### NEWS OF THE DAY

MONTEVIDEO, SUNDAY, AUGUST 21, 1898.

Eleventh Sunday after Trinity.—*Saints Joaquin and Joanna Francisca*.—Battle of Ymiria, 1505.—233 days past, 132 to the end of the year.

### POLITICAL NOTES.

The Council of State held a busy sitting on Friday, Dr. Arechaga presiding. A short Message from the Executive was read, proposing certain modifications in the Annual Law of Property Tax (contribución inmobiliaria) mainly relating to the assessment of rural properties in the interior. These were discussed summarily and eventually approved, completing the sanction of the Law.

An animated discussion then ensued over the Message of the Executive soliciting authority to degrade the military officers who signed the recent manifesto of rebellion. Sr. Echeverría made a vigorous speech, condemning in very strong terms the action of the officers who took part in the military mutiny of July 4. They were, he said, bad citizens and bad officers who had filled the city with bloodshed for the satisfaction of the most selfish desires, who merited but unfortunately had escaped the severest punishment on the scene of their crime, and who had responded to the clemency shown them by insults against the government and threats of further invasion. Such great criminals as these should be dealt with severely and without waiting for judicial forms. He therefore approved the course indicated by the Executive and recommended by the Committee.

Dr. M. C. Martínez made an eloquent defence of the Government which, he said, although working in a situation full of difficulties, was gradually reconstructing the Republic and fulfilling its promises of honest administration and co-participation of all parties in public affairs. Though not beyond criticism in certain minor details, the Government was fully satisfying the aspirations of the country in its general policy, and nothing could have been more unreasonable than the attempt to overthrow it by violence. He entirely agreed that the officers who were guilty of this were deserving of severe punishment but he thought that the Council was not called upon to intervene in the matter. The Executive, in his opinion, was sufficiently authorized to suspend the officers, eventually submitting them to the Tribunals, and that was the proper course to pursue.

This view was supported by Dr. Acevedo Díaz, Sr. Batlle and other speakers, and eventually a practically unanimous sanction was given to a «minute of communication» in the following terms:

«The Council of State shares the opinion of the Government regarding the necessity of repressing the repeated insubordination committed by the signatories of the document of July 15, and approves the attitude of the Executive but as Art 81 of the Constitution exacts the authorisation of the Senate—at present represented by the Council—only in cases of dismissal for incapacity or neglect, and not in those of dismissal for offence, the Council understands that, in accordance with this Article and with Art 467 of the Military Code, the Executive is authorized to repress at once and of

itself the act of subordination, suspending the authors in their military posts and opportunistly referring the matter to the Tribunals in order that they may be tried legally.»

There was no further business of general interest.

The rather important news has been telegraphed by the Prefect of Rivera that the Brazilian frontier authorities at Santa Ana have arrested Majors Isasmendi and Ciriaco Burgos (two of the officers prominently concerned in the recent mutiny) who were gathering groups of men in that district with the object of disturbing order in this Republic. The same authorities have likewise dissolved several small groups of men that had been formed. Isasmendi and Burgos, who were going about under false names, will probably be interned in Porto Alegre, which will keep them out of mischief for some little time to come. The attitude of the Brazilian authorities has made a very good impression in official circles, and it is said that the Argentine authorities in Entre Rios are showing an equal vigilance and friendly disposition. The *Nacion* of yesterday contains an official assurance that neither the Argentine nor the Brazilian authorities are in the least disposed to favor the mutineers, and that it is in vain that the latter search for elements for no one is disposed to second them.

«The Argentine and Brazilian Governments have no sympathy with the disturbing intention of these gentry, who have against them the public opinion of all the country. Moreover, the neighbouring Republics are interested that we should arrive as soon as possible at the reestablishment of a normal situation, and that the new constitutional powers should be established on a base of legality and concord, and hence they could not favor the ambitious few who dream of producing new perturbations. We repeat, therefore, that there does not exist the least motive to give any credit to the alarming rumors that may circulate, whilst on the other hand there exist many reasons to assure that public order will not be disturbed and that the last echo of subversive rumors will promptly disappear.»

We understand that General M. Tajes has definitely refused to form part of the conciliation Committee of the «colorado» party, not because he is opposed to the present situation so much as because he considers his presence of little use.

### ARREDONDO.

*Thirteen Years for Killing a President.*

The trial of Avelino Arredondo for the assassination of Sr. Idiarte Borda, President of the Republic, on August 25, 1897, took place on Friday and, contrary to expectation, was concluded the same evening. The defence was mainly to the effect that it was not sufficiently proved by the medical evidence that Sr. Borda died from the effects of Arredondo's bullet (I) that the offence was political and not personal, and that extenuation must be allowed for the state of public feeling when the crime was committed. After the pleadings had been heard, Arredondo read a long sentimental speech in which he said that he had been solely impelled by the idea of ridding the country of an odious tyrant, and was prepared to sacrifice his own life in the attempt. At the conclusion of the speech he was loudly applauded by the spectators present who showed a marked sympathy with him throughout the trial. After some twenty minutes deliberation the jury found him guilty with extenuating circumstances. Two of the five jurymen disagreed with the sentence, considering that it was not scientifically proved that the death of Sr. Borda was caused by the bullet and that the offence, being political, was condoned by the peace compact of September. The Judge Dr. Montaña at once issued sentence condemning Arredondo to 13 years' imprisonment including the term already suffered, and two months' solitary confinement. There was a large crowd outside the court which cheered Arredondo as he was transferred to the police carriage.

We understand that the sentence will be appealed against by Dr. Melian Lafinur, who is defending Arredondo.

### OUR PROSECUTION.

We have to thank several of our native contemporaries, and especially the *Nacional* and the *Bien* for their kindly and sympathetic remarks with regard to our condemnation by the Correctional Judge. The *Nacional* publishes the sentence at full length, adding some comments in which it shows that the Article of the Criminal Code under which the Judge has condemned us is absolutely inapplicable to the case, as it makes explicit exception of public

ations in newspapers or periodicals, and showing, moreover, that the sentence is as bad in law as it is faulty in justice.

We have abandoned the intention of the translating the sentence of the Correctional Judge in our columns, because it contains many legal technicalities and references which it would be difficult to make intelligible as they have no exact equivalent in English. We intend, however, to occupy ourselves with the matter in these columns, though are think it more judicious to wait until our appeal against the sentence, which was lodged yesterday, has been formally granted.

### «DAMN!»

GLOBE.  
To be really successful and popular, an expletive must be mouth-filling; it should include one or more explosive consonants, and it is a general, though by no means universal, rule that malediction should be part of the original sense. Expressions not constructed upon this formula may attain to a certain temporary vogue, but they are ephemeral, they pass with the season's hats, they afford no relief in serious emergencies; but, once discovered, a word fully embodying the consonantal force of the language, a word which can be hurled like a blow is never forgotten and is never lost. Like other masterpiece of nature, such words are not to be had for the asking, nor can they be manufactured or compounded in any philological laboratory. Like all sublime achievements, there is something fortuitous in their composition that transcends analysis, and leaves them in the company of genius and white blackbirds, among those unique of their kind.

There have been excellent persons, excessively literal, who, failing to appreciate the value of phonetics and the sublimely irrational, and yet compassionate towards human weakness, have tried to eliminate the smack of profanity from popular expletives, and have suggested expressions that might ease a man's temper without endangering his spiritual welfare—blank cartridges, so to speak, exploding in fire and smoke, but carrying no deadly missile.

Every language tends to produce what may be considered its quintessential expletive, and there is something to be gathered of national characteristics from the word that is most readily jotted out, as it were, when the individual is jarred, that gives readiest expression to the emotions of the average man. To a Latin race, accustomed to roll its «r's» and make the most of its sibilants, the liss and trill of «sacré» is full of satisfaction, and the compound is some what shrill and excitable, as befits the Gallic temper. «Sapristi» has a vehemence of its own; the snap of the lips upon the «p.» the long «r.» the waspish «st.» have divided merits, and the combination is vehement and somewhat venomous. «Poltausend» and «Donnerwetter» obey the great law of consonantal definition and are solid and almost weighty. But for terse, businesslike quality, the British «Damn!» is unsurpassed. It is short, succinct, explicit, the initial consonant will bear pressure to any extent, and the final lingers on occasion; it possesses, moreover, the unique virtue of being forcible when uttered with the calmness and lack of emphasis that characterises a phlegmatic people, it is consistent with the repose that stamps the caste of Vere de Vere—there is even the aristocratic quality of «you be damnedness»—it forms two or three useful and finely differentiated variants, and it possesses the saving grace of a lurking humour.

When Bob Acres remarked that Damn had had his day, he revealed himself as a man of no observation, and of shallow understanding. So far from having had its day, the expletive that propriety points with a big D and a dash, remains, what it has been any time this two hundred years and more, the most popular word in the English language—popular one may say advisedly, for there is no other word that of its sole and singular self, without context or in incongruous connection, is absolutely capable of a rapturous reception from any audience in the three kingdoms.

Every actor, the man who has his finger on the pulse of popularity, knows how much he may owe to that concatenation of four letters; it tickles every ear in the house, laughter follows as ripples follow the dropping of a stone into the placid lake. It has saved many a dull scene, it has even saved a play, it has the virtue to call public attention to minor poetry, it has been known to make a fashionable congregation listen to the sermon, and it is said that a gallant M.P. owes something of his popularity to a happy use of the specifically warlike variant, «damme.» When Nansen delivered a recent lecture, it was to be remarked that the vast audience that punctuated his narra-

tive with applause, received with a burst, particularly spontaneous and hearty, the «d—d fool» remark (the combination is irresistible) attributed by the explorer to his invaluable lieutenant; and it has been related, by one who ought to know, that when that charming woman, Lady Hyde-Bassett, and her elderly husband, the learned Grecian, walked in their garden, they said «Damn!» together for their amusement.

### SUNDRIES.

The war telegrams yesterday mainly consisted of references to the surrender of Manila, the contradictions over which are so bewildering that it is hopeless to follow them. It is evident, however, that the misification exists at the other end as well as here. Of positive news there is nothing worth repeating. The alleged massacre by the Spanish in Ciales is now reduced to a suppression by the local authorities of native riots, in which some 20 persons were killed and wounded. Those dangerous men, the correspondents of the New York papers, have been refused admittance into Havana, for fear their extravagances should provoke the Spanish residents to disorders.

As idiotic a telegram as ever we have seen was one published yesterday from Rio Janeiro, stating as an important piece of news that Com. Norcock had expressed the intention of bringing the British squadron to this port for the Presidential election in order to salute the new President. The idiosyncrasy of telegraphing this is apparent when it is remembered that the Presidential election does not take place until March next, that Rio Janeiro is only three or four days' voyage from here and that in any case the British squadron will be back here about the end of October, and will then remain on station in the River Plate for another nine months.

A funeral service in memory of the late Don Tomás Eastman will be held in the Cathedral at 10 a. m. on Tuesday next.

The Entertainment Society having announced a function for yesterday evening, rain fell, as seems to be invariably the case. The day could hardly have been more disagreeable.

We have not received notice of any football for to-day—the Albions well deserve a rest after their efforts in Buenos Aires—and in any case it is very doubtful if the weather will permit it. For the same reason the races at Maroñas will probably have to be postponed once more.

Amongst the deaths registered on Friday was that of Mrs. Clementina Spark de Baily, English, aged 45, in the National Lunatic Asylum.

The once great Italian actress Adelaide Ristori is said to be dying at Turin. She is 75 years of age.

Herr Lebnor, a celebrated watchmaker of Berlin, has just completed a wonderful instrument which will measure time to the thousandth part of a second. This will be of great utility for astronomical and scientific purposes, but we dread to think of its application to athletics, the records of which are already bothering enough with their absurd distinctions of fifths and tenths of seconds in races, the measurement of which is sheer chance or guess-work nine times out of ten.

The excellent Circus Company at the Cibis Theatre gives two final performances this afternoon (bonbons for the kids, remember) and evening.

The Zarzuela Company at the Solis Theatre offers varied programmes this afternoon and evening. Tomorrow it migrates to the San Felipe Theatre where its performances are more adopted than to the Solis. The Opera season at the Solis begins on Wednesday, and we hear several complaints because the *Cinderella* Dance is fixed for the same evening. This, however, could not well be avoided now the busy season for the Theatres has commenced.

The popular and energetic Beethoven Society gives its fifth social Concert on Monday evening. The programme, too long for us to repeat, is most interesting. Among the items are an Andante for strings composed by the well known amateur Mr. Trimble. Miss Lola Dorr will play three pianoforte selections, one with orchestral accompaniment. Other items are Grieg's «Peer Gynt» suite, Delibes' «Sylvia» music, and compositions by Beethoven, Mouskouski, Thalberg, Breton, Haydn, Chopin, Bizet, Pienié, Schumann and Ardiu.

The latest sensation in the scientific world is the discovery of «terrestrial coronium.» Coronium had hitherto been supposed only to exist in the sun's atmosphere. Prof. Nasini, of Padua, in analysing the gases issuing from the earth in volcanic districts by means of the spectroscopic, detected the element coronium. It will be remembered that a few years ago Professor Ramsay, in looking for argon, discovered «terrestrial helium» helium having also been only known previously as a constituent of the sun.

We quote from the *B. A. Herald*.—The accomplished young ladies of green Lomas are about to lose one of their number in the person of Miss Lizzie Hunter, who will be united in the bonds of holy matrimony to one of our cleverest comic amateur entertainers, Mr. J. D. Humphreys. The nuptial knot will be tied by the Rev. J. W. Fleming B. D. on Monday evening the 22nd, inst. at 7 o'clock, at the residence of the bride's family in Lomas. Many a charitable society has benefited through the generous disposition of Mr. Humphreys, who has always been ready to lend his valuable assistance, and it is to be hoped that he will continue to render his much appreciated services in the future as he has done in the past.

Here's a startling story from Montreal, Canada:—An exciting incident occurred on the Grand Trunk Railway on Monday (July 18) owing to a passenger on one of the trains becoming insane. He locked the door at one end of the carriage and then went to the other end and locked the door there also. He next began to rush violently about the carriage, and having kicked the windows to pieces, seized the back of a seat and proceeded to wrench it off. The passengers were panic-stricken, and a scene of great confusion prevailed. Matters became worse when, after a few vigorous tugs he succeeded in releasing the back of the seat, and using it as a weapon he began a deliberate assault upon his fellow passengers. He knocked several of them senseless, and some who put up their arms to shield their heads had their arms broken. Several of the women fainted. All possibility of escaping from the carriage was out of the question, for the man had the keys and the train was travelling at the rate of forty miles an hour. The male passengers were for a time unable to subdue the maniac, but after a hard struggle they succeeded in throwing him, though owing to his great strength it required ten of them to control him. His clothing being completely torn off in the fight, it became necessary to dress him in a suit of overalls. From some papers found in his pocket and relating to an asylum it appeared that his name is William Smith and that he came from London. Twenty persons were seriously injured by the lunatic before he was finally subdued.

A Montevideo telegram in a Buenos Aires paper makes the following statement:—A syndicate of Argentine capitalists will shortly propose to the Council of State a scheme by which it would establish in the Island of San Gabriel (almost opposite Buenos Aires) an important bathing establishment, hotel, casino, gambling-hells, &c. They ask for a concession for 10 years, after which the improvements made in the island would become the property of the State. We think we remember hearing of this scheme, or of a very similar one, some years ago, but nothing came of it then, and nothing is likely to now. The present Council of State fortunately contains too many honorable men to entertain such a proposal.

We quote from the *Times of Argentina*:—«Not so very long ago a Gymnasium Club was founded in Montevideo and it is now said to be in good working order and to contain all the principal necessities for such an establishment. Not content with local tournaments, they have boldly challenged the «Club de Gimnasia y Esgrima» of this city to «mortal combat» to take place on their premises in Montevideo. Amongst natives and all English residents who have visited the «Club de Gimnasia y Esgrima» in this city it is admitted that it is most probable that another such Club with such perfect fittings and such a sound foundation does not exist in South America, and it is generally put on a par with some of the best in Eng-

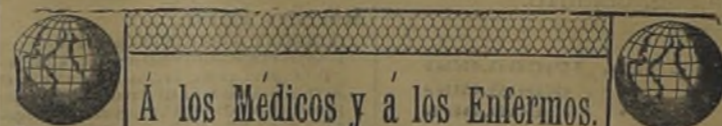
