### THE TREASURY CERTIFICATES

The story point of the recent measure of the Government suspending the issue and conversion of the Treasury Certificates seems to be that it is a hard hit to those who were induced to invest their money in the Certificates, confiding in the assurances of the Government that there would be no interruption in the system of issue and conversion.

To a certain extent this is undeniably true, but it is not entirely so. When the Government gave those assurances, at the same time giving the Certificates the additional guarantee of a raw tax in their favor, it naturally expected that the market would respond to its efforts with some degree of confidence, and it is hardly to be thought that either the Government or any one else would imagine that the war against the Certificates would be carried on until they reached a discount of 25 per cent. This, however, did occur, as is notorious, and the Government was compelled to choose between suspending the issue of the Certificates or paying its employees in values worth only 75 cents to the dollar. It elected the former course, and in our opinion wisely so, as we expressed in our article of yesterday. The heavy depreciation did not respond to any legitimate reasons whatever, it was brought about merely by speculation and trickery, which it was the business of the market to have checked. As the market did not do this, the Government did, and we do not see that it could have done anything else in self-defence. The Government finds itself, indeed it has provided itself, in a position to meet its monthly obligations punctually and in cash. This being the case, and no one can deny that it so, it would be mere insanity on the part of the Government to continue paying its employees in depreciated values which mulcted them in 25 % of their salaries, merely to please a group of speculators and of Bolsa «bears».

There are two classes of persons affected by the suspension of conversion of the Certificates. The first are those who have acquired the Certificates as a legitimate investment and at a moderate rate of discount. As, however, it is promised that the consolidation of the Certificates into an internal Debt will be accompanied by a bonus proportional to their age, we do not see that they have anything to complain about yet. Some of them may suffer a temporary inconvenience, awaiting the change, but their loss will be small, if there is any loss at all.

The other class affected are those who have acquired the Certificates as a speculation at an exorbitant discount. Possibly they will be losers by the transaction, but we do not see that they are deserving of much pity. Those who place their money on an unnaturally depreciated value of making 20 or 25 % interest, know well enough, or at all events ought to know, that their are not legitimately investing, but are speculating—gambling, in plainer language—and they must not complain if the game goes against them. The Government was certainly not called upon to respect the interests of speculators of this class in preference to its own credit and the interests of its employees. They were gambling with the credit of the Government, and they have lost the game—that is all, and that does not give them the right to abuse the Government, which has only acted

in self-defence. And, after all, have they lost so much? We doubt it. In place of the 20 or 25 % they expected to make, they will have to put up with the return of their capital and perhaps 8 or 10 %. It is not all gamblers who come out so well, and we think they should be thankful it is not worse.

The exact ratio of the bonification of the new Debt is not yet known to us. In our opinion the Government will act both foolishly and weakly if it makes the ratio proportionate to the unnaturally depressed quotation of the Certificates just before the Decree of suspension. That would be playing directly into the hands of the «bears». To be just, the bonification should be in proportion to an average price of the Certificates between their highest and their lowest quotation since March last, that is to say the price at which the large majority have been acquired. This, so far as we can see, would mean a bonification of 30 to 33 %, and this would be sufficient to cover genuine investors from loss.

It is also well to point out that the creation of the new Debt does not alter the financial situation in the least, it is merely the consolidation of the floating Debt which was in existence when the present administration came into office. There were nine months' Certificates owing then, and there are nine months' owing now. The difference it any, is in favor of the present situation, for the nine months' Certificates owing then corresponded to the extravagant Government of Sr. Borda, and those owing now correspond to the economical Government of Sr. Cuestas. The debt, therefore, will probably have been reduced. Its consolidation was practically inevitable at some period or other—only recently the *Siglo* was urging the step—and the very worst that can be said is that the moment was an unfortunate one, but in this, as we have shown, the hand of the Government was forced by the determined war on the Certificates made by the Bolsa.

Neither does the new Debt increase the national obligations by a single cent, seeing that its service is provided for by a 5 % tax on administrative salaries. The employees will now receive their salaries punctually in gold with a reduction of 5 %, instead of in Certificates which they have to discount at 20 or 25 %. We do not see that there is any choice in the matter. Certainly the tax will affect some employees who have hitherto been paid in gold without discount, but this is only remedying a situation of inequitable favoritism which was a just cause of discontent. It is obvious that the general situation of the administrative employees is greatly improved by the measure.

There has been more nonsense talked over this measure than we can remember for a long time past. For instance, a correspondent of the *Razon* tells that paper yesterday that the measure will greatly prejudice the employees and lower the credit of the Government! This is delicious. It is certainly the first time that we have heard of a return to cash payments being discredited to a Government or prejudicial to its creditors—most people would say the tale was exactly the other way about.

A little common sense, such as we have endeavored to apply, shows how unjust and ill-founded are most of the criticisms that have been directed against the Government in this matter. The measure might have been taken at a more opportune moment, it might have been softened by the giving of a few months' notice, but, apart from this, it is well considered, and angry criticisms do not come well from a market which practically forced the measure on the Government by its own unjust attitude towards the Certificates, and which has lent itself and still lends itself to unlimited «bearing» speculation that injures the Government and the credit of the country. When the matter is viewed in a calmer light, we expect this is the view that will be taken.

#### POLITICAL NOTES.

In the Council of State, on Monday, consent was given to the appointment of General Salvador Tajes as member of the Military Tribunal of Appeal. Discussion in detail of the Budget commenced, though the Ministers were unable to attend. The first two Schedules were approved, with some minor amendments, when the hour sounded and the sitting concluded.

The Message respecting consolidation of the outstanding Treasury Certificates into an internal Debt is ready for the Chambers, and will probably be published to day or tomorrow. So far its exact terms are not known.

#### How to Succeed.

«How to Succeed in Business» is the title of a series of interviews with the people who ought to know in «The Young Man» Alderman Treloar says: «Work hard, and take an interest in your work. Merely working hard as a machine will not do; an interest must be taken in the work, and individuality must be shown.» Sir Richard Tangye gives as one great secret of his success the life-long habit he has had of giving close attention to small details. He also makes a point of doing everything promptly. Mr. Walter Hazell, M.P., says that in general ability, united with great industry and unswerving perseverance, ultimately get their reward. The capacity to develop improved methods of production or distribution benefits alike the inventor and the entire community. It is more satisfactory to pursue steady industry than to seek success by a short cut; but, he adds, beware of keeping slavishly in old ruts.

Sir George Newnes's answer is: By taking as much interest in his work as he does in his pleasures. Sir Thomas J. Lipton advises starting with a definite object in view, determining to work hard, to take an intelligent interest in duties, not make too much of a bargain about long hours and do to others as they would like to be done by. Mr. C. A. Pearson says: «If your work does not interest you, it is perfectly impossible to do your best at it. When you have decided what business interests you, stick to it like a limpet. Get up with it in the morning, and go to bed with it at night. Think of it all the time. Then, if you have average intelligence, you are bound to succeed and success will bring leisure in which to enjoy it. But don't try and take your leisure until you have secured your success.»

#### SUNDRIES.

—The official list of the British losses in the great victory at Ondurman gives 2 officers killed and 13 wounded, 23 men killed and 89 wounded. Accounts still differ as to the losses of the Derwishes. The entry of the British troops into Kartum is not yet confirmed, but is probable as Kartum is only a few miles from Ondurman, though on the opposite side of the Nile. Anyhow, the Derwish army is completely broken up, which is the great point. The Kalief (or Caliph) has not been taken yet. The first congratulatory telegram from Europe was a very

hearty one from the Kaiser. The Lieut. Grenfell who was killed is probably a son of Mr. Pascoe Grenfell, a cousin of the British Consul here.

—The weather has changed very pleasantly without the storm prophesied on Monday having come to pass. Better so;

—The Empress Frederick of Germany, eldest daughter of Queen Victoria has just had a fall from her horse at Hamburg, but fortunately escaped without injury.

—Mr. James Egan, the ex-tenant, has been appointed Sheriff of Dublin.

—The promised repetition of «Jeannette» will not be able to take place at the San Felipe on the 14th instant, as was hoped, as the Theatre will be otherwise occupied, but it is hoped to make arrangements for a repetition at some other date before the end of the month.

—The Spanish Cortes reassembled on Monday. The Government will probably secure secrecy for the discussion of the war and the peace questions, thus minimizing the public excitement that prevails. The socialist and republican factions are absenting themselves in sign of protest.

—General Zurlinder has been named Minister of War in France, in place of Mr. Cavaignac. His attitude in the Dreyfus question is not yet known, nor is any decision of the Cabinet announced respecting the revision.

—The Government has appointed Dr. Juan F. Canessa as member of the National Council of Hygiene, in place of Dr. Diego Perez, who died three days ago.

—Mr. Gladstone's will, which was holographic, has just been opened. It is dated Nov. 29, 1896. His personal property amounts to £59,500.

—The telegrams are both contradicting and corroborating the rather improbable story of an Anglo-German alliance, so the matter remains in doubt. The assertion seems to have originated with the *London Daily Mail*, the least reliable of papers.

—The Bank of the Republic has discovered that the «privilege» of issuing notes is far from being an unmixed blessing. In fact it is anything but a privilege in a country like this, where any foolish or malicious rumor is sufficient to start a «run» on the Bank by the ignorant classes, and consequently the Bank always has to keep a reserve on hand equivalent to the notes in issue, so that the notes are more of a danger than a «privilege».

—We see from our Buenos Aires contemporaries that it is practically certain that Lord Hawke's cricketing team will visit the River Plate in the coming season, so that our local cricketers will have the opportunity of trying their strength against what is to all interests and purposes professional cricket. Lord Hawke's team are not «professionals» in the false and artificial meaning given to the word by the Amateur Athletic rule, for they do not receive direct payment for their services, though we believe they expect their living and travelling expenses to be paid, which is quite as much as many men make out of a profession and more than some. But they are professional cricketers in the sense that they are experts in constant practice, who devote all their time and energies to the game and make it the principal occupation of their life. If this is not making a «profession» of the game, the *English Dictionary* will have to be altered.

—We quote from the *B. A. Standard*.—A most dastardly, barbarous and atrocious crime was committed in the open day—the sun had barely set—on Saturday afternoon in Calle Florida. As the Consul-General of Brazil, Senhor José Miguel de Azevedo Barrozo Bustos, was leaving the Consulate accompanied by his Secretary, a man named Candido de Castro Sorrento, soldier, disalt Lieut. Colonel of Guatemala, sprang at him with a knife and endeavored to cut his throat, besides inflicting a frightful gash in the cheek and another in the neck. His secretary, in attempting to defend the Consul received a nasty cut on the hand. The unfortunate victim was taken to his house in a very critical condition and his assailant to the 1st section police station. It is said that the Consul had given a very unfavorable report regarding the character of Sorrento to certain persons who were in business relations with him in Europe and that consequently, Sorrento determined on revenge.

—The new mail steamer Carisbrook Castle, which arrived at Southampton about 2 a. m. on August 5, has succeeded in breaking the record on the homeward run from Table Bay. She accomplished the distance (close upon 6,000 miles) in 15 days 1 hour 11 minutes, a record which her owners declare she will yet eclipse. The present was her first return voyage from the Cape.

«Cosmos», a French scientific review, says that a South American farmer has recently made an accidental discovery of great value to gardeners and florists. It is to the effect that the leaves of the tomato plant will drive insects away from other plants. He covered the tomato leaves over some young shrubs he wished to protect from the sun and from small insects, and was delighted to find that the latter cleared out as soon as they got the odour of the tomato leaves. He then extended the same treatment to an entire row of young peach trees, and his success was complete. To render the process more simple, he tried a decoction of fresh tomato leaves as a spray on other trees and shrubs, and found that he had a perfectly effective weapon, which cost practically nothing. He also found that a spray of the same kind would keep flies off his horses.

—The Lord Mayor of London made a great hit in his speech at the recent Press banquet. «There were some portions of the Press», he said, «for which we all have the greatest contempt.» The cheers which greeted this declaration were loud, prolonged, universal, and obviously heartfelt. It was clear that there was not a journalist present but knew of some contemporary for which he felt the greatest contempt. One may recall Lord Bowen's emendation to the Jubilee Address from her Majesty's Judges. «Conscious as we are», said the address, «of our shortcomings.» «Suppose we substitute», suggested Lord Bowen, «conscious as we are of one another's shortcomings.»

—The fierce competition of commercial travellers in these modern days extends to the form of their advice notes. It is all important that these should command some attention from the customer, and much ingenuity is expended both on their appearance and on their contents. An appeal to the trader's sense of humour is a favourite device. It is on this principle that one Edinburgh firm has recently sent a card to the shopkeepers on whom their travellers are about to call, saying «Mr. So-and-so will afflict you on the —th inst.»

## LONDON NOTES

**SATURDAY, AUGUST 6.**  
General Shafter's troops at Santiago are to be sent home as speedily as possible. The Spanish armoured cruiser Maria Teresa has been refloated and will steam to Norfolk.

The Queen of Denmark's health is again fairly satisfactory, and no special reason for apprehension now exists. The sudden summons to her relatives was due to a passing phase of excessive weakness.

In the House of Lords yesterday the Vaccination Bill as amended was read a third time; the Metropolitan Commons Bill, and the Commons' Amendments to the Local Government (Ireland) Bill, and the Merchant Shipping (Mercantile Fund) Bill were passed through Committee. The Nonconformist Marriages (Attendance of Registrar) Bill was read a second time.

In the House of Commons, Mr. Fletcher Moulton took the oath and his seat for Launceston in place of the late Mr. T. Owen. After Supply, the consideration of the Lords' Amendments on the Vaccination Bill with reference to the Conscience Clause was commenced, and not concluded at an early hour this morning.

The Lord Mayor, accompanied by the Lady Mayoress, attended by the camp at Shoeburyness yesterday, and distributed the prizes won by the Artillery Volunteers at the various shooting competitions which have been held there during the past week.

A fine wind favoured yacht racing at Cowes yesterday. A contest between small craft for a Cup offered by the Prince of Wales was won by Captain J. D. Barry's *Tauergine*. There were seven entries for the Australian Cup, which was taken by Mr. Busing's *Centis*. In the race for the German Emperor's Cup, *Latona*, who had to give time to all her competitors, came in victorious.

The two great London cricket matches were both brought to a close yesterday. Surrey beating Yorkshire at the Oval, by an innings and 272 runs, and Essex defeating Lancashire, at Leyton, by nine wickets. At the provincial Gloucestershire, at Bristol, ran up a total of 379. Townsend scoring 131, and than Middlesex made 352. At their second attempt Gloucester-

shire scored 11 for no wicket. The second match of the Canterbury week is in an interesting position. Notts made 345 and Kent 270, and then on going in a second time the Midland county lost three wickets for 16 runs. At Leicester the home side scored 333 and Hampshire at their second attempt had made 209 for six wickets when stumps were drawn for the day. Sussex at Taunton did not gain any advantage from their good total, for Somerset went in and scored 369 and then got two Sussex wickets down for 12 runs.

A specially constituted court, consisting of the Lord Chief Justice, Mr. Justice Wright, and Mr. Justice Kennedy, yesterday heard two cases which raised question under the Fugitive Offenders' Act. The first, that of a Mr. Hole, was adjourned until judgment had been delivered in the second. This was the matter of Major Spilsbury, who, charged with offences committed within the territorial waters of the Emperor of Morocco in connection with the Tourmaline expedition, has been ordered to be sent to Tangier for trial by the Moroccan authorities. For Major Spilsbury it was contended that if so sent his life would be endangered, and that already two attempts had been made upon it. The hearing was adjourned.

Proceedings against the men charged with fraud in connection with the alleged Lydenberg Consolidated Mines were continued at the Central Criminal Court before Mr. Justice Lawrence. The defendant Coward, who was seized with a fit in the dock of Thursday, was stated to be still very ill and was released on bail to come up for trial if required. Evidence on behalf of the defendants was given and the case was adjourned.

A man who called himself Captain Samuel Johann Baptiste Stanhope, but whose real name was said to be Samuel Lee, was at the Newington Sessions yesterday sentenced to five years' penal servitude and two years' police supervision, having been convicted of charges of fraud. It was shown that the prisoner had for years passed as a cryerman, and conducted bogus missions. He was arrested at Sheffield.

Dr. John Lloyd Whitmarsh was yesterday committed for trial by Mr. Marsham, from the Westminster Police-court, on a charge of wilful murder, the alleged offence being that of causing the death of Miss Bayly, under circumstances already made public. The accused denied his guilt and reserved his defence.

MONDAY, AUGUST 8. The Queen held a private investiture at Osborne on Saturday of the Bath, Star of India, St Michael and St. George, and the Indian Empire.

A Madrid Correspondent telegraphs that the Spanish Government has now finally drafted its reply to America, and that it was submitted to the Queen Regent yesterday. Spain accepts the terms offered by America and asks for a suspension of hostilities pending the definite conclusion of peace.

With regard to the Philippines, the Spanish Government proposes that the future of the island should be decided by a Commission representing the two Powers. In this connection a Washington Correspondent says that the Jingo Senators, fearing the decline of the Imperialist idea, are now loudly protesting against the giving up by the United States of any territory occupied in the present war. Should the President decide the question against them, however, he would probably be supported by the people, whom the recent conduct of the Cuban and other insurgents has disgusted.

Telegrams from Santiago give startling accounts of the condition of the United States army there. Thousands are sick, and General Ames has telegraphed to Washington declaring that the only marching the troops are now able to perform will be that to the transports which are to take them home. The officers and doctors at the front have held a meeting, and made representations in the same sense to General Shaffer. They prophesy an appalling disaster should their warning remain unheeded.

A yacht race round the Isle of Wight for a prize of one hundred guineas, given by Mr. C. D. Rose, took place on Saturday. Four yachts entered—Bona, Ailsa, Aurora, and Rainbow—but the first named did not start. The weather which was bad at the beginning of the contest, cleared up later. In the result Ailsa won on her time allowance from Rainbow.

The annual competition for the professional painting championship was held at Maidenhead on Saturday. There were four competitors, three of whom were members of the well-known Haines family, of Old Windsor, and in accordance with anticipation William Haines again won easily, the second prize being taken by F. 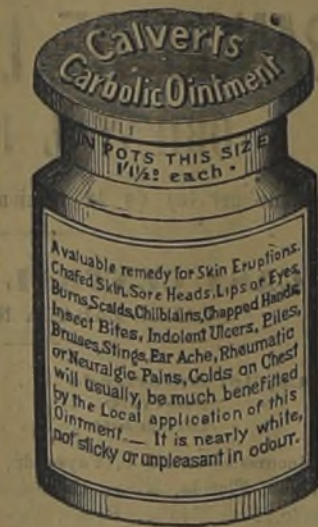
