is probably the lowest figure on record, and compares with \$100,000 spent monthly under the same head by previous administrations. As the *Siglo* justly remarks, «Precisely at the moment when there was the greatest provocation to extravagance, the economical spirit which characterises the present administration shows itself strongest.» It is hardly possible to avoid the inference that it is precisely this laudable spirit of economy that has provoked such violent opposition to the present Government among those bad and immoral elements of society who were the most faithful supporters of its extravagant predecessors.

It would seem that none of the persons whose deportation was revoked by the Decree of Wednesday has yet cared to avail himself of the liberty to return.

SUNDRIES.
—The evening paper the *Reaccion* of Friday devotes two columns and a half of its space to examining our case with Carvalho and the Correctional Judge, taking our part with great vigor, and condemning the attitude of the Judge in the very strongest terms. As we already devote considerable space to the matter to-day we are not able to quote from the article, but we will do so on another occasion. Meanwhile, we express our heartfelt thanks to our contemporary for the very energetic manner in which it has expounded our cause—the more remarkable as the editor is personally a complete stranger to us—and we only hope that the strength of its expressions will not expose it to a similar trial to that which we are undergoing.

—It is worth noting that, except the *Siglo*, every one of our native contemporaries here in referring to the case has condemned the sentence of the Correctional Judge as absolutely illegal and irregular. The *Siglo*, for some reason of its own, has not yet referred to the case.

—The following passengers arrived by the R. M. S. «Thames» yesterday. Mr. and Mrs. Transmar and family (4) Mr. M. Sinclair, Miss C. and Miss A. Lamarque, Mr. A. Gomez, Mr. F. Vives, 8 third class.

—The thrice-postponed race meeting at Maroñas should be held this afternoon, provided the weather holds up, which again seems doubtful.

—We note that in Rio Janeiro they have been putting up prayers for rain. We can spare them some from here, and gladly too.

—Press telegrams from Cairo contain interesting reports upon the Anglo-Egyptian army sent by telegram to that city from Atbara, the headquarters of Sir Herbert Kitchener, Sirdar of the Egyptian army and commanding the field force acting against the Dervishes. General Kitchener on Wednesday reviewed his troops, who are encamped fifty miles from Oudurreh, the military capital of the Khalifa Abdullah el-Taachi, who has concentrated all his forces there. The dispatches from Atbara

say that the 20,000 men who compose the army of General Kitchener, drawn up in perfect order, make a magnificent sight. The Sirdar expressed himself as being very pleased to have at his orders the best army that ever entered the Sudan.

—A telegram from New York says that the idea of annexation of Jamaica to the United States, started at Kingston by a convocation to a plebiscite, is not received at all favourably in that Republic. All the newspapers oppose it, and on the other hand assert that the promoters of the annexation movement are only a handful of disconsolate farmers who do not like the policy followed by the Right Honourable Joseph Chamberlain, Colonial Secretary in Great Britain, in the matter of the sugar question. As, however, the telegrams can never be consistent, later messages assert that the idea of annexation is gaining ground.

—A football match will be played at Punta Carretas, at 2.30 p. m. this afternoon, between the Albion 2nd XI and the Uruguay Athletic Club 1st XI. The Albion team will be as follows:—Calcraft, Ramsay (captain), Bordoni, Gillespie, Llado, Davie, Williams, Jones, C. Swinden and Lodge (10 men).

—«Faust» is announced for representation at the Solis Theatre this evening. Srta. Tetzzi will appear as Marguerite, Sr. Maini as Faust, and Sr. Respindoni as Mephistopheles, a part of which he is one of the best representatives we have seen here.

—The Zarzuela Company at the San Felipe Theatre—whose visit will soon come to an end—offers the usual afternoon and evening performances to-day, with varied programmes.

—Our contemporaries comment rather severely on certain «contemp» that occurred in the gala performance at the Solis Theatre on Thursday evening, and one even goes to the length of suggesting that the impresario should be severely fined for disrespect to the occasion and the audience! This is rather absurd. If the Company has offended the people, it is very easy for the latter to punish it by remaining away from the theatre, but there is certainly no call for the authorities to interfere; in fact there is far too much official interference in the theatres already.

—The topic of the day over the water is the speech made by the Argentine President-elect General Roca at the commercial banquet given to him on Thursday evening, at which Mr. R. P. Thurburn, manager of the London & R. P. Bank presided. His speech seems to have given considerable satisfaction in financial and commercial circles, though it has dissatisfied some of the native papers. Possibly the latter wanted him to talk war and politics and other matters which retard rather than advance the progress and prosperity of the Republic.

—The name of Mr. White-law Reid, proprietor of the New York Tribune, is now added to the list of U. S. Commissioners for the discussion of peace with Spain. Beyond this there is practically nothing worth repeating in the war telegrams, which are mainly occupied with contradictory and obviously unreliable references to the future of the Philippines. General Shafter has left Santiago de Cuba for New York.

—«Mamma, I've learn'd to talk Spanish.» «Have you, Johnnie? How much have you learn'd?» «I can say «caramba!».» «What does that mean?» «Oh, it's just a swear word like papa says when he's vexed.»

—By way of economy in Italy, all the military bands are to be suppressed. This is no trifle, for it means two million lire annually.

—Another falsification of silver coins of one dollar is said to have been discovered. The police have arrested two youths who had a number of the false coins in their possession, and hope through them to catch the forgers.

—Complaints is becoming general as to the high premium which is again being charged for gold in exchange for small notes or silver. Some of the exchange shops are charging as much as 4 per cent, which is a serious loss to small traders whose takings are practically all in silver.

—The telegrams contrive to keep up an alarmist tone over the British-Chinese-Russian question. The latest tale is that Gt. Britain and Russia are now entirely in accord, and that it is between Gt. Britain and China that relations are strained, almost to the point of rupture. However, the telegrams are so given to sounding false alarms over these matters, that it is useless to place much faith in them.

—A savage affair, carrying one back to the beginning of the century, has just occurred in Santiago del Estero, Argentina, where the national Deputy Sr. Pedro Garcia has been assassinated by the police, who were pretending to search

his house under plea that he was concerned in a revolution against the provincial government. The whole city seems to be in a reign of terror.

LONDON NOTES

FRIDAY, JULY 29. Continuing their meeting at Edinburgh yesterday, the British Medical Association discussed the plea of insanity raised on behalf of criminal lunatics.

At Johannesburg yesterday the man Von Veldheim was acquitted of the murder of Mr. Woolf Joel. He was subsequently re-arrested and charged with attempted violence and blackmailing.

Despite the dull and showery weather in London yesterday, quite ten thousand people assembled at the Oval to see the return match between Surrey and Essex. Surrey left off with a good deal the better of the game, being only 50 behind with seven wickets in hand at the drawing of stumps.

A verdict of suicide whilst temporarily insane was brought in yesterday at an inquest held at the City mortuary respecting the death of Mr. Geo. Wm. Ward, a writer and journalist, whose mutilated body was found on the line at Moor-gate street Station on Monday last.

At the Central Criminal Court yesterday the charge against John Trodd, a shoemaker, forty-one years of age, of shooting at Count Aro Valley, First Secretary to the German Embassy, outside the German Embassy, and of a similar offence against a police officer with intent to murder, was proceeded with.

At Warwick Assizes yesterday the trial of Nurse Brandish for the murder of her illegitimate child was resumed, and Mr. Hugo Young, Q.C., addressed the jury for the accused woman, who at one time during the proceedings was so painfully affected that she had to be removed from the dock.

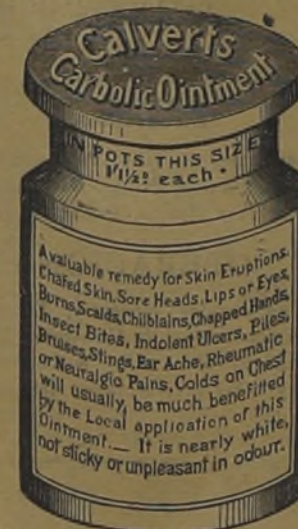
