## NEWS OF THE DAY

**BANK OF THE REPUBLIC.**  
We condense below the balance sheet of the Bank of the Republic dated August 31, adding for the sake of comparison some of the figures from the balance sheet of the previous month.

**Credit.**—Unissued shares of 2nd Series \$5,000,000.—Unissued bonus shares \$1,979,696.83.—Various Debtors at head office and branches \$7,977,387.45 (in July, \$7,817,702).—Guarantee of Judicial Deposits, \$750,000 nom. in Bonds of the Extraordinary 1897 Loan at 62 1/2 % \$465,000.—Cash in hand, \$3,124,964.94 (in July, \$3,032,101.82).—Total, \$22,752,729.12.

**Debit.**—Capital, nominal, \$12,000,000.—Various Creditors, \$2,937,642.46 (in July, \$2,871,487).—Depositors of values, \$2,210,679.50.—Judicial Deposits \$418,019.89.—Service of the Extraordinary 1897 Loan, payments by the Direction General of Direct Taxes, \$103,805.60.—Notes in circulation, \$3,062,879 (in July, \$2,825,916.50).—Reserve fund, \$30,303.17.—Total, \$22,752,729.12.

In view of the recent very short-lived run upon the Bank by the note holders, it is interesting to note that the cash in hand was well in excess of the notes in circulation. The note issue is now higher than it has been at any time since the Bank opened. In August 1897, the circulation was only \$721,460. The other figures also show a recovery of business from the depression of the preceding month July. We may note that our contemporaries are again advocating the advisability of making a separate statement of the Government account with the Bank, and, judging from a hint given in the *Día*, this will probably be done in future.

The note issue mentioned above is divided as follows: major notes (\$10 and over) \$1,359,740; minor notes (under \$10) \$1,404,137. As the run was practically confined to holders of the minor notes—some rushed to convert quantities as low as \$5 or \$6—it is obvious that the Bank was able to meet it without the least difficulty.

The following is a comparative statement of the note issue and reserve of the three Banks of emission on August 31st.—

Total circulation, \$6,040,659;—Total cash in hand, \$9,256,827.

**POLITICAL NOTES.**  
The efforts to induce Dr. Mendilaharsu to withdraw his resignation of the portfolio of Foreign Affairs, all proved useless, and consequently the Decree has been issued accepting the resignation, and temporarily placing the portfolio in charge of the Minister of Foment Dr. J.A. Varela. According

to our contemporaries, it is doubtful if the portfolio will be filled before March next. Even now the exact reasons for Dr. Mendilaharsu's resignation are somewhat a mystery, the only statement being that, whilst he is a supporter of the Government policy in general, he cannot agree with certain matters of detail. Some of our contemporaries attribute the resignation to the effects of an outburst of ill temper on the part of Sr. Cuestas, an assertion which is perfectly gratuitous as they confess in the same breath that they know nothing of the matter. In any case, we think they attach exaggerated political importance to the resignation, as we said in our last. A fatality seems to be attached to the portfolio of Foreign Affairs in the present administration, as none of its occupants seem to have been able to retain it long, though all have left it without any rupture of friendly relations with Sr. Cuestas, which should show that the fault can hardly be attributed to him. Anyhow, it is the least «political» post in the Cabinet.

A topic which is giving rise to considerable controversy, owing to the conflicting interests involved, is a proposition that has been made for the temporary free introduction of wheat, both for seed purposes and for the use of millers. The proposal is vehemently opposed by agriculturists, who contend that it would be ruinous to their interests, and a very extensively signed petition against it has been presented to the Council of State from San José and Colonia, the two principal wheat producing Departments. On the other hand the millers contend that the local supply of wheat is too limited and too dear for them to develop their industry fully, and that if they were allowed to import Argentine wheat free of duty, they could create an extensive exportation of flour to Brazil, and that they are prepared to do this under conditions which would not affect local consumption or the price of home grown wheat. The question, it will be seen, is a very knotty one, in which there is much to be said on both sides, and we are not prepared to express an opinion, though on general principle we are proposed to protective duties, especially on articles of food and general consumption.

It is stated that Col. Andres Vera will be appointed to the vacant prefectship of Colonia, and Col. Andrés Klinger will probably be appointed to that of Tacuarembó, both appointments being of political rather than administrative significance. The bad old habit of appointing military men and persons of pronounced political—or rather, partisan—significance to what should be essentially an administrative and neutral post, is still maintained to the full. The custom is entirely prejudicial to the best interests of the Republic, but we are afraid it will be many years yet before we see a reform in this respect. The ideal Prefect would be a sound and honest civilian of administrative ability and experience, and strictly neutral in partisan politics, but, even if such were to be found, the Minister of Government with sufficient courage to make the appointment is still wanting, and, indeed, it is to be feared if such an appointment would be well received. So deeply has the custom become established of regarding the post as a political one for the furtherance of partisan (or generally of governmental) interests, that the contending parties have come to regard the Prefectships as a sort of prize for their political leaders, to be employed equally as a reward for party devotion and as a means for furthering party interests. Yet, we need hardly say, this is the worst possible view that can be taken of the post, and it is just because this view is so constantly taken, that the Departmental Prefects, for a long time past, have been, as a general rule, an unquestionable hindrance, instead of an aid, to the development and welfare of the interior. With due respect to the present occupant of the portfolio, the Minister of Government has yet to be found who will take a more enlightened view of the matter and will initiate a healthy reform in these appointments. The Prefect of a Department should no more be a political appointment than a Judge, and neither, as a rule, should be a military man, for military notions are put of place in his peculiar duties.

It is stated that the Northern Tramway Company has initiated proceedings before the Judge of Finance, to enforce a demand against the Government for breach of contract and concession. The claim, as we understand, is based on an alleged monopoly of the conveyance of meat into the capital from the slaughter houses of Santa Lucia and the amount claimed as damages is no less than \$1,515,747.

## THE ASSASSINATION OF THE EMPRESS OF AUSTRIA.

The accounts given by numerous telegrams of this terrible anarchistic crime, committed on Saturday, are so extraordinary as to be hardly intelligible. The Empress, it would appear, had been staying incognito at the Hotel Baden Rivage, at Geneva, it being doubtful if the Swiss authorities were aware of her presence. She was leaving the Hotel to take an excursion on the lake, when a man rushed from behind a tree and stabbed her in the left breast with a stiletto. The Empress was knocked down by the force of the blow, but immediately picked herself up, and strange to say, instead of returning to the Hotel, proceeded on board the steamer, which started on its trip! The only explanation of this is that she felt no pain, and thought she had been struck, but not wounded. The steamer, however, had not proceeded far, when the Empress fainted. She was then immediately taken back to the Hotel, where she died very soon after, without again recovering consciousness, from internal hemorrhage.

The assassin was arrested immediately after the deed. He is an Italian named Luccheni, but was born in Paris, and is a notorious anarchist of the most violent description. The crime seems to have been inspired by pure devilry, for he is unable to furnish the least motive for it except that he had made up his mind to assassinate some royal personage, and, being favored by opportunity, chose the Empress for his victim. Some of his immediate associates have also been arrested, but so far there is no evidence of any plot, and he denies having any accomplices or having been instigated by any committee. He is described as a rather good-looking, fair, young man, 25 years of age, perfectly self possessed and showing no signs of insanity. He was a deserter from the Italian army.

The crime has aroused the greatest horror throughout Europe, the more especially as the Empress was a woman of the most amiable character, gradually sinking to her grave overwhelmed by profound family griefs, living a life of complete retirement and incapable of inspiring personal resentment in any one. The aged Emperor was profoundly overcome by the news, which completed the tragic history of his family. Mourning in Vienna and throughout Austria is general. Sympathy and indignation have been expressed all over Europe. The Italian Court has been ordered into mourning for six months. The body of the thrice unfortunate Empress will be taken to Vienna for burial.

## CIBOLA Theatre.

The appearance of the Italian conjurer Sr. Watry at this theatre has proved a great success, and we do not hesitate to pronounce him one of the cleverest performers in his line that has yet been seen here. His feats of prestidigitacion, which constitute the first part of the programme, are really remarkable for the skill and neatness with which he performs them, besides containing many novel and surprising combinations. From a hat—what conjurer could perform without a hat—he produces paper ribbon enough to cover the stage then a live duck which quacked its acknowledgements to the audience with the nonchalance of an experienced actor, and eventually a real, live, plump and smiling baby. The latter very ingenious way of creating a family provoked uproarious applause. The other parts of the entertainment consist of the box trick and optical illusions which, if not, exactly new, are remarkably well performed. Sr. Watry, we may further mention, is an eloquent skilful, and it was a real pleasure to listen to his exceptionally clear utterance of the musical Italian language, which, as he speaks it, seems to be understood by instinct. His entertainment has been a decided hit, and should draw large audiences, being well worth a visit. He will perform again this evening, with variations in the programme, including a hypnotic seance.

## The Destruction of Locusts.

Those who are interested in the experiments which have lately been made by the Rhodesian Farmers and Landowners Association, and kindred bodies in South Africa, with a view to exterminating locusts will receive considerable encouragement from the success which has attended the efforts of the sugar-growers in Natal, who have hit upon a method of killing off these rapacious insects with deadly certainty, and without much of the expense which has been entailed in other cases. The scheme, as explained to us by Mr. W. J. Mirrieles, the president

of the Inanda Agricultural Association of Natal, is this: Dissolve a pound of arsenic in a gallon of boiling water, with three ounces of caustic soda, or even less, on account of its bitter taste (a smaller amount of caustic will dissolve the arsenic with a longer boiling); to this add two gallons of treacle and two gallons of water, or 10 lbs. of sugar and four gallons of water. The solution is then ready for use. The megass (crushed cane) is dipped therein and spread about broadcast, and generally proves a sufficiently palatable bait to the locusts; but, if necessary, a flavouring essence may be added, such as a teaspoonful of butyric ether to every five gallons of solution, and this has been found so alluring as to attract the locusts from quite long distances. Valerian is also another flavouring essence, but in ordinary circumstances the dish served plain will satisfy the insects, who eat of it and die, and, being addicted to cannibalism, infect one another with the poison. By following this process Natal has been practically cleared of the scourge, and the system has been found infinitely quicker than the fungus system tried by Mr. Marshall Campbell and others. It may be added that higher forms of life are not adversely affected by the poison. Dogs are said to flourish on the diet, which acts as a mild tonic, and improves their coats. This success may be extremely gratifying to the colonists, and now that the Cape Colony, Natal, and the Free State have entered upon an agreement with regard to protecting their own products, should act as a considerable stimulant to the sugar-growing industry in Natal, which at present barely supplies half the amount consumed in the three countries named.—*S. A. Journal.*

## The Centenary of Malthus.

The present year is the centenary of a very famous book—the essay by Malthus on «The Principle of Population as it affects the Future Improvement of Society; with Remarks on the Speculations of Mr. Godwin, M. Condorcet, and other writers.» It would be difficult to say whether the book has been more famous for what it really contained, or for what it is erroneously supposed to contain. The object of Malthus was to diminish poverty, and, by implication, to increase wealth. Of that large subject he specially occupied himself with the relations between agriculture and population. It is very evident that if the numbers of the people grow more food must be raised to feed them, and that if the land produces less fewer people can be supported on it. «There were, in fact, three propositions which he intended to prove. The first was that «population» was necessarily limited by the means of subsistence. The second that «population» invariably increases where the means of subsistence increase unless prevented by some very powerful and obvious checks. And the third and last that «these checks and the checks which repress the superior power of population and keep its effects on a level with the means of subsistence are all resolvable into moral restraint, vice, and misery.» «Moral restraint» was defined by Malthus as «restraint from marriage from prudential motives with a conduct strictly moral during the period of this restraint.» No authority whatever is found in his writings for what is known as Neo-Malthusianism.

Malthus was all his life either a quiet country clergyman—he took orders in the same year as his great work appeared—or a secluded professor at Haileybury; always enjoying the warm affection of all who knew him, and especially of his poor neighbours. He was ever studying and founding scientific institutions, or joining the older ones which did themselves the honour of electing him. So far as his writings from showing any of the peculiar piquancy which alone would tempt some classes of readers that he is a controversialist without acrimony, ambling along in literature very much as in life. He was one of the first to see the evils of the old Poor Law, which might have been called a code to make paupers. Darwin said that it was Malthus's Essay which first suggested to him his immortal hypothesis.

## Gallophobia in America.

The United States Correspondent of the Paris «Temps» writing from Jacksonville July 24 th, fills a column and a half (small type) with complaints of American bad feeling towards France. The American Press, he says, rakes up rumours, magnifies small incidents, and twists truth. History is travestied to force on readers the conclusion that all the nations of Latin origin are rotten like Spain, and that great is the Anglo-Saxon race, France is doomed to sink like Spain and Italy. Though in fact first in the world she is spoken of as not reaching to the ankles of Great Britain. As to American taste for French arts and amenities, the correspondent says it

exists only among the cultivated few. The masses put up with French fashions, but despise them. Far from trying to imitate French models in architecture, sculpture, painting, and gold-smith's work, American artists try to discover formulas of art opposed to the French. They seem to do this as if for a bet. The public see on every article thus produced the stamp of genius, and they pay tributes to it at banquets at which the menus, still written in French are not understood. The American Press has seized on the Dreyfus affair as it did on the Panama scandal to belittle France. It now makes use of the wreck of the Bourgoigne to render her odious. A great illustrated weekly represents Madame Lacasse as the only woman on a raft. Another woman is being beaten away by French sailors. The final complaint is that the American Press loses no opportunity to glorify German science and British prowess. Bismarck is the great German. The German army is the great army as the British navy is the great navy.

## SUNDRIES.

—The *Espana* of yesterday consoles its readers and compatriots with the following remarkable conclusions respecting the results of the late war:—«Our struggle with the United States, then, is merely another link in the chain of our immortal glories. We Spaniards issue from the struggle as pure and as unstained as is said of the ermine with its coat of dazzling whiteness after rolling a hundred times in the mud. Well may we lift our fronts before the whole world, in the surety that the whole world will uncover with respect before our glorious heroism.»—We leave the comments to our readers.

—The charming and talented Italian actress Sra. Mariani, with her well combined Company, will reappear at the Solis Theatre on the 22nd instant, giving 15 farewell performances, including some pieces not played here on her first visit.

—The musical event of this evening will be the Concert of the Beethoven Society. The programme is the same as that issued three weeks ago, the orchestra of the Society and the pianist Miss Lola Borr-Hilner taking part. We thank the Committee for a courteous invitation to attend.

—Seas for the repetition of «Jeannette» on Thursday are being rapidly bought up, and no time should be lost in making application.

—A shocking murder was committed at midnight on Saturday in a small drinking saloon at the corner of Calles San José and Arapay. Three men named Francisco Real, Antonio Santorosso and José Teba began quarrelling over some trivial question, when the last named lost his temper and attacked the other two with a large knife, stabbing them both in the abdomen. Real was taken to the Hospital, where he died on Sunday morning. He is an Uruguayan, aged 21, and was in the employ of the Montevideo Gas Company. The other man's wound was slight and he is in no danger. The murderer, who has been arrested, is a Neapolitan of violent character, who earned his living by hawking fruit.

—Here are three prize «bulls» from the *Spectator*.—Oas occurs in the description of a dinner party at which there were present two brilliant talkers. Each, it is said, was talking so fast that neither could get in a word. The second is the gem of a speech in defence of a committee of management. «Perhaps you think,» said the committee's defender «that in our committee half do the work and the other half do nothing. As a matter of fact, gentlemen, the reverse is the case.» But the best is the Irish defence in a poaching case;—«Indeed, your worship, the only bird I shot was a rabbit, and I knocked that down with a stick.»

—The Princess of Wales has had a singular distinction paid her by England's oldest colony. On the first day of August Newfoundland issued a new three-cent stamp, which bears the effigy of her Royal Highness. The likeness is unmistakable, and as it is the first time the Princess of Wales has been portrayed on a postage stamp, every collector must secure this addition for his album. It is the third of a series of royal portraits to appeal on the stamps of Newfoundland. The first two, the one cent stamp with her Majesty's portrait, and the two-cent with that of the Prince of Wales,

were issued in November last. The next will be a half-cent stamp with Prince Edward of York, and about the end of this year or the beginning of next a five-cent stamp will appear with the Duke of York's portrait.

It is telegraphed from Madrid, but not yet confirmed, that the Senate has voted approval of the peace protocol. The violent debates and recriminations in the Cortes continue, General Polavieja wonderful proposal to construct a new political party for the redemption of Spain has fizzled out completely and is now being laughed at.

Discussion still rages in the United States over General Miles' attacks on the army administration, but it is doubtful if he will be court-martialed, though a Commission of Enquiry into the charges will probably be appointed.

Telegram express fear of a conflict between British and French troops in the Sudan, the latter being said to occupy the town of Fashoda, which is not far from Omdurman.

LONDON NOTES

MONDAY, AUGUST 15.

The general tone of the comment in Madrid on the conclusion of peace is one of painful resignation. One Republican journal, which appeared with black borders, has been suspended.

News has been received at Key West that several of the American war vessels have been struck by shells fired by the Spaniards from Morro Castle. Fighting has also taken place in Puerto Rico.

A telegram from Shanghai says that a report is current there that Russia has received a promise from Li Hung-Chang to place the Imperial Customs Department under her control.

At the forthcoming army manoeuvres, the Duke of Connaught is to command the Northern Army and Sir Redvers Buller that of the South, each force being about 27,000 strong.

A Cardiff Correspondent states that the prospect of a settlement in the South Wales Coal dispute, which is now entering upon its twentieth week, is as remote as ever. There was an absolute breakdown of negotiations, and it is difficult to forecast the conditions under which they will be resumed.

The feeling prevailing on the Cardiff Exchange on Saturday he reports to have been a very dismal one, many persons expressing the opinion that nothing would close the dispute now except the cold weather.

While bathing from the beach at Coombe's Cove, Woolacombe, near Ilfracombe, yesterday morning a young lady, aged 20 years, a daughter of Sir Walter Foster, M. P., was carried out to sea and drowned.

Owing to the intense heat a large number of persons have been overcome in the street and taken to the different hospitals to be treated for sunstroke or heat apoplexy. At Highgate a man fell down in a field in which he was attending to his live stock, and died almost immediately from apoplexy brought about by the heat.

Through a fire which occurred last night at some oil and general stores in Dorton street, Camberwell, ten horses were burned to death in their stables.

Yachting contests at Ryde took place on Saturday in connection with the Royal Portsmouth Corinthian Yacht Club, the chief event being a race round the Isle of Wight. The weather was not too favourable, and at one time a thick fog entirely shut off the competing vessels from view. Maid Marian, who saved her time, was declared the winner.

At Cheltenham, on Saturday, Gloucestershire beat Warwickshire by five wickets, and at Kennington Oval Surrey defeated Sussex by 73 runs. Kent, playing Somerset, at Taunton, made such a gallant stand, that when stumps were pulled up and the game drawn they had scored a lead of 53 runs with three wickets still to go down. The match between Middlesex and Leicestershire at Lord's resulted in a victory for the home team by an innings and 119 runs.

Early on Saturday morning a shocking crime was perpetrated on Leyton Marshes, a man 72 years of age, named William Viney, murdering three out of his four children there, by cutting their throats. Viney also made an attempt on the life of the fourth child, a boy of eight, and stabbed him so seriously in the neck that he is now under treatment at the German Hospital at Dalston. The man, who has been out of work and is separated from his wife, who is some thirty

years his junior, was at once arrested, and confessed his guilt. Later in the day he was brought before the Stratford magistrates and remanded.

At Lancaster, on Saturday, the County Bench of magistrates dismissed the cases in which Artillery Volunteers at Bare Camp had been charged by the police with selling liquor at the sergeants' mess without a licence.

John Henry Jones, manager of the Seacombe branch of the North and South Wales Bank, pleaded guilty at Wallasey Police-court on Saturday, to appropriating about 2,000l. belonging to his employers.

The prisoner, who, it was said, had recently taken to betting, was recommended to mercy and was sentenced to six months' imprisonment. Another branch bank manager, Frederick Bulstrode Whitlock was committed for trial by the Nottingham magistrates on a charge of embezzling the money of Messrs. S. Smith and Co.

An inquest was held at Keswick on Saturday into the circumstances attending the death of the five ladies who were drowned through the foundering of their boat on Derwentwater on Friday morning. It appeared that the boat, although only built for six persons, had eight passengers in her at the time she filled and sank.

The three survivors, all males, gave evidence as to the catastrophe, which occurred after one of them had changed his seat. The jury returned a verdict of accidental death, but expressed the opinion that the boatman had committed an error of judgment in allowing eight passengers to take seats in the boat. At the same time, they were of opinion that if the boat had been properly trimmed as at first, the accident would not have happened. They also considered that the number of passengers should be registered on all boats let for hire.

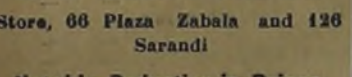

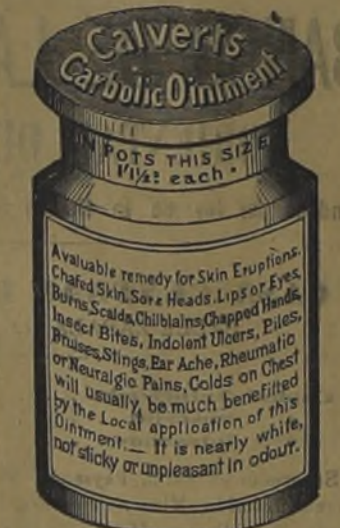
