DUR LAW SUIT.

Three important papers, the Nacional, the Razon and yesterday the Bien, have expressed at con-siderable length their opinions upon our condemnation by the Correctional Judge to the heavy fine of \$1000 and costs, in the prosecu-\$1000 and costs, in the prosecuion initiated against us by Carme o J. Carvalho, who killed Mr. Lews, station-master of the Cantral Uruguay Railway, for alleged sin-juries against his honor and private tranquillity», said to be con tained in the articles we published in this paper and (in translation) in the Dia, in April and May of last

Our space being limited we can-not reproduce the three articles in question, nor would they be easily question, nor would they be easily intelligible to our readers, resting, as they do, on points of Uruguayan law that have no equivalent in English law or legal phraseology. We think, however, we can make a sufficiently plain statement of the case to show the monstrosity of the Judge's decision from a technical point of view

The prosecution based their claim, and the Judge likewise bases his decision, on Article 360 of the Penal Code of the Republic. This Article runs as follows:-

«He who, before various persons, together or separately, but | dange in such manner that the news may | tice. V be spread, or in public document or by means of printed publications WHICH ARE NOT NEWSPAPERS OR PERropicals or by writings, cartoons or drawings of any kind divulged or shown to the public, attributes to any person a certain act which, if it were true, would give rise to a penal or disciplinary process against that person, or exposes him to public hatred or contempt, shall be pun ished, according to the decision of

the Judge, with imprisonment to 18 months or fine to \$2000.> The words we have printed in capital letters should be sufficient to show the absolute inapplicability of the Article cited to our case, since our offence, if offence there were, is precisely contained in the enewspapers or periodicals. of which exception is specifically made in the Article.

made in the Article.

Furthermore, Article 417 of the same Code states: «With regard to PRESS OFENCES and other offence and faults not specially punished by this Code, they shall be treated according to the other Codes and special laws of the Republic, etc.,» thereby clearly showing that the Code is not applicable to press offences. This applicable to press offences. This is further proved by other Laws and Decrees, which it would be tedious to cite in detail, and by the existence in the Code of Criminal Instruction of a special chapter devoted to procedures in the case of press offences which is the calc of press offences, which is the only law of the Republic at present applicable to such offences. Article 404 establishes as the penalty for press offences, when proved, a fine of \$50 to \$300, or imprisonment of 10 days to three months. The maximum penalty therefore to which we could be subject, is a fine of \$300 or 3 months' imprisonment.

In this there is an inexpressible error.... Did the Correctional Judge bandage his eyes not to read the phrase 7 (exempting newspapers) The Razon then cites Art. 404 of the Code of Criminal Instruction, referred to above, saying that the penalty therein fixed for press offences cannot be exceeded in our case without falling into notorious and illegal excess »

The Bien takes precisely the same view of the inapplicability of Art. 360 of the Criminal Code to a press offence, concluding as follows:—«In the appeal, already lodged, we are sure this doctrine will triumph, provided the offence be proved. And we likewise hope that, should this be so, the personal conditions of Mr. Denstone will be taken into account to apply the minimum penalty, since even great criminals, such as murderers, are easily allowed the extenuation of previous good conduct.>

The Nacional, which was the first to treat the matter, shares this view, pesides expressing the opinion that the articles complained of, though highly coloured, cannot be regarded as constituting a «personal injuys in the juridical sense of the term. It also points out that the Correctional Judge, in his sentence, has gone out of his way to charge us with offence against the Tribunals as an additional reason for heaping up the penalty. Not only is no such offence charged against us, but no such offence is recognised in the Codes of the Re-

public

So much for the purely legal side. of the question The moral side is hardly touched upon. The Razon, and with it the Dia, basing their opinions solely upon the very ob-viously prejudiced statements contained in the sentence of the Judge, who does not seem to have even taken the trouble to read the pleadings we presented in our de-fence or the articles on which the prosecution was based, incline to the opinion that we have certainly been guilty of abusing the liberty of the press. They evidently express this opinion without call-ing to mind the exceptional antecedents of the case - not altogether surprising, remembering the time that has been consumed in the law's delays. They labour under the error, excusable from the unfair statement made by the judge, that we have libell-ed our prosecutor by accusing him of a criminal act which he never committed. We did no such thing. What we did, was to comment on an act confessed and ad mitted by our prosecutor, and to contend that that act required punishment in the interests of society, and that his absolution was a dangerous miscarriage of jus-tice. We did not accuse the man of anything which he himself did not admit having done, we do not attack him personally in the least degree, we mere-ly said that such an act was murder and ought to be punished as such. This is the offence which the prosecution and the Correctional Judge have tried to twist into a calumny and a per-

sonal injury. We have addressed to the Raxon, sending also a copy to our very friendly contemporary the Nacional, a letter which should appear this morning, setting forth the almost forgotten antecedents of the case, which, we hope and think, will induce our contemporaries to change their opinion respecting our culpability. In due time we, will publish a translation in our columns, as we think it will our interest our readers.

Meanwhile, we may state that we received notification yesterday that our appeal had been granted, and consequently the case will now go before one of the Judges of Crime, though which we cannot yet вау.

POLITICAL NOTES.

It is said that a majority of the Ministers is in favor of making the Decree extensive to the entire batch of the conspirators, so that they may all be at liberty to return, and then, if the military officers choose to put in an appearance, they may be submitted to the military Tribunals for trial for rebellion, in accordance with the recent resolution of the Council of State. This is very pretty, but we fail to see how it can be made to agree with the compact, made with the same officers, that no military proceedings should be instituted against them. The end of it will be, we expect, that not only will they got off without any punishment, but that they will also retain their rank and pay, not a very moral or creditable ending to the affar.

A Decree has been issued nam ing a Commission of Commanding Offices, under the presidency of the Chief of the Stall, to draw up general regulations for the uniforms badges and insignia of the national military and marine.

We are pleased to learn that both the Minister of Finance Dr. Mendoza and the Pre-fect of Police Sr. Dominguez have recovered from their recent indispositions and are once more able to attend at their respective

The Council of State held a short sitting on Monday, entirely oc cupied in passing some comple mentary articles to the Law of Electoral Reform. The discussion in general of the Budget should have commenced when the Coun-cil was counted out, as seems to happen rather frequently of late. it is noteworthy that it was expected that the Budget would be entirely sanctioned by the end of July, yet we are now approaching the end of August without the discussion having even commenced.

There is trouble about Sr. Basanez, the Uruguayan Minister in Paraguay, who seems to have given great offence there by indiscreet and undiplomatic expressions about toe limits contention between Paraguay and Bolivia. It is expected that the matter will end in his

### A New American Industry.

It is reported that a couple of enterprising individuals from Kanenterprising individuals from Kan-sas recently arrived at Freeport with the object of acquiring a piece of land for the purpose of breeding black cats on a large scale. They proposed to com-mence with 1,000 cats and 5,000 rats, the latter to serve as food for the former. According to celcula-tions, the cats would increase in number to 15,000 in the first twelve months, and to 225,000 during the second year. The economy of the design is ingenious, it being intended to devote the carcases of the cats killed for their skins to feeding the rats, and, as the latter increase five times as fast as the former, a perfect cycle—of small limit, it is true—of cat rat-cat and rat again would go on till doomsday. Details of the new naval programme were given in the House of Commons by the First Lord of the Admiralty. Dr. Danford Thomas, Coroner for Central London, held an inquiry yesterday regarding the deaths of Walter Peart and John Dean, the driver and fireman of the Windsor express, to the engine of which an accident occurred on Monday. The jury returned a verdict of accidentdeath, adding that in their opinion the engine was not a proper one to be used for express traffic. They commended the deceased for their devotion to duty.
Mr. Luxmore Drew, the West

London coroner, yesterday held an inquest into the circumstances attending the death of a labourer and sweeper in the employ of the Midland Railway Company, who was killed by the explosion which occurred at the Earl's Court Exhibition on Monday last. Captain Thompson, one of her Majesty's Inspectors of Explosives, said the best and the most likely theory that he could form was that the sodium stored in the magazine ignited first, probably through con-tact with the moist air, that petroleum vapour caught alight from the sodium, and that the vapour caused the gunpowder to explode. The july returned a verdict of accidental death, but added a rider that they considered the County Council should take more stringest measures to ensure compliance with the Explosives Act.


